Summary of testimony presented in support: Representative Vail

- This bill creates a statute of limitation on civil actions relative to damage caused by perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFASs) and is part of an effort to create a system of response for the PFAs contamination.
- PFAs chemicals are bio-accumulative, environmentally persistent, and can be found in Teflon, firefighting gear/foam, Gore-Tex, food packaging, carpeting, etc.
- The slippery nature of the particles means they easily enter the soil and do not dissolve.
- Private wells have been rendered unusable due to the contamination.
- The zone of contamination is presently a 4.5 mile radius around Saint Gobain.

- People living in that zone must implement high filtration systems or use other sources of water.
- Saint Gobain has been providing bottled water to many residents, but the recycling of the bottles falls to Merrimack.
- There are other sources of contamination in other areas in NH beside Saint Gobain.
- Contamination in Amherst was caused by a different manufacturer.
- The Coakley Landfill is a superfund project leaching chemicals.
- Evidence implicates that PFAs impacts fetal development, increases risks for the development of endocrine disorders, it is linked to cancer, kidney disease, high cholesterol, tumors, and concentrates in breast milk.
- Cities and towns are being stuck with the remediation.
- Colluders have not provided information to residents about the long term impact or a cleanup plan.
- The manufacturing of PFAs is continuing with no end in site.
- The statute of limitations needs to be expanded to give more time to calculate the scope of the harm, to address the impact on vulnerable groups, to identify victims, to get a scope of the problem across the state, to protect communities from bearing the cost, to delineate a true zone of contamination, and to provide vital education to citizens and medical providers.
- Particularly thinks of the firefighters in the state that are now faced with these diseases because of the firefighting gear they wore and the foam.
- This bill will expand the statute of limitations for people to prove injury to six years.
- Senator Kahn asked what the current statute of limitations is.
 - o Three years for personal injury.
- Senator Gannon asked how they arrived at six years.
 - o That was discussed among a number of individuals in Merrimack.

Representative Mooney

- Merrimack is victim to possibly the worst case of environmental pollution in the state's history.
- The town has spent years trying to determine the effects of this.
- This bill is a much-needed measure to ensure a guideline for resident's reactions to the effects of PFAs.
- An extended statute of limitations is critical for those suffering injuries, who now find themselves balancing their health with the complications of legal recourse.
- Six years after the date of discovery is sufficient and the bill is written well to provide that direction.
- Senator Carson asked about the community meeting regarding the six years.
 - Was not present at the meeting. Believes it was likely a citizens group that meets with Saint Gobain or it was a meeting of Merrimack Citizens for Clean Water.

Representative Healey

- As time has gone by research has shown that PFAs is causing more and more harm
- People need additional time to identify the physical damage to their bodies and seek protections under the law.
- Senator Kahn asked how the six years was determined.
 - o These issues have existed since 2016. There are people today who are just discovering this issue in their town. Did not participate in that meeting.
- Senator Kahn asked why any limitation is there.
 - o Agrees. Firefighters can go up to potentially 70 years. Is not averse to making this as long as possible.

Don Provencher (Merrimack Village Water District)

- Three years is not enough to understand the full impact of these chemicals.
- Would be in favor of keeping the statute of limitations as long as possible.
- Does not believe the description of when that statute of limitations starts matches with what people have been advised by their legal counsel.
- The cost for PFAs treatment has gone up significantly.
- Senator Kahn asked when the hearings were held for the potential for contamination in the town.
 - o There have been hearings since it was discovered in spring of 2016.
- Senator Kahn asked if the reach of the contamination has been mapped out.
 - o That is continuing to unfold. Is aware that a ground water management zone has been established in Merrimack; is not sure if that is going to change in the future. Since 2016 the drinking water standards for PFAs levels have consistently gone down. That indicates that as more information comes out it is clear it is more detrimental than originally thought.
- Senator Kahn asked if the reach of the contaminated ground water expanded since the original mapping.
 - o Believes when it first came out the radius applied around the identified polluter for maybe a half mile. That subsequently grew. In March 2018 DES completed the management zone and since then additional wells have been found to have groundwater above the maximum contaminate levels. There was a consent decree that may have limited that zone, but as more wells outside that boundary are identified that shows there is additional contamination beyond that boundary.
- Senator Kahn asked what a reasonable statute of limitations would be.
 - o Longer than three years. It took decades to understand the impact of tobacco and it will take time to identify how significant the harm of PFAs. In some instances, knowing about contamination can start the clock. In another three years, if that is not enough time, it could be extended again. In support of anything over three years. Would not be opposed to 10 years or longer.

- Senator Gannon asked about the clock beginning earlier.
 - o This is interpreted based on the way a judge sees it to some extent. Concerned that that interpretation, although it may not be consistent, there is always that risk there. Has been told that what could be construed as the starting of the statute of limitations is earlier than what others might agree with.

Councilor Healey (Merrimack)

- These are called forever chemicals because they persist for years in the environment and in the body.
- In the body it has a cumulative effect, and it can take years before it starts to show the negative effects.
- In these cases, people have to be able to rule out other causes for their illnesses in order to qualify.
- The ideal would be to not have a statute of limitations but believes there was a concern that that would not be approved.

Summary of testimony presented in opposition: David Creer (BIA)

- This bill is not necessary.
- The standard statute of limitations is three years, but it does not begin to toll until an individual has an injury and they link it to the cause of the injury.
- Three years is common with medical malpractice. If an individual undergoes surgery and 15-20 years later discovers that the doctor left his watch in the abdomen, the person has three years from that point to file a lawsuit.
- Senator French asked if this bill would create any problems.
 - o Statute of limitations exist because it is deemed to be good public policy to not hang the threat of lawsuits over peoples' heads indefinitely. They also help to ensure expedient, appropriate, and quality justice occurs. As time goes on evidence is lost and memories fade. A statute of limitations encourages people to get a remedy as soon as possible.
- Senator French asked if PFAs cases are different than most instances where statute of limitations apply.
 - o PFAs is an emotional issue. The issue with it being a latent injury, is really no different than medical malpractice. There is no benefit to expanding this to six years. It does signal to everyone in the State that we are trying to make it as hard as possible for businesses to do their business here.

Neutral Information Presented:

Allen Brooks (Attorney General's Office)

- Concerned that as written the bill may inadvertently create a limitation on state actions where there is currently none.
- Currently, state plaintiffs are covered by a specific statute of limitations under RSA 508:4-h.

- RSA 508:4-h addresses putting limitations on the state but also ensuring the state's ability to move forward on cases.
- This bill addresses civil actions for PFAs, but is concerned that the term civil action is broad enough that a defendant could argue that that includes civil actions by the state.
- Recommends amending the bill, not to change its intent, but to make sure the state is not precluded from taking action.
- Discussed with the sponsors changing it from 'civil' to 'personal' action to match the existing statute of limitations, but they were not comfortable with that.
- Recommends adding a sentence at the end bill that says, 'Nothing in this section shall be construed as limiting any action brought by the State.'
- Senator French asked if there is currently a statute of limitations for PFAs exposure of three years.
 - o Believes they are referring to RSA 508:4. It would depend on the specific action, but that three years is generally for personal actions.
- Senator French asked if it would be possible to remove all statutes of limitations in relation to PFAs exposure.
 - o That is a policy decision for the Legislature to make. These limitations are created by statute and they can be taken away by statute.
- Senator Kahn asked for clarification on the distinction being drawn between civil and personal action.
 - O The state litigated before the enactment of RSA 508:4-h, in a case called Lake Winnipesauke Resort. In that case the defendant thought the state had taken too long to bring the case and the statute of limitations applied. This went to the Supreme Court, and the court ruled that 'personal action' does not look like the action the state is bringing because it is bringing a penalty action by statute. Personal action does not cover state actions. The intent of the drafters of the bill was to not have this apply to any action the state might bring.
- Senator Kahn asked if this exemption needs to extend to RSA 508 as well.
 - O Does not believe so. RSA 508 as written already tries to address these issues where it says, 'shall not apply to any situation where remediation has not yet occurred'. So as long as the contamination is still in the ground we can fix it.
- Senator Kahn asked what the statute of limitations is on the legal or insurance claims for firefighters.
 - o Does not know that and would be hesitant to make a statement on that.
 - o Mr. Lehmann stated that the statute of limitations for firefighters applies in the form of workers compensation, and they can file until they are 65 years old. Believes Commerce currently has a bill that extends it to 70 years old.
- Senator Gannon asked under Winnipesauke, if there is a limitation currently for State action.

o The limitation now is RSA 508:4-h.

Testimony of David Creer Business & Industry Association HB 236 Senate Judiciary Committee May 11, 2021

Dear Members of the Senate Judiciary Committee,

I'm David Creer, director of public policy for the Business and Industry Association (BIA), New Hampshire's statewide chamber of commerce and leading business advocate. BIA represents more than 400 members in a variety of industries. Member firms employ 89,000 people throughout the state, which represents one in seven jobs, and contribute \$4.5 billion annually to the state's economy.

BIA opposes HB236 because an increased statute of limitations for per and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) exposure is not needed in New Hampshire. Under current law in New Hampshire, a person would have three years to commence an action for PFAS exposure, which starts from the time an injury and its causal relationship to an act or omission by the defendant. This means that even though illness from PFAS may be delayed for years, a suit can still be brought within three years of getting sick and linking the illness to PFAS exposure.

Three years is ample time to bring suit and is used in almost every other type of civil case in New Hampshire, including medical malpractice which can often also have delayed injuries. There is no reason to create a special statute of limitations for PFAS and doing so would make NH the only state with such a law, making us less business-friendly than every other state.

This concludes my testimony and I am happy to address any questions from the committee.

> The past weeks I have had the opportunity to speak with Congressional members from Massachusetts and New Hampshire to share the issue of PFAS within the fire service Many of these discussions took place with the efforts of the Honorable Wendy E.N. Thomas, fmr New Hampshire State Rep and Scott Faber, Sr VP of Governmental Affairs, Environmental Working Group.

Firefighting gear is complex, technical equipment that must meet NFPA (National Fire Protection Assn) standards and codes for structural firefighting. NFPA

Committee 1971 has 16 voting members made up of firefighters, manufacturers, special experts and IAFF and NFPA members.

Every purchase order written for turnout gear, and AFFF will require it 'meet or exceed NFPA standards'.

Herein lines the problem, DuPont, Gore, Honeywell, Lion, are all voting members of these committees.

Turnout gear is made up of 3 layers;

The 'outer shell' the material the public sees, is the most highly fluoirinated textile ever seen by science;

Graham Pealsee conducted our own independent study done on turnout gear. This study was orchestrated by a fire-wife and a group of firefighters from Salem Ma, Northern Cali, and Chicago.

We had no help from institutions, we had no prior skills, this was the first in the world study of chemicals used on the material of the gear. The safety institution NFPA had 20 years to do such a study. They never did. They and our IAFF only sought

and supported studies on the products of combustion or toxic smoke, which was fed to them by the chemical industry itself.

And, they willingly went along.

While DuPont, Honeywell, and W.L. Gore knew of the health effects of PFOA and Teflon, they remained silent while voting on materials to be sued for gear. DuPont would go on record stating only Nomex should be used for outer shell material. A DuPont fiber.

The gear must pass a stringent water resistance test per NFPA 1971

Manufacturers argue only PFAS will meet this standard.

Our study, conducted by Dr Peaslee of Notre Dame found that 10 year old gear still had enough PFAS to meet NFPA 1971 for water resistance.

This causes us to be concerned that America's Bravest have been used to support 'shareholder value' for DuPont. DuPont knew how much PFAS was going onto the coatings. There are no standards for limits.. only vague language that states 'enough to meet the requirements'.

The inner component is called a 'moisture barrier' and not seen by the eye. It is made with a sheet of Teflon.

It is made by W.L. Gore. ~ In 2004 Gore was told by the United Steelworkers Union that they had a 'duty to warn' the end user of the product that the laborers of the Washington Works Plant in WV found PFOA to be causing health issues in the union members:

Gore and DuPont ignored the orders to warn the end users.

Instead, in 2006 Gore would write language for NFPA stating that the material needed for moisture barriers must withstand a 'xenon light test'..

...a test that only 'Teflon' material can meet.

The chemist Jeff Stull on the committee went on record stating the test was completely fallacious.

The standards was voted in by NFPA and firefighter have been wrapped in a Teflon burrito dipped in staggering amounts of PFOA and PFAS since.

The material closest to the firefighter's skin is called the 'thermal liner'.

Recently Lion Gear introduced a thermal liner that is coated in PFAS. Lion Gear carriers many DoD contracts for firefighting gear.

It is our hope that with the DoD language to phase out PFAS in products purchased by the DoD this language will force manufacturer to make safer gear for us. This would require 'turnout gear' or 'personal protection ensambles' be added to the list of DoD items to be PFAS-FREE.

Currently the director of industry relations of Johnson Controls — makers of AFFF has been named to two leadership positions within the NFPA.

He will 'oversee code and development, administer rules and regulations, an support appeals process. He is a NFPA Research Foundation Board of Trustee, the 'Independent foundation conducts research for the NFPA and entire fire protection industry'..

If this weren't reason enough to support the passage of H.B.236 you should understand that just this week a study was published showing the PFAS Dust in 15 Massachusetts firehouses staggering in number, and the PFAS in the dust matches the PFAS in the turnout-gear firefighters wear. The study was conducted by Dr Graham Peaslee of Notre Dame and Dr's Anna Young, Joseph Allen, and Emily Sparer Fine of Harvard. The happenstance of the PFAS portion of the dust study was serendipity. It was again, not initiated by the hands of our gear made by fibers and coatings from DuPont and

others. The PFAS was not from the AFFF. It's from the gear. Who will pay to make these firefighters whole from the cancers they may be getting from their turnout gear? Cities? Towns?

I am a Merrimack resident impacted by the PFAS contamination that has polluted our only drinking water source, our groundwater, and also am a cofounder of the community group, Merrimack Citizens for Clean Water. I am writing to express my support for HB 236 which seeks to extend the current statute of limitation for civil action involving PFAS related harm in NH from 3 years to 6 years.

We learned from NHDES back in 2016 that a manufacturing facility in our community, Saint Gobain bears responsibility for contaminating our groundwater, which is where drinking water is exclusively attained for both municipal and private well use in an area of no less than 65 square miles. Merrimack is at the center of a multi town contamination by Saint Gobain Performance Plastics with all 6 of our municipal wells contaminated by PFAS. Two of our public drinking water wells that are located just over the border into Hollis appear to be additionally polluted by TCI, who has been deemed responsible for the contamination of many private wells in Amherst.

As is the case in the groundwater management zone in the Merrimack/ Bedford/ Litchfield/ Londonderry area, wells in the Amherst vicinity were also initially identified in 2016. In the Amherst area a groundwater management zone has yet to be set by NHDES despite identification of a responsible party. We are 5 years into an investigation that has long since identified responsible parties but finalization is lacking for many locations.

HB 236 is of great importance to thousands of residents impacted by PFAS Contamination of drinking water in southern NH as despite knowing responsible parties, grave inadequacies are present in the area of what would be expected of a known polluter. Saint Gobain has continued business as usual over the last 5 years and has profited immensely from immense Department of Defense Contracts as well as other contracts. They hold patents for PTFE (Teflon) uses for various fabric coating processes which contain exclusively PFAS compounds, only 4 of which are currently regulated in NH. Unfortunately, the Federal government has lagged behind for many years in hazardous substance designation for PFAS compounds despite government conducted toxicological studies that show significant health disruptions for every PFAS studied. Here in the Merrimack area, we consistently see 16 PFAS compounds in water samples, and on site at Saint Gobain, 34 PFAS compounds have been detected at significant levels in groundwater monitoring wells and storm water/outfall samples.

The statute of limitations extension is of utmost importance as this investigation has been continually delayed by Saint Gobain from the start and many homes still do not have adequate information as the state ordered work plan leaves the responsible party in charge of the course.

Hundreds of residents have been caught in limbo waiting for a remediation plan that has not been committed to by Saint Gobain.

In the Amherst contamination area a Groundwater

I would ask for your support of HB236 as residents in Merrimack and many surrounding towns in Southern NH are bearing the harm of what we did not create.

Good afternoon Senators.

Senator French called me out for being conspicuously absent from a hearing on a bill (HB 236) that expands a civil statute of limitations, so I wanted to follow up with the committee.

NHAJ is supportive of efforts aimed at making sure individuals, families, and small businesses harmed by PFAS contamination have equal footing in our justice system when going up against well-heeled corporate defendants. Extending the statute of limitations in this unique area of the law seems in line with that goal.

HB 236 was not a bill requested by our organization, nor have we worked on any of the language. I have sent the bill language to one of our members who is well versed in toxin tort claims, and am waiting for his feedback. I do have a few questions about unintended consequences: the question raised by Atty. Brooks at the Department of Justice is a good one - limiting any action the State may take against polluters would be a terrible unintended consequence.

Once I hear from our toxin tort expert, I will be sure to send formal testimony to the committee. In the meantime, if you have any specific legal questions about the language in HB 236, please do not hesitate to let me know and I will get them answered.
