#### **ANALYSIS**

This bill prohibits a person from, without consent, installing or activating an application on an electronic device that can track an individual's proximity to similar equipment or otherwise relay the individual's location information.

Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

1 Electronic Device Location Information; Conditions of Use of Location Information; Proximity 1 2 Applications. Amend RSA 644-A:4 to read as follows: 644-A:4 Conditions of Use of Location Information. No individual or person shall, without 3 4 consent, place, locate, or install an electronic device on the person or property of another and obtain 5 location information from such electronic device. Nor shall an individual or person, without 6 consent, place, install, or activate an application on an electronic device that can track an 7 individual's proximity to similar equipment or relay an individual's location to a similar 8 device or to a central monitoring station or other similar agency. No such consent shall be 9 required by the parent, foster parent, or legal guardian of a minor, or by the legal guardian for the 10 subject of his or her guardianship, or for persons under house arrest or probation or parole 11 supervision who are issued ankle bracelets.

2 Effective Date. This act shall take effect January 1, 2022.

#### **METHODOLOGY:**

This bill, which amends RSA 644:A:4, contains penalties that may have an impact on the New Hampshire judicial and correctional systems. There is no method to determine how many charges would be brought as a result of the changes contained in this bill to determine the fiscal impact on expenditures. However, the entities impacted have provided the potential costs associated with these penalties below.

It should be noted that average case cost estimates for FY 2021 and FY 2022 are based on data that is more than ten years old and does not reflect changes to the courts over that same period of time or the impact these changes may have on processing the various case types.

It should be noted that a person needs to be found indigent and have the potential of being incarcerated to be eligible for indigent defense services. The majority of indigent cases (approximately 85%) are handled by the public defender program, with the remaining cases going to contract attorneys (14%) or assigned counsel (1%).

Many offenses are prosecuted by local and county prosecutors. When the Department of Justice has investigative and prosecutorial responsibility or is involved in an appeal, the Department would likely absorb the cost within its existing budget. If the Department needs to prosecute significantly more cases or handle more appeals, then costs may increase by an indeterminable amount.

RSA 644-A:6 provides penalties for violation of RSA 644-A. In addition to a class B misdemeanor penalty, an individual or person who is injured as a result of a violation of this chapter may file a civil action against a government entity, individual, or person that fails to comply with the provisions of the chapter. The cost to the Judicial Branch of an average routine civil case in the superior court in fiscal year 2022 is \$526. These numbers do not consider the cost of any appeals that may be taken following trial.

Summary of testimony presented in support: None

Summary of testimony presented in opposition: Representative Horrigan

- Online privacy, especially location data, is something people are concerned about, but it is a fundamental aspect of the Internet.
- Companies use, buy, and sell personal data to provide services to consumers.
- Any type of crowd sourcing apps, like Google Maps, Waze or dating apps would be impacted by this.
- Many of these apps are essential and they are provided for free.
- There are false claims going around regarding Covid-19 tracking software being involuntarily installed.
- There are a lot of privacy protections built into these apps and people should take personal responsibility for their devices.
- Senator Kahn asked if the House committee received information from transportation or communications companies that use tracking.
  - o Got a lot of information on similar bills. Is not on the Criminal Justice Committee where this bill was.

#### Paula Minnehan (NH Hospital Association)

- Hospitals obtain consent prior to placing an electronic device on a person.
- The proposed language would cause issues in these cases.
- A weighted detecting device can be used on a hospital bed to alert personnel if a patient falls out of bed.
- A central monitoring station, as referenced in the bill, could be a nurse's station to monitor those devices attached to beds.
- This bill would prohibit a monitoring station such as that.
- Requests language to explicitly exempt healthcare facilities and providers from this bill.

#### Lisa McCabe (CTIA)

- This bill would add to further fragmentation of consumer privacy laws and raise concerns as it is technology and sector specific.
- Consumer privacy protections should apply consistently across all sectors and protections should be consistent for any type of information.
- This bill only applies to location information.
- This is something consumers are unlikely to expect or understand.
- The bill could unintentionally affect reasonable uses, such as a company that uses a device to track a package for legitimate purposes, like fresh fish in order to ensure it is safe to eat upon delivery.
- This could also impede an employer's legitimate need to track fleet vehicles.
- Privacy issues are better approached with a holistic effort across the board in order to lessen any unintended consequences and provide consistent consumer protections.

#### Maura Weston (New England Cable and Television Association)

 As written, this bill would criminalize common applications and software use in virtually all modern devices, while impeding companies' abilities to provide services that are critical to executing legitimate functions that a core to business operations.

- Badge access systems used to enter and exit buildings would be impacted by this by suggesting consent can be withdrawn or withheld, which is inappropriate and could pose safety and security threats.
- Location data related applications are important to consumer experience.
- Comcast offers a tool on their customer app to allow customers to know where a technician is and what they look like before they arrive at the customer's home.
- Technologies allow for enhanced consumer experiences and efficiency.
- The bill would prohibit the use of this technology even on a person's own property.
- NECTA member companies would be prohibited from placing tracking technology on their own vehicles or own equipment in their own buildings without consent.

#### Chief David Goldstein (Association of Chiefs of Police)

- Looking for an exception for law enforcement similar to the language proposed on HB384.
- Spoke with the prime sponsor and was given the impression that he does not object to adding the exception.
- Requesting an exemption for law enforcement and other emergency services.

#### **Neutral Information Presented:**

#### Lt. Brian Strong (NH State Police)

- There is a lack of law enforcement caveat or exception in this bill.
- Concerned that court order GPS trackers on vehicles or the activation of a vehicles GPS system to locate a driver would no longer be tools law enforcement can utilize under this bill.
- Senator Gannon asked if the exception language from HB384 would address the concerns.

#### Testimony of Lisa McCabe CTIA

#### Opposition to New Hampshire House Bill 129 Before the Senate Judiciary Committee

#### April 27, 2021

Chair Carson, Vice Chairman Gannon, and members of the Committee, on behalf of CTIA®, the trade association for the wireless communications industry, thank you for the opportunity to provide this testimony in opposition to House Bill 129, which prohibits the placement, installation, or activation of an application on an electronic device that can track an individual's proximity without consent. HB 129 is unnecessary, would add to the further fragmentation of consumer privacy laws, and raises particular concerns because it is technology-and-sector-specific.

CTIA and its member companies strongly believe that consumer information should be protected and that consumers should be given choices with respect to when and how their information is used. Mobile providers currently obtain the affirmative opt-in consent of their wireless consumers before using or sharing subscribers' precise location information – with limited exceptions for emergency situations and appropriate legal process. This is consistent with the Federal Trade Commission's (FTC) Privacy Framework and with other federal laws and regulations, which generally require telecommunications carriers to obtain opt-in consent prior to sharing mobile call location information. The FTC regularly brings

enforcement actions against companies that have misrepresented consumer control regarding collection and use of geolocation data.<sup>1</sup>

Consumer privacy protections should apply consistently across all industry sectors, and protections should be consistent for any given type of information. HB 129 applies to a specific type of information – location information – that is utilized by an application on a device for the purpose of tracking and sharing location. Because the requirements in HB 129 only apply to applications that can track location and relay that location, the legislation favors certain business models and particular competitors over others. For instance, many online companies have access to location data on consumer handsets and use that data for a variety of purposes. Operating system platforms can collect large amounts of location data from WiFi access points and sell ads based on this data without consumers' knowledge or consent. WiFi networks provide greater location accuracy and various third parties have mapped these networks. Nevertheless, the proposed law would not apply in this situation in which precise location data is collected, used, and shared. HB 129 is unfairly limited to the collection of one type of location data in the online ecosystem – something that consumers are unlikely to understand or expect. Furthermore, the bill exposes companies in New Hampshire to costly litigation.

Moreover, because this bill is overly broad it could have untended consequences. For example, the bill could capture uses that are reasonable, such as a company that uses a device in their packages to track the package for legitimate purposes (e.g. tracking produce or fish to make sure it remains safe to eat upon delivery). This bill could also impede an employer's legitimate need to track fleet vehicles for business purposes.

Privacy issues are better addressed with a holistic approach and at the federal level, so that the law does not apply differently to different types of data or on a patchwork, state-by-state basis, or favor one business model over another. A comprehensive approach will lessen any unintended consequences and provide consistent consumer protections. For these reasons, CTIA respectfully requests that you report this bill Inexpedient to Legislate. Thank you for your consideration.

Dear Chair Carson and Members of the Senate Judiciary Committee,

On behalf of the New England Cable and Telecommunications Association (NECTA), I am writing to express concerns with HB129, Prohibiting the Installation or Use of Electronic Tracking Software. NECTA is a five-state regional trade association representing substantially all private cable telecommunications companies in New Hampshire. Our members, including Atlantic Broadband, Charter and Comcast, are New Hampshire's leading broadband and communications providers with over 450,000 customers in more than 184 communities.

NECTA appreciates the intent of HB129 to target and prohibit the use of tracking software to maliciously surveil or monitor someone without their consent, but as drafted, this legislation is overly broad in its application and would have unintended consequences on legitimate business practices in a variety of industries. Without clarifying language, this legislation would criminalize common applications and software used in virtually all modern devices, while impeding companies' abilities to use these technologies for services that are critical to executing legitimate functions core to business operations.

Many private businesses utilize software and hardware devices for a range of security, safety, environmental and customer service operations which would fall under the prohibition created in HB129. A common example of this type of use is a badge access system, which businesses utilize for security purposes to enter and exit facilities and to manage internal access within those facilities. Badge systems can also be used for routine everyday business functions such as using copiers and printers or to access product and inventory storage. Requiring that an employer make these types of uses optional by suggesting that consent can be withdrawn or withheld is not only inappropriate, but it could pose a safety and security threat to employees and business operations.

Another use of software that would be prohibited under this legislation is fleet vehicle management software, which any modern company who has a large fleet of vehicles to manage utilizes. New

Hampshire's cable industry owns and operates the largest vehicle fleets in the state, with Comcast alone managing hundreds of vehicles in New Hampshire. Fleet management software monitors everything from engine idle time to lower emissions to vehicle location for efficient routing and time management. The efficient operation and maintenance of the state's most capable broadband networks serving more than 450,000 homes and businesses is made possible in part through fleet analytics collected by hardware and software that would ultimately be prohibited under HB129 without consent. Again, requiring an employer to obtain consent from employees for this technology utilization or allowing it to be optional is not practical and would have a critical impact on day-to-day business operations and efficiency.

Location data related applications are also very important to customer experience in a variety of industries. In the cable-broadband industry for example, Comcast offers a tool on their customer app which allows customers to see additional information about their Comcast technician when they are within thirty minutes of an appointment window. This not only enhances convenience for customers by reducing the time they have to wait at their house for a technician, but it also gives them more visibility into who their technician is which provides for greater consumer safety. Overall, this technology allows for enhanced consumer experience and greater efficiency—all modern-day advances that consumers have grown to expect from companies providing customer service, like the companies NECTA represents.

Lastly, HB 129 is different from the existing statutory language because the prohibition applies even on a person's own property. As drafted, NECTA member companies would be prohibited from placing tracking and monitoring technology on their vehicles or equipment in their own buildings without consent. The existing statute clarifies that the placement or installation of a device is limited to being on the property of another, but this important distinction is not included in HB129 which creates a new and distinct prohibited conduct in statute.

Because of these concerns highlighted above, we respectfully ask the committee to amend the bill to include clarifying language that would not prohibit or impede a companies' ability to use these important technologies for legitimate business purposes. NECTA would be happy to assist in the development of amendment language to clarify the allowance of these legitimate uses while still maintaining the original intent of this legislation, which is to ultimately target and criminally prohibit illegal and malicious surveillance.

#### HB 129 - Prohibiting the Installation of Use of Electronic Tracking Software

#### **Testimony**

Good afternoon, Madam Chair, and members of the committee. My name is Paula Minnehan, Senior VP, State Government Relations with the New Hampshire Hospital Association (NHHA), representing all 26 of the state's community hospitals as well as all specialty hospitals.

NHHA is concerned with the proposed language in HB 129-FN. While hospitals obtain consent before placing an electronic device on a person, the proposed language would cause issues in cases where medical devices could be considered one of the devices described in this bill. For example, a weigh detecting device could be used on a hospital bed to alert healthcare personnel if a patient falls out of the bed. There may likely be a central monitoring station, such as a nurse's station, to monitor these devices and this bill, as written, would prohibit such a monitoring station. While the sponsor may not have intended this bill to apply to health care facilities, as drafted, it would impact them. If this bill were to move forward, we would ask that you consider amending the bill to ensure that hospitals and other health care facilities that utilize devices and equipment for the safety of patients, are not negatively impacted. One suggestion is to explicitly exempt health care facilities and providers from the bill.

NHHA appreciates the opportunity to comment on HB 129-FN. I am happy to answer any questions.
