It shifts responsibility, notifying outstate town clerk, supervisors of check list to Secretary of State to gather information, provide and get information from other surrounding states. It should mean a much more efficient process. Second, in regards to Absentee affidavits were both items talked about by SOS after last election noted if people didn't sign affidavit., had problems or confused with which one to sign. No reason to have two separate affidavits, one on top of form sign in one place combined with opening the outer envelope, if make a mistake, ample time to correct it. First section make it conform with Maine, and VT, more efficient.

• Question: Rep Paul Bergeron – My question first deals with first section, 654:13, supervisors, lines 8-10. This is already in statute that form and database shall include information on registration forms last registered to vote. Why need to have this in two statutes?

Town of Milford, NH March 12, 2019 Election E-Poll Book Results

The town of Milford conducted an e-poll book trial during our Town Election held on March 12th 2019.

The participants of this trial included Electec and we had Michael Narducci in attendance for the entire election to help us set up and handle any questions. We also had CyberScout on hand with 3 members of their team on-site for the entire election.

We had a turnout of 2127 voters which was confirmed by the total number of ballots cast as well as the number of voters checked in by the E-Poll book.

The process started by training election volunteers on the use of the E-Poll books the night before Deliberative Session in February as well as we had an E-Poll book on loan for the week before the elections so that the ballot clerks could come in at their convenience and get trained. Training took 5 to 10 minutes. We trained 6 ballot clerks per 5 hour shift for a total of 18 ballot clerks. One clerk on each shift was trained to do the extra steps of Adding a new voter, absent ballot entry, name change and address change. Otherwise the rest of the ballot clerks just checked people in.

During the day we never experienced a line of any significance the most at one time may have been 2 people in the queue. We set up the check in like a bank line; there were no specific lines for last names so all voters just went to any clerk that was available. If the voter was new to town there was a specific ballot clerk that they were instructed to go to. This worked very well. All the voters seemed very pleased with the process we did not have any issues of significance. For this trial we did not have any significant change in election workers as we used our other ballot clerks to fill in the backup checklist that we maintained in case the e-poll books might go down.

Where we saw a significant amount of savings was in the time it took to get a number on how many voters we had checked in for the day it was instantaneous. As well as all the related data it was basically a click on the laptop and we knew how many absentee voters we had as well as CVA's and new registered voters.

Testimony of Kyri Claflin, Supervisor of the Checklist,

Concord, on SB 31

Madam Chair and members of the House Election Law committee, I cannot be with you at Wednesday's hearing on SB 31, so I am submitting written testimony instead. Thank you for the opportunity to share my testimony in writing. I wish to speak to Section 1. III (lines 18-26) on page 1 of the bill, which addresses keeping our voter checklists up-to-date.

As a Supervisor of the Checklist in Concord (Ward 5), I have a great deal of interest in how New Hampshire can improve the efficiency, security, and integrity of our elections. One important factor in ensuring well-run elections is having accurate, well-maintained voter rolls. Our current practice is somewhat hit or miss, and that poses more of a challenge than you may think.

First, a lot of every Supervisor's time on Election Day is devoted to updating voter registrations with changes of address or name, rather than registering new voters. This can cause a bottleneck at the Supervisors' table because updating someone's registration is exactly as time-consuming as registering a first time voter — there's not a shorter process for updates. When the voter is finished updating their registration, they go wait in second line to check in with the ballot clerk and get their ballot. That's two lines even before the voter has gone into the booth. This is needlessly inefficient and, frankly, it's unfair to expect busy Granite Staters to have to queue up for an unknown length of time at the polling place in the middle of their workday. Alternatively, a voter could go to their clerk's office to update their registration — provided they're free during the clerk's office hours — but now you've spread voting in one election over two days.

Second, a voter's new town or state might send notice of a change of address, or a voter may well stay on an out-of-date checklist for years — some peripatetic N.H. voters believe that they are on the checklist in the multiple towns where they have lived since the last decennial purge of the checklists. If they've moved a lot, they probably are. In this way, out-of-date voter rolls can give rise to fears, however unfounded, of potential illegal voting. While election officials know that it is very rare that a voter would take advantage of this situation to vote twice, it is not the kind of thing that people who are not election officials tend to know and feel secure about. If our voter rolls were kept as accurate and up-to-date as possible, all N.H. citizens would have greater confidence in the security of our elections.

Where I am going with this is to ask you to please consider amending SB 31 to authorize our Secretary of State to enroll N.H. in the Electronic Registration Information Center, or ERIC, as the most secure and efficient way of maintaining accurate voter lists.

ERIC uses highly sophisticated technology to help member states keep voter rolls up-to-date and to increase access to voter registration for all eligible citizens. Right now, our voter rolls are likely inflated with people who have moved or passed away. With ERIC every lawful Granite State voter would be on our rolls exactly once, at the correct address, with the correct name. Imagine the time savings for Supervisors, Clerks, and, importantly, the voters themselves if we were to use ERIC's technology to assist us with these important "housekeeping" tasks.

As of a year ago, March 2020, thirty states plus the District of Columbia had joined ERIC. The member states include red states (e.g. Florida, Alabama), blue states (eg. Rhode Island, Oregon), and purple states (e.g. Pennsylvania, Arizona). Importantly, our neighboring New England states of Vermont and Connecticut are ERIC member states. I believe Massachusetts is in the process of joining. Minnesota and Wisconsin are, like N.H., not motor-voter states, and both of those states have reported good experiences as members of ERIC.

So ERIC is clearly a tried and tested system that the majority of states is using. There is no comparable extant system, and it would be prohibitively expensive to try to create something similar on our own with neighboring states, even if they had any interest in doing so.

I'm sorry I'm unable to be present to take your questions, but I thank you for taking the time to read my testimony. I will be following SB 31 with great interest. Thank you.

Granite State Taxpayers supports election laws that make our system of elections easy to understand, resistant to fraud, and available exclusively to residents of New Hampshire.

SB 31 has a portion of which we support, and one we oppose, so we identified as neutral on the Bill.

We support the portion of SB 31 that would require communication between States when a person registers to vote in another state.

Optimally, an individual should be registered to vote only in the political jurisdiction where they reside and maintain domicile.

Currently, a person who moves does not necessarily get removed, or seek removal, from the checklist in the place they have moved from.

The consequence is that voter checklists can include persons who are no longer legal voters at their previous address.

This opens the possibility of someone requesting an absentee ballot based on the individuals prior address.

This portion of SB 31 promotes a more robust process for removing from the checklist persons who have moved from that jurisdiction.

Purging checklists of individuals who have moved (or have deceased) would improve election integrity.

We oppose the portion of SB 31 that adds a continuation of the no-fault absentee voting associated with the Covid pandemic.

"Disability includes medical conditions that pose a risk of infection to others or where infection from others carries significant health risk."

The primary, and expected, method of voting should remain as voting in person. This allows for voter identification and integrity in ballot processing.

As a result of the Covid pandemic, absentee voting was made available to all who were concerned by a risk of voting in person..

Yet, even during the height of the pandemic, people were willing and able to appear in public, and stand in socially distant lines, with masks, to purchase groceries and other necessities. The in person voting process was no different.

Compared to in-person voting, absentee voting strategies introduce added costs and opportunities for error:

- reduced certainty that the person voting is in fact currently a resident at the address on the check-list
- additional handling and cost due to mailing ballots, which also introduces chances for errors

No-fault absentee voting was passed at a point in the Covid pandemic where its impacts were largely unknown.

This portion of SB 31 would extend Covid-like absentee voting past the denouement of the Covid pandemic.

Doing so (absent some new pandemic and emergency associated with it) would degrade the integrity of our electoral system.

Hello,

I agree with SB31's intent to ensure the absentee ballots are comprehensive and clear.

The major problem with the current absentee ballots is not the language but the small type used and the layout of the text on the envelope.

If the committee has not already done so, I recommend the committee review "mock ups" of absentee ballots with the proposed text before acting on the proposal.

Also, please amend the legislation to allow the Secretary of State, or other role if appropriate, to print text on the side opposite the affidavit. This text would provide a simple, large type explanation to the voter of what they need to do.

For example, the opposite side text could read:

ATTENTION

Before mailing your ballot, make sure you have:

- Marked your ballot (on both sides, if appropriate)
 - Inserted your ballot in this envelope
 - Sealed this envelope
- Signed the affidavit on the other side (where appropriate)

The current absentee ballot design leaves all that blank space on one side. Let's use the space to communicate with the voter and minimize their chance for errors.

The amendment enabling the SOS to print text on the currently blank side may either include the actual language to be used or simply authorize the SOS to add directions to the reverse side,

If the supervisors decide to add the name of the applicant to the checklist, then they shall retain the original of the registration form for their own file, which shall be retained in accordance with RSA 33-A:3-a[, forward one copy to the supervisors of the checklist of the city or town of the applicant's last voting address if said address is in the state of Vermont, Maine, Massachusetts, Connecticut, or Rhode Island, and send another copy to the clerk of their town or city]. If the applicant entered a place last registered to vote on the voter registration form, the supervisors shall enter that data into the statewide centralized voter registration database, the supervisors of the checklist in another New Hampshire city or town will receive notice through the statewide centralized voter registration database that the voter has moved.
- II. If the supervisors decide not to add the name of the applicant to the checklist, they shall send notification in writing to the applicant within 7 days stating the reason for the denial. They shall write the word "REJECTED" and the date of rejection across the registration form. They shall retain the original registration form and a copy of the denial notification in accordance with RSA 33-A:3-a.
- III. The secretary of state shall provide information on individuals who report being previously registered to vote out of state to the chief elections officer of that state. The secretary of state may use secure electronic information transfer. The secretary of state shall pursue establishing routine secure electronic transfers of this information between states. When electronic information transfer from another state occurs the supervisors of the checklist where the person is registered in New Hampshire will receive notice through the statewide centralized voter registration database that the voter has registered in another state. Unless the supervisors possess evidence that the notice is inaccurate, they shall remove the voter from the checklist as provided in RSA 654:36.
 - 2 Absentee Affidavit Envelopes. Amend RSA 657:7, II to read as follows:

4	a) I will be out-of-town on election day.
5	b) I will be unable to vote in person because I will be working.
6	c) I will be unable to vote in person because I will be caring for children or
7	infirm adults, with or without compensation.
8	d) I am voting absentee on the Monday immediately before the election, the
9	National Weather Service has issued a winter storm warning, blizzard warning, or ice
10	storm warning that applies to my town/ward, and I have concerns for traveling in the
11	storm.
12	2) I am unable to vote in person due to disability. Disability includes medical
13	conditions that pose a risk of infection to others or where infection from others carries
14	significant health risk.
15	3) I am unable to vote in person due to observance of a religious commitment,
16	which prevents me from voting in person.
17	I have carefully read or had read to me the absentee voting instructions. I
18	personally marked the absentee ballot enclosed in this envelope or, due to a disability, I
19	had assistance in marking the absentee ballot.
20	
21	Voter Signature
22	A person assisting a [disabled or blind] voter with a disability shall [make and] sign [a]
23	this statement on this envelope [in the space provided] acknowledging the assistance. [The
24	moderator will not compare the voter's signature on this affidavit with the signature on the absentee
25	ballot application when a person assisting the voter has signed the statement on the affidavit that
26	assistance was provided.]
27	I attest that I assisted (print voter name) because the voter
28	is a person with a disability. I marked the ballot and/or this form as instructed by the
29	voter.
30	In accordance with RSA 659:34, the penalty for knowingly or purposefully providing false
31	information when registering to vote or voting is a class A misdemeanor with a maximum sentence
32	of imprisonment not to exceed one year and a fine not to exceed \$2,000. Fraudulently registering to
33	vote or voting is subject to a civil penalty not to exceed \$5,000.
34	3 Effective Date. This act shall take effect 60 days after its passage.
