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ANALYSIS

This bill allows alternative treatment centers to acquire and use in manufacturing hemp-derived cannabidiol (CBD) isolate.

*In the Year of Our Lord Two Thousand Twenty One*

AN ACT                    allowing alternative treatment centers to acquire and use in manufacturing  
                                 hemp-derived cannabidiol (CBD) isolate.

*Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:*

1            1 New Paragraph; Use of Cannabis for Therapeutic Purposes; Alternative Treatment Centers;  
2 Requirements. Amend RSA 126-X:8 by inserting after paragraph XVIII the following new  
3 paragraph:

4            XIX. An alternative treatment center may acquire, and may use in the manufacture of  
5 cannabis concentrate and cannabis infused products, hemp-derived cannabidiol, or CBD, isolate that  
6 is not produced by an alterative treatment center in New Hampshire. All such CBD isolate, and all  
7 cannabis concentrate and cannabis infused products manufactured from such CBD isolate, shall be  
8 tested for contaminants and cannabinoid profile in accordance with this chapter and department  
9 rules.

10          2 Effective Date. This act shall take effect 60 days after its passage.
