- [(b)] (d) Where an owner is not known, all animal shelter facilities shall inspect for tattoos, ear tags, or other permanent forms of positive identification and shall scan for a microchip upon admission of an unclaimed or abandoned animal as defined in RSA 437:18, IV and prior to transferring ownership of an unclaimed or abandoned animal. Registered owners or agents shall be contacted as soon as possible, not to exceed 72 hours, and alerted that the animal has been taken in and is available to be reclaimed.
- (e) If listed owners or agents cannot be located or refuse to reclaim possession of the animal, every effort shall be made to contact the secondary owner listed by microchip registries as soon as possible, not to exceed 72 hours.

Summary of testimony presented in support:

Representative Howard Pearl Merrimack – District 26

- HB 249 is a reintroduction of HB 1187 (2020). HB 1187 was recommended "ought to pass with amendment" out of the House Environment and Agriculture Committee by a vote of 20-0. The committee placed the bill on the House consent calendar. The full House adopted the committee's recommendation on a voice vote. However, the bill was tabled in the Senate and died there due to the COVID-19 pandemic and the suspension of legislative activity.
- Section 1 amends the definition of an animal shelter facility in RSA 437:1, I to include leased facilities. There are some leased animal shelter facilities around the state. Making this change to RSA 437:1, I will ensure those facilities are covered by state statute.
- Section 2 requires the following:

- o All dogs, cats, or ferrets transferred out of an animal shelter facility have a form of positive identification approved by the Commissioner of the NH Department of Agriculture, Markets, and Food (DAMF).
- o All dogs, cats, or ferrets 3 months of age or older be vaccinated against rabies in accordance with RSA 436:100 before transfer from an animal shelter facility, if proof of rabies vaccination is not available.
- o Animal shelter facilities contact registered owners or agents of unclaimed or abandoned animals within 72 hours.
- Secondary owners of unclaimed or abandoned animals be contacted by animal shelter facilities within 72 hours if listed owners or agents cannot be located or refuse to reclaim possession of the animal.
- No animal shelter facilities transfer any dog, cat, or ferret that is received from outside of the state without an official health certificate and until the quarantine requirements in RSA 437:8, IV have been met.
- Senator Watters referenced page 1, lines 13-16 that outlined the positive forms of identification that animals
 must have when transferred out of an animal shelter facility. In that section, a form of positive identification
 includes a tattoo, collar, microchip, ear tag, or any other permanent form of identification approved by the
 DAMF Commissioner. Senator Watters asked if a collar was a permanent form of identification.
 - o Representative Pearl said HB 249 requires that a dog, cat, or ferret have a positive form of identification when transferred out of an animal shelter facility. A collar may not technically be a permanent form of identification, but it is a positive form of identification.
- Senator Watters said HB 249 gave some authority to the DAMF Commissioner. Senator Watters asked if
 there was any consideration to require the DAMF to undertake administrative rulemaking to outline how
 the DAMF Commissioner made those decisions.
 - Representative Pearl said the DAMF Commissioner did not feel there was a need for administrative rulemaking for the provisions under HB 249.

Dear Chairman Avard and Members of the Senate Committee on Energy and Natural Resources:

Founded in 1884, the American Kennel Club (AKC) is a recognized and trusted expert in canine health, breeding, and training. We represent over 5,100 dog clubs nationally, including 22 in New Hampshire, which represent thousands of responsible dog owners.

HB 249 makes clear that before re-homing any dog imported from outside New Hampshire, an animal shelter must provide an official health certificate, ensure the rabies vaccination is up to date, and comply with the state's quarantine requirements. The AKC strongly supports these provisions, as well as the bill's procedure for identifying and notifying the rightful owner of animals admitted to a shelter in a timely manner.

The inability to verify documentation has resulted in numerous incidents in which certifications of dogs imported into the country have been found by the United States' Centers for Disease Control and Prevention to be invalid or fraudulent. While the importation of dogs helps meet the demand for personal pets and working dogs, incidents involving sick dogs entering the country are alarming public health officials. They include well-documented cases of rabies, distemper, influenza, brucellosis, parasites, and other health threats, many of which can be passed to humans and other animals and many of which had been virtually eliminated in the United States.

Several recent incidents highlight these dangers. In 2019, a dog imported from Egypt and ending up at a Kansas rescue was determined to have rabies, but not before all 25 of its companions had been placed into foster care or adopted.¹ United States officials suspect that the Egyptian vaccination certificates were forged. Because it was the third incident of its type in recent years, the CDC responded by imposing a ban on all imports of dogs from Egypt.² In 2018, scientists at Cornell University's Animal Health Diagnostic Center identified a strain of Asian canine distemper virus never before reported in North America, which likely travelled with a dog

obtained at a Korean meat market.³ A year before that, an epidemic of canine influenza was also traced to Asia.

In partnership with national experts such as the American Veterinary Medical Association, AKC has worked to file and pass the federal Healthy Dog Importation Act, which would streamline the federal oversight of canine imports to better protect animal and public health.
