If the moderator or the moderator's designee determines the forms are not properly executed, the town or city clerk or their designee shall attempt to contact the voter using telephone or email information, if provided on the application, to notify the voter of the error and possible methods to correct the error. The clerk shall make a record that notice was provided to the voter on the clerk's list of absentee ballots.
- IV. After the corrected checklist to be used at the election has been posted, and based on the reviews conducted pursuant to this section, the moderator or the moderator's designee may highlight the names of the absentee voters whose forms were properly executed on the checklist, or may place

a notation on the checklist beside the name of the absentee voter whose forms were properly executed, to help facilitate processing of the ballots on election day.

- V. The moderator of the moderator's designee may authorize additional sessions for preprocessing absentee ballots prior to the posting of the final corrected checklist for the election. The opening of the envelopes and the review of the forms shall occur as outlined in this section, provided the opening of the outer envelopes occurs in public with notice of the time and place. If the moderator or the moderator's designee determines the forms are not properly executed, such as having a missing signature or incorrect name, the town or city clerk or their designee shall attempt to contact the voter using telephone or email information, if provided on the application, to notify the voter of the error and possible methods to correct the error. The clerk shall make a record that notice was provided to the voter on the clerk's list of absentee ballots. During the session required for preprocessing of absentee ballots following the posting of the checklist for the election, the moderator or his or her designee may highlight the names of the absentee voters whose forms were properly executed in earlier sessions on the checklist, or may place a notation on the checklist beside the name of the absentee voter whose forms were properly executed, to help facilitate processing of the ballots on election day.
- VI. The moderator or moderator's designee shall not initiate compliance with RSA 659:51 and RSA 659:52 until the time specified in RSA 659:49 on election day.

*Senator James Gray, District 6. Bill Sponsor - introduces each Part of the Senate Bill.

I: City chief elections officer of NH should be resident of town or city. Currently, no resident requirement. There is a clerk now who is a resident of another state. Between the SOS and myself, we have attempted to draft this a couple of times.

II: Prohibiting the taking of certain photographs within the Guardrail. There have been court challenges. A person could take a photo of their own ballot, but this deals with taking a photo of someone and their ballot. With cameras on phones now, it could be detailed and blown up on how a person voted.

III: Allowing the opening and processing of outer envelopes and preprocessing of AB.

This is popular with elected officials at last election. It allows a quicker process on election day. Now the process of AB, temporarily put in place for Friday, Saturday and Monday. If person found has not signed off, many communities contact person to fix problem. There is nothing right now to preclude a person putting inner envelope in an envelope not provided by the state. Once realized it is not official, it is stapled shut tight and goes in with the rest of the ballots on election day. Clerk can open it after it arrives, look at signatures and if not executed properly, contact individual. I worked with the ACLU to understand what is going on so that they would not object to the language. At the time it went thru the Senate, they were in agreement. Now clerk could open ballot in front of the voter, check signatures, to make sure no problems with affidavits or from caretaker bringing in ballot.

IV: Post-Election Audit in Windham, you guys just got done processing of SB43.

Part of problem of Windham, SOS and AG did not see a way to open ballot boxes to do additional information as law is written to preserve custody chain of command. This bill started to reestablish a committee to look into this section. Ballot Law Commission, ,if they find a significant difference in vote announced on election night and recount done or audit finds significance differences between announced vote or credible information, they can request the

AG to do an investigation. Words for AG that they are allowed to open up the ballot box, doesn't have to wait for permission during an investigation. Take away the roadblocks.

V: Duties of Register of Probate.

Example, my son passed away a year ago December. My son had a trust that most his assets were in. My daughter-in-law had to go thru this process and the cost of the fees and of the state cost \$1,700. The only things not in the trust was one automobile and a small bank account. The attorney did modify some documents such as taking my son's name off, but even saying ½ cost of \$800 of the probate portion is ridiculous. The cost according to information provided by the court system averages \$170-180 per probate. They also receive between 6-7 phone calls per probate filing.

What this bill does is put back in the Register of Probate, not to be an advocate for anyone, but help people thru the process. They could help with the electronic system, what to put in block I, in block II, what the time period is to do assets and inventory. Not giving advice on legal procedures, but advise on procedures. There will be an added \$20. \$20 versus \$800 attorney fee. I believe many more people with a person who knows the system, help navigate many additional people who go thru process of probate and save themselves hundreds of dollars without attorney fees. \$20 to fund the Register of Probate, voluntary to counties. I implore you to think of your constituents out there.

Questions / Discussion on Part I

- **Question: Rep Bergeron,** in regards to Part I. Senator Gray, Portsmouth clerk is not a resident. What is it you are trying to accomplish as city clerk who doesn't live in her city?
- Answer: My problem is someone from another state. It causes confusion with authority of moderators and elected city clerks that comes into play, recounts, other decisions to be made. The city clerk does not have a lot of authority. They are still in charge of non-legislation out there, if they want posting of different documents. In the Town of Rochester, city clerk has a board for all postings. Again, as long as going along with state laws. It does cause conflicts at times with authority of moderators which is spelled out in statute for operating on election day.
- **Question:** Rep Bergeron So in a situation where a city clerk supervises training of up to 9-12 moderators, someone new who's interpreting state law as correct, but city clerk knows it is incorrect, the city clerk won't have authority over the moderator to ensure that that polling places being run are consistent with the other polling places?
- **Answer:** I believe your question does not address the situation properly. These moderators in charge of voting places, every citizen of NH has a problem with a moderator not following state laws, there is a hot line that can be used on election day. City clerk still has responsibility in statute that if there's disagreement, proper place to be adjudicated thru SOS office.
- **Question:** Rep MacDonald As observed in your testimony, it seems everyone has cell phones today and taking pictures. I'm concerned about enforcement, who's even going to notice?
- **Answer:** Certainly, enforcement is an issue. My hope might be who takes a picture, the moderator will ask him to delete it, trying to discourage people, not create a confrontation. Set out in statute, there's a code, behavior at polling places, though may not be easy, lessen the occurrences.
- **Question:** Rep MacDonald Did any local officer request this legislation?
- **Answer:** It was requested by SOS.

Part III Opening the outer envelope and preprocessing.....

- **Question:** Rep Hamblet I have three questions about preprocessing, line 17&18, town or city clerk shall open outer envelope of absentee prior to 5pm on election day, that just means they open the outer envelope at some point. They don't have to open all the AB the day before?
- **Answer:** The intent ongoing is to open outer envelope, inspect ballot, if problem try to contact voter by information provided, which it does request, such as an email or cell phone.

Right now, state law without exception put into place for COVID, back when I was a moderator, we could only open the outer envelope two hours after polls open. Then if noticed Affidavit was not signed, there was no opportunity to accept that ballot. This gives people opportunity to fix ballot, allows clerk to contact voter, best interest of voter.

- **Question:** Rep Hamblet lines 24 &25, it does require clerks to open outer envelopes, review affidavit. There are actually 3 parts open outer envelope, review, and final processing on election day. Now allowed to open outer envelope, and review affidavit, then another preprocessing day with a team, maybe the Saturday before election day go thru the process again with marking on check list?
- Answer: I did not touch this statute what the moderator processing of AB because of court order from checking signature verification. The process would be that the moderator would also look at signatures to make sure the affidavit was filled out properly and allowed to make annotation onto the checklist allowing the process on election day.
- **Question:** Rep Torosian Much of my questions has been answered, but appears two-fold reason why wanting to open outer AB envelope before election day. First, free-up time for town clerks and other to address missing signatures. Any date in what extent this is a problem with people not signing?
- **Answer:** I do not. I know phone calls with SOS and moderators and clerks, this is very popular thing to do. One question the ACLU asked me in precursor to reinstating signature verification. My answer to them if I was to reinstate verification tell them up front, but to reinstate signature verification requires a method of cure. It would be a training by the SOS and a petition by the SOS's office to lift the injunction.
- **Question:** Rep Torosian Under this provision, if it would become law, it would be a disadvantage for anybody who would drop off their AB the night before election. The individual would not have the same time to correct the deficiencies?
- **Answer:** This is what the ACLU discussed with me. If I'm doing as much as I can to make sure the ballot is counted, if I limit the ballot to be opened two days before election day, may take away the ability to cure from that individual to drop off AB on way to Florida, depriving them of their right to franchise.
- Question: Rep Bergeron Senator Gray, I want to address language in lines 17&18. Am I clear, is it your intent this process shall be conducted for every city, town, state election, not local option is a mandate because it says "shall"?
- **Answer:** Yes, opening of outer envelopes in all towns and cities.
- **Question:** You are saying this needs to be done day before Election Day versus days before election. The Clerks in Nashua trying to contact voters, maybe 1,000/day, I cannot see how it can be physically done. Was it your intent to say the day or a day?
- Answer: Again, page 2, part III, line 18, AB ballots open prior to 5pm on the prior day. The
 intent this has been ongoing process from 1st day allowed for those who voted AB, maybe
 once a week. When it gets closer to election day, open on a daily basis. Have provision while
 you're still at polls, sealed or not, but clerk is able to verify signature on affidavit. On-going
 process, don't see a slew of problems.

Questions / Discussion on Part IV

- Question: Section IV, page 5, line 36. All other sections of bill have specific dates, or 60 days after passage. This one says upon passage. Would this override what we did on SB-43?
- Answer: No, in fact supports I think SBB43. If execution of Windham found significant differences with Governor, Senator which you modified to the bill, this would allow the AG to say, do I need to expand investigation into other communities which SB43 wouldn't allow you to do because it is specific to Windham. This bill would allow them to expand this request.
- **Question:** Rep Muirhead I'm inquiring about the procedure for populating that committee, page 3 lines 30-34. Wonder if you considered a process of ensure bipartisan members on committee. Seems consistent process, maybe populated by members of one party?
- **Answer**: 2 members of senate, 3 members by the Speaker of the House which is normal standard language we put in, would appoint one member from each party and a 3rd maybe whomever is chosen. Senate, 2 members, generally one from each party, but we rely on these two people doing this appointment to have bipartisan representation.
- Question: Rep Murihead Would you be willing to amend to specify that expectation?

- **Answer** Again the bill is in the House. I don't believe it to be a problem in the past. I personally do not see the need.
- **Question:** Rep MacDonald Historically, registers of probate activists of either party came into office with some probate experience, sometimes none, but there always was a seasoned staff to help them out. This is no longer the case as it has been almost a decade. How would a party activist with no experience meet the duties under this?
- **Answer:** I point out to other elected officers, Registers of Deed, appoint of depute of register deeds, probate or finance person. County commissioner is responsible for services to provide duties. If register of probate elected is incapable of duties, can also appoint a deputy to that person thru use of salaries.
- **Question:** Rep Berry Points have been made quite a bit about experience on whom we elect. To my knowledge outside of County Attorney, we don't require this including a state rep, a governor or executive council. Is this like any other elected official?
- **Answer**: Like any other elected official.
- **Question: Rep Lane** I noticed that a provision of archives putting things older than 40 years in state archives making it difficult. Why cut of 40 years and why are we doing this?
- **Answer:** Original cut off from original legislation was 35 years. At requests of a couple of people, including the court system changed to 40 years. Lot of research actually only done back 40 years of property records. If the SOS is still on, their process making records digitized make available, might be easier.

OPENED to REGISTERED TESTIMONY

*Donna Systek – I'm a former Register of Probate. Long history of this issue going back to 1983. See Written Testimony.

- **Question:** Rep Torosian Each county currently has one Register of Probate and they do not work, but are paid \$100 a year?
- Answer: Yes, I went over to the courthouse to be sworn in, had a tour of the state house, but during my campaign, I said I would not collect the \$100. Their only obligation is to coordinate with SOS and administrative judge where records are held and that is done by staff
- **Question:** Rep Berry Most functions of government by professional staff, the governor, the executive council.
- **Answer:** The register of probate has no connection of professional staff, no connection to court staff, no desk, no ballpoint pen.

Representative Griffin: I did ask an invite to Judiciary Committee to the content of this bill.

Representative Horrigan: I support the basic concept of restoring the Register of Probate, but I am not sure of this particular version. I like the concept of Part V, but not sure to pass this one.

*Kate Horgan: See Testimony Executive of NH Counties. Part V- I believe it is well intentioned, but we believe Section V would not cover expenses. Set salaries and fees don't come in as anticipated funds, towns would have to make up the additional costs.

*Cathy Stacey: See Testimony I am Register of Deed for the County of Rockingham and a NH attorney. I'm in opposition to SB89, part V.

We ask to remove it and vote on bill separately. Reference was made counties could opt in or out. That is not true, not optional. I'd agree the Register of Deeds is a court function, not county function. We have already housed at the courthouse a help center. The NH Counties are in opposition to this bill.

• **Question: Rep Berry** – in your closing argument, people attempt readdress. Probate has to go to Judiciary. Judiciary by design is independent. If a person has a problem, how do people reconcile redress?

- **Answer:** I disagree with that. I honestly believe you're in position to put thru legislation if people have a problem with the Judiciary.
- **Question**: Isn't that what this legislation is about, us doing our job?
- **Answer:** I disagree. You have a court function not county. This office belongs to be in the court.
- Question: Rep MacDonald Miss Stacey, you have obviously been involved a long time. You have been Register of Deeds for a long time and well versed attorney. I'm from Rockingham. Having followed this issue over the year, can you give your insight with your experience of clerk of the courts replacing a register of probate function?
- **Answer:** What I will say, my office fields lots of questions from the public. Obviously, clerks were well versed upstairs in court. People asked questions, got answers on site there. Not happening as much now and not happening since COVID.
- *Ann Tilton Written Testimony I was a Register of Probate until the position was eliminated. One unfortunate of this position being eliminated, no longer advocate for the people, but I had professional staff who assisted. I don't know how towns can pay if not enough fees coming in. I agree with others that spoke, part V should be broken out and ITL.

*Jane Bradstreet - Written Testimony - I am Register of Probate for Merrimack County and speak in favor of this bill.

I have been in touch with 8 other registers who are looking forward to what this bill could provide for constituents Two problems, 2011 reduced duties of register of probate court to nonexistent. Court that had staff of around 50 people, 2017 to 9. First problem, keeper of historical records, register of deeds, register of probate go hand in hand to prove ownership, deserves better oversight. Second problem is customer service. Supervised probate more difficult, large estates have attorney, smaller estates people do it on their own, no longer get the help on their own.

There's big difference with District Court and Probate issues. Probate procedure for loss of loved one or loved one to go under guardianship. Now, if one can't use a computer, goes to Circuit Court House, goes to a window, goes to a Kiosk lobby to fill out case and binder, then if still have questions, go to a phone dial 855. That's about all you get. This bill attempts to help with difficulties, help constituents who need it at time of distress. Training is difficult. I have 20 years of experience of probate court and would be willing to assist in training other registers. I think Register of Probate County Website would be a good thing, helpful to people.

Last thing, when Senator Gray was talking about a case that had an attorney help transfer a car. I think had they talked to a register of probate would know that could been changed to private car.

- **Question:** Rep Hamblet How could you help citizens if records are over at the courthouse?
- **Answer:** I had hoped we would expect we get access electronically, all done in Concord. All estate records are electronically. Reason counties don't have the information, everything is done in Concord. The Register can pick up the phone, 855, knowing what questions to ask.
- Question: Rep Hamblet I thought I heard all records are not all digitized>
- **Answer:** They are not. You would have to go back 40 years. Maybe 2015-2016 state started going electronically. Register out to be able to look at paper files. One thing haven't been able to do, now not able to do their job.
- Question: Rep Torosian Miss Bradstreet, Today living change from 2011 being adopted to Circuit Court, what is your job description?
- **Answer:** What they mentioned in this bill, "Keeper of any possible historical records, oversee supervision with circuit court of appointed officers. We have not been allowed in court houses to even see what's happening.
- **Question:** Rep Torosian Under this proposed legislation, how would that better help you serve the probate system?
- **Answer:** They get an Advocate who knows the system, negotiate thru it, the process and procedure more efficiently, go thru court and get what they need, someone who is helpful. Civil cases are in Probate court cases, much more family related issues, to get documents or help in the process of a person's estate or help with an incapacitated relative.

- **Question: Rep Torosian** So if this legislation becomes law, do you think it would speed up process for people going thru probate from currently done?
- **Answer:** Cannot say for certain it would speed up, but would help our constituents set up what they need and make whole experience, no fault of their own dealing with court system.

*Dan Healy – Derry Clerk concerned with Part III, #2, opening of AB outer envelopes. I suggest be an option to change 'shall' to 'may'.

Doesn't take into account large towns day before 500 AB, opening envelopes day before, verify signature. We did pre-processing, great option, closer get to election day, clerks in bigger towns, don't have to do additional steps.

Other concern is section on security of open ballots. Nothing in bill that says now have outer envelopes left open. Our moderator is responsible, not clerk. Smaller towns might be able to do 50 ballots, but Derry, Nashua would have issues with 500 ballots and contacting those people.

- **Question: Rep Torosian** Pre-COVID when you had to do processing on election day, was that a problem?
- **Answer:** Pre COVID no problem going thru AB. 2016 we had 1,200 ballots, 2020 we had 7000 ballots.

*Margaret Burns - Executive Director of NHMA express support to part III, no other position on rest of bill.

Generally, we support this part as it provides efficiency for preprocessing prior to Election Day. Generally, NHMA heard support some level of authority for preprocessing. One suggested amending and conveyed to Senator Gray also, page 3, lines 21-23 language in bill. Right now the Moderator should mark check list process on election day. We recommend it to say moderator or moderator designee. In practice it's the moderator who opens the inner ballot and clerk makes mark on election day.

Deputy David Scanlan, Secretary of State's Office;

Part III - I agree with Dave Healy and Margaret Burns.

Experience we had in 2020 election related to preprocessing was very favorable. Moderators found useful tools in being able to process absentee ballots. What's missing in the language procedure in 2020 specifically allowing pre-processing on Th, F, Sat, Monday prior to election. At discretion of moderator, we found ability of clerks to contact voters to procure inefficiencies, come in and correct, make their vote count. To be allowed to continue uniformly throughout state, provided voters willing to provide a phone number or email on application.

Part IV - Audit after election and potential investigation.

I know this committees has referred to this topic, studies and later calls for progressive lead of investigation authorized by commission or AG. Need to be very careful of process we put in place after election. It is really important process lead to accurate count and recount and process to audit devices to count ballots. We need to achieve finality, not have elections questioned-ongoing. I think there is a door open to continue that in future. I think needs to be carefully thought out.

- **Question:** Rep Torosian In regards to, preprocessing. Same question I ask prime sponsor, does SOS have any data on % of statewide AB where signatures of inner envelope were incorrect for a vote not to count?
- **Answer:** I do not have it at my fingertips, but I can put it together.

*Rep Barbara Griffin – 4th term representative from Goffstown. Non-Germane Amendment 1445 to SB89 was prepared at my request due to the assault o NH sovereignty if HR1 passes that it would have no effect on NH officers.

Testimony given.

I have a copy of 2021 People's Act of over 800 pages on campaign finance, ethics. It eliminates Voter ID, 75% of Americans support voter ID. S1 provides registration to vote at age 16. S1 provides automatic online provisions to opt out, not opt in. This major change comes at great cost. S1 occurs voting over weeks which goes against our NH Constitution. We have election day. S1 community allows voting at least 15 days before election day and to continue receiving AB 10 days after election. It states voting places to remain open for 10 hours prior to election day and 12 hours on election day. Small communities in NH do not have the staff for this. S1 provides noexcuse AB voting. Our constitution does not have this provision. S1 mailing application requires 60 days prior, drop boxes 45 days prior to election. For our communities, who is going to pay for this? Most communities have already started their budgets. These processes have been rejected by this committee over the years. Un-manned drop boxes, extended hours, extended days were brought forward by the American Federation of American Teachers in 2020. They asked the court to order the state to implement these provisions. The Superior Court rejected this, realized our processes and procedures are appropriate of our Constitution. The NH process has worked. In April 2020, UNH from the survey center, the polling data showed 90% voters said it was easy to vote or somewhat easy. NH has placed in the top 3 of all state's participation of voter in the last 4 Presidentials.

Some say this Amendment will create two elections. I disagree. It is S1 forcing states to have two elections, not this amendment. I present S1 will have dramatic and an unconstitutional impact on our Constitution and our elections. I strongly disagree with our sitting Senator who says it doesn't change how our NH elections are run. If you are concerned about this Amendment, suggest contact our federal officials. While 2 federal members have already voted, 2 have not, reach out to them. I ask you to vote yes on Amendment 1455.

- **Question Rep. Prudhomme O'Brien:** Our Senators were former Governors, former state reps. Are you aware of anyone of them ever serving on this committee?
- **Answer** No, I am not.

Representative Manuel Espitia: I am here to testify against this non-germane amendment.

- HR1 is basically to get dark money out of politics, crack down on corruption. Today's hearing is nothing more than a political stunt and an attempt at misinformation. It is a silly amendment. SB89 is a good bipartisan bill, but adding this amendment would be detrimental to this bill. NH was not in the last 3 top elections it turns out. This bill (HR1-SR1) will not happen overnight. There are provisions for time lines.
 - **Question:** Rep Torosian Please help me understand how HR1-SR1 by relaxing voter ID requirements and other requirements help ensure voter integrity? Tell me how that gets rid of dark money in politics?
 - **Answer** This is only one piece, voting is not one specific, many parts to it. In my opinion, it makes for fair elections, transparent how candidates are funded. Elections are not just one component.
 - **Question: Rep. Torosian** Are you aware any voter in NH's last election that wanted to vote but wasn't given the chance to vote?
 - **Answer**: Funny you asked that, yes I've heard due to misinformation. People turned away to vote. A new naturalized citizens, didn't have exact date naturalized, denied right to vote.

Representative Amanda Toll – representing Cheshire 16, Keene. I'm here to testify against this Amendment.

This is voter suppression for the People Act. Creating separate elections federal and state, disenfranchise young people. Many my college students would be confused on the different voting procedures. They shouldn't be turned away by red tape. Important to note, cost of monies for this Amendment? Will not be taking any questions.

Deputy Secretary State David Scanlan – Secretary Gardner was scheduled to testify, but had a commitment with an awards ceremony. (By the way Chairman Griffin, the winner was a 14-year old from Goffstown.) We are in support of this Amendment by Sponsor Griffin.

- S1 form our standpoint is a state takeover. Reading of the bill if S1 was to pass would change every area of our election process. Rep. Griffin did a great job. The general state election process has to work for all voters, easy to vote, make sure to avoid fraud, don't want voter suppression. If we go too far one way, it creates people's voter suppression. If we go too far the other way, fraud is rampant. Need to find a balance in laws we enact, most voters are confident. HR1,
- Secretary of State's office has put together a power point. The Act itself as mentioned is very broad, broken down to divisions A- Voting, B- Campaign Finance C Ethics. Again, our comments are related to Division A, voting. Some things in this legislation is good, like same-day registration, electronic polls books, which our office is currently working on. But when get further into the bill, page 20, HR1, it is a takeover of Congress on states and localities rights to vote thru restrictions on right to vote including onerous voter ID burdens, on the voting procedures, polling places, and other impediments. I challenge any member of this committee to point to an area that is not problematic to the state of NH. Major concerns about opportunity of ballot harvesting, and provisions difficult to maintain voter check lists, and difficult to remove voters if there is an unqualified problem.
 - **Question:** Rep Cote Do you agree that passage of this Amendment would separate federal and state elections?

- Answer: That would be one option.
- **Question:** Rep Cote What would the other option be?
- Answer: Different ballots and check lists on day of elections.
- Question: Rep Cote Any idea the financial impact if passage of this amendment?
- **Answer:** No, we don't even know the financial impact of S1 either.
- **Question:** Rep. Muirhead It is my understanding, most of your testimony focused on US legislation. I wonder if you understand this Amendment converts NH SB89 into a referendum?
- Answer: This Amendment fires a shot across the bow, shows passing wisdom of passing such legislation from Congress would be a federal takeover if S1 passes. Congress then controls NH election laws. Congress is made up of over 400 legislators, NH has 2. Who's really writing election laws? States like CA and NY.
- **Question:** Is it my understanding from yes, this Amendment converts this to be a referendum? Is there concern state office will compromise integrity?
- **Answer**: The climate in politics where there is a great deal of polarization, it is difficult to administer positions on election bills. If we don't speak up we're not doing our job to not alerting to citizens what's going on. I've repeated for years, there is a delicate balance to making voting easy and secure enough that confidence in votes counted. This perspective we are taking is one of Administrative.
- Question: Rep Prudhomme-O'Brien Reactions of this legislation from local town officials, supervisors of check list and moderators, I think of them first. My question out of 24 clerks polled and 21 were opposed to the People's Act. How is the reaction on the ground?
- **Answer:** We work very closely with elected officials, clerks. We discuss legislation and gave briefing on HR1 a few weeks ago. We did not poll clerks on this, but I am sure they would agree, but have not heard.
- **Question: Rep Lane** The Power Point you referenced, I am not aware of this. Please share with members. You referred to page 2 voting problems. SB3 where one needs multiple degrees to understand the affidavit. Do you see that as at least one of the problems?
- Answer: I would disagree with you on this point.
- **Question:** Rep Lane If I heard you correct, you said, "keep our vote pure". Because I am someone who grew up in the South, just wanted to say Jim Crow, as indicated this is a highly charged issue that type of language. Knee jerk reaction for me.
- Answer: Rep Lane, I don't recall using words "keeping vote pure". I don't recall saying it that way.
- **Question:** Rep Bergeron Deputy Scanlan, in looking at the proposed Amendment, could you tell me what provisions you or other officials the authority to conduct parallel federal and state, adapting changes or other edits to check list?
- **Answer:** I cannot point out in the Amendment. If S1 was to pass, we would be doing major rewrite of all our election laws.
- Question: Rep Bergeron If S1 does pass, major legislation will have to be introduced to make sure NH laws work with federal laws.
- Answer: Yes.
- **Question: Rep Berry** Has any member of our federal delegation spoken to you or your office directly in regards to SR1?
- **Answer:** Not that I am aware of.
- **Question:** Rep Berry Why do you think all 4 US Congress-Senate could not bother to reach out to your office that runs our elections?
- **Answer**: I don't know Representative Berry.
- Statement Rep Berry: I do, they don't care.
- **Question: Rep Groen** How do you see this in light of federal and state constitution of HR1, (SR!) relating to the Constitution?
- **Answer:** S1 conflicts with provisions of the NH Constitution.
- Question: Rep Timothy Horrigan Rep for Strafford 6. I'm hard press as to what it means, S1 and HR1, not sure what form it's going to take. Two different elections, Federal-state sounds absurd in my opinion, as we rely on federal government monies. And to defend our US Congress, I'm sure they care.

Kelsey Klementowicz: Written Testimony. Portsmouth civil rights lawyer. SB89 a thoughtful bill, but this Amendment does the opposite.

Because NH cannot exempt federal, this would double work for local offices, slow down lines. Let's assume S1 passes, towns would need additional forms, online voting registration, SOS portal system to change address, obtain AB online. Other states have attempted this two-tier system. Texas did have this bill, but failed. This amendment if passed probably unlikely to survive legal challenge and tie up the state.

- Question: Rep Lane Have you submitted your testimony?
- **Answer**: No, but I will.

Phil Hatcher: See Testimony. Please vote against this non-germane amendment.

Ken Barnes: I live in Contoocook. I speak against this non-germane amendment, poison bill, not related to the bill it's attached to.

I would make voting more difficult and more costly. By creating 2 different voting, different check lists, everything to be done double by officials, that costs money, NH doesn't have that money. Secretary of State, Governor praised our NH elections, encouraging and easier to vote, that is what democracy is about. This will cause confusion. Please vote no on this Amendment.

Cordell Johnston – Represents NHMA. My initial reaction, it's crazy for two separate processes for election.

I have to admit to H1 as someone who follows state and federal. I assumed HR1 extreme hyperbole on both sides. On what I have read, there are some good things, but also things that would be a problem: early voting provision- under this bill locations in NH would be open 10 hours a day for 15 days before the election. I am the Moderator in my town and I do not have time this kind of time to spend. Maybe it makes sense in TX, but in town of 70, it's insane. No option, no possibility of a waiver. I am not convinced this amendment is the answer. Try to work with federal legislatures.

- Question: Rep Berry As representative to NHMA, has any of our federal delegation reach out to you?
- **Answer:** Not to my knowledge. We will be reaching out to them over our concerns.

Lucas Meyers: Volunteer for 603 Forward. We have great concern of attaching this partisan bill change the purpose is insidious.

To highlight Mr. Johnston, there is work being done for states like NH under this bill. I think this hearing is a disservice to our local officials. I do not think it is the best interest for our voters. This is only power grab is for billionaires. Vote this Amendment down.

Alvin See: Testimony given. I am in support of SB89 and this Amendment 1445.

I don't like the idea US Congress violating the US Constitution and have federal take over of the election process. I would support this amendment even if it meant two separate ballots, federal and state, some people potentially not qualifying for both ballots. I also approve if its two separate days for two separate ballots. I think it is appropriate the NH legislature create a resolution to send a message to Senator Hassan and Senator Shaheen to vote against HR1 to protect NH elections.

Liz Tentarelli: Testimony - President of LWV. Our mission is to empower voters.

Earlier Deputy Scanlan said the election process has to work for all voters. I fear this Amendment if HR1 passes and this Amendment passes, will do the opposite, will discourage voters, make voters lose confidence in our elections. If future voters have to register for federal and differently for state and local, will lose confidence. Whether you like HR1, members of this committee should make views known to our Federal delegation. I think this way is an overreach. I support SB89 with it's bipartisan support, but oppose this amendment.

Deborah Nelson: I live in Hanover. I have been a volunteer at the polls for 30 years.

- Until I recently retired, I taught American History and Literature in public schools. I respond to this Amendment which is distorted information on the federal bill, creates barriers to voting. The "For the People Act", I wish people would not refer to it as a "federal take over". I wish they could stop using such charged language. I would disagree that the SOS's power point to clerks a few weeks ago is riddled with misinformation, highly not independent, in other words, very partisan. HR1 gets rid of dark money that plays in politics. This Amendment does none of that. I support this bill before this Amendment which has no fiscal note attached.
- Elizabeth Corell: I'm from Concord. I am in opposition to this Amendment as a Ward Supervisor of the Checklist. My comments are specific to local impact, two points. As Supervisor, we come to our jobs as volunteers, usually picking up the SOS manual few times a year. That manual is over 300 pages. The notion that it will have two check lists, 2 processes is mind boggling, making it harder to find people to run for check list and moderators. #2 Confusion used as a tool to keep people away from polls. I hope it is clear I oppose this Amendment.

Jodi Nelson: Testimony. I am from Derry. Out of respect for people's time, I am testifying in support of this Amendment for reasons as stated prior to my testimony.

- Olivia Zink: See Testimony. I am testifying in opposition to this Amendment. I am Executive Director to Open Democracy and from Franklin. HR1 is a critical package, reform, get dark money out of politics, cracks down on corruption. This Amendment simply put creates massive confusion and cost NH lots of money. I urge you to vote down this Amendment.
- Susan Richmond: Testimony given. I am in opposition to this non-germane amendment, 1445 to SB89. I worry there's no financial note attached to run 2 parallel elections, cost passed down to cities and towns. Where will extra workforce be found to run. So many details before this bill can move forward. I urge you to please not pass this nongermane amendment 1445 to SB89.
- Kerry Claffin. Testimony. Supervisor of check list, Concord Ward 5. I submitted written testimony to this committee. I am speaking in opposition to this Amendment for many reasons that have been talked about. I object to characterization to S1, attitudes, speculative, no reliable polling done. Opinions of only 24 clerks. I don't know how chosen. These comments heard this am and earlier in media are speculative. I fully support S1 and while not a perfect bill, I agree with others that it is incumbent that our elected officials and SOS reach out to our Senators as opposed to back ending, obstructing and putting out misinformation.
- Linda Bundy: I'm from Antrim. I'm speaking in opposition to this non germane amendment to SB89. If this passes, 2 separate ballots, 2 separate procedure requirements, confusing to voters, create additional work for officials. The "For the People Act" will move our election procedures into the 21st century. I am confident our SOS will maintain secure voting elections and voter participation. I support SB89, but I urge the members of this committee to oppose this Amendment.
- Janet Ward: Testimony given. I watched the presentation by Deputy Scanlan to the NH officials, during this I suggested he contact our federal officials of S1. I felt Mr. Scanlan's comments and concerns were disingenuous. I also watched the Senate Committee, Judiciary Committee in its entirety "For the People Act". As for letters sent to Senator Hassan by Rep Berry, and Rep. Sweeney, it contains deliberate failure to acknowledge and document critical voter suppression issues that this Act was designed to address. Some key objectives of this "Act" end gerrymandering. No defensible reason to support this Amendment, it would create confusing sets of elections. Please support SB89 and vote no on this Amendment.

Mr. Perry: See written testimony. I'm speaking in support of SB89, and oppose Amendment 1445h.

SB-89 Adopting omnibus legislation relative to election procedures and registers of probate Open (Miriam it's on the slip I left, didn't write it on pad)

*Senator James Gray, District 6.

I: City chief elections officer of NH should be resident of town or city. Currently, no resident requirement. There is a clerk now who is a resident of another state. Between the SOS and myself, we have attempted to draft this a couple of times.

II: Prohibiting the taking of certain photographs within the Guardrail. There have been court challenges. A person could take a photo of their own ballot, but this deals with taking a photo of someone and their ballot. With cameras on phones now, it could be detailed and blown up on how a person voted.

III: Allowing the opening and processing of outer envelopes and preprocessing of AB. This is popular with elected officials at last election. It allows a quicker process on election day. Now the process of AB, temporarily put in place for Friday, Saturday and Monday. If person found has not signed off, many communities contact person to fix problem. There is nothing right now to preclude a person putting inner envelope in an envelope not provided by the state. Once realized it is not official, it is stapled shut tight and goes in with the rest of the ballots on election day. Clerk can open it after it arrives, look at signatures and if not executed properly, contact individual. I worked with the ACLU to understand what is going on so that they would not object to the language. At the time it went thru the Senate, they were in agreement. Now clerk could open ballot in front of the voter, check signatures, to make sure no problems with affidavits or from caretaker bringing in ballot.

IV: Post-Election Audit in Windham, you guys just got done processing of SB43. Part of problem of Windham, SOS and AG did not see a way to open ballot boxes to do additional information as law is written to preserve custody chain of command. This bill started to reestablish a committee to look into this section. Ballot Law Commission, ,if they find a significant difference in vote announced on election night and recount done or audit finds significance differences between announced vote or credible information, they can request the AG to do an investigation. Words for AG that they are allowed to open up the ballot box, doesn't have to wait for permission during an investigation. Take away the roadblocks.

V: Duties of Register of Probate. Example, my son passed away a year ago December. My son had a trust that most his assets were in. My daughter-in-law had to go thru this process and the cost of the fees and of the state cost \$1,700. The only things not in the trust was one automobile and a small bank account. The attorney did modify some documents such as taking my son's name off, but even saying ½ cost of \$800 of the probate portion is ridiculous. The cost according to information provided by the court system averages \$170-180 per probate. They also receive between 6-7 phone calls per probate filing.

What this bill does is put back in the Register of Probate, not to be an advocate for anyone, but help people thru the process. They could help with the electronic system, what to put in block I, in block II, what the time period is to do assets and inventory. Not giving advice on legal procedures, but advise on procedures. There will be an added \$20. \$20 versus \$800 attorney fee. I believe many more people with a person who knows the system, help navigate many additional people who go thru process of probate and save themselves hundreds of dollars without attorney fees. \$20 to fund the Register of Probate, voluntary to counties. I implore you to think of your constituents out there.

Question: Rep Bergeron, in regards to Part I. Senator Gray, Portsmouth clerk is not a resident. What is it you are trying to accomplish as city clerk who doesn't live in her city?

Answer: My problem is someone from another state. It causes confusion with authority of moderators and elected city clerks that comes into play, recounts, other decisions to be made. The city clerk does not have a lot of authority. They are still in charge of non-legislation out there, if they want posting of different documents. In the Town of Rochester, city clerk has a board for all postings. Again, as long as going along with state laws. It does cause conflicts at times with authority of moderators which is spelled out in statute for operating on election day.

Question: Rep Bergeron – So in a situation where a city clerk supervises training of up to 9-12 moderators, someone new who's interpreting state law as correct, but city clerk knows it is incorrect, the city clerk won't have authority over the moderator to ensure that that polling places being run are consistent with the other polling places?

Answer: I believe your question does not address the situation properly. These moderators in charge of voting places, every citizen of NH has a problem with a moderator not following state laws, there is a hot line that can be used on election day. City clerk still has responsibility in statute that if there's disagreement, proper place to be adjudicated thru SOS office.

Question: Rep MacDonald – As observed in your testimony, it seems everyone has cell phones today and taking pictures. I'm concerned about enforcement, who's even going to notice?

Answer: Certainly, enforcement is an issue. My hope might be who takes a picture, the moderator will ask him to delete it, trying to discourage people, not create a confrontation. Set out in statute, there's a code, behavior at polling places, though may not be easy, lessen the occurrences.

Question: Rep MacDonald – Did any local officer request this legislation?

Answer: It was requested by SOS.

Part III Opening the outer envelope and preprocessing.....

Question: Rep Hamblet – I have three questions about preprocessing, line 17&18, town or city clerk shall open outer envelope of absentee prior to 5pm on election day, that just means they open the outer envelope at some point. They don't have to open all the AB the day before?

Answer: The intent ongoing is to open outer envelope, inspect ballot, if problem try to contact voter by information provided, which it does reqest, such as an email or cell phone. Right now, state law without exception put into place for COVID, back when I was a moderator, we could only open the outer envelope two hours after polls open. Then if noticed Affidavit was not signed, there was no opportunity

to accept that ballot. This gives people opportunity to fix ballot, allows clerk to contact voter, best interest of voter.

Question: Rep Hamblet – lines 24&25, it does require clerks to open outer envelopes, review affidavit. There are actually 3 parts – open outer envelope, review, and final processing on election day. Now allowed to open outer envelope, and review affidavit, then another preprocessing day with a team, maybe the Saturday before election day go thru the process again with marking on check list?

Answer: I did not touch this statute what the moderator processing of AB because of court order from checking signature verification. The process would be that the moderator would also look at signatures to make sure the affidavit was filled out properly and allowed to make annotation onto the checklist allowing the process on election day.

Question: Rep Tirosian – Much of my questions has been answered, but appears two-fold reason why wanting to open outer AB envelope before election day. First, free-up time for town clerks and other to address missing signatures. Any date in what extent this is a problem with people not signing?

Answer: I do not. I know phone calls with SOS and moderators and clerks, this is very popular thing to do. One question the ACLU asked me in precursor to reinstating signature verification. My answer to them if I was to reinstate verification tell them up front, but to reinstate signature verification requires a method of cure. It would be a training by the SOS and a petition by the SOS's office to lift the injunction.

Question: Rep Tirosian – Under this provision, if it would become law, it would be a disadvantage for anybody who would drop off their AB the night before election. The individual would not have the same time to correct the deficiencies?

Answer: This is what the ACLU discussed with me. If I'm doing as much as I can to make sure the ballot is counted, if I limit the ballot to be opened two days before election day, may take away the ability to cure from that individual to drop off AB on way to Florida, depriving them of their right to franchise.

Question: Rep Bergeron Senator Gray, I want to address language in lines 17&18. Am I clear, is it your intent this process shall be conducted for every city, town, state election, not local option is a mandate because it says "shall"?

Answer: Yes, opening of outer envelopes in all towns and cities.

Question: You are saying this needs to be done day before Election Day versus days before election. The Clerks in Nashua trying to contact voters, maybe 1,000/day, I cannot see how it can be physically done. Was it your intent to say the day or a day?

Answer: Again, page 2, part III, line 18, AB ballots open prior to 5pm on the prior day. The intent this has been ongoing process from 1st day allowed for those who voted AB, maybe once a week. When it gets closer to election day, open on a daily basis. Have provision while you're still at polls, sealed or not, but clerk is able to verify signature on affidavit. Ongoing process, don't see a slue of problems.

Question: Section IV, page 5, line 36. All other sections of bill have specific dates, or 60 days after passage. This one says upon passage. Would this override what we did on SB-43?

Answer: No, in fact supports I think SBB43. If execution of Windham found significant differences with Governor, Senator which you modified to the bill, this would allow the AG to say, do I need to expand

investigation into other communities which SB43 wouldn't allow you to do because it is specific to Windham. This bill would allow them to expand this request.

Question: Rep Muirhead – I'm inquiring about the procedure for populating that committee, page 3 lines 30-34. Wonder if you considered a process of ensure bipartisan members on committee. Seems consistent process, maybe populated by members of one party?

Answer: 2 members of senate, 3 members by the Speaker of the House which is normal standard language we put in, would appoint one member from each party and a 3rd maybe whomever is chosen. Senate, 2 members, generally one from each party, but we rely on these two people doing this appointment to have bipartisan representation.

Question: Rep Murihead – Would you be willing to amend to specify that expectation?

Answer – Again the bill is in the House. I don't believe it to be a problem in the past. I personally do not see the need.

Part IV

Question: Rep MacDonald – Historically, registers of probate activists of either party came into office with some probate experience, sometimes none, but there always was a seasoned staff to help them out. This is no longer the case as it has been almost a decade. How would a party activist with no experience meet the duties under this?

Answer: I point out to other elected officers, Registers of Deed, appoint of depute of register deeds, probate or finance person. County commissioner is responsible for services to provide duties. If register of probate elected is incapable of duties, can also appoint a deputy to that person thru use of salaries.

Question: Rep Berry – Points have been made quite a bit about experience on whom we elect. To my knowledge outside of County Attorney, we don't require this including a state rep, a governor or executive council. Is this like any other elected official?

Answer: Like any other elected official.

Question: Rep Lane – I noticed that a provision of archives putting things older than 40 years in state archives making it difficult. Why cut of 40 years and why are we doing this?

Answer: Original cut off from original legislation was 35 years. At requests of a couple of people, including the court system changed to 40 years. Lot of research actually only done back 40 years of property records. If the SOS is still on, their process making records digitized make available, might be easier.

*Donna Systek – I'm a former Register of Probate. Long history of this issue going back to 1983. See Testimony.

Question: Rep Tirosian – Each county currently has one Register of Probate and they do not work, but are paid \$100 a year?

Answer: Yes, I went over to the court house to be sworn in, had a tour of the state house, but during my campaign, I said I would not collect the \$100. Their only obligation is to coordinate with SOS and administrative judge where records are held and that is done by staff.

Question: Rep Berry – Most functions of government by professional staff, the governor, the executive council.

Answer: The register of probate has no connection of professional staff, no connection to court staff, no desk, no ballpoint pen.

Representative Griffin: I did ask an invite to Judiciary Committee to the content of this bill.

Representative Horrigan: I support the basic concept of restoring the Register of Probate, but I am not sure of this particular version. I like the concept of Part V, but not sure to pass this one.

*Kate Horgan: See Testimony Executive of NH Counties. Part V- I believe it is well intentioned, but we believe Section V would not cover expenses. Set salaries and fees don't come in as anticipated funds, towns would have to make up the additional costs.

*Cathy Stacey: See Testimony I am Register of Deed for the County of Rockingham and a NH attorney. I'm in opposition to SB89, part V. We ask to remove it and vote on bill separately. Reference was made counties could opt in or out. That is not true, not optional. I'd agree the Register of Deeds is a court function, not county function. We have already housed at the courthouse a help center. The NH Counties are in opposition to this bill.

Question: Rep Berry – in your closing argument, people attempt readdress. Probate has to go to Judiciary. Judiciary by design is independent. If a person has a problem, how do people reconcile redress?

Answer: I disagree with that. I honestly believe you're in position to put thru legislation if people have a problem with the Judiciary.

Question: Isn't that what this legislation is about, us doing our job?

Answer: I disagree. You have a court function not county. This office belongs to be in the court.

Question: Rep MacDonald Miss Stacey, you have obviously been involved a long time. You have been Register of Deeds for a long time and well versed attorney. I'm from Rockingham. Having followed this issue over the year, can you give your insight with your experience of clerk of the courts replacing a register of probate function?

Answer: What I will say, my office fields lots of questions from the public. Obviously, clerks were well versed upstairs in court. People asked questions, got answers on site there. Not happening as much now and not happening since COVID.

*Ann Tilton – Written Testimony I was a Register of Probate until the position was eliminated. One unfortunate of this position being eliminated, no longer advocate for the people, but I had professional staff who assisted. I don't know how towns can pay if not enough fees coming in. I agree with others that spoke, part V should be broken out and ITL.

*Jane Bradstreet – Written Testimony – I am Register of Probate for Merrimack County and speak in favor of this bill. I have been in touch with 8 other registers who are looking forward to what this bill could provide for constituents Two problems, 2011 reduced duties of register of probate court to nonexistent. Court that had staff of around 50 people, 2017 to 9. First problem, keeper of historical

records, register of deeds, register of probate go hand in hand to prove ownership, deserves better oversight. Second problem is customer service. Supervised probate more difficult, large estates have attorney, smaller estates people do it on their own, no longer get the help on their own. There's big difference with District Court and Probate issues. Probate procedure for loss of loved one or loved one to go under guardianship. Now, if one can't use a computer, goes to Circuit Court House, goes to a window, goes to a Kiosk lobby to fill out case and binder, then if still have questions, go to a phone dial 855. That's about all you get. This bill attempts to help with difficulties, help constituents who need it at time of distress. Training is difficult. I have 20 years of experience of probate court and would be willing to assist in training other registers. I think Register of Probate County Website would be a good thing, helpful to people.

Last thing, when Senator Gray was talking about a case that had an attorney help transfer a car. I think had they talked to a register of probate would know that could been changed to private car.

Question: Rep Hamblet – How could you help citizens if records are over at the courthouse?

Answer: I had hoped we would expect we get access electronically, all done in Concord. All estate records are electronically. Reason counties don't have the information, everything is done in Concord. The Register can pick up the phone, 855, knowing what questions to ask.

Question: Rep Hamblet – I thought I heard al records are not all digitized>

Answer: They are not. You would have to go back 40 years. Maybe 2015-2016 state started going electronically. Register out to be able to look at paper files. One thing haven't been able to do, now not able to do their job.

Question: Rep Tirosian Miss Bradstreet, Today living change from 2011 being adopted to Circuit Court, what is your job description?

Answer: What they mentioned in this bill, "Keeper of any possible historical records, oversee supervision with circuit court of appointed officers. We have not been allowed in court houses to even see what's happening.

Question: Rep Tirosian – Under this proposed legislation, how would that better help you serve the probate system?

Answer: They get an Advocate who knows the system, negotiate thru it, the process and procedure more efficiently, go thru court and get what they need, someone who is helpful.

Civil cases are in Probate court cases, much more family related issues, to get documents or help in the process of a person's estate or help with an incapacitated relative.

Question: Rep Tirosian – So if this legislation becomes law, do you think it would speed up process for people going thru probate from currently done?

Answer: Cannot say for certain it would speed up, but would help our constituents set up what they need and make whole experience, no fault of their own dealing with court system.

*Dan Healy – Derry Clerk concerned with Part III, #2, opening of AB outer envelopes. I suggest be an option to change 'shall' to 'may'. Doesn't take into account large towns day before 500 AB, opening

envelopes day before, verify signature. We did preprocessing, great option, closer get to election day, clerks in bigger towns, don't have to do additional steps.

Other concern is section on security of open ballots. Nothing in bill that says now have outer envelopes left open. Our moderator is responsible, not clerk. Smaller towns might be able to do 50 ballots, but Derry, Nashua would have issues with 500 ballots and contacting those people.

Question: Rep Tirosian – Pre-COVID when you had to do processing on election day, was that a problem?

Answer: Pre COVID no problem going thru AB. 2016 we had 1,200 ballots, 2020 we had 7000 ballots.

*Margaret Burns - Executive Director of NHMA express support to part III, no other position on rest of bill. Generally, we support this part as it provides efficiency for preprocessing prior to Election Day. Generally, NHMA heard support some level of authority for preprocessing. One suggested amending and conveyed to Senator Gray also, page 3, lines 21-23 language in bill. Right now the Moderator should mark check list process on election day. We recommend it to say moderator or moderator designee. In practice it's the moderator who opens the inner ballot and clerk makes mark on election day.

Deputy David Scanlan; Part III I agree with Dave Healy and Margaret Burns. Experience we had in 2020 election related to preprocessing was very favorable. Moderators found useful tools in being able to process absentee ballots. What's missing in the language procedure in 2020 specifically allowing preprocessing on Th, F, Sa,Monday prior to election. At discretion of moderator, we found ability of clerks to contact voters to procure inefficiencies, come in and correct, make their vote count. To be allowed to continue uniformally throughout state, provided voters willing to provide a phone number or email on application.

Part IV – Audit after election and potential investigation. I know this committees has referred to this topic, studies and later calls for progressive lead of investigation authorized by commission or AG. Need to be very careful of process we put in place after election. It is really important process lead to accurate count and recount and process to audit devices to count ballots. We need to achieve finality, not have elections questioned-ongoing. I think there is a door open to continue that in future. I think needs to be carefully thought out.

Question: Rep Tirosian – In regards to preprocessing. Same question I ask prime sponsor, does SOS have any data on % of state wide AB where signatures of inner envelope were incorrect for a vote not to count?

Answer: I do not have it at my fingertips, but I can put it together.

*Rep Barbara Griffin – 4th term representative from Goffstown. Amendment 1445 to SB89 was prepared at my request due to the assault o NH sovereignty if HR1 passes that it would have no effect on NH officers. Testimony given. I have a copy of 2021 People's Act of over 800 pages on campaign finance, ethics. It eliminates Voter ID, 75% of Americans support voter ID. S1 provides registration to vote at age 16. S1 provides automatic online provisions to opt out, not opt in. This major change comes at great cost. S1 occurs voting over weeks which goes against our NH Constitution. We have election day. S1 community allows voting at least 15 days before election day and to continue receiving AB 10 days after election. It states voting places to remain open for 10 hours prior to election day and 12 hours on election day. Small communities in NH do not have the staff for this. S1 provides no-excuse AB voting. Our constitution does not have this provision. S1 mailing application requires 60 days prior, drop boxes 45 days prior to election. For our communities, who is going to pay for this? Most communities have already started their budgets. These processes have been rejected by this committee over the years. Unmanned drop boxes, extended hours, extended days were brought forward by the American Federation of American Teachers in 2020. They asked the court to order the state to implement these provisions. The Superior Court rejected this, realized our processes and procedures are appropriate of our Constitution. The NH process has worked. In April 2020, UNH from the survey center, the polling data showed 90% voters said it was easy to vote or somewhat easy. NH has placed in the top 3 of all state's participation of voter in the last 4 presidentials.

Some say this Amendment will create two elections. I disagree. It is S1 forcing states to have two elections, not this amendment. I present S1 will have dramatic and an unconstitutional impact on our Constitution and our elections. I strongly disagree with our sitting Senator who says it doesn't change how our NH elections are run. If you are concerned about this Amendment , suggest contact our federal officials. While 2 federal members have already voted, 2 have not, reach out to them. I ask you to vote yes on Amendment 1455.

Question – Rep. Prudhomme O'Brien: Our Senators were former Governors, former state reps. Are you aware of anyone of them ever serving on this committee?

Answer – No, I am not.

Representative Manuel Espitia: I am here to testify against this non-germane amendment. HR1 is basically to get dark money out of politics, crack down on corruption. Today's hearing is nothing more than a political stunt and an attempt at misinformation. It is a silly amendment. SB89 is a good bipartisan bill, but adding this amendment would be detrimental to this bill. NH was not in the last 3 top elections it turns out. This bill (HR1-SR1) will not happen overnight. There are provisions for time lines.

Question: Rep Tirosian – Please help me understand how HR1-SR1 by relaxing voter ID requirements and other requirements help ensure voter integrity? Tell me how that gets rid of dark money in politics?

Answer – This is only one piece, voting is not one specific, many parts to it. In my opinion, it makes for fair elections, transparent how candidates are funded. Elections are not just one component.

Question: Rep. Tirosian – Are you aware any voter in NH's last election that wanted to vote but wasn't given the chance to vote?

Answer: Funny you asked that, yes I've heard due to misinformation. People turned away to vote. A new naturalized citizens, didn't have exact date naturalized, denied right to vote.

Representative Amanda Toll – representing Cheshire 16, Keene. I'm here to testify against this Amendment. This is voter suppression for the People Act. Creating separate elections federal and state, disenfranchise young people. Many my college students would be confused on the different voting procedures. They shouldn't be turned away by red tape. Important to note, cost of monies for this Amendment? Will not be taking any questions.

Deputy Secretary State David Scanlan – Secretary Gardner was scheduled to testify, but had a commitment with an awards ceremony. By the way Chairman Griffin, the winner was a 14-year old from Goffstown. We are in support of this Amendment by Sponsor Griffin. S1 form our standpoint is a state takeover. Reading of the bill if S1 was to pass would change every area of our election process. Rep. Griffin did a great job. The general state election process has to work for all voters, easy to vote, make sure to avoid fraud, don't want voter suppression. If we go too far one way, it creates people's voter suppression. If we go too far the other way, fraud is rampant. Need to find a balance in laws we enact, most voters are confident. HR1, Secretary of State's office has put together a power point. The Act itself as mentioned is very broad, broken down to divisions A- Voting, B- Campaign Finance C – Ethics. Again, our comments are related to Division A, voting. Some things in this legislation is good, like same-day registration, electronic polls books, which our office is currently working on. But when get further into the bill, page 20, HR1, it is a takeover of Congress on states and localities rights to vote thru restrictions on right to vote including onerous voter ID burdens, on the voting procedures, polling places, and other impediments. I challenge any member of this committee to point to an area that is not problematic to the state of NH. Major concerns about opportunity of ballot harvesting, and provisions difficult to maintain voter check lists, and difficult to remove voters if there is an unqualified problem.

Question: Rep Cote – Do you agree that passage of this Amendment would separate federal and state elections?

Answer: That would be one option.

Question: Rep Cote - What would the other option be?

Answer: Different ballots and check lists on day of elections.

Question: Rep Cote – Any idea the financial impact if passage of this amendment?

Answer: No, we don't even know the financial impact of S1 either.

Question: Rep. Muirhead – It is my understanding, most of your testimony focused on US legislation. I wonder if you understand this Amendment converts NH SB89 into a referendum?

Answer: This Amendment fires a shot across the bow, shows passing wisdom of passing such legislation from Congress would be a federal takeover if S1 passes. Congress then controls NH election laws.

Congress is made up of over 400 legislators, NH has 2. Who's really writing election laws? States like CA and NY.

Question: Is it my understanding from yes, this Amendment converts this to be a referendum? Is there concern state office will compromise integrity?

Answer: The climate in politics where there is a great deal of polarization, it is difficult to administer positions on election bills. If we don't speak up we're not doing our job to not alerting to citizens what's going on. I've repeated for years, there is a delicate balance to making voting easy and secure enough that confidence in votes counted. This perspective we are taking is one of Administrative.

Question: Rep Prudhomme-O'Brien – Reactions of this legislation from local town officials, supervisors of check list and moderators, I think of them first. My question out of 24 clerks polled and 21 were opposed to the People's Act. How is the reaction on the ground?

Answer: We work very closely with elected officials, clerks. We discuss legislation and gave briefing on HR1 a few weeks ago. We did not poll clerks on this, but I am sure they would agree, but have not heard.

Question: Rep Lane – The Power Point you referenced, I am not aware of this. Please share with members. You referred to page 2 – voting problems. SB3 where one needs multiple degrees to understand the affidavit. Do you see that as at least one of the problems?

Answer: I would disagree with you on this point.

Question: Rep Lane – If I heard you correct, you said, "keep our vote pure". Because I am someone who grew up in the South, just wanted to say Jim Crow, as indicated this is a highly charged issue that type of language. Knee jerk reaction for me.

Answer: Rep Lane, I don't recall using words "keeping vote pure". I don't recall saying it that way.

Question: Rep Bergeron – Deputy Scanlan, in looking at the proposed Amendment, could you tell me what provisions you or other officials the authority to conduct parallel federal and state, adapting changes or other edits to check list?

Answer: I cannot point out in the Amendment. If S1 was to pass, we would be doing major rewrite of all our election laws.

Question: Rep Bergeron – If S1 does pass, major legislation will have to be introduced to make sure NH laws work with federal laws.

Answer: Yes.

Question: Rep Berry – Has any member of our federal delegation spoken to you or your office directly in regards to SR1?

Answer: Not that I am aware of.

Question: Rep Berry – Why do you think all 4 US Congress-Senate could not bother to reach out to your office that runs our elections?

Answer: I don't know Representative Berry.

Statement Rep Berry: I do, they don't care.

Question: Rep Groen – How do you see this in light of federal and state constitution of HR1, (SR!)

relating to the Constitution?

Answer: S1 conflicts with provisions of the NH Constitution.

Question: Rep Timothy Horrigan – Rep for Strafford 6. I'm hard press as to what it means, S1 and HR1, not sure what form it's going to take. Two different elections, Federal-state sounds absurd in my opinion, as we rely on federal government monies. And to defend our US Congress, I'm sure they care.

Kelsey Klementowicz: Written Testimony. Portsmouth civil rights lawyer. SB89 a thoughtful bill, but this Amendment does the opposite. Because NH cannot exempt federal, this would double work for local offices, slow down lines. Let's assume S1 passes, towns would need additional forms, online voting registration, SOS portal system to change address, obtain AB online. Other states have attempted this two-tier system. Texas did have this bill, but failed. This amendment if passed probably unlikely to survive legal challenge and tie up the state.

Question: Rep Lane – Have you submitted your testimony?

Answer: No, but I will.

Phil Hatcher: See Testimony. Please vote against this non-germane amendment.

Ken Barnes: I live in Contoocook. I speak against this non-germane amendment, poison bill, not related to the bill it's attached to. I would make voting more difficult and more costly. By creating 2 different voting, different check lists, everything to be done double by officials, that costs money, NH doesn't have that money. Secretary of State, Governor praised our NH elections, encouraging and easier to vote, that is what democracy is about. This will cause confusion. Please vote no on this Amendment.

Cordell Johnston – Represents NHMA. My initial reaction, it's crazy for two separate processes for election. I hae to admit to H1 as someone who follows state and federal. I assumed HR1 extreme hyperbole on both sides. On what I have read, there are some good things, but also things that would be a problem: early voting provision- under this bill locations in NH would be open 10 hours a day for 15 days before the election. I am the Moderator in my town and I do not have time this kind of time to spend. Maybe it makes sense in TX, but in town of 70, it's insane. No option, no possibility of a waiver. I am not convinced this amendment is the answer. Try to work with federal legislatures.

Question: Rep Berry – As representative to NHMA, has any of our federal delegation reach out to you?

Answer: Not to my knowledge. We will be reaching out to them over our concerns.

Lucas Meyers: Volunteer for 603 Forward. We have great concern of attaching this partisan bill t change the purpose is insidious. Ito highlight Mr. Johnston, there is work being done for states like NH under this bill. I think this hearing is a disservice to our local officials. I do not think it is the best interest for our voters. This is only power grab is for billionaires. Vote this Amendment down.

Alvin See: Testimony given. I am in support of SB89 and this Amendment 1445. I don't like the idea US Congress violating the US Constitution and have federal take over of the election process. I would support this amendment even if it meant two separate ballots, federal and state, some people

potentially not qualifying for both ballots. I also approve if its two separate days for two separate ballots. I think it is appropriate the NH legislature create a resolution to send a message to Senator Hassan and Senator Shaheen to vote against HR1 to protect NH elections.

Liz Tentarelli: Testimony - President of LWV. Our mission is to empower voters. Earlier Deputy Scanlan said the election process has to work for all voters. I fear this Amendment if HR1 passes and this Amendment passes, will do the opposite, will discourage voters, make voters lose confidence in our elections. If future voters have to register for federal and differently for state and local, will lose confidence. Whether you like HR1, members of this committee should make views known to our Federal delegation. I think this way is an overreach. I support SB89 with it's bipartisan support, but oppose this amendment.

Deborah Nelson: I live in Hanover. I have been a volunteer at the polls for 30 years. Until I recently retired, I taught American History and Literature in public schools. I respond to this Amendment which is distorted information on the federal bill, creates barriers to voting. The "For the People Act", I wish people would not refer to it as a "federal take over". I wish they could stop using such charged language. I would disagree that the SOS's power point to clerks a few weeks ago is riddled with misinformation, highly not independent, in other words, very partisan. HR1 gets rid of dark money that plays in politics. This Amendment does none of that. I support this bill before this Amendment which has no fiscal note attached.

Elizabeth Corell: I'm from Concord. I am in opposition to this Amendment as a Ward Supervisor of the Checklist. My comments are specific to local impact, two points. As Supervisor, we come to our jobs as volunteers, usually picking up the SOS manual few times a year. That manual is over 300 pages. The notion that it will have two check lists, 2 processes is mind boggling, making it harder to find people to run for check list and moderators. #2 Confusion used as a tool to keep people away from polls. I hope it is clear I oppose this Amendment.

Jodi Nelson: Testimony. I am from Derry. Out of respect for people's time, I am testifying in support of this Amendment for reasons as stated prior to my testimony.

Olivia Zink: See Testimony. I am testifying in opposition to this Amendment. I am Executive Director to Open Democracy and from Franklin.HR1 is a critical package, reform, get dark money out of politics, cracks down on corruption. This Amendment simply put creates massive confusion and cost NH lots of money. I urge you to vote down this Amendment.

Susan Richmond: Testimony given. I am in opposition to this non=germane amendment, 1445 to SB89. I worry there's no financial note attached to run 2 parallel elections, cost passed down to cities and towns. Where will extra workforce be found to run. So many details before this bill can move forward. I urge you to please not pass this nongermane amendment 1445 to SB89.

Kerry Claflin. Testimony. Supervisor of check list, Concord Ward 5. I submitted written testimony to this commit. I am speaking in opposition to this Amendment for many reasons that have been talked about. I object to characterization to S1, attitudes, speculative, no reliable polling done. Opinions of only 24 clerks. I don't know how chosen. These comments heard this am and earlier in media are speculative. I fully support S1 and while not a perfect bill, I agree with others that it is incumbent that our elected

officials and SOS reach out to our Senators as opposed to back ending, obstructing and putting out misinformation.

Linda Bundy: I'm from Antrim. I'm speaking in opposition to this non germane amendment to SB89. If this passes, 2 separate ballots, 2 separate procedure requirements, confusing to voters, create additional work for officials. The "For the People Act" will move our election procedures into the 21st century. I am confident our SOS will maintain secure voting elections and voter participation. I support SB89, but I urge the members of this committee to oppose this Amendment.

Janet Ward: Testimony given. I watched the presentation by Deputy Scanlan to the NH officials, during this I suggested he contact our federal officials of S1. I felt Mr. Scanlan's comments and concerns were disingenuous. I also watched the Senate Committee, Judiciary Committee in its entirety "For the People Act". As for letters sent to Senator Hassan by Rep Berry, and Rep. Sweeney, it contains deliberate failure to acknowledge and document critical voter suppression issues that this Act was designed to address. Some key objectives of this "Act" end gerrymandering. No defensible reason to support this Amendment, it would create confusing sets of elections. Please support SB89 and vote no on this Amendment.

Mr. Perry: See written testimony. I'm speaking in support of SB89, oppose Amendment 1445h.

Rep Lane: What was the results of the sign in sheet?

Rep MacDonald: 307 in support, 331 in opposition, 1 neutral.



To expand Americans' access to the ballot box, reduce the influence of big money in politics, strengthen ethics rules for public servants, and implement other anti-corruption measures for the purpose of fortifying our democracy, and for other purposes.



Sec. 2. Organization of Act into divisions; table of contents

(a) Divisions.—

This Act is organized into divisions as follows:

- (1) Division A-Voting.
- (2) Division B-Campaign Finance.
- (3) Division C-Ethics.

Today's briefing will only discuss Division A which is the elections portion of HR 1.

Items in Division A that we will not discuss today:

- Provisions not specific to New Hampshire such as voting provisions for U.S.
 Territories, Tribal lands and the District of Columbia.
- Redistricting of Congressional Districts.
- Provisions of HR 1 already practiced in New Hampshire such a election day voter registration.
- Provisions of HR 1 that New Hampshire is already working toward such as electronic poll books, on-line voter registration portals, and increased accessible voting opportunities for individuals with disabilities.

Section 3 (3)(C), page 20

• (C)As a result, Congress finds that it has the authority pursuant to section 5 of the Fourteenth Amendment to protect the right to vote. Congress also finds that States and localities have eroded access to the right to vote through restrictions on the right to vote including excessively onerous voter identification requirements, burdensome voter registration procedures, voter purges, limited and unequal access to voting by mail, polling place closures, unequal distribution of election resources, and other impediments.

Section 4 (a), page 23

- 4.Standards for judicial review
- (a)In general
- For any action brought for declaratory or injunctive relief to challenge, whether facially or as-applied, the constitutionality or lawfulness of any provision of this Act or any amendment made by this Act or any rule or regulation promulgated under this Act, the following rules shall apply:
- (1)The action shall be filed in the United States District Court for the District of Columbia and an appeal from the decision of the district court may be taken to the Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia Circuit. These courts, and the Supreme Court of the United States on a writ of certiorari (if such a writ is issued), shall have exclusive jurisdiction to hear such actions.

Section 1012 (d), page 55

- (d)Treatment of individuals under 18 years of age
- A State may not refuse to treat an individual as an eligible individual for purposes of this part on the grounds that the individual is less than 18 years of age at the time a contributing agency receives information with respect to the individual, so long as the individual is at least 16 years of age at such time. Nothing in the previous sentence may be construed to require a State to permit an individual who is under 18 years of age at the time of an election for Federal office to vote in the election.

Section 1013 (b), page 57

- (b)Requirements for contributing agencies
- (1)Instructions on automatic registration
- With each application for service or assistance, and with each related recertification, renewal, or change of address, or, in the case of an institution of higher education, with each registration of a student for enrollment in a course of study, each contributing agency that (in the normal course of its operations) requests individuals to affirm United States citizenship (either directly or as part of the overall application for service or assistance) shall inform each such individual who is a citizen of the United States of the following:
- (A)Unless that individual declines to register to vote, or is found ineligible to vote, the individual will be registered to vote or, if applicable, the individual's registration will be updated.

Section 1013 (b)(2), page 58

- (2)Opportunity to decline registration required
- Except as otherwise provided in this section, each contributing agency shall ensure that each application for service or assistance, and each related recertification, renewal, or change of address cannot be completed until the individual is given the opportunity to decline to be registered to vote.

Section 1013 (b)(3), page 58

- (3)Information transmittal
- Upon the expiration of the 30-day period which begins on the date a contributing agency as described in paragraph (1) informs an individual of the information described in such paragraph, unless the individual has declined to be registered to vote or informs the agency that they are already registered to vote, each contributing agency shall electronically transmit to the appropriate State election official, in a format compatible with the statewide voter database maintained under section 303 of the Help America Vote Act of 2002 (52 U.S.C. 21083), the following information:
- (A)The individual's given name(s) and surname(s).
- (B)The individual's date of birth.
- (C)The individual's residential address.
- (D)Information showing that the individual is a citizen of the United States.
- (E)The date on which information pertaining to that individual was collected or last updated.
- (F)If available, the individual's signature in electronic form.

Section 1013 (e)(2), page 62

- (2)Federal agencies
- In each State, each of the following agencies of the Federal Government shall be treated as a contributing agency with respect to individuals who are residents of that State (except as provided in subparagraph (C)):
- (A)The Social Security Administration, the Department of Veterans Affairs, the Defense Manpower Data Center of the Department of Defense, the Employee and Training Administration of the Department of Labor, and the Center for Medicare & Medicaid Services of the Department of Health and Human Services.
- (B)The Bureau of Citizenship and Immigration Services, but only with respect to individuals who have completed the naturalization process.
- (C)In the case of an individual who is a resident of a State in which an individual disenfranchised by a
 criminal conviction under Federal law may become eligible to vote upon completion of a criminal sentence
 or any part thereof, or upon formal restoration of rights, the Federal agency responsible for administering
 that sentence or part thereof (without regard to whether the agency is located in the same State in which
 the individual is a resident), but only with respect to individuals who have completed the criminal sentence
 or any part thereof.
- (D)Any other agency of the Federal Government which the State designates as a contributing agency, but only if the State and the head of the agency determine that the agency collects information sufficient to carry out the responsibilities of a contributing agency under this section.

Section 1015 (b), page 69

- (b)Limits on use of automatic registration
- The automatic registration of any individual or the fact that an individual declined the opportunity to register to vote or did not make an affirmation of citizenship (including through automatic registration) under this part may not be used as evidence against that individual in any State or Federal law enforcement proceeding, and an individual's lack of knowledge or willfulness of such registration may be demonstrated by the individual's testimony alone.

Section 1017, page 78

- 1017.Payments and grants
- (a)In general
- The Election Assistance Commission shall make grants to each eligible State to assist the State in implementing the requirements of this part (or, in the case of an exempt State, in implementing its existing automatic voter registration program).
- (b)Eligibility; application
- A State is eligible to receive a grant under this section if the State submits to the Commission, at such time and in such form as the Commission may require, an application containing—
- (1)a description of the activities the State will carry out with the grant;
- (2)an assurance that the State shall carry out such activities without partisan bias and without promoting any particular point of view regarding any issue; and
- (3) such other information and assurances as the Commission may require.

Section 1201 (b), page 132

- (b)Prohibition Against Voter Caging
- No State or local election official shall prevent an individual from registering or voting in any
 election for Federal office, or permit in connection with any election for Federal office a formal
 challenge under State law to an individual's registration status or eligibility to vote, if the basis for
 such decision is evidence consisting of—
- (1)a voter caging document or voter caging list;
- (2)an unverified match list;
- (3)an error or omission on any record or paper relating to any application, registration, or other act requisite to voting, if such error or omission is not material to an individual's eligibility to vote under section 2004 of the Revised Statutes, as amended (52 U.S.C. 10101(a)(2)(B)); or
- (4)any other evidence so designated for purposes of this section by the Election Assistance Commission,
- except that the election official may use such evidence if it is corroborated by independent evidence of the individual's ineligibility to register or vote.

Section 1201 (c)(2), page 132

- (2)Prohibition on challenges on or near date of election
- No person, other than a State or local election official, shall be permitted—
- (A)to challenge an individual's eligibility to vote in an election for Federal office on Election Day, or
- (B)to challenge an individual's eligibility to register to vote in an election for Federal office or to vote in an election for Federal office less than 10 days before the election unless the individual registered to vote less than 20 days before the election.

Amends HAVA Section 306 — Early Voting Page 183

- 306.Early voting
- (a)Requiring Voting Prior to Date of Election
- (1)In general
- Each State shall allow individuals to vote in an election for Federal office during an early voting period which occurs prior to the date of the election, in the same manner as voting is allowed on such date.
- (2)Length of period

Testimony on non-germane amendment to HB 89. May 19, 2021.

My name is Kelsey Klementowicz. I live in Portsmouth, and I am a civil rights lawyer focusing on voting issues. I am testifying as a member of the public, but informed by my experiences working with local elections officials and hearing from thousands of NH voters. I also have experience in election administration in other states including Georgia, Texas, and Wisconsin.

I had been in support of HB89 prior to this amendment. HB 89 is a thoughtful and necessary bill to assist our hardworking NH elections officials and voters.

This amendment, however, would do the opposite.

The Supremacy Clause of the US Constitution (Art VI, Para 2). It establishes that the federal constitution, and federal law generally, take precedence over state laws, and even state constitutions.

Because NH law cannot preempt Federal Law for Federal Offices - this amendment attempts to create two separate schemes and procedures for Federal offices and state and local offices - even on one election day.

This would more than double the work of elections officials during federal election cycles - where elections officials must offer voters one set of ballots, forms and rules for Federal offices and a separate set for local offices. They must also somehow manage and maintain two different registration and absentee ballot lists - all for one election.

You could imagine how confusing this would be for voters - how it would slow down lines on election day - and inundate clerks' offices.

Let's assume for a moment that HR1 passes and includes online voter registration, and the SOS implements a comprehensive voter portal system like they have in other states where a voter can register, change their address, or request an absentee ballot online.

Say a voter registers online and requests their absentee ballot. They then can only get a ballot for the Federal offices. Then they either call their clerk and realize they need to do additional forms to register and get a ballot for the local races, which they do but then they aren't eligible. So this voter then needs to go on election day to vote for local offices. Then are they given a ballot only for local offices? Which has a separate, dedicated machine? Or must moderators then cancel their absentee ballots and thus can't begin feeding them into machines until the close of polls.

This is why attempts to create a two-tier election system have failed or been struck down across the United States. No states currently have two-tiered systems. The Texas legislature heard a similar bill just last week (HB 4507) to force voters to register separately for federal and state/local elections if HR1 passes. This bill failed - even in the Republican-controlled House - because of administrative challenges and costs. Kansas and Arizona had similar bifurcated systems with different requirements in state elections. Kansas's law has since been overturned by federal courts and their system unified. Arizona settled a case objecting to their bifurcated system that then required them to unify their registration system.

This amended bill, if passed, would be unlikely to survive a legal challenge and would tie the state up in costly and unnecessary litigation.

Finally, this bill attempts to address a problem that doesn't exist. The details of the HR1 are still being worked on/ In fact - just this morning Senator Klobuchar circulated a markup of S1 which gives leeway to some jurisdictions, including an exemption to the 15 days/10 hrs per day early voting requirement for jurisdictions with fewer than 3,000 registered voters.

And the core of HR1 would be great for New Hampshire. It would allow the pro-voter reforms that were put in place in 2020 to continue - any voter could cast an absentee ballot or vote by absentee ballot early in their clerk's offices - which was available for more than 30 days in 2020. And it would include federal funding to finally modernize our systems and give our local elections officials tools to do their jobs even better.

Dear Chair Cook, Senator Gray, and Representative Griffin:

In accordance with RSA 656:45, SB 283 (2020), the Secretary of State's office conducted a study of the use of a high-speed optical/digital scan ballot counting device to assess the feasibility of using such equipment for a post-election, pre-recount period audit of a sample of ballots counted by a different ballot counting device at an election.

Executive Summary

One vendor successfully demonstrated an ability to use their ballot counting device to count previously counted ballots that had been designed to be counted by a different vendor's device. We conducted the study using ballots from the 2018 General Election from five towns where at least one race was recounted. All races and two questions were studied in four towns that use a ballot counting device: Amherst, Canaan, Charlestown, and Northwood. Only two races were studied in the fifth town, Dalton, which hand counts ballots.

In the ballot counting device towns, the audit study examined the results for a total of 167 candidates and questions. Of those 167 candidates/questions, the total votes for a candidate/question as counted on election night and reported on the return of votes and the total votes for the same candidate or answer for a question from the study count matched for 47 candidates/questions, or 28% of the 167 outcomes studied.

The causes for the results that did not match were not fully determined. For one town, an indeterminate number of spoiled ballots that would not have been counted on election night were stored with counted ballots and were inadvertently counted during the study. This accounts for a small part of the differences in outcomes and identifies the need to change ballot storage protocol.

The three instances where the differences between the election night count and the study count were greater than 10 votes involved counts where the differences were 73 votes, 51 votes, and in the third case, 11 votes in the scatter of write-in votes. These three instances were in county office races. Of the three instances, two were uncontested races. Determining the source of these significant differences was beyond the scope of this study. To the extent the source of the difference could be determined, it would likely require a study hand count of the ballots, which would need to be authorized by law, and might require additional efforts. This study was conducted under COVID mitigation practices and teams of counters were not available. It may be appropriate to conduct further study to address this issue.

<u>Difference in recount results vs study count results – Ballot Counting Device Towns</u>

By design, the study was conducted using ballots where at least one race on the ballot was recounted by the Secretary of State. This afforded the opportunity to compare the study count results with the recount results. In the ballot counting device towns, the audit study examined the results for a total of 14 candidates whose races were recounted. Of those 14 candidates

and races, the study count matched the recount for 5 candidates or in 36% of the outcomes studied.

The one instance where the difference between the recount and the study count were greater than 10 votes involved a difference of 11 votes in a State Representative Race. Determining the source of this difference was beyond the scope of this study. It may be appropriate to conduct further study to address this issue.

Difference in hand count results vs study count results - Hand Count Town

Published academic research on historical recounts in New Hampshire prior to 2004 reports that at that time there was a greater difference in election night results compared to recount results in hand count towns versus in ballot counting device towns.

"Historically, there is about a 1 percent difference between initial counts and recounts when ballots are tabulated by hand. The discrepancy between initial counts and recounts falls to about .5 percent with the optically scanned ballots."

CALTECH/MIT Voting Technology Project, <u>Using Recounts to Measure The Accuracy of Vote Tabulations: Evidence from New Hampshire Elections 1946-2002</u>, at page 7.

Since 2002, the end of the period studied, New Hampshire no longer uses the Optech ballot counting device that was in use in some towns during the CALTECH/MIT study period. Also, the read-heads in the AccuVote devices used during and after the study period have been updated since that study ended. Significant education has been provided to local election officials on best practices for ballot counting in both hand count and ballot counting device polling places. While the conclusion likely still applies that a device count is slightly more accurate than hand count, we are hopeful that a study on more recent recounts would show smaller differences between election night and recount results for the majority of recounts.

By design, the 2020 study included one set of hand counted ballots. The Ballot Counting Device used in the study requires that a ballot has precisely printed reference marks, referred to as timing marks, printed on the ballot for the device to be able to count the ballot. The 2018 General election ballots printed for hand count towns, however, did not have timing marks printed on them. Therefore, the study device required a human adjudicator to examine an image of each ballot and direct the system how to count each ballot for each race and question. The moderators for Bedford and Durham assisted in the study and performed most of the human adjudication of the hand counted ballots using the vendor's system. This is a time consuming process where the moderator views an image of the ballot on a computer screen and uses the computer keyboard/mouse to tell the system which candidate/question received a vote on that ballot for each race/question.

Due to the time required, the study analyzed only two races. The audit study examined the results for a total of 5 candidates whose races were counted by hand on election night. Of those 5 candidates, the total votes counted by hand on election night and the total votes for the same candidate counted using the device at the study did not match in any race. There was a difference of 1 vote for three candidates. There was a difference of 2 votes for one candidate and a difference of 4 votes for one candidate.

The Secretary of State previously recounted one of those races. The recount results matched the hand count results from election night for both candidates. The count at the study, using moderator adjudication with the system, had a difference of 1 vote for one candidate and 4 votes for the second candidate.

The study count was in effect a hand count, albeit, using the study technology to view and record the votes as determined by the human adjudicator. Determining the source of the difference between the counts was beyond the scope of this study.

The vendor's system reported 386 ballots were scanned for counting for the two races used in the study of hand counted ballots.

Addendums

The vendor, Clear Ballot, provided a written report, attached as Addendum A.

The vendor provided the results reports on the day of the study, however, due to the manner in which programming was completed the reports for each town include races from other towns. Each therefore contains reports on some race which were not on that ballot and for which 0 ballots and 0 votes are reported.

The Clear Ballot device report, their equivalent of a results tape, for the Northwood ballots used in the study is attached as Addendum F.

A PDF of the Excel spreadsheet, showing the raw results from the study, is attached as Addendum G.

How the study was conducted

The Secretary of State's Office issued a Request for Proposal ("RFP") that was distributed to all known ballot counting device vendors. We held a conference call to discuss the RFP and receive prospective vendor questions. Five prospective vendors participated. Three reported on the call that their system counts only ballots that are created using the software they sell as part of their election suite of products. They, therefore, declined to submit a proposal or participate. Two vendors submitted proposals and the State contracted with both to participate in the study. Clear Ballot Group, Inc. completed the study and its results are described above. The other vendor withdrew from the study, citing COVID-19 related travel restrictions and quarantine periods as making it impractical for the necessary technical staff to travel to New Hampshire and return to other work. The RFP and contracts are available on request.

Due to the COVID-19 Health Emergency, this study was completed after the deadline in RSA 656:45. Issues included vendor travel issues and the staff needed to conduct the study being fully engaged with work supporting local election officials preparing for the Primary and General elections.

Conclusion

This study demonstrates that a post-election, pre-recount period audit of a limited number of ballots from a limited number of polling places would be feasible provided resources are available to gather the ballots and staff the audit. The results of this study show that the one system used in the study produced outcomes that for some candidates affirmed the election night count. For many others, the audit study reported an outcome with such a small difference that it may help a candidate considering whether to request a recount. Where the margin of victory is greater than the difference in election night versus audit count, an audit might assure voters that the election night count accurately reflects the will of the voters.

However, the study results also identified a few instances where the audit result for a candidate varied significantly from the election night count. Further study would be necessary to determine whether such differences are attributable to errors on election night or errors with the study count. Were an audit conducted that resulted in significant differences, it would exacerbate, not mitigate, concerns with the validity of the election night result.

The study encountered a problem with uncast and spoiled ballots being stored in boxes with counted ballots. If an audit must be conducted after the election and before the recount request deadline, it will be essential that ballots that were cast and counted on election night be segregated from uncast and spoiled ballots. For the 2020 elections, the Secretary of State's Office distributed two different boxes to towns and cities for the storage of election materials following the election. Going forward, the boxes printed with red ink or other identifiers will be exclusively for the storage of ballots that were counted on election day. The boxes printed with blue ink or other identifiers, used in 2020 for absentee ballot envelopes, affidavits, rejected absentee ballots still in their envelopes, will also be used going forward for any ballots that are not counted. This will include both uncast ballots (those never issued to a voter) and spoiled ballots. The use of other boxes for storage will be discouraged.

Practical issues with implementing post-election, pre-recount audits include:

- Staffing of the ballot collection and audit process. For the audit results to be available
 to candidates who must decide by the Friday following the election whether to
 request a recount, the audit must occur simultaneously with the election canvas. The
 canvas currently utilizes virtually all staff who can be diverted from their regular
 duties from several divisions of the Secretary of State's office.
- If the audit law requires auditing of hand count towns, it will be necessary to print timing marks on all hand count ballots.
- What polling place's ballots would be audited?
 - If the sole purpose of the audit is to test a random sample of ballots from polling places to ensure that the ballot counting devices used were properly programmed and functioning, a random selection may be sufficient.
 - o If a purpose of the audit is to detect tampering with the programming of the ballot counting device occurring while the device/memory card is in storage it will be necessary to develop criteria for selection. To be effective, the criteria must be non-public, because if known before an election, anyone seeking to tamper would avoid those towns/cities whose ballots will be audited. While a random selection might detect tampering, most theories of tampering suggest that tampering would be targeted based on expected vote outcomes at specific polling places. A small random sample of polling places may miss the polling places most likely to be targeted for tampering.

 An effective post-election audit system needs to use technology from a different vendor than the technology used at polling places to count ballots on election day.
 New Hampshire will be selecting a different ballot counting device in the foreseeable future. Selecting a vendor for audit technology now will either require disqualifying that vendor from consideration as the election day device vendor or necessitate replacing the audit technology if the audit vendor is chosen as the election day vendor.

New Hampshire Post Audit Report December 7, 2020

Summary

On November 30, 2020, Clear Ballot Group audited 5 jurisdictions randomly selected by the New Hampshire Secretary of State. The jurisdictions that were selected were Amherst, Canaan, Charlestown, Northwood, and Dalton. During the audit, approximately 13,300 ballots were scanned and tabulated using the ClearAudit system. The scanning process started at a 9:20 AM and ended at 12:40 PM resulting in an estimated overall throughput of more than 4,000 ballot per hour.

During the process, the overall ballot unreadable rate of ballots was .32%. Approximately 43 ballots required manual adjudication for various reasons, such as damaged timing marks, folded corners or the ballot was a "hand counted" military overseas ballot printed by the voter. In addition to the small number of unreadable ballots in Amherst, Canaan, Charlestown, and Northwood, the 386 "hand counted" ballots without timing marks in Dalton also required manual adjudication. Two admin stations were setup and manual adjudication occurred while the other jurisdictions were scanned.

Recommendations

Voided and unused ballots should be kept separate from official tabulated ballots. During the opening of ballots, the team found batches of unused (blank) and voided ballots mixed with official tabulated ballots. The team took the time to manually separate these ballots from the ballots to be tabulated but in some cases, voided and unscanned ballots were unintentionally processed through the Clear Ballot tabulator. It is the recommendation of Clear Ballot that the unused and voided ballot be kept in separate folders or boxes to eliminate this in the future.

The manual adjudication process can be time consuming for ballots without code channels or timing marks thus slowing down the process of tabulation and providing detailed reports. It is highly recommended that code channels be added to the ballots so audit and recounts can be performed efficiently in the future.

The NH Association of Counties would like to register its opposition for SB 89, AN ACT adopting omnibus legislation relative to election procedures and registers of probate, Part V The duties of the registers of probate.

While the bill is well intentioned to assist members of the public to obtain information around their probate filings, it would place an additional burden on the ten county governments. The NHAC believes that these duties lie firmly in the Judicial Branch's jurisdiction and not with county government. If this bill were to pass, it would require county governments to provide a salary to the registers of probate, as well as provide them with mileage reimbursement, an office, supplies, telephone, computer, printer, etc. The bill does provide a fund to cover the new salary costs, however it does not cover the other associated costs as described above. County governments have been financially impacted greatly by the COVID 19 pandemic and adding this additional financial burden at this time would be a challenge.

The Association believes that SB 89, Part V would not benefit county government or the public. We would recommend that you strike Part V of SB 89.

Chairman Griffin and Members of the Committee:

My name is Cathy Stacey. I am the Rockingham County Register of Deeds, Legislative Chair for the NH Association of Counties and a licensed NH Attorney. I am here today to speak in opposition to SB 89 Part V the Register of Probate proposal. We ask that you **remove Part V of the bill and vote on it separately as Inexpedient to Legislate or strike it entirely**.

In 2011, the State Legislature with the support of the Judicial Branch removed all responsibilities of the Register of Probate making it ministerial in nature and created the Circuit Court division headed by a Clerk of Court. Prior to 2011 the Register of Probate performed the duties of a clerk of court. Please refer to Page 6 Line 1 containing the definition of "clerk" that shows the strike-out of "register of probate". The Counties do not wish to take on this new responsibility and stand by the belief that the public's best interest is served by this position being housed in the Court system.

Under" 7 New Sections" found on Page 6 Line 11; 548:1-a Authority. The register of probate shall have an office collocated with the county "resister" (sic) of deeds or other location determined by the county. There is no funding mechanism for the county to recapture funds needed to set up an office manned by a Register of Probate and Deputy. The same paragraph charges the Register of Probate with assisting parties with probate court filings and probate process governed under state statute. I would argue again this is a Court function not a county function. I can understand why the Judicial Branch might support this proposal because it eliminates the necessity for trained court staff to work with the public. This proposal creates a whole new layer of liability to the County. Having a lay person with no expertise in probate matters provide legal advice to the public could be disastrous for the public and for the Counties.

There are no qualifications for an individual elected to this position. Nor does this proposal take into consideration any education or training component.

The court is understaffed and relies upon a centralized call center to assist the public. I believe much of the public go to the court with questions because that is where they believe the expertise is to obtain answers to probate court matters. I find it unreasonable and unfair to the public that this proposal could now lead to knowledgeable staff at the court having the ability to avoid assisting the public by referring them to a name on a card located somewhere off site. How frustrating it would be to drive from the outskirts of a county to the court to be faced with the possibility of no staff on site to assist you. The 10th Circuit Court has a help center that has been closed for years. This is the location where consultation with the public should occur. At the court.

What provisions are being made for the Register of Probate to gain access to the court's electronic filing system and the physical files located at the Probate office?

This proposal contains inconsistent references to the Register of Probate salary. It first offers the salary as being consistent with NH RSA 548:17 which states the annual salary will be \$100.00. (Page 5 Lines 6-8) but then suggests the delegation sets the salary.

The proposed legislation creates a separate fund to be established by the State treasurer used to help fund salaries, benefits and other compensation for the Register of Probate, however this bill purports only to set a salary and no other compensation (see Page 4 line 15). In turn the bill increases fees for the public to file actions with the court by adding an additional \$20.00 to all entry fees. So, we are going to increase the cost to the consumer and then utilize someone outside of the Court system to perform a function that should be performed by court staff. We have no information to gauge the extent to which the public will be seeking out assistance from the Register after utilizing the call center or local court office. What need is this proposal fulfilling that cannot be addressed by the Judicial Branch?

The funding aspect creates a new burden on Counties by requiring them to file quarterly reports with the Treasurer outlining the salary "and benefits" paid to the Register of Probate. The Treasurer in turn shall pay to the counties from the fund an amount "up to the total salary" paid for the previous filing period if funds are available. Please note if there are insufficient funds in the account for that quarter the County is responsible to cover the payment without compensation. There is further no mention of payment for other benefits provided nor does it discuss reimbursement for office and equipment to house the Register of Probate. We believe this to be an unfunded mandate under NH RSA 28-A. There was no fiscal note attached to this bill in the Senate when likely it has a significant financial impact on County government.

Section 548:1-b Deputy Registers of Probate. In all cases elected officials with a deputy appoint their own Deputy to perform the duties in their absence. This proposal places authority on the Board of Commissioners to appoint. This section then speaks of qualification of the candidate to be in the same manner as the appointing officer. Is that the Board of Commissioners who in many cases have distinct districts or the Register of Probate? The compensation shall be either from the register's salary or as otherwise directed by the county delegation. It begs the question

does this position come into effect with pay only upon the disability of the Register or does it become a salaried County position? There are too many unanswered questions.

In closing, the NH Association of Counties believe this position is a Court function not a County function, believe it may create increased County liability and increased costs to the County for implementation and therefore opposes Part V of SB 89, and requests you divide the bill and vote separately on Part V as Inexpedient to Legislate or strike in its entirety.

I am Grafton County's currently serving Register of Probate. My sole purpose for running and subsequently serving as Register of Probate, has been to provide support for the restoration of this important constitutional office that, in 2011, at the instigation of the Justices of the NH Supreme Court, was gutted by the legislature. That the Justices themselves would have initiated the dismantling of a constitutional provision clearly intended to provide public oversight of probate where, historically, unscrupulous guardians, lawyers, judges, and Justices often found ways to loot unprotected estates of usually the weakest of our citizens, says something very disturbing about the then members of the Court's actual interest in ensuring constitutional provisions and protections generally. That the legislation was engineered at the time to receive as little publicity and clarity of intent as possible as it was processed in both chambers of the legislature, represents a black mark upon legislative disclosure of intent. That wrong ought to be corrected now by supporting restoration of this important constitutional function.

Current Register Bradstreet, ought to be your primary contact for questions having to do with any aspect concerning understanding the services that a Register can provide your constituents. My personal interest in this entire effort, lies in the realm of ensuring that the public watchdog function of the Office is restored.

Concerning emphasis on the importance of public oversight, one cannot ignore the historic importance placed upon this matter without recognizing that in the 1870s, the NH constitution was amended by voters to make the Register's office an <u>elected</u>, rather than an appointed one.

I hope that the Committee will see fit to vote to move SB89, as it relates to Probate matters, toward passage.

There is everything to object to in SB 89. What is the person who will be the Register of Probate supposed to do if this bill passes? I have read the bill language several times and still have little idea what would be the duties of this position other than "to assist county residents". But there is little direction as to what that assistance would entail. The Register can't provide legal advice and most of those who have been elected will probably have little knowledge of the Probate laws.

Further the bill states: "and to "request processes necessary to further all probate matters" I don't know how the Register of Probate would be able to require the Court to change their processes.

This position will not help improve the probate process. The entire probate system needs to be reconsidered. The requirement for filing everything on-line is not user friendly and means that now even the smallest estates require the assistance of an attorney - which eats up the assets of the small estates.

For the person who is trying to recover the \$500 left in a checking account by a spouse or parent, by the time that case is over there would be little to no money left - so those probate cases may not even be opened. But I don't think that bringing back a Register of Probate will fix that.

New Hampshire is one of the states that doesn't follow the Uniform Probate Code. Instead, the state has its own code in the state statutes.

The better solution could be to to modify the probate process as many other states have done. Make the entire probate process simpler - raise the amount of assets necessary to even require a probate estate and reduce the costs. The fees keep going up, the probate process is hard to do without an attorney and is unnecessarily complicated. This from California: "California probate courts allow a decedent to transfer assets to their heirs, and avoid a formal probate proceeding, if the total value of their estate is less than \$166,250."

The legislature could look at how to simplify the entire probate process for small estates. And if that doesn't happen, at least to allow persons to file paper with the court and to require the court to provide an employee for simple assistance to fill out forms and explain the process. Probate is not working well now and won't work any better if this legislation passes.

The most urgent need in the Probate Court is to preserve the many records that are presently only available on paper. The records in many counties have not been scanned, digitized or preserved to have available in the future. The paper records are deteriorating and will turn to dust as the years go on. The Probate records and the Deeds records are both necessary for the accurate record of home ownership. If the Probate records are eventually unavailable to be

searched and ownership verfied, many home owners will be unable to prove they own their properties. That would be a problem when trying to search a title or obtain a mortgage.

Opposition to Amendment 2021-1445h and Section IV of SB 89, May 19, 2021

To Honorable Members of the House Election Law Committee,

Oppose Amendment 1445h

As a member of the "majority party" of undeclared voters in NH, I ask your committee to remain neutral on S1 "For the People Act of 2021." Instead, encourage state and national discussion and recommendations for improving specific parts of the bill.

Listen more, fight less. Find common ground that works for ALL voters (or at least MOST of us).

Oppose Section IV Establishing a committee to study post election audit counting devices.

The NH legislature doesn't have the authority to outsource election responsibility to an unaccountable secretary of state or private business. **Absent a constitutional amendment, the constitutional and legal responsibility must remain the responsibility of local communities and public.**

I am including here testimony I submitted for HB 524. Please also look at the CT idea of "audit stations." That might work for NH and I'm willing to consider it. Hope you will also.

My suggestions for post-election audits are based on 1) NH Constitution and laws consistent with it and 2) widely accepted audit principles and best practices.

See link and generic principles copied below:

Specific NH Principles (consistent with constitution and current election laws that say local officials are accountable to voters): NH Const. esp. pt.1, art. 8— public accountability, transparency, pt. 2, art 32: moderator duty to "sort and count" votes in "open meeting" in the presence of the town clerk, selectmen and "all others who may take an interest in the election, and be able and willing to detect and expose any error, and obtain a correction of it immediately, when it can be most easily corrected." *Opinion of the Justices*, 53 N.H. 640, 1873

1. The NH legislature and local election officials don't have the authority to

outsource election responsibility from local election officials and public to an unaccountable secretary of state and one or more private companies. Local election officials have a constitutional duty to protect voting rights, votes and elections. Citizens have a constitutional right to a publicly observable vote count and duty to participate in local election oversight.

The 2009 state advisory report confirms that local responsibility.

"Ballot counting accuracy, security and credibility are essential for a democracy to function. Ongoing efforts to test accuracy and maintain security for tabulators and paper ballots must be supported by the cities and towns responsible for counting ballots in elections. The primary cost of tabulator testing and security must be borne by the towns and cities. If towns or cities are unwilling or unable to make such commitments, the alternative is hand counting." p.21

- 2. There have to be real checks and balances, with robust law enforcement from the Attorney General if needed, OR that responsibility (and funding) needs to be delegated to county attorneys.
- 3. HAVA money is available for audit expenses and if the state is ready to require computer-count communities to audit computer results, that money should be available to pay local managers (town moderators) and citizen auditors, with mix of R, D, U voters involved. That eliminates some of the ballot chain of custody issues that would be involved in transporting ballots to Concord and allows the public to both participate in the audit and observe it.

<u>Suggestions (to ensure checks and balances, "Separation of responsibilities")</u>

- 1. Ballot Law Commission makes "random selection" of jurisdictions to be audited. Selection made soon after election day. At least one R and D party representatives witness; ensure selection process is public.
- 2. Secretary of State prepares auditing forms (see samples from MA) https://www.sec.state.ma.us/ele/elepostelectionidx.htm

Includes local officials' explanation of why discrepancy exists (see "V. Any additional notes on perceived causes of discrepancies") SoS and AG develop audit protocols consistent with current laws.

- 3. Local election officials recruit citizen auditors. Reimbursed costs through state/HAVA funds.
- 4. SoS follows up to see why there is a discrepancy of 1% or more and makes

recommendation for improvement. Public report.

- 5. Hand-count audits conducted <u>before</u> results are certified, giving candidates time to request recounts. Calendar for reporting to Concord (currently 48 hours) and for requesting recount (currently the Friday after a Tuesday election) will need to be altered to allow local election officials time to finish the audit and candidates to request a recount if warranted.
- 6. Principles and Best Practices for Tabulation Audits

EXAMINATION OF VOTER-VERIFIABLE PAPER BALLOTS: Audits require human examination of voter-marked paper ballots — the ground truth of the election. Voter- marked paper ballots may be marked by hand or by ballot marking device. Audits cannot rely on scanned images or machine interpretations of the ballots to accurately reflect voter intent.

TRANSPARENCY: Elections belong to the public. The public must be able to observe the audit and verify that it has been conducted correctly, without interfering with the process.

SEPARATION OF RESPONSIBILITIES: Neither the policy and regulation setting for the audit, nor the authority to judge whether an audit has satisfied those regulations, shall be solely in the hands of any entity directly involved with the tabulation of the ballots or the examination of ballots during the audit.

BALLOT PROTECTION: All the ballots being tabulated and audited must be verifiably protected from loss, substitution, alteration or addition.

COMPREHENSIVENESS: All jurisdictions and all validly cast ballots, including absentee, mail-in and accepted provisional ballots, must be taken into account. No contest should be excluded *a priori* from auditing, although some contests may be prioritized.

APPROPRIATE STATISTICAL DESIGN: Audits should produce and scientifically while making efficient use of available resources. A risk-limiting audit (RLA) with a small risk limit assures a large chance that an incorrect outcome will be detected and corrected.

RESPONSIVENESS TO PARTICULAR CIRCUMSTANCES: Audit processes must include a way to respond to circumstances that come to light affecting particular devices, ballots or contests.

BINDING ON OFFICIAL OUTCOMES: Audits, including any full hand counts that result, must be completed in time to change official outcomes if hand counts so indicate.

INVESTIGATING DISCREPANCIES AND PROMOTING CONTINUOUS IMPROVEMENT:

10. The data gathered from post-election audits should be analyzed and used to continuously improve voting processes.

TESTIMONY in Opposition of the 2021-1445h Amendment to SB 89

Good Morning Chairwoman Griffin and Members of Election Law Committee,

For the record, my name is Olivia Zink from Franklin, NH and I am the Executive Director of Open Democracy Action, a non-partisan, non-profit, pro-voter organization with over 35,000 members. Open Democracy Action's mission is fixing our democracy, specifically campaign finance reform, redistricting and honest elections in New Hampshire.

The H.R. 1 "For the People Act" passed the U.S. House in March, and May 11, the U.S. Senate Rules Committee marked up the S.1 version of the bill and proposed amendments to the largest democracy reform bill in over 50 years. The For the People Act is a critical reform package—supported by an overwhelming majority of Americans across party lines—to get dark money out of politics, crack down on corruption, protect voting rights and ensure elections are safe, accessible, and accurate. According to Global Strategy Group and ALG Research, voters across the board overwhelmingly support the bill (83% support/10% oppose). It has strong support across party lines as well, with 96% of Democrats, 74% of Republicans, and 73% of independents in favor of the For the People Act. Voters nearly unanimously support policies to limit the influence of money in politics. Nearly all voters – 94% – support making nearly all political contributions fully transparent, 93% support providing more transparency into lobbyist fundraising, and 92% support prohibiting political candidates from benefiting from unlimited secret corporate money to boost their campaigns.

Protecting the Freedom to Vote

The For the People Act has a chance to finally make real the promise of democracy, and it is the culmination of a struggle for equitable voting rights that can be traced back to this country's inception. By implementing common sense voting standards like automatic, online and same day registration, we make our elections safe, secure, and accessible.

The urgency of the moment cannot be overstated. The 2020 election was the most secure in history, and the For the People Act guarantees that security for the future by requiring paper ballots, and providing financial support for our election infrastructure, something New Hampshire sorely needs.

Ending Partisan & Racial Gerrymandering

The polarization of our politics is driven in part by gerrymandering, which allows politicians to pick their voters by drawing their own districts. The For the People Act changes that. Instead of representatives drawing their own districts, S1 requires states to use independent, bipartisan redistricting commissions, and outlaws partisan gerrymandering for Congressional elections.

Getting Big Money Out of Politics: Combating Corruption with the For the People Act
The damage done by the floods of money in our elections on both sides of the aisle will not be
quickly undone, but S1 lays the groundwork for our political recovery. S1's Disclose Act requires
dark money Super PACs to disclose their donors, limiting the influence of anonymous money in our
federal politics. The For the People Act sets rigorous ethical standards for every branch of
government. Judicial reforms will create a code of ethics for the Supreme Court and Members of
Congress will no longer be able to sit on boards of the same companies they regulate.

If you'd like to delve into the details of the For the People Act, I'd encourage you to visit the Brennan Center's Annotated Guide to the For the People Act 2021.

The Impact of the Amendment to SB 89

If NH SB 89 passes as amended, federal races would be conducted under the rules set by H.R. 1 — with early voting, vote-by-mail, and countless other policies to make voting easier and more accessible. State races, however, would be conducted under whatever anti-democratic rules the legislature so chooses. Simply put, this amendment would create massive confusion and costs for New Hampshire, local election officials, and voters. For midterm and Presidential elections, it may create a situation where two simultaneous elections would need to be conducted, one federal and one state, each with separate ballots and separate rules. The cost & labor factors alone are staggering.

As federal law, H.R. 1 / S. 1 will not be able to be <u>nullified</u>. The Elections Clause in Article I gives Congress power over elections for Senators and Representatives (it also has additional power, potentially more limited, over elections for presidential electors). Other provisions give Congress power over aspects of state election laws—notably the 15th Amendment, which grants power to prevent racial discrimination—but that means there can be a two-track system.

Even the Texas legislature voted down a similar amendment. New Hampshire House Election Law Committee should follow suit and vote down amendment 2021-1445h.

Thank you, Chairperson Griffin and Members of the Committee, for this opportunity to testify in opposition to the non-germane amendment to SB 89.


I am a Supervisor of the Checklist in Concord Ward 5. I supported SB 89 and early pre-processing of absentee ballots. Senator Gray was very responsive to the many moderators who said that this provision in the 2020 Covid-19 election law was enormously helpful. Voters, too, were happy to have the opportunity to cure their ballots.

However, with the addition of the non-germane amendment, I can no longer support SB 89. The non-germane amendment, which appears to create dual tracks for federal and state/local elections in the event of the passage of HR1/S1 For the People Act, would result in the transformation from our current well-run elections, and my enjoyment of my position as a Supervisor, into a chaotic mess that should give Secretary of State Gardner nightmares. I can only begin to imagine the repercussions of an amendment that establishes that there will be one set of laws and procedures for state and local elections and a wholly different set of laws and procedures for federal elections.

My first thought goes to the cost of running elections this way. The members of this committee know better than anyone that whenever new election laws are proposed, cost is often among the top concerns that are raised, which is why I'm puzzled that there is no fiscal note. Would this amendment double the cost of elections? My second thought is for us election officials who would be asked to possibly do double the work. I can't speak for others, but I can only imagine that there would be some number of resignations over such a complex and confusing change to our elections. Would there have to be two ballots for elections of federal and state offices — that is to say, a federal ballot that any voter can use to vote by mail and a state/local ballot that must be cast at the polling place? That doesn't seem likely to help New Hampshire maintain our impressive voter turnout record. The negative implications of this amendment are endless; the positive ones seem to me to be non-existent. And, because we care about the Granite State's national reputation, it is worth pointing out the likelihood that passing this non-germane amendment would make us a national laughingstock.

In closing, I will just stress that the non-germane amendment ignores the fact that HR1/S1 For the People Act is very popular with voters of all political ideologies. And it is popular because the American people fundamentally believe in fairness and equality, no less so when it comes to voting, redistricting, and getting big money out of politics. Moreover, polling data show that implementing national standards for elections is more popular with Republican, Democratic, and Independent

The public shall have a right to attend and observe as the clerk opens the envelopes and reviews the affidavits.
 - III. The affidavit shall be reviewed to determine if the affidavit is properly executed, such as whether there is a missing signature or incorrect name.
 - IV. If during this review the affidavit does not appear to be properly executed, such as having a missing signature or incorrect name, the town or city clerk or their designee shall attempt to contact the voter to notify them of the errors and possible methods to correct the error using the telephone or email information, if provided, on the application. The clerk shall make a record that notice was provided to the voter on the clerk's list of absentee ballots.
 - 3 New Section; Processing Absentee Ballots; Pre-processing of Absentee Ballots. Amend RSA 659 by inserting after section 49-b the following new section:

The ballot shall remain secure in the unopened affidavit envelope until final processing on election day. III. The moderator or moderator's designee shall not initiate compliance with RSA 659:51 and RSA 659:52 until the time specified in RSA 659:49 on election day. 4 Processing Absentee Ballots; Challenges. Amend RSA 659:51, I to read as follows: I. All absentee ballots are subject to challenge after the moderator publicly announces the name of the absentee voter, except for voters provided for in RSA 7:46, but not after the checklist is marked with the red "A.V." or the ballot is removed from the envelope. No challenge to an absentee ballot may be asserted except in conformity with the requirements of RSA 659:27-a. 5 Processing Absentee Ballots; Opening Envelope; Depositing Ballot. PART IV Establishing a Committee to Study Post Election Audit Counting Devices and Authorizing the Attorney General to Count Ballots as Part of an Investigation into Recount Discrepancies. 1 Committee Established. I. There is established a committee to study post election audit counting devices. II. The members of the committee shall be as follows: (a) Two members of the senate, appointed by the president of the senate.
 - (b) Three members of the house of representatives, appointed by the speaker of the house of representatives.
 - III. Members of the committee shall receive mileage at the legislative rate when attending to the duties of the committee.

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- IV. Duties. The committee shall determine what ballot counting equipment is available which would support a post election audit in New Hampshire, and shall study the feasibility, time constraints, and cost of conducting a post election audit using any vote counting equipment identified. The committee may use ballots cast in prior elections to test ballot counting equipment, provided that such use is in conjunction with the secretary of state and with the approval of the ballot law commission.
- V. Chairperson; Quorum. The members of the study committee shall elect a chairperson from among the members. The first meeting of the committee shall be called by the first-named senate member. The first meeting of the committee shall be held within 45 days of the effective date of this section. Three members of the committee shall constitute a quorum.
- VI. Report. The committee shall report its findings and any recommendations for proposed legislation to the president of the senate, the speaker of the house of representatives, the senate clerk, the house clerk, the governor, the secretary of state, the attorney general, and the state library on or before November 30, 2021.
 - 2 State General Election Recounts; Conduct of Recount. Amend RSA 660:5 to read as follows:
- 660:5 Conduct of Recount. If directed by the secretary of state, the state police shall collect all ballots requested from the town or city clerks having custody of them and shall deliver them to the public facility designated by the secretary of state. At the time and place so appointed, the ballots cast for such office or question, including votes cast for the candidates or question on the ballot, write-in votes, and not voted (resulting from overvotes or undervotes), shall be counted by the secretary of state and such assistants as the secretary of state may require. When counting the ballots, the secretary of state or his or her assistants shall visually inspect each ballot. No mechanical, optical, or electronic device shall be used for the counting of ballots. The candidates, their counsel, and assistants shall have the right to inspect the ballots and participate in the recount under such suitable rules as the secretary of state may adopt. If the candidate requesting the recount cannot attend the recount, the candidate shall designate, in writing, to the secretary of state the name of an individual who will attend the recount and who will be authorized to make decisions on the candidate's behalf. Each candidate or his or her counsel or designee shall have the right to protest the counting of or failure to count any ballot. The secretary of state shall thereupon rule on said ballot and shall attach thereto a memorandum stating such ruling and the name of the candidate making the protest. If, at any time during the counting of the ballots, a discrepancy appears in any ballot for any reason, the secretary of state shall suspend the recount until the discrepancy is resolved, at which time the secretary of state shall continue the recount. In no event shall a discrepancy result in a second recount for the same candidate, as provided in RSA 660:3.
 - 3 Ballot Law Commission; General Duties. Amend RSA 665:6, III to read as follows:
- III. When the ballot law commission finds by a majority vote of members present and voting that a significant and unexplained discrepancy exists between the election

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results reported by moderators and the recount conducted pursuant to RSA 660, the results of any audit conducted by the secretary of state, or any other credible information that the commission believes, if not resolved, could undermine public confidence in the accuracy of election results, the commission shall request the attorney general to investigate.

- *IV*. The jurisdiction vested in the ballot law commission under paragraphs I and II of this section shall be exclusive of all other remedies.
 - 4 Attorney General; Enforcement of Election Laws. Amend RSA 7:6-c, II to read as follows:
- II. Without limiting the authority granted pursuant to paragraph I, whenever the ballot law commission requests an investigation to be conducted pursuant to RSA 665, or upon his or her own motion, the attorney general may unseal and reseal ballot boxes, examine or cause to be examined for that purpose any equipment, books, records, papers, ballots, or other documentary materials, or may examine any person under oath and subject to the pains and penalties of perjury that the attorney general thinks may have knowledge of any violation of election laws.
- III.(a) Beginning January 31, 2013, the attorney general shall, at least once during every 6-month period, provide a rolling report to the general court on the status of all complaints of alleged violations of the election laws received. The attorney general shall submit the report to the standing committees of the senate and house of representatives with jurisdiction over election law.
 - (b) The report shall include, but not be limited to the following:
- (1) A summary of complaints received during the preceding 6 months, or during the period since the previous report if such period is less than 6 months, including the number of complaints categorized by type of complaint and month received.
- (2) For each complaint investigated, the results of the investigation and a description of actions taken following the investigation.
- (3) For each complaint not investigated, an explanation of why the complaint was not investigated.
- (c) The requirements of subparagraph (b)(2) or (b)(3) may be satisfied by including with the report, for the complaint described, a closure letter, settlement agreement, cease and desist order, or complaint filed with a court, or any other official communication.
- 5 Enforcement of the Election Laws; Impounding Ballots. Amend RSA 666:13 to read as follows: 666:13 Impounding Ballots. If directed by the attorney general as part of his enforcement of the election laws *pursuant to RSA 7:6-c*, the state police which he designates shall collect all ballots requested from *secretary of state or* the town and city clerks who have custody of the ballots. The state police shall deliver the ballots to the public facility which is designated by the attorney general and may conduct inspections of the ballots as the investigation requires.
 - 6 Effective Date. Part IV of this act shall take effect upon its passage.

Relative to the Duties of the Registers of Probate.

1 Establishing Compensation; Register of Probate. Amend RSA 23:7 to read as follows:

23:7 Establishing Compensation. Every county convention shall have the power to establish salaries, benefits, and other compensation paid to elected county officers including the county attorney, sheriff, register of deeds, register of probate, treasurer, and county commissioners. For the purposes of this section, except for the register of probate, "compensation" shall include salary, longevity pay, vacation and sick pay, allowances, and all other payments made by the county to its officers, plus the fair market value of any compensation paid in kind if reportable as income for federal income tax purposes, plus all fringe benefits that may be provided including health insurance and retirement, and may also include an upper limit on the amount of mileage and out-of-pocket expenditures reimbursable to each officer. Said compensation shall be established biennially by the county convention prior to the filing date required under RSA 655:14 for the elected offices listed in this section, upon recommendation of the executive committee which shall remain in effect during their term of office. Notwithstanding any other provision of law to the contrary, in counties in which any of the officers listed in this section receive fees or mileage, or both, for services performed by them as part of their compensation, the county convention may put such officer on a salary and expenses basis. Such officer may be required to continue to collect the usual fees and mileage for the service performed and to pay over all such fees and mileage to the county treasurer for the use of the county. In such event, the amount such officer received in fees and mileage, less expenses, shall be included in determining the minimum at which his or her salary may be established unless a lesser amount is agreed upon by the incumbent officer at that time. In no case, except for the register of probate, shall the salary or other compensation of any of such officers be established at a lesser amount than that which was in effect December 31, 1972.

- 2 Salaries for Counties; Register of Probate. Amend RSA 23:8 to read as follows:
- 23:8 Salaries for Counties.

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- I. Every county shall establish the salary for its register of deeds at a fixed dollar value. Said salaries may not be established either in part or in total as a percentage of fees or other charges or payments collected by said register. Said salaries shall be established not less than biennially by the county convention, upon recommendation of the executive committee. In no case shall the salary of any of said registers of deeds be a lesser amount than the salary which said register was receiving on January 1, 1974.
- II. Every county shall establish the salary for its register of probate at a fixed dollar value. Said salaries may be established either in part or in total as a percentage of fees or other charges or payments collected by the county treasurer or the state and consistent with RSA 548:17. Said salaries shall be established not less than biennially by the county convention, upon recommendation of the executive committee.

SB 89 - AS AMENDED BY THE SENATE - Page 7 -

- III. There is hereby established in the state treasury a separate fund to be known as the county registers of probate fund, which shall be used to help fund salaries, benefits and other compensation paid by counties to registers of probate. The fund shall consist of all moneys collected pursuant to RSA 490:24, III and RSA 490:27, III. Payment to the counties shall be limited to the extent funds are available in the county registers of probate fund.
- IV. Moneys in the county registers of probate fund shall be nonlapsing and continually appropriated to the counties for the purposes stated in RSA 23:8, III.
- V. Counties shall report to the state treasurer each year on or before the 15th of March, June, September, and December the total salary and benefits paid to registers of probate in each county since the last report. The administrative judge of the circuit court shall provide by the same dates a summary of the number of probate court filings by county since the last report. The state treasurer shall pay to the counties on or before the 30th of March, June, September, and December of each year a distribution from the county registers of probate fund an amount up to the total salary paid by each county in the previous reporting period. The distribution to the counties shall be calculated on a prorata allocation based on the number of probate court cases filed in each county.
- 3 New Paragraph; Supreme Court; Costs; Entry Fees. Amend RSA 490:24 by inserting after paragraph II the following new paragraph:

- I. "Clerk" means a clerk of court or a deputy clerk, [a register of probate or deputy register,] a court stenographer or reporter, and any person performing the duties of a clerk[, register,] or reporter.
 - 6 Registers of Probate; Residence. Amend RSA 548:1 to read as follows:
- 548:1 Residence, Etc. The register of probate shall [dwell] reside in the county in which [the probate records are required to be kept] he or she is elected. If a register shall [dwell] reside in any other county and continue so [dwelling] residing for 30 consecutive days, the office shall be deemed vacant.
- 7 New Sections; Registers of Probate; Authority; Deputy Registers of Probate. Amend RSA 548 by inserting after section 1 the following new sections:

Whenever it appears from the inventory or any other instrument pertaining to real estate filed with the probate court in connection with the administration of any estate that the estate contains real estate located in another county within the state, the probate court shall notify within 15 days the register of deeds of the county in which the real estate lies of the name and date of death of the decedent. A register of deeds who receives such a notice shall record in the grantor's index the name of the decedent, his or her date of death, and the county in which the estate is being probated. The cost for filing said notice shall be assigned to the estate.

10 Probate Courts and Decedents' Estates; Publication and Notice in Newspaper RSA 550:10 is repealed and reenacted to read as follows:

SB 89 - AS AMENDED BY THE SENATE - Page 9 -

- 550:10 Publication and Notice in Newspaper. Whenever notice is required to be published in a newspaper by any provision of this title, the probate division of the circuit court shall cause such notice to be made available to the public on the New Hampshire judicial branch website or by other electronic media not less than 2 weeks before the date for which notice is given, unless otherwise ordered by the judge.
- 11 County Officers; Vacancies; Registers of Probate. Amend RSA 661:9 to read as follows:
- 7 661:9 County Officers.

- I. If a vacancy for a period of one year or longer occurs in the office of county sheriff, county attorney, register of deeds, *register of probate*, or county treasurer, the members of the county convention shall fill the vacancy for the unexpired term by a majority of the ballots cast. If a vacancy for a period of less than a year occurs in any such office, the members of the county convention shall, by majority vote of the county convention, vote to either fill the vacancy or to leave the office vacant.

Testimony on non-germane amendment to HB 89. May 19, 2021.

My name is Kelsey Klementowicz. I live in Portsmouth, and I am a civil rights lawyer focusing on voting issues. I am testifying as a member of the public, but informed by my experiences working with local elections officials and hearing from thousands of NH voters. I also have experience in election administration in other states including Georgia, Texas, and Wisconsin.

I had been in support of HB89 prior to this amendment. HB 89 is a thoughtful and necessary bill to assist our hardworking NH elections officials and voters.

This amendment, however, would do the opposite.

The Supremacy Clause of the US Constitution (<u>Art VI</u>, Para 2). It establishes that the federal constitution, and federal law generally, take precedence over state laws, and even state constitutions.

Because NH law cannot preempt Federal Law for Federal Offices - this amendment attempts to create two separate schemes and procedures for Federal offices and state and local offices - even on one election day.

This would more than double the work of elections officials during federal election cycles - where elections officials must offer voters one set of ballots, forms and rules for Federal offices and a

separate set for local offices. They must also somehow manage and maintain two different registration and absentee ballot lists - all for one election.

You could imagine how confusing this would be for voters - how it would slow down lines on election day - and inundate clerks' offices.

Let's assume for a moment that HR1 passes and includes online voter registration, and the SOS implements a comprehensive voter portal system like they have in other states where a voter can register, change their address, or request an absentee ballot online.

Say a voter registers online and requests their absentee ballot. They then can only get a ballot for the Federal offices. Then they either call their clerk and realize they need to do additional forms to register and get a ballot for the local races, which they do but then they aren't eligible. So this voter then needs to go on election day to vote for local offices. Then are they given a ballot only for local offices? Which has a separate, dedicated machine? Or must moderators then cancel their absentee ballots and thus can't begin feeding them into machines until the close of polls.

This is why attempts to create a two-tier election system have failed or been struck down across the United States. No states currently have two-tiered systems. The Texas legislature heard a similar bill just last week (HB 4507) to force voters to register separately for federal and state/local elections if HR1 passes. This bill failed - even in the Republican-controlled House - because of administrative challenges and costs. Kansas and Arizona had similar bifurcated systems with different requirements in state elections. Kansas's law has since been overturned by federal courts and their system unified. Arizona settled a case objecting to their bifurcated system that then required them to unify their registration system.

This amended bill, if passed, would be unlikely to survive a legal challenge and would tie the state up in costly and unnecessary litigation.

Finally, this bill attempts to address a problem that doesn't exist. The details of HR1 are still being worked on. In fact - just this morning Senator Klobuchar circulated a markup of S1 which gives leeway to some jurisdictions, including an exemption to the 15 days/10 hrs per day early voting requirement for jurisdictions with fewer than 3,000 registered voters.

And the core of HR1 would be great for New Hampshire. It would allow the pro-voter reforms that were put in place in 2020 to continue - any voter could cast an absentee ballot or vote by absentee ballot early in their clerk's offices - which was available for more than 30 days in 2020. And it would include federal funding to finally modernize our systems and give our local elections officials tools to do their jobs even better.

TESTIMONY in Opposition of the 2021-1445h Amendment to SB 89

Good Morning Chairwoman Griffin and Members of Election Law Committee,

For the record, my name is Olivia Zink from Franklin, NH and I am the Executive Director of Open Democracy Action, a non-partisan, non-profit, pro-voter organization with over 35,000 members. Open Democracy Action's mission is fixing our democracy, specifically campaign finance reform, redistricting and honest elections in New Hampshire.

The H.R. 1 "For the People Act" passed the U.S. House in March, and May 11, the U.S. Senate Rules Committee marked up the S.1 version of the bill and proposed amendments to the largest democracy reform bill in over 50 years. The For the People Act is a critical reform package—supported by an overwhelming majority of Americans across party lines—to get dark money out of politics, crack down on corruption, protect voting rights and ensure elections are safe, accessible, and accurate. According to Global Strategy Group and ALG Research, voters across the board overwhelmingly support the bill (83% support/10% oppose). It has strong support across party lines as well, with 96% of Democrats, 74% of Republicans, and 73% of independents in favor of the For the People Act. Voters nearly unanimously support policies to limit the influence of money in politics. Nearly all voters — 94% — support making nearly all political contributions fully transparent, 93% support providing more transparency into lobbyist fundraising, and 92% support prohibiting political candidates from benefiting from unlimited secret corporate money to boost their campaigns.

Protecting the Freedom to Vote

The For the People Act has a chance to finally make real the promise of democracy, and it is the culmination of a struggle for equitable voting rights that can be traced back to this

country's inception. By implementing common sense voting standards like automatic, online and same day registration, we make our elections safe, secure, and accessible.

The urgency of the moment cannot be overstated. The 2020 election was the most secure in history, and the For the People Act guarantees that security for the future by requiring paper ballots, and providing financial support for our election infrastructure, something New Hampshire sorely needs.

Ending Partisan & Racial Gerrymandering

The polarization of our politics is driven in part by gerrymandering, which allows politicians to pick their voters by drawing their own districts. The For the People Act changes that. Instead of representatives drawing their own districts, S1 requires states to use independent, bipartisan redistricting commissions, and outlaws partisan gerrymandering for Congressional elections.

Getting Big Money Out of Politics: Combating Corruption with the For the People Act

The damage done by the floods of money in our elections on both sides of the aisle will not be quickly undone, but S1 lays the groundwork for our political recovery. S1's Disclose Act requires dark money Super PACs to disclose their donors, limiting the influence of anonymous money in our federal politics. The For the People Act sets rigorous ethical standards for every branch of government. Judicial reforms will create a code of ethics for the Supreme Court and Members of Congress will no longer be able to sit on boards of the same companies they regulate.

The Impact of the Amendment to SB 89

If NH SB 89 passes as amended, federal races would be conducted under the rules set by H.R. 1 — with early voting, vote-by-mail, and countless other policies to make voting easier and more accessible. State races, however, would be conducted under whatever anti-democratic rules the legislature so chooses. **Simply put, this amendment would create massive confusion and costs for New Hampshire, local election officials, and voters.** For midterm and Presidential elections, it may create a situation where two simultaneous elections would need to be conducted, one federal and one state, each with separate ballots and separate rules. The cost & labor factors alone are staggering.

As federal law, H.R. 1 / S. 1 will not be able to be <u>nullified</u>. The Elections Clause in Article I gives Congress power over elections for Senators and Representatives (it also has additional power, potentially more limited, over elections for presidential electors). Other provisions give Congress power over aspects of state election laws—notably the 15th Amendment, which grants power to prevent racial discrimination—but that means there can be a two-track system.

Even the Texas legislature voted down a similar amendment. New Hampshire House Election Law Committee should follow suit and vote down amendment 2021-1445h.

Thank you, Chairperson Griffin and Members of the Committee, for this opportunity to testify in opposition to the non-germane amendment to SB 89.

I am a Supervisor of the Checklist in Concord Ward 5. I supported SB 89 and early pre-processing of absentee ballots. Senator Gray was very responsive to the many moderators who said that this provision in the 2020 Covid-19 election law was enormously helpful. Voters, too, were happy to have the opportunity to cure their ballots.

However, with the addition of the non-germane amendment, I can no longer support SB 89. The non-germane amendment, which appears to create dual tracks for federal and state/local elections in the event of the passage of HR1/S1 For the People Act, would result in the transformation from our current well-run elections, and my enjoyment of my position as a Supervisor, into a chaotic mess that should give Secretary of State Gardner nightmares. I can only begin to imagine the repercussions of an amendment that establishes that there will be one set of laws and procedures for state and local elections and a wholly different set of laws and procedures for federal elections.

My first thought goes to the cost of running elections this way. The members of this committee know better than anyone that whenever new election laws are proposed, cost is often among the top concerns that are raised, which is why I'm puzzled that there is no fiscal note. Would this amendment double the cost of elections? My second thought is for us election officials who would be asked to possibly do double the work. I can't speak for others, but I can only imagine that there would be some number of resignations over such a complex and confusing change to our elections. Would there have to be two ballots for elections of

federal and state offices — that is to say, a federal ballot that any voter can use to vote by mail and a state/local ballot that must be cast at the polling place? That doesn't seem likely to help New Hampshire maintain our impressive voter turnout record. The negative implications of this amendment are endless; the positive ones seem to me to be non-existent. And, because we care about the Granite State's national reputation, it is worth pointing out the likelihood that passing this non-germane amendment would make us a national laughingstock.

In closing, I will just stress that the non-germane amendment ignores the fact that HR1/S1 For the People Act is very popular with voters of all political ideologies(1). And it is popular because the American people fundamentally believe in fairness and equality, no less so when it comes to voting, redistricting, and getting big money out of politics. Moreover, polling data show that implementing national standards for elections is more popular with Republican, Democratic, and Independent voters than so-called "state's rights" (2). Please do not needlessly complicate our elections just to spite the federal government or prove a point. It is the voters and election officials of New Hampshire who will surely suffer.

Please vote no on the non-germane amendment to SB 89.

Madame Chair and the other members of the Election Law committee,

My name is Phil Hatcher and I am a resident of Dover.

I am testifying to put the debate that HR 1 has provoked into a historical context.

In 1903 New Hampshire amended its constitution to require that voters be able "to read the English language and to write". And in 1905 a law was passed to put in place a literacy test to be applied when a person went to register to vote. Slips of paper were placed in a box, with each slip containing five lines of the state constitution. The person applying to vote would reach into the box to select a slip, and then needed to read all five lines, copy by hand one of the lines, and sign their name.

I am not sure what the motivation was for the literacy test. Perhaps there was a concern about the growth in the number of non-English speaking immigrants at the time. But it seems clear that the law was intended to suppress votes that were perceived as low-quality.

This literacy test stayed on the books until 1976. What was the motivation to finally remove it?

Well, the federal government had passed the landmark 1965 Voting Rights Act, which aimed to eliminate the voting apartheid that existed in many Southern states at the time. Southerners and many state rights advocates were upset about what they saw as federal overreach. However, both senators from New Hampshire voted for the bill, one Republican and one Democrat.

And New Hampshire became collateral damage in the war for full citizenship for African Americans. Because the state had a literacy test on the books, similar to what was used to disenfranchise citizens in the South, and because ten towns in the state had voting participation rates below 50% in the 1968 election, the ten towns were labeled as "covered jurisdictions," meaning they needed to have any changes in their voting laws and procedures cleared by the US Department of Justice. This caused New Hampshire to have to file extensive paperwork at times, such as after performing redistricting. In 2012, when the state was applying to be freed of this burden, Secretary of State Gardener was quoted in the Concord Monitor as saying that New Hampshire's situation made a mockery of the original goals for the Civil Rights Act because he said the state had not had lynch mobs and cross burnings. I guess the Secretary failed to recognize that the Klu Klux Klan had been active in the state, particularly in the early decades of the twentieth century, directing its ire not just at African Americans but also at Catholic immigrants, who very well might have been the target of the 1903 amendment.

I do not know why New Hampshire decided to leave its literacy test on the books even after the passing of the 1965 Civil Rights Act, but I hope that we would all agree that finally removing the literacy test was a good thing. And that the Civil Rights Act was a very good thing for our nation.

More recently, In 1993, the federal government passed the National Voter Registration Act, better known as the motor-voter bill. The New Hampshire senators, both Republicans, voted against this bill. The bill caused New Hampshire in 1994 to add election-day registration. Again, this caused consternation in many quarters of the state. But, as Secretary Gardener showed in his presentation to the Election Law committee at its orientation meeting back in January, New Hampshire's ranking in voter turnout has since risen to be consistently in the top 5 in the nation, and this has occurred without any evidence of widespread fraud in the intervening 25+ years. I hope again that we would all agree that this is a very good thing.

So, while the details of HR 1 surely should be debated, a blanket refusal to allow the federal government to call for improvements to our state voting practices has no historical basis.

And such a refusal is particularly dangerous right now when our democracy is under the strongest attack seen since the Civil War. President Trump is lying to his followers about the 2020 election results. A large number of US representatives and senators voted against accepting fully legally certified electoral votes in January. Numerous states are rushing through laws designed to suppress the vote and hand more control of election processes and verification to partisans in state legislatures. This will not end well unless people from both political parties start to stand up and say "Enough is enough. We will defend the right and the freedom to vote."

Thank you for listening to this testimony and please vote against this non-germane amendment.

It significantly interferes with the ability of states and their citizens to secure the integrity of their election processes and assure that each citizen's vote counts/ is not diluted by potentially illegal practices.

Only citizens are allowed to vote. A citizen is someone born or naturalized in the United States. With the past and now increasing lack of control at our a southern border, citizenship becomes an important factor with respect to S1. S1 would establish automatic voter registration using multiple data bases which may not discriminate as to citizenship. This could register large numbers of ineligible voters or cause multiple registrations of a single individual. Compound this with eliminating voter ID laws, there is tremendous opportunity for unintended or intended fraud diluting the legal voter franchise.

Other issues include:

Restricting election officials' efforts to maintain the accuracy of voter registration lists and remove ineligible voters.

No witness signature or notarization requirements for absentee ballots which will be mandated to be no fault.

Allow ballot harvesting.

All of the above could be or have been vehicles for fraud.

S1 reduces the number of Federal Election Commission members from 6 to 5. This allows the political party with 3 seats to control the commission which could result in partisan enforcement.

There are more issues which I am putting together to send to our Senators. However, S1 does very little to assure election integrity. We were forced to implement many practices to support the 2020 election process during COVID. Some of the practices were good. However, others presented challenges to election officials and a reasonable possibility of threats to election integrity. Many states have been taking steps to secure their elections going forward and have also implemented some of the positive 2020 practices such as early voting. It is offensive that in cases like Georgia, the Democrats, more importantly the President, were reduced to lying about the intent. Securing election integrity is not voter suppression. In many cases, the opportunity to vote has been expanded.

Protecting the value of each person's vote is supported by the majority of Americans. The majority of Americans believe only citizens should have the right to vote. In a recent Rasmussen poll, 75% of likely US voters believe that voters should present a photo ID, 89% of Republicans, 60% of Democrats, and 77% of Independents. Ballot harvesting is allowed in some states, but the by whom and numbers are controlled. It is only unspecified in 9 states. S1 will change a lot including funneling taxpayer dollars to political campaigns. Unless we take action, the states will have no way to control their federal election processes as originally intended in the constitution.

If the For the People Act is enacted, amendment #2021-1445h would effectively set up parallel and contradictory procedures for state and federal elections, leaving New Hampshire with two election standards. Federal elections would be conducted one way while non-federal elections would be conducted another. There would be two ballots, two procedures and requirements relating to voter eligibility, voter registration, absentee voting, conducting the vote, and counting of votes.

Having different standards for state and federal elections would not only make voting more difficult, but it would also put an undue burden on the town and city officials and volunteers who New Hampshire depends on to carry out our elections. In addition to creating unnecessary confusion for voters and election officials, amendment #2021-1445h doesn't include any language outlining what the additional costs would be to pay for two different election systems or who would bear the burden of those extra costs.

While I support SB89 *without* the amendment, I am strongly opposed to it with the amendment. I urge you to oppose any version of SB89 that includes amendment #2021-1445h.

The League of Women Voters New Hampshire supports the principles in SB89 parts II and III. We believe that the early processing of absentee ballots is a sensible and safe way to ensure that all votes are processed.

However, with the introduction of Amendment 2021-1445h, we are ready to throw out the baby with the bathwater and oppose this bill if the amendment is included.

As a non-partisan organization whose mission includes empowering voters, we work diligently to help voters understand the registration and voting process. With each additional requirement voters must meet, explaining that process becomes harder. We work to meet that challenge, but it can get to the point that potential voters are faced with so many complexities they become discouraged and don't bother to engage in elections.

This amendment has the potential to create great confusion among voters. If HR1/S1 becomes federal law, voters would be allowed to vote early for their congressional delegation...but not for governor if this amendment passes. Voters would be allowed to register online to vote for President...but would apparently have to appear in person at town offices to register to vote for state senators.

I honestly don't know how I would explain to young first time voters or to voters moving here from another state that they can vote absentee and use a drop box only for Congress and the President, but if they want to vote for their own state reps they should show up in person at the polls unless they are disabled or out of town. And even then, if they want to vote absentee, they may not use an unstaffed drop box to return their ballots, which would presumably be available under HR1/S1.

I can't believe that this committee wants to create that kind of confusion, a two-tiered system, just to thumb your noses at Congress. I won't here debate the virtues of HR1/S1. You each have the same right as I do to make a case for or against the For the People Act. I will, however, appeal to your sense of integrity and to your belief that eligible voters should be able to vote safely and with confidence their vote will be counted.

Amendment 2021-1445h will, I fear, create doubt in the minds of eligible voters that the system makes any sense and can be trusted.

None of us want that kind of attitude toward our elections.
