Summary of Testimony Presented:

Representative Daryl Abbas, Rockingham 8

- Rep. Abbas said, this is a simple and straightforward bill. Under the current law, if a person strikes a dog with their vehicle, then a person is required to report it to the owner or police. This bill requires the same for cats.
- Rep. Abbas said, NH does not currently provide the same property rights protection for cat owners. NH requires individuals to report any damage to property by a motor vehicle. If you hit a statue of a cat, you would have to report that, but currently not a real cat. This bill is not creating any new private right of action in a civil case. This would put a cat on an equal playing ground as a dog.
- Rep. Abbas said, this bill does not imply a person is negligent just because they hit a cat with their motor vehicle. This bill just offers the same protection to another domesticated animal. With a stray cat, there is no victim to the crime. It is not a reason to not pass this.
- Rep. Abbas said, this comes down to a property rights issue. There is no reason cat owners are not offered the same protection. There is also a moral issue for when conduct injures the rights of another person. Cats and dogs should be under equal standing.

- Sen. Sherman asked, what is the law if you hit another animal, such as livestock? Can domesticated animals include livestock? Should dogs and cats be replaced by "domesticated animals" to protect other family pets out there?
 - o Rep. Abbas said, the intent of this bill is to simply incorporate cats. These are the most common animals that roam freely and there is an emotional attachment to them. However, I would share the same moral concern and the same moral obligation if it were a livestock animal that got hit by a vehicle.
- Sen. Ward said, I noticed this is called "Arrow's Law." Should we take this out?
 - o Rep. Abbas said, this bill was suggested by a very concerned constituent that lost their cat to being struck by a motor vehicle. This constituent is actually my wife.
- Sen. Birdsell said, some dogs have collars with an address so you would know who to report it to. Cats usually don't. How would you know who to report it to?
 - o Rep. Abbas said, it is unusual to see a domesticated cat far from its home. You also have the option to report it to the authorities. This, may make the driver feel safer and it is helpful if the cat does not have a collar. It depends on the circumstances.

Gina Scrofano

- Ms. Scrofano testified in support of the bill.
- Ms. Scrofano said, there is an inconsistency with the penalty in these laws. Failing to report property damages is a misdemeanor, and death and injury is a class B felony. The death of a dog is a violation. I believe enhancing the penalty is worthy of a misdemeanor.
- Ms. Scrofano said, I appreciate the question of broadening this to all domestic animals and should be concerned in the future.
- Ms. Scrofano said, the existing laws fails to reflect the significant households with cats in NH. An estimated 25.4% of US households own cats. The number of cats with collars has gone up, specifically through a rabies vaccine requirement.
- Ms. Scrofano said, fleeing from the scene of any property or individual damage is unacceptable. Lastly, this bill will provide families the information they need to save their cat, or receive closure with the loss of their cat.

Dear Chair Birdsell and members of the Senate Transportation Committee,

As a New Hampshire resident, I support HB 174, relative to reporting a collision between a cat and a motor vehicle, for the following reasons:

1. Existing NH law is inconsistent, unclear, and limited regarding the reporting of vehicle collisions involving property damage, death, injury, and animals, as well as with the level of penalty for a violation of reporting such accidents.

RSA 264:25 mandates that a driver who "... has just been involved in any accident which resulted in death, personal injury or damages to property, shall immediately stop such vehicle at the scene of the accident" and give their information (name, address, driver's license number, etc.) "... to any person injured and to the owner of any property damaged," or "... to any uniformed police officer arriving at the scene of the accident or immediately to a police officer at the nearest police station."

A natural person's failure to comply with that law is currently considered a misdemeanor when involving injury to property and a class B felony when involving death or personal injury (RSA 264:29).

Based on current interpretation and court practice, those laws do not include the injury or death of animals, whether wild, domestic, or companion animals (also referred to in current law as 'household pets').

RSA 264:31 requires that "the driver of any vehicle who knowingly strikes a dog and fails to report the incident to the dog's owner or custodian or to a police officer as soon as possible, shall be guilty of a violation."

That statute is extremely limited in terms of a vehicle collision with animals or that results in the death or injury to animals, as it is only applicable to dogs.

Under current law, a driver must report a vehicle collision with an inanimate object - such as a statue of a cat, but not with a living cat (or any animal other than a dog). There is also an inconsistency regarding the current level of penalty within these laws, as failure to report such incidents involving injury to property is a misdemeanor, and those involving death or personal injury a class B felony, while a failure to report such accidents involving dogs is a violation.

2. Existing law fails to adequately reflect the significant number of NH households with cats and how cats are valued by NH residents.

According to a survey conducted by the American Veterinary Medical Association (AVMA), an estimated 25.4% of US households owned cats in 2016, with the American Pet Products Association's (APPA) survey showing 38%. When combining those numbers with the US Census Bureau's household data between 2014-2018, an estimated 134,000 - 201,000 NH households had cats. According to the AVMA's survey, the average number of cats per household was 1.8, with APPA at 2.

Studies also show that cat ownership benefits human health and happiness. According to research, cats reduce stress and anxiety and help combat depression. In a 10-year study of more than 4,000 Americans, people with cats also showed a 30% lower risk of death from a heart attack. Studies additionally revealed that cats are more than two times likely to help their human companions sleep better than disturb their sleep.

As sentient beings, capable of experiencing pain and fear, and who bring such companionship into the lives of NH residents, cats deserve more than suffering severe injuries or dying alone in the street without any acknowledgment or efforts to help them.

3. Drivers should be held to the responsibility of reporting a collision with animals. Mandating the immediate reporting of vehicle collisions with cats could alert the owner and also give authorities an increased chance of arriving in time to provide necessary assistance, prevent prolonged suffering, and save the cat's life.

Although drivers might flee the scene of an accident out of fear, the law already acknowledges that as unacceptable behavior. And while we have empathy for those involved in accidents, if someone strikes a cat (or any animal) with their vehicle, it should be their responsibility to report it, and they should be held accountable for that.

Granted, residents can protect their cats from vehicle collisions by keeping them safe indoors. However, current law does not mandate that. Additionally, accidents happen even in the most cautious households, and cats kept indoors sometimes find a way outside when unintended.

HB 174 will grant cats the acknowledgment they deserve when injured by a vehicle while giving law enforcement and families the information they need to promptly help and potentially save the cat's life, or provide those families with closure if they loose their cat to a tragic vehicle accident.
