TESTIMONY

*Rep. Read - Prime sponsor of the bill. Introduced by Rep. Read. Currant use changes. The purpose is to protect our lands and being stewards. Not to remotely touch the agricultural world. We have two privately owned hunting clubs with exotic species. Largest exotic species hunting club east of the Mississippi River. The club has damaged our environment. The name of the park is Corbin Park. There is a game bird facility that trains hunting dogs. Bring exotic species that invade our land.

Rep. Porter: Do you know of any other current use land that does not have to pay taxes if they make a profit? ANS: Not that I am aware of. A private club is receiving a benefit and the state is not benefiting for it? ANS: You are correct. It is posted with no trespassing signs. Completely cut off.

Rep. Mangipudi: How are the feeding habits affecting our eco system? ANS: Very broadly, wild board can affect the habitat.

Rep. Lascelles: Attempting to control the non-native species to control wild boars.

Rep. Maggiore: How do we define non native species? ANS: What language to put in. I just used the simplest way as possible.

Rep. Lang: Harboring non native trout from Fish and Game.

Rep. Stavis: Amendment tax exemptions for private hunting clubs? ANS: I would be acceptable to that.

*Rep. Rung - Supports the bill. Written testimony submitted.

Rep. Mangipudi: Large blue foes game preserve. Any others that you know of? Any particular that could spread? ANS: I am not aware of any other hunting clubs being preserved. Corbin Park is hunting club. It is not a benefit to the state of New Hampshire. It's a club, there is a lot of money involved. Why should they be allowed in current use? Exotic species to cause a lot of damage. Protecting our state is a lot of work.

Rep. Lang: Served on current use commission.

Rep. Rung - Served species and aquatic life commission. Current uses make our state a better state. It is stunning. New Hampshire into safari life.

Rep. Stavis: Left handed glove on the right hand. The tax status of this private club. ANS: They are allowed to roam freely (Exotic Species). Very common for wild board to escape.

*Rep. Mason - Opposes the bill. State of New Hampshire established a long open policy of current use. Allows for private use for a variety of activities. Current use helps keep the land open for public recreation. The current proposed statute would affect Corbin Park. They maintain their current use status over the past years. Rep. Mason has provided written testimony.

Rep. Treleaven: 26,000 acres of land that isn't open to the pubic? ANS: 1.33 million current (acres) use that is not open to the public. Corbin Park is basically the side of a mountain. Current use has worked well to keep New Hampshire scenic.

Rep. Mangipudi: Does this club also have a view tax? Shouldn't we be responsible to police our environment? ANS: Yes, we should be responsible.

Tana Gitau, NH Wildlife Federation - Opposes the bill. These properties generate revenue for the state.

Robert Johnson, NH Farm Bureau - Against bill. Keep it the open focused current use bill that it is.

*Joseph Mullin, Congressional Sportsman's Foundation - Statement emailed to committee. New Hampshire Sportsman generated 18 million dollars last year. Training dogs also may use nonnative species.

Jasen Stock, NH Timberland Association - Against the bill. Is it developed or is it open? We currently have the best open spaced laws in the country. You can post current use lands. The bill is targeting a specific land owner.

Scott Rouleau, Farview Farm N.E. Upland Owner - We keep bees, licensed by Fish and Game to keep pheasants. I am opposed due to the vague language in the bill. We have over 400 acres in current use status, our business would be in jeopardy.

Mr. Lawrence Keanne, National Sports Foundation - Includes many firearm retailers. This is directly related to Corbin Park. This bill will hurt conservation. Most of the information given was incorrect concerning wild boar, elk, etc.

Donald McFarlane - There are weaknesses in the bills wording. The definition is subjective. What constitutes a native or non native species? There is very little you could do to change the language. Current use laws are designed for the preservation of open space. I was horrified when I read this bill. The bill's intent is to go after Corbin Park. I am appalled by what the sponsor's are doing with this bill. This bill is a taking of property.

Nancy Holmes, AKC Hunt Clubs - Against the bill. Would be affected. Corbin Park, 130 years with no problems. There is a situation in the south western part of the state where wild boar are breeding. This bill is really bad, and it needs to be ITL.

*Jake McGuigan - Written statement submitted.

Peter Crowell, President of Corbin Park - We oppose this bill. We maintain the property as a private preserve.

As a resident, voter & property tax payer in New Hampshire, I do not support the changes to land use regulations as proposed in HB 467. The removal of the 'open space' classification from lands & properties currently used for game preserves & shooting/hunting clubs appears to be yet another sneak attack to destroy our New Hampshire way of life & culture. As there are not many of these establishments, the amount of revenue generated by the change would be small, but the impact on their viability would be large. The change in property assessments both for owned properties & those leased to operators would be significant, raising costs to the point of failure, essentially outlawing stocked preserves through a back door.

My name is Scott Rouleau. I am the owner of Far View Farm & New England Upland Shooting Preserve in Hillsborough NH.

I am also the President of the Pheasants Forever New England Chapter, a conservation organization that raises funds for upland and pollinator habitat improvement projects.

Far View Farm is a small family business. We are marginal at best when it comes to the bottom line. Our land is in current use and is multipurposed. In addition to game birds, we raise bees for their honey and pollination. We plant many acres of buckwheat each year for them to pollinate and to gather nectar. We also have a fruit tree orchard, hay fields and blue berries. We are regulated by the NH Fish and Game department. They provide me with the permits I need to run my game bird operation.

I am reaching out to you regarding HB 467. http://www.gencourt.state.nh.us/bill_status/billText.aspx?sy=2021&id=595&txtFormat=html I oppose this bill as written. The proposed bill doesn't have any clarifying language in it regarding "non native" and "non domesticated" so it is difficult to determine who it was intended for and who will be impacted by it as written. As is , it reads like an anti hunting / anti game species bill in the form of a tax bill designed to penalize anyone that has game species on their property.

Here are a few questions that immediately came to mind when I read the bill.

Q: Would private landowners that allow their property to be use for NH F&G pheasant stocking be impacted by this bill?

There are \sim 53 stocking sites in NH and many of them are owned by private land owners who have their land in current use.

Q: Are the pheasants that the state releases native or non native?

Q: Are they wild or domestic? They were not raised in the wild.

In recent history, NH had a naturally reproducing pheasant population that has dwindled due to lack of suitable habitat. One could argue that pheasants are native because they once lived here in the wild and were naturally reproducing not that long ago, just like the wild turkeys are native that were repatriated to NH a few decades ago once turkey habitat had improved.

Upland hunters and dog trainers that posses the proper permit from the state can use pen raised game birds to train their dogs.

Q: Are these birds considered domestic or wild?

Q: Would the dog trainers be negatively impacted if their training grounds are in current use?

We have Elk ,Red deer and Buffalo farmers in the state that raise these animals for food / and breeding with other operations to share genetics.

Q: Are these animals domestic or are they game? Would the farmers be negatively impacted by this bill?

Elk lived in NH in the 1700's. They once thrived here.

Q: If we brought them back like the eastern turkey would they be considered native?

Have any of these questions been asked or considered? Are there any answers you can share?

It would be very difficult for me to keep my business / farm running if I couldn't keep my land in current use and I assume that would be true for the small farms , NH sportspeople and landowners I mentioned above.

Please take this into consideration when you have the hearing on HB 467

I would be happy to discuss this if anyone would like to speak with me.

Good afternoon, to whom it may concern. I'm writing to voice my opposition to HB 467, a bill that would fundamentally attack the treasured past time of hunting in the great state of New Hampshire. Across the country, states allow for the hunting of non-native, non-domestic animals, such as Pheasants for sport and to ultimately put food on the table for their families. The ability to offer open space land, both public and private, for Pheasant hunting would be kneecapped if HB 467 is passed and the tax dedication is removed. As with any business, if the tax dedication is removed landowners, as well as those who run shooting preserves will bear the increased costs and pass them off to a cohort of sportsmen that are already riddled with a high barrier to entry to enjoy their hobby/sport (cost of equipment, training, and licensing for hunting).

Having private open space land (shooting preserves) allows sportsmen like me the ability to utilize private land for efficient dog training that wouldn't be possible on public land. As a 25-year-old with a full-time job, it would take me months of hunting on public land, utilizing state WMA Pheasent stocking sites to give my dog the same amount of exposure and opportunities that could be accomplished in a few hours on a shooting preserve. For example, I went hunting 3-4 times per week during the last Pheasant season (in 2020 without a dog), and only had 7 bird "opportunities" where birds were found and flushed into the air. On a shooting preserve, I would be able to have the 7 birds released in a controlled environment, in a variety of different settings and cover (trees, fields, woods, etc on their open space land), and have the dog receive the same amount of opportunities with much greater control of outside variables. This ultimately results in a more well-trained dog, and hunting companion.

Please do not allow HB 467 to pass, as it will only lead to the decline of a great American past time, and punish those that are responsibly stewarding the sport.

We feel most people do not understand the Current Use program, which is about keeping land undeveloped not about human access. ONE CU category (recreational which gets the highest discount) requires land not be posted and be open to human recreation, but all the rest may be posted legally.

We have lived near Corbin park most of my life. The park provides a very very large extremely valuable unbroken habitat for many native NH species that cannot be replicated anywhere in the Southern half of NH. Removing the CU designation from their very wild undisturbed property would risk it being dissolved and sold as smaller lots

Most of our life wild boar escapees were listed in the FG rule book as "no closed season" but early in the 2000's FG changed the rules and declared the boar private property that can only be killed with park permission (We note that We've not personally seen a boar outside the fence in years). My name is Don McGinley and I live in New Boston. Although I've lived here in New Hampshire for 22 years, I'm told I'll never achieve "Native" status as I was born (1944) and lived in Massachusetts most of my life. I'm not quite sure what HB 467 is meant to achieve, but it seems that it *might* very well be an Anti-Hunting Bill? This is why I'm writing to you and the Committee as I hold a Lifetime NH Hunting & Fishing License and enjoy Upland Bird Hunting with my English Springer Spaniel, Nellie. I also happen to be the appointed New Hampshire "Public Member" of the Connecticut River Atlantic Salmon Commission, and would be interested to hear if non-native fish might be linked to this bill. Some thoughts on HB 467 follow:

We have lots of "non-native, non-domesticated animal species" in New Hampshire. The most obvious species are upland birds, including Pheasants which are stocked in the Fall by NH Fish Game for hunters on both public and private land. About 12,000 birds at 65 sites are stocked weekly for shotgun hunters who pay a \$31 license fee (this program costs the State & Taxpayers nothing as the license fees cover the total cost of birds). I don't have a specific number but a large number of stocking sites are privately owned by people and farmers who utilize the tax benefits of Current Use; but, HB 467 here would likely take away Current Use benefits to farmers and other landowners who need CU to afford their property taxes. Additionally, NH has several upland public preserves where people can hunt pheasants for a fee. I've seen a number of such preserves go out of business due to overhead costs and I would guess that more would fail as businesses if HB 467 passes into law.

Another non-native Species found at some of our farms are Red Stags (many call them Elk) that are really non-domesticated animals. What will HB 467 do to our farmers who absolutely need and deserve the Current Use benefit?

NH has a world renowned private Hunting Preserve in Croydon as you probably know. Corbin Park which consumes nearly 50,000 acres of land surely takes advantage of Current Use. Corbin contains large numbers of European Wild Pigs as well as other exotic species that would cause the preserve significant financial pain. A friend of mine shot a trophy Elk there years ago and had it mounted in his Manchester store for customers to talk about and enjoy. Have the Bill's authors looked at this potential impact?

We now have over 40,000 **non-domesticated**, wild Eastern Turkeys roaming throughout the state with Spring and Fall hunting seasons. Our current Turkeys derive from birds introduced to the state by NH Fish & Game over a period of years (1970s-1980s) with **non-native** birds provided by the states of West Virginia and New York (NY birds equal most of the success). As an amateur, I'm not quite sure if the Courts would consider today's Turkeys as Native or like me and my NH born children being Non-Native? I think,

however, that a good Attorney could nearly wipe out Current Use benefits statewide if HB 467 becomes Law.

Last, I think most if not all animal scientists probably consider Fish as an animal. I know of an excellent trout Hatchery in the Ossipee area that raises thousands of non-native Brown and Rainbow Trout for landowners to stock on private ponds and for Clubs to stock especially for the myriad of Kid's Fishing Events. NH Fish & Game of course stocks hundreds of thousands of Trout (the majority are Browns & Rainbows) throughout the state annually. I guarantee that a significant amount of Current Use land includes the huge Merrimack and Connecticut River watersheds. Would such stocking eliminate CU benefits for all the private, commercial and charitable organizations that those non-native fish swim in? Maybe...

Mr. Chairman, I just found out about NHB 467 yesterday and have a 3 hour appointment starting at Noon on Monday. As such, it is impossible for me to virtually attend your hearing. I hope my comments here are of use to you and the Committee and I would ask that this EMail to be entered as Testimony if possible.

I urge you and the Committee to report HB467 to the full House as "Inexpedient to Legislate".

Honorable Tom Dolan, Chairman & Honorable Members:

I am in opposition to HB467 and ask you to motion and vote ITL. NH Current Land Use was developed by this General Court in 1973. The spirit of the law is to save NH's open space by allowing private landowners an affordable tax base for rural land usage. It has an established, long-proven track record of success in our State. Current Use tax strategy works congruently, maintaining open land while reducing urban sprawl, resulting in protecting of our privately owned forests, agricultural lands, wetlands, and wildlife habitat. Additional incentives are allowed for a forestry stewardship program, thus creates enhanced timber yield and quality. At harvest time this results in increased timber tax revenue. It also plays a significant roll providing views and vistas creating a kaleidoscope of charm and charisma attracting tourists to our State. It has successfully added private land use trespass giving opportunity for recreational hikers, skiers, cyclists, water recreation, ATV's, snowmobiles, bird watching, wildlife viewing, hunting, and fishing to name a few. Landowners have the right to keep their land closed by paying a higher tax rate. Our Current Land Use program creates far more tax revenue than burden, as open land needs few services. The tax incentives for these property owners helps keep their private open land intact. Since established, the program has protected an estimated half of our 5.74 million acres, and further estimates half of this land is open for public recreation. Our Current Land Use program has been examined and has stood the tested time, rightfully protected as Legislature continues to make the right choice of sheltering this established current program.

By the proposed amended inclusion, "Nor shall "open space land" include any farmland or forestland used to harbor not-native, non-domesticated animal species." opens a pandoras box that jeopardizes many of our citizens open space commitment and the spirit of the law. Places like Corbin Park, a private 26,000 acre preserve established in 1890 maintains such non-native species would be forced to end their Current Use status. The park managed for 130 years a population of non-native wildlife with recreational hunting harvest by its owners and guests. Corbin's open space land practices wildlife and forestry management, along with wetland protection creating habitat for both non-native and native wildlife. Corbin Park has worked with NH foresters, and loggers generating jobs and timber tax revenue. Their forest releases result in additional habitat, natural feed for both native and non-native species. The park maintains its Current Use status well within the spirit of the current law. (This is no different than someone recreational cross-country skiing on their owned Current Use Land!) Corbin may survive this incurred legislation tax burden of HB467 but at the same time HB467 would have unilateral devastating impact on many NH landowners. NH's has additional upland preserves, that use nonnative upland gamebird species, regulated by NHF&G licensing, would be affected. They promote similar land management practices maintaining excellent habitat for both non-native and native species. These preserves are membership based, with family focus, and open to the public. They provide countless hours of outdoor experience for many NH families and draw out of state sportsmen as well. These preserves offer a wide range of experiences and work hand-in-hand with clubs and groups providing a safe non-crowded environment for the recreational shooter, hunter, and dog trainers alike. In addition, NHF&G currently has 21 licensed non-native species game propagation growers in NH. Many who would be forced to forfeit their Current Land Use tax credit or give up their passion. NH sport dog owners and trainers use other Current Use lands throughout the state often trained with live birds.

Some of these dogs are used for field trial competitions throughout the United States and abroad. NHF&G stock pheasants on 13 private regulated shooting areas. For these landowners, to retain their Current Use tax credits, would be forced to close their land to public use, ending their cooperative use with NHF&G's jeopardizing the pheasant program. Furthermore, there are countless addition not-native species that habitat and seek harbor. Example it the rock pigeon, European starling, house finch, brown and rainbow trout. State pigeon clubs exist, use homing flight pens releasing them on Current Use Land. Farms have large flocks of these birds that seek winter harbor and feed off their crop residue and storage. Private stocking ponds, purchase and raise both rainbow and brown trout. As written this language would end Current Use as we know it.

From personal experience, on my farm and woodlands that I have in Current Land Use, I have stocked my pond, raised gamebirds. and trained dogs. I hunt at NH's public preserves, and NHF&G stocking sites, purchasing State licenses as required. Under this amendment I would be no longer able to raise gamebirds on my land unless I gave up my Current Land Use benefit. Many others would feel the same financial strain, forcing them to abandon their passions. Public hunting areas on private land would be lost, a devastating blow to NHF&G pheasant hunting program. This amended language does not belong in our Current Use program nor does its intent. *Current Use program helps us to ensure that the New Hampshire we all love will be preserved for generations to come*.

Thank you Mr. Chairman and the members of the County and Municipal Government Committee. I come before you to speak in support of HB467.

As ones who love New Hampshire and all that makes our state special, you will join me in appreciating this bill. It reflects the intent of our state's current use statute to preserve the natural and traditional land use of the Granite State.

However, the NH Advantage fundamentally relies on assessing non-current use property to raise tax revenue to fund local services, including public education. We have been successful since current use passed into law in 1973 in balancing the lower revenues from land in current use with regular tax rates for other properties.

But, is it consistent with current use when land is used to introduce non-native, non-domesticated animals for private, paid recreational hunting? Is the legislative intent for wealthy, out of state hunters to stock private land – public use forbidden - with non-native species and pay handsomely to hunt them? Is it worth the risk of destroying the habitat of our native species? Is that the New Hampshire way? I don't think so.

I believe that the current use statute needs to clarify that its intent is to protect the natural and cultural heritage of New Hampshire. That is what this bill does and I respectfully ask that you recommend OTP. Thank you.

On behalf of the National Shooting Sports Foundation ("NSSF"), I write today to express our strong opposition for House Bill 467, which seeks to curtail certain types of legal hunting activities in New Hampshire via changes to the tax code.

As the trade association for America's firearms, ammunition, hunting, and recreational shooting sports industry, NSSF seeks to promote, protect and preserve hunting and the shooting sports. We have a membership of more than 9,000 manufacturers, distributors, firearms retailers, shooting ranges, and sportsmen's organizations. Our manufacturer members make the firearms used by law-abiding New Hampshire sportsmen and women, the U.S. military, and law enforcement agencies throughout the state.

This piece of legislation would quietly remove a current use tax credit/deduction if you "harbor" non-native, non-domesticated animals. This bill would have a negative financial impact on many of the hunting preserves and clubs throughout New Hampshire. At a time where we are finally seeing an increase in hunters this bill would try to slowly put an end to that while impacting legal small businesses in the state. Hunting, fishing and other forms of outdoor recreation have proven physical, psychological, and educational benefits for our nation's young people. Despite these benefits, our country has experienced declining participation in hunting until the only recent increase and we need to make every effort to continue trying to recruit new hunters and protecting opportunities.

Hunting and associated industries represent the largest financial supporters of wildlife conservation throughout the United States, having contributed over \$10.3 billion to habitat conservation and wildlife management through Pittman Robertson excise tax payments since 1991. In addition to excise tax payments, hunting and fishing licenses constitute the second largest source of revenue for state fish and wildlife agencies. Excise tax contributions and license receipts will inevitably decrease with the passage of this bill.

New Hampshire Fish and Game Department Testimony on HB 467, Relative to Current Use Tax Rate Eligibility. House Municipal and County Government Committee March 1, 2021

We write to express concern about HB 467 as drafted, and to express the position of the New Hampshire Fish and Game Department to oppose the bill as written. While members of the Commission have been briefed upon the bill, the full NH Fish and Game Commission has not met to develop a position on the bill.

We offer no comment on the current use program itself, which has been a very valuable tool in protecting the status of open land for many conservation purposes, including the preservation of the land for the management of wildlife and for access to hunting, fishing and trapping.

Instead, we express concern about the very vague language that is proposed to be added to the statute, "...Nor shall "open space land" include any farm land or forest land used to harbor non-native, non-domesticated animal species." We have the following concerns:

- 1. We do not know the meaning of the term "harbor", which might mean anything from passively allowing a species to remain on a site all the way to actively fencing in an area, or otherwise placing the species in some form of captivity.
- 2. We do not know the meaning of "non-native, non-domesticated animal species". If one contrasts this idea with the definition of "wildlife" that is contained in RSA 207:1, XXXV:

"XXXV. Wildlife: Refers to all species of mammals, birds, fish, mollusks, crustaceans, amphibians, invertebrates, reptiles or their progeny or eggs which, whether raised in captivity or not, are normally found in a wild state.

We are concerned that all wildlife is "non-domesticated" by definition, and thus nearly every parcel of open space land in the state currently in the current use program could be affected. Since there is no definition of "non-native", and no point in time when a specific species could be determined to be native or non-native, we are concerned that nearly every parcel of open space farm or forest land in the state could be affected by this language, and potentially disqualified from the current use program.

3. There could be an unintended side effect of preventing the Fish and Game Department from operating a full season for pheasant or for wild turkey, both of which are very popular game birds among hunters in the state. Pheasant is stocked from birds that are farm raised, but then are released into the wild. As to the pheasant season, the Department stocks these birds at both privately owned locations and state owned locations. Over 65% of the locations are on privately owned lands and over 50% of the stocked birds are released on these lands, many of which would be affected by this bill, because pheasant as stocked could be found to be both "non-native and "non-domesticated". Rather than risk loss of current use status, we

As to the wild turkey season, turkey is a species that was once extirpated from the state. Thus, depending upon when the determination of species status is made under this program, this game bird could be found to be both "non-native and non-domesticated". Over a period of years, the restoration efforts of the department and its partners have restored the population to the point that there is a spring and fall hunting season that impacts thousands of sportsmen, and turkey are found in all communities in our state. Many of the birds are hunted on private property with the permission of the owners, which permission might be revoked rather than lose current use taxation status. The loss of hunting opportunity would have serious repercussions for the management of the species. The loss of current use taxation status would be a severe impact upon the owners of open space farm and forest property in the state.

If a hunting season for pheasant is lost or curtailed, or a hunting season for wild turkey is lost or curtailed, there will be a fiscal impact to state revenues in the form of lost hunting license revenue to the Fish and Game fund. Thus, we respectfully request that this bill be found Inexpedient to Legislate, or in the alternative, that the bill receive a Fiscal Note so that the impact of public revenues may be known.

Honorable Members of the House Municipal and County Government Committee:

My name is Joseph Mullin and I am the Assistant Manager, Northeastern States for the Congressional Sportsmen's Foundation (CSF). I respectfully urge you to oppose House Bill 467 (HB 467) – legislation that poses to eliminate conservation tax incentives for New Hampshire's upland bird hunting facilities and sporting dog kennels. Doing so has the potential to hamper hunter recruitment efforts and would in turn result in a negative impact to the conservation funding stream the New Hampshire Fish and Game Department relies on to carry out their critical mission on behalf of New Hampshire's fish, wildlife, their habitats, and all citizens of the state.

For more than 80 years, sportsmen and women have been the primary funders of state-level conservation efforts in this state and are thus an important constituency that provides benefits for all New Hampshire residents. In 2020 alone, New Hampshire's sportsmen and women generated around \$18 million dollars for conservation through revenue derived from license sales and excise taxes on sporting-related goods in the unique "user-pays, public-benefits" structure known as the American System of Conservation Funding (ASCF). The funds collected through this program are the lifeblood of state fish and wildlife agencies (including the New Hampshire Fish and Game Department) — the primary managers of our nation's fish and wildlife resources. In this system, hunting preserves and sporting dog kennels offer unique benefits that further contribute to the management of our nation's fish, wildlife, and natural habitats.

For new sportsmen and women, bird hunting facilities offer a variety of benefits and present the ideal opportunity to experience time afield in a learning environment. On these properties, hunters will often spend time shooting clays at an on-site range, ensuring that they are prepared for the day's hunt, with each pull of the trigger (including those in pursuit of game) representing a contribution made to the ASCF. These facilities also offer an ideal venue for new sportsmen and women to learn alongside mentors in a controlled

environment, as hunting positions are coordinated in order to allow for unimpeded opportunities. At a point in time where national participation in hunting has been on a general decline, preserves offer new sportsmen and women an opportune introduction to our nation's sporting traditions.

Additionally, sporting dog kennels provide a model setting for sportsmen and women to train their four-legged friends under true hunting conditions. Hunting dogs have an irreplaceable role alongside their handlers, and the training needed to prepare for each season is not something taken lightly. Many of the field exercises that that these dogs experience include live-firing at birds, which further contributes to the ASCF. Project Upland – an award-winning hunting media brand – conducted a survey of its readership to determine the members' reasons for getting involved with hunting, and a resounding 75% answered "Yes" to the question "Would you say that dogs played a critical role in you becoming a hunter?" As this study reflects, dogs can play an instrumental role in hunter recruitment, retention, and reactivation. With this in mind, most – if not all – hunting preserves and sporting dog kennels use non-native species, such as pheasant and Hungarian partridge. While these gamebirds have become iconic species for the upland hunting community, their existence in North America by virtue makes them non-native and non-domesticated.

Many hunting preserves and kennels receive incentives under the current use tax assessment by conserving the land, water, forest, agricultural and wildlife resources on their properties – something expressly encouraged in RSA Title V, Chapter 79-A:1 as being "in the public interest." However, because these locations use non-native species in their operations, they would become ineligible to receive the "open space land" benefits under current use tax assessments should HB 467 pass. It's not unreasonable to surmise that without these benefits, some of these locations may look to commercialize or develop a portion of their lands to recoup a portion of the higher operational costs they would incur following the passage of this bill, thus completely defeating the purpose outlined within the current use tax law's declaration.

For these reasons, I urge the House Municipal and County Government Committee to oppose HB 467. Should you require any additional information on this, or any other sportsmen-related topic, please feel free to contact me at any time.

ANALYSIS

This bill provides that land used to harbor non-native, non-domesticated animals shall not be eligible for current use assessment under RSA 79-A.

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Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

1 Current Use Taxation; Definition of Open Space Land; Land Used to Harbor Non-native, Non-

- domesticated Animal Species Excluded. Amend RSA 79-A:2, IX to read as follows:

 IX. "Open space land" means any or all farm land, forest land, or unproductive land as defined by this section. However, "open space land" shall not include any property held by a city, town or district in another city or town for the purpose of a water supply or flood control, for which a payment in place of taxes is made in accordance with RSA 72:11. Nor shall "open space land" include any farm land or forest land used to harbor non-native, non-domesticated animal species.
- 2 Effective Date. This act shall take effect April 1, 2022.
