STATEMENT OF INTENT

Individuals using medications for Attention Deficit Disorder (ADD), Attention Deficit/Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD) or narcoplepsy are frequently students studying a distance from home. Logistical difficulties are regularly encountered when refills are needed while away which creates significant risks for disruption of critical functioning. This bill as amended allows a 90-day prescription just for these medical diagnoses and thus corresponds better to routine home visits. This avoids the risk of disruption in medications and consequent functional impairment. Although these medications are schedule II drugs and a single prescription cannot be written that indicates a number of refills, the US Department of Justice has opined that a single prescription can be written for a 90-day supply if also allowed by state law. This bill meets these federal requirements.

Good morning, I am the parent of a teen who has ADHD. The medication he is prescribed has dramatically improved his ability to focus his attention on the material he is learning and complete tasks. Currently, he is not able to get a 90 day supply either at the pharmacy or through mail in means. This requires us to request frequent new scripts, manage requests to ensure it is not too early and won't be refilled and not too late causing him to run out. We also incur more frequent copays, costing us and all the other families who take stimulants higher costs. Whether he received a 30 day supply or 90 day supply, it is kept in a locked safe that only my husband and I know how to access. A 30 day supply, a 90 day supply or over the counter medications all pose risks if not secured, so I do not feel there is an increased risk to receiving a 90 day supply; it is all in the precautions taken. My son has been on a stimulant for ADHD for seven years and I do not see it being discontinued anytime soon. It enables him to be the conscience, smart student he is.

HB 582 - AS INTRODUCED

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

In the Year of Our Lord Two Thousand Twenty One

AN ACT relative to prescriptions for the treatment of attention deficit disorder or attention deficit disorder with hyperactivity.

Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

1 Controlled Drug Act; Sale by Pharmacists; Attention Deficit Disorder and Attention Deficit 2 Disorder with Hyperactivity; Prescriptions. Amend RSA 318-B:9, IV to read as follows:

3 IV. No prescription shall be filled for more than a 34-day supply upon any single filling for 4 controlled drugs of schedules II or III; provided, however, that for controlled drugs, in schedules II or $\mathbf{5}$ III, that are commercially packaged for dispensing directly to the patient, such as metered sprays and inhalers, liquids packaged in bottles with calibrated droppers, and certain topical preparations 6 7packaged with metered dispensing pumps may be filled for greater than a 34-day supply, but not 8 more than 60 days, utilizing the smallest available product size, in order to maintain the dosing 9 integrity of the commercially packaged containers; and, provided that with regard to amphetamines 10and methylphenidate hydrochloride, a prescription may be filled for up to a [60-day] 90-day supply if 11 either such prescription specifies it is being used for the treatment of attention deficit disorder $[_{1}]$ or 12attention deficit disorder with hyperactivity, or a 60-day supply if such prescription specifies it 13is being used for narcolepsy.

14 2 Effective Date. This act shall take effect 60 days after its passage.
