The problem this bill seeks to fix is that the absentee ballot request form does not acknowledge this specific situation so prisoners in this situation have no correct option presented on the form to declare why they are requesting an absentee ballot. The current options for voting absentee are very specific and limited. They include being outside of the home community, being ill, being at a place of employment during polling hours or caring for ill people or children. **HB 555** 

This bill establishes no new voting rights for prisoners. Felons currently serving their sentences cannot vote in NH, other incarcerated people such as those awaiting trial, retain their right to vote. This bill only clarifies that people incarcerated in a penal institution in their own community, and not convicted of or serving a sentence for a felony, may vote by absentee ballot as is currently their legal right. The problem this bill seeks to fix is that the absentee ballot request form does not acknowledge this specific situation, leaving prisoners not convicted of felonies who want to vote absentee, with no correct option presented on the form to declare about why they are requesting an absentee ballot. The current options for voting absentee are very specific and limited. They include being outside of the home community, being ill or being at a place of employment during polling hours or caring for ill people or children. The committee agreed that it would be best to update the absentee ballot request form to allow for the persons addressed in this bill to be accurate and honest about why they need to vote by absentee ballot.

Representative Andrew Bouldin, Sponsor representing Manchester, Ward 5. This bill passed committee with bipartisan support last year, but died in the Senate. This bill is to allow people who are waiting for trial or have a misdemeanor be allowed to obtain an Absentee Ballot.

• I spoke to Deputy Scanlan and he agrees this is an issue. Last year's bill of this was HB 1751. See further testimony.

**Question:** Representative Wayne MacDonald – Do you have any idea of what people might be affected?

**Answer:** I do not have any stats. I assume domiciled in Manchester, jailed in Manchester would be.

**Question:** Representative Prudhomme-O'Brien – I am proud to say I have not spent anytime in jail. What would happen if a person in jail requests an Absentee Ballot, only spends a few days there, the ballot is delivered to the jail, but the person went home?

**Answer:** This applies to people serving for a year. They also have the option to take the AB and show up on election day.

Question: How did you become aware of this issue?

**Answer:** I ran into a person who once served time as a felon.

**Question:** Representative Paul Bergeron – I do remember the bill last year. On page 2, line 23; "I am confined in a penal institution for a misdemeanor". I am wondering about someone who is confined as a felony and waiting for trial?

**Answer:** Felons do not have the option. I am open to make the wording clear.

**Representative Griffin**: It would appear a language fix, "and I am not a felon, add that to every example?" **Answer** – I do not understand.

Kara Randolph: I am in support of HB555. I am a member of the NH High School Democrats. This should be a bipartisan issue. This bill clearly outweighs the cost.

Jeanne Hruska: I am the political director of the ACLU. I support this bill and consider it a simple housekeeping bill. It is not about eligibility but AB forms, just want to make sure eligible voters are able to vote.

**Question: Representative Mannie Espitia**: Do you know the average wait time for bookings, like at Valley Jail time?

**Answer**: It certainly is extended due to COVID. In theory, someone could miss out on an election.

**Cynthia Walker**: I support this bill. The high school student clarified what their abilities to get an AB. They are taxpayers too.

**Louise Spencer:** I think all points have been covered, **and I am in support of this bill**. In my door to door canvassing, these people who were not able to vote because of this, I saw joy that they would be able to participate again. All walks of life have the right to vote and value their voice.

My name is John Garrison, and I am a registered voter who lives at 194 Elm Street in Lancaster, New Hampshire.

First off, this Bill does not, in my opinion, suggest any changes that change a prisoner's right to vote, nor changes to improve their access to a ballot.

I am writing to oppose the changes proposed by House Bill 555 because existing New Hampshire Law currently provides clear direction regarding how voters confined in penal Institutions may register to vote and it also allows alleged criminals access to absentee ballots:

- Title LVIII, Chapter 654 Voters and Checklists, Section 654:2-a Eligibility, clearly states in Paragraph I: "The domicile for voting purposes of a person confined in a penal institution shall be the town or city in New Hampshire in which such person had his or her domicile immediately prior to such confinement..."it goes on the say in Paragraph III: "In completing a voter registration form, as specified in RSA 654:7, a person confined in a penal institution shall list the address of his or her domicile in the address section, and the address of the penal institution in the mailing address section.
- Title LVIII, Chapter 657 Absentee Voting, Section 657:4 Application, already allows individuals to mark that they are entitled to vote by absentee ballot because they will be absent from the Town/City where they are domiciled and will be until after the election without having to provide a specific, personal, and potentially embarrassing specific reason.
- Finally, Chapter 657, Section 657:4 provides a place for the applicant to provide the address of their domicile AND address to mail the ballot to, when different from the domicile.

The sponsors of this bill have presented no argument that supports the need for change in their submittal, nor do they provide any argument supporting a valid need for change..

#### CHAPTER 654 VOTERS AND CHECKLISTS

#### **Eligibility**

#### Section 654:2-a

#### 654:2-a Voters Confined in Penal Institutions. -

- I. The domicile for voting purposes of a person confined in a penal institution shall be the town or city in New Hampshire in which such person had his or her domicile immediately prior to such confinement, even though such person no longer maintains a domicile in said town or city and even though his or her intent to return thereto is uncertain. The domicile for voting purposes of a person confined in a penal institution shall not include the municipality where the person is confined unless the person was domiciled in that municipality prior to confinement. If the person was domiciled immediately prior to confinement in the municipality where the person is confined, the person shall be considered absent for purposes of voter registration and absentee voting during the period of confinement.
- II. A person confined in a penal institution whose domicile is in a town or city in New Hampshire shall be eligible to vote in state elections and shall exercise that right by absentee ballot provided:
- (a) The person complies with all other applicable requirements and qualifications of the state of New Hampshire, including, but not limited to, the requirement that an absentee voter take the steps necessary to have his or her name placed on the voter checklist no later than 10 days before an election and the requirement that the absentee voter take the steps necessary to make sure that his or her ballot is received by the town or city clerk from whom it was sent by 5:00 p.m. on election day. A person confined in a penal institution shall use the mail to comply with all applicable requirements and qualifications.
- (b) The person is not registered to vote or eligible to vote in any other state or election district of a state or in any territory or possession of the United States.
- (c) The person is not a citizen of another state.
- III. In completing a voter registration form, as specified in RSA 654:7, a person confined in a penal institution shall list the address of his or her domicile in the address section, and the address of the penal institution in the mailing address section.

An appeal or other proceeding taken to set aside or otherwise nullify the conviction or sentence does not affect the application of this section, but if the conviction is reversed the defendant shall be restored to any public office forfeited under this chapter from the time of the reversal and shall be entitled to the emoluments thereof from the time of the forfeiture.

I would like to respond to questions raised in today's hearing on HB555, speaking from my experience with the League of Women Voters NH, in which I answer questions from the public in the weeks before elections, and from my experience as a member of the Citizens Advisory Board to the NH Correctional Facility for Women.

<u>Felons:</u> Someone who is incarcerated for a felony may not vote. However, those voting rights are restored after release. A felony offender on parole may register and vote. Upon completion of the sentence and/or parole, the offender may register and vote.

Other offenders: People incarcerated for misdemeanors may vote absentee from the county houses of correction, and that is what the bill tries to address. People awaiting trial who are not released on bail nor released on their own recognizance—in other words they are being held at the county houses of correction until their trial or plea agreement—are also entitled to vote.

The suggestion to add wording to the absentee ballot application to the effect "I am not a felon" will cause unnecessary confusion and will, in effect, disenfranchise some. Many people, including those who at one time were convicted of a felony, would read that to mean "I have never been convicted of a felony." In law, these two statements are not equivalents.

We understand that the felony offender's voting rights are restored upon release. If, in the future, that same individual is incarcerated for a misdemeanor or is incarcerated while awaiting trial, he or she needs to understand that voting is still his/her right. Employers and the general public may, unfortunately, eternally regard that person as a felon, and in fact the person may consider him/herself a felon. But for purposes of voting, that is not true.

I suggest keeping the wording as it is in the bill. Adding a qualification about felony will cause unnecessary confusion.

- In accordance with RSA 659:34, the penalty for knowingly or purposefully providing false information when registering to vote or voting is a class A misdemeanor with a maximum sentence of imprisonment not to exceed one year and a fine not to exceed \$2,000. Fraudulently registering to vote or voting is subject to a civil penalty not to exceed \$5,000.
  - 4 Effective Date. This act shall take effect 60 days after its passage.
