STATEMENT OF INTENT

This bill seeks to remove the authority for a law enforcement officer to use deadly force when effecting an arrest by the repeal of RSA 627:5 VIII. The committee listened to many stakeholders on this bill, including representatives of the law enforcement community, and the general public. After careful consideration and debate the majority of the Criminal Justice and Public Safety committee concluded that this bill should be found inexpedient to legislate due to the fact that a fleeing felon simply attempting to evade arrest is distinctly different from an individual in the same set of circumstances using or attempting to use a deadly weapon to evade his or her arrest. Furthermore law enforcement officers need to be able to exercise the use of deadly force not only to protect themselves but also to protect victims of violent crimes during the arrest process. Domestic violence crimes are prime examples of such circumstances.

After careful and debate the majority of the Criminal Justice and Public consideration committee concluded that this bill should be found inexpedient to legislate due to the fact that a fleeing felon simply attempting to evade arrest is distinctly different from an individual in the same set of circumstances using or attempting to use a deadly weapon to evade his or her arrest. Furthermore law enforcement officers need to be able to exercise the use of deadly force not only to protect themselves but also to protect victims of violent crimes during the arrest process. Domestic violence crimes are prime examples of such circumstances. Vote 14-7.

The U.S. Supreme Court actually cited our statute, RSA 627:5, as one of the unconstitutional laws that allow officers to kill a fleeing felon. This bill really has to pass in some form, with or without amendment.

This bill removes the legal authority for a law enforcement officer to use deadly force in effecting an arrest.

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:
