Summary of Testimony Presented:

Representative Casey Conley, Strafford 13

- Rep. Conley introduced the bill and testified in support of the bill.
- Rep. Conley said, this bill allows dispensaries to use the commercial names of the strains on packaging and for displaying inventory on websites.
- Rep. Conley said this bill addresses a rule that prohibits the use of the commercial names of strains. Currently initials or short-hand must be used to identify the strains.
- Rep. Conley said, the current system is needlessly confusing for users. Using the standardized industry names will allow for people to recognize the strains. People need different strains for different relief. Patients are confused. They could accidentally buy the wrong strain and not get the right medicine that they need.
- Rep. Conley said many other states already allow for the use of commercial names.

Hon. Tim Josephson

- Mr. Josephson said he is a card-carrying caregiver for three people.
- This bill seeks to allow the full commercial name of cannabis to be printed.
- Mr. Josephson said, cannabis is an agricultural product with different lineages.
- Mr. Josephson recommended leafly.com to explain differences of strains.
- Mr. Josephson said, "Sativa LH" is different than "Sativa SC." Just the initials listed can lead to a mix up. The wrong will not provide the right results for the medication necessary for a patient's needs.
- Mr. Josephson told an anecdote about his mother struggling with identifying various strains by initials. He said, elderly patients feel like they are talking in code and it feels wrong and illegal.
- Mr. Josephson said, all other medications have names. What if "Claritin" was just labeled "CL?" It would be hard.
- Mr. Josephson said, there are arguments that strains with unique names may be tempting to children. The department did not makeup these strain names, they go back decades. These packages look like medication—these packages do not have fun, colorful packaging. That type of packaging is for liquor stores, not medication. Any fears that children will be swayed by plain packaging is false.
- Mr. Josephson said, please hear the requests of people asking for clarity.

Helina Josephson

- Ms. Josephson testified in support of the bill.
- Ms. Josephson said she is a registered patient in the therapeutic cannabis program and that she would benefit from this bill.
- Ms. Josephson shared anecdote about using therapeutic cannabis and not knowing what strain she needs to treat her conditions.

Michael Holt, TCP-DHHS

- Mr. Holt testified as neutral on this bill. He said that he is the administrator of therapeutic cannabis program in the DHHS.
- Mr. Holt said he was here on behalf of Jerry Knirk, the chair of medical cannabis oversight board. The board reviewed this bill and voted to recommend support of this bill in a 5-2 vote.
- Mr. Holt said, our (department) rules prohibit the use of commercial strain names. When that rule when into effect two years ago, we received complaints from patients about the confusion of using acronyms.
- Mr. Holt said, the strain names originate from the recreational market.
- Senator Whitley asked, how does this impact ATC's advertising and commercial names on social media?
 - Mr. Holt said, currently strain names are not allowed to be used on websites or social media sites. This bill would allow strain names used on products and websites. This bill is silent on social media sites as well. This continues a level of confusion.
- Senator Gray asked, if it is by rule, then couldn't you amend that rule by not going through the legislative process?

- Mr. Holt said, if the legislature wants us to repeal our rule, then we will. We will not change the rule on our own because our position is neutral.
- Senator Avard asked, are there any benefits to changing the rule?
 - Mr. Holt said, we have received complaints, but we are neutral. There is no downside to the administrative program operating with this change.

Josh Beecher

- Mr. Beecher said he testified in support of the bill.
- Mr. Beecher said, cannabis is expensive and not covered by insurance and there is no guidance from doctors on which strain to pick.

Keenan Blum, Prime ATC

- Mr. Blum testified in support of the bill.
- Mr. Blum said, the use of acronyms has been a huge challenge for patients and staff. Staff can not recommend strains because they cannot tell what it is in comparison to other strains. Patients cannot remember what the initials they got before when they come back to get more. Staff and patients have to use a strain key to identify products.
- Mr. Blum said he would like to see an amendment that would allow use of commercial names on social media too because he does not want patients to have to use a guide just to read on social media.

Lee Cooper, Sanctuary ATC

- Ms. Cooper testified in support of the bill.
- Ms. Cooper said, Sanctuary ATC gets a lot of calls and emails from patients that need help identifying products.

Sian Leininiger, Temescal Wellness

- Ms. Leininger testified in support of this bill.
- Ms. Leininger said, the current system creates confusion for patients differentiating between products and strains. Similarity is in strains makes this especially difficult. Patients may use the wrong strains at the wrong time of the day because of the confusion caused by the currently naming system.
- Ms. Leininger said staff and patients must rely on the use of strain keys.

Kate Frey, New Futures

- Ms. Frey said New Futures is OK with the bill as written, but she testified in opposition of an amendment allowing the use of commercial names on social media.
- Ms. Frey said, the social media part was a problem with department because social media has targeted post/ads. Social media can target certain audiences, such as youth or young adults that can find these commercial names more enticing.
- Ms. Frey said, ATCs can easily avoid the social media rule by just having a post that defers to website instead.

- Ms. Frey said, patients are more familiar with commercial strains and understand the product. New Futures is OK with websites using the commercial names of the strains but, but social media is a totally different territory.
- Ms. Frey said, the therapeutic cannabis oversight board was clear about this bill and they were concerned about commercial names on social media.

August Ravvingar

- Mr. Ravvingar testified in support of the bill.
- Mr. Ravvingar said, using commercial names would lead to a more efficient system.

Melissa Wareing

- Ms. Wareing testified in support of the bill.
- Ms. Wareing said she is a patient of Prime ATC.
- Ms. Wareing shared anecdote about using cannabis for kidney stone issues.
- Ms. Wareing said, elderly patients are struggling with the current naming system.

Grant Ellis

- Mr. Ellis testified in support of the bill.
- Mr. Ellis said he is a disabled and homebound cannabis patient.
- Mr. Ellis said, expanded use of medical cannabis results in less youth use
- Mr. Ellis said he supports an amendment allowing commercial names on social media.

Hello,

My name is Michele Peters and I am a qualifying patient for medical cannabis in New Hampshire. I use cannabis for chronic pain and PTSD. Due to anxiety, I need to be careful of what strain of cannabis I consume because some strains, like sativa leaning ones, may trigger a panic attack while indica leaning strains help my pain, anxiety, mood, and quality of life. It is extremely difficult for me to figure out what strains are being offered at Prime ATC because they can only use abbreviations. There is no way for me to find out what strains would be beneficial to me by just looking at their website and I can only find this out by driving 45 minutes to the dispensary, going inside, and talking to one of the knowledgeable people who work there and can direct me to which strain will help me. This is a tedious task for me however, because I can only make the 45 minute trip when I am having a low pain and low anxiety day. When I find a strain that works for me, I then know the abbreviation and can look for it on the online menu but if the strain is no longer available. I am once again left guessing what the abbreviation could stand for and trying to guess what could be helpful. During these trying times with COVID, I am trying to limit my time inside establishments including Prime ATC and do not wish to stand inside talking to an employee for a while trying to figure out what strain they have on hand that could help me- if they have any that day. I have wasted money on strains I guessed would be helpful but turned out to be something different than what my research on my guess told me. Having the dispensary tell me what the complete strain is on their website would be invaluable to me and my health and keep me from feeling worse from cannabis that is supposed to be helping me, all because I don't know what it's actually called.

For the same reasons of travel and guessing strains, being able to have even one plant to grow at home that is the strain I know 100% helps all my ailments, would also be an extremely beneficial bill to be passed for me. I would be able to have access to the strain that helps me the most even when the dispensary is out of it and I would no longer have to guess what I am getting. I wouldn't need to plan my 45 minute drive around pain and anxiety because I would have a supply at home. I would also save money being able to cultivate my own cannabis as buying it from the dispensary regularly is expensive and I am not always able to afford it as I am on a fixed income from Social Security Disability. While medical cannabis is extremely useful and life changing when I am able to consume it, sometimes cost causes me to run out for weeks at a time and live in pain and an anxious state until I am able to obtain more. Being able to cultivate even a single plant at home would help to keep my quality of life more stable since I would have access to cannabis when I need it regardless of money.

I ask you to please pass these bills to help me and countless others, have easier access to the life enhancing medicinal cannabis strains that we know work for us once we know their names, and to help us achieve relief from the medical problems we have through more affordable access by growing our own cannabis at home.

TCMOB discussed HB 240 at their meeting on February 3, 2021. The following is a summary of the discussion.

HB 240 would permit expanded use of chemovar names (ie, commercial strain names) instead of current TCP requirement to not use these names in a public manner. ATCs are currently using undescriptive letters, numbers, and abbreviations.

Board concerns about the use of chemovar names:

Noted that some chemovar names (Amnesia Haze, Maui Wowie, Blue Haze, etc) are: o Evocative of partying and getting high and undermine the identity of dispensaries as therapeutic enterprises. o Attractive to adolescents

Board's view of favorable aspects of the bill:

It was noted by board and the public that chemovar names are helpful because they:

o Are easier to remember by patients and providers

o Are consistent strain names from state to state so are helpful when patients relocate

o Reduce time of providers, dispensaries, patients in trying to identify what a patient has been dispensed.

o Easier for providers to document.

o Dispensaries spend a lot of time converting between the chemovar and the abbreviated names

o The bill permits dispensaries to use the chemovar names on the website, but not on social media sites, therefore helping the patients, providers and ATCs but lessening the attraction to adolescents by not allowing the names on social media.

Board recommends support of this bill to the Legislature:

o Vote: 5-2 (2 abstentions).

As a follow up to the hearing last week on HB 240, relative to identification of cannabis strain for therapeutic cannabis, we wanted to follow up with our statement, that while New Futures does not have an issue with the original language within HB 240 that would allow Therapeutic Cannabis Alternative Treatment Centers (ATCs) to include commercial strain names on product labels and ATC website, we oppose repealing the Department rule through legislation that prohibits using these names on ATC social media channels.

Examples of commercial strain names sold at New Hampshire ATCs include *Alien Rift, Gorilla Bomb, Purple Haze, Pineapple Skunk, Kush, Banana Bread, CBD Yummy, LSD, Blueberry Headband etc.* Administrative rule He-C 402, prohibits forms of advertising through websites and social media that would induce, directly or indirectly, the purchase of cannabis by persons who are not qualifying patients or designated caregivers. In context, these strain names may not be controversial to patients, but out of context these strain names would appeal to youth.

Prior to the passage of these rules, some ATCs advertised these strain names through social media, which allowed them to "boost" sponsored posts, enabling them to appear on newsfeeds of individuals of a certain demographic (age, location, interest, etc) including individuals who may have never engaged with the site to begin with. Examples of past NH ATC social media posts with strain names are included below.

The targeted marketing of addictive products to adolescents is not new and has been historically utilized by the tobacco and alcohol industry. With the legalization of marijuana in several states and the boom of social media, the marijuana industry has followed suit. A recent study by Boston University School of Public Health researchers found that one in three youth in states with legal recreational cannabis engages with cannabis brands on social media. <u>Published in the journal Drug and Alcohol Dependence</u>, the study shows that this engagement goes hand-in-hand with use: Adolescents who liked or followed marijuana marketing on social media were five times more likely to have used marijuana over the past year compared to those who did not, and adolescents who reported a favorite brand were eight times more likely

We urge the committee to keep the exclusion of social media advertising of cannabis strain names.



Testimony in Support of HB 240:

Sian Leininger, Director of Retail, On Behalf of Temescal Wellness Alternative Treatment Center

Good morning Chairman and members of the Committee. My name is Sian Leininger, I am the Director of Retail for Temescal Wellness of NH, which operates two of the four Alternative Treatment Center licenses in NH, with a therapeutic cannabis production facility in Manchester, and dispensaries in Dover, Lebanon, and a soon to be satellite location in Keene.

We are in support of HB 240 because it will meaningfully help NH patients better understand and utilize their therapeutic cannabis.

Since the initial implementation of the rule that prohibited the use of strain names, we have been using abbreviations and have found that it creates confusion and is more difficult for patients to differentiate between strains. Keeping groups of randomly assorted letters straight is more difficult for our brains than keeping track of product names. Some patients report greater difficulty remembering which strains worked well for them for different situations, particularly if the abbreviations are similar. This could potentially lead to a patient using a strain during the day that they would normally use at night or vice versa and ending up with a different effect than what their current need required.

We give out Strain Keys depicting the strain associated with each abbreviation, but this is an additional piece of paper to keep track of rather than simply being able to read the label of the product you are consuming. We get consistent phone calls and emails from patients confused about the strain abbreviations and would like to see this burden eliminated for them.

This bill would eliminate a source of confusion for NH patients and allow them to have a better, more informed, and safer experience with their therapeutic cannabis.

Thank you Chairman Bradley and the members of the committee.

My name is Tim Josephson, former representative in the State House, and this was a bill that Representative Conley was kind enough to shepherd through for me this session. For the record, I am a card-carrying caregiver for therapeutic cannabis for 3 people -- my wife, my mother-in-law, and one more person -- a member of the House.

The bill seeks to allow the full commercial name of cannabis strains to be printed on the labeling of therapeutic cannabis at the Alternative Treatment Centers (dispensaries) in New Hampshire. If you are not familiar with strain types of cannabis, it is an agricultural product and as such, has different lineages. You can think of it similarly to different varieties of apples -- Galas are different from Northern Spy different from Macintosh different from Granny Smith, etc etc. Cannabis strains also have a wide variety of differences between strains, but the effects are more pronounced than just being sweeter, tarter, or better for a pie. One website that may be of great use to you here would be Leafly.com -- it details all the different strains, and from their website is a little description about the differences in strains. "Marijuana strains are organized into three primary types: sativa, indica, and hybrid. Each type of strain has unique effects on both the mind and body. For example, sativa strains are uplifting and pair well with activities like social gatherings and being physically active. On the opposite end of the strain spectrum, indica strains are relaxing and can help amplify a deep level of physical sedation - making indica great for those times when you need deep sleep. Lastly, there are hybrid strains which fail between indicas and sativas. Hybrid strains offer a combination of both energizing and relaxing effects. Hybrid strains are great for the times when it's too late for an energizing sativa or too early for a sedating indica strain." (leafly.com)

And so while the NH rules permit the differentiation between Indica, Sativa, and Hybrid, it effectively stops there. In NH, the ATCs are not allowed to put the commercial strain name on the packaging, they have to use abbreviations. You can have Sativa LH which is different from Sativa SC, each doing different things. Perhaps LH is good for appetite while SC is good for energy. The Hybrid category can be more confusing since some hybrids lean towards sativa and some lean towards indica, and just having initials can lead to mixups, as one hybrid might be what you need in the afternoon because it helps your chronic pain without too much energy late in the day, but not enough to make you sleepy.

I first became aware of this problem when my mother-in-law got her cannabis card. She shared with me the labeling system and its confusion of only allowing initials and not names, and so, with her getting up there in age and driving being an issue, I became a caregiver for her. While helping her navigate names and strains, it was definitely confusing with the different initials and I wondered, if this is confusing for me, what do you think it's like for the elderly and disabled patients who need their medication? It's confusing for people, there's no other way to say it. These folks are from a time when cannabis was fully illegal, and by having to use code it gives this legitimate medical product an air of illegitimacy or shadiness. She feels like she is still having to sneak around to ask me to pick up her medication when it would be much more legitimate and concise for her to say "I need some Northern Lights and Point Break." instead of

saying "hey, I need some...stuff." Why is this medication being censored? We don't do this with the medications we get in pill form. Can you imagine? Your pill bottles are now all blank, and Lipitor is LP, Prozac is PZ and Claritin is CL. Now fill up your medicine cabinet with bottles that just have initials on them, and try to sort it out. Many people take lots of different medications daily, and strains of cannabis are no different.

I spoke with the folks at the dispensaries and when I asked about the naming system, I was told that they were not allowed to put the actual names on the containers due to a rule at DHHS. This seemed ridiculous to me -- why would they not be able to say the actual name? I was told that it was because of the children and true labeling of strain names would be too tempting for them. Yes, there are strains named things like Girl Scout Cookies, Fruity Pebbles, and Bubblegum Kush, but these strains are named from the lineage of the plants that created each strain and as such, important to be aware of, especially for patients who are seeking to find specific strains to treat specific conditions. If someone needs a strain that helps with appetite, they should be able to tell that the strain comes from a line that treats that condition. The dispensaries did not come up with these names, these are heirloom varieties and some old names go back decades. Again, I stress -- this is a long-established system that other states have used just fine. I have researched other state rules and laws and I cannot find any other state with this amount of censorship on our medication. There is no reason to censor ourselves among adults.

This information would be in plain font on a medical package similar to a pill bottle. It would not be in snazzy packaging, attractive labeling and colorful fonts. That is what we use in our liquor stores -- one quick look at the schnapps on the state liquor store website reveals names like 99 Bananas, Buttershots Burst, Hot Damn Cinnamon, and Lucious Pomegranate Pleasure. If we can label our liquor like THAT, why can't we label our medical packaging with a plain font? Kids are allowed in our liquor stores and can see the colorful packaging there and we are fine with it. Kids are not allowed inside of dispensaries -- only patients.

The therapeutic cannabis program has been in effect for several years now, and any fears that children would be swayed by a plain label on a medication container should be long-gone. Dispensaries have been helpful in producing a little strain guide with full names that you can get in person, but what happens when the patient loses that sheet? What happens when the dispensary gets new inventory? Clear labeling on packaging would help. In the initial consultation with a dispensary, patients are told about the requirements to secure their medications and to keep it away from children -- this is more, I might add, than what you are told when given any prescriptions from your doctor. Patients are very aware of the penalties for not taking care of their medication.

In conclusion, I ask that the committee hear the request of people for clarity on their medication. A well-informed patient can make the best decisions for their medical care, and we should not put up barriers to information. Thank you for your time, and I am happy to take any questions.
