Summary of testimony presented in support:

Representative Renny Cushing

Rockingham - District 21

 Representative Cushing said that 2021 is the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the last major expansion of the electorate in the United States, celebrating the passage of the 26<sup>th</sup> Amendment, extending the right to 18-, 19-, and 20-year-olds and extending the ability to hold off to them in New Hampshire.

- Rep. Cushing said that HB 273 marks a historic event that should be celebrated and lift up
  young people who are voters and office holders. He said that May 13th, 2021 is the
  anniversary of New Hampshire ratifying the 26th Amendment.
- Rep. Cushing was involved with the Let Us Vote movement as a 16-year-old and spoke in the
  House Chamber in support of the lowering of the voting age. He said that although they lost
  that specific vote, their support was bipartisan and included the then-Speaker and his
  leadership team.
- Senator Carson asked if Rep. Cushing had any concerns over the date in HB 273 being May 13th, 2021 and the legislative timeline for passing HB 273.
  - o Rep. Cushing said that he did not see any issues, and that he hoped the Committee and the Senate could act on HB 273 as soon as possible and get the bill to the Governor for his signature on or before May 13th.

Honorable members of the Senate Executive Departments and Administration,

I urge you to support HB273 — Celebrating the 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the passage of the 26<sup>th</sup> amendment to the US Constitution. There is a little unknown story of the grassroots effort to pass this amendment. In 1967, I was fortunate to be at the heart of initiating the creation of the Youth Franchise Coalition which became the sponsoring organization/movement to establish enabling 12 million new voters to enable them to participate as voters in the election process. What follows is a brief summary and a video on the origins of the youth franchise movement.

March 23, 2021 marked the Golden Anniversary of the passage of the 26<sup>th</sup> amendment to the US Constitution – the 18 year old vote. Fifty years ago, among the crises of the Viet Nam war protest, civil rights movement, and the free speech battle on college campuses, a group of student teachers initiated an effort to secure voting rights for 12 million 18 to 20 year olds. While protests against the system in which they had no voice were taking place in the streets, these altruistic young educators chose to work within the system to fight change via the use of the ballot box. So, how did this happen? What is the back story that initiated the galvanizing of young people to exert their voice within the system? It is really an untold story. I was privileged to be at the right place at the right time, to be an original organizer of the effort. 1967 was an exciting and challenging time. As a member of the staff of the Student National Education Association, I took on the task to create an endeavor to bring groups of like interest to form the Youth Franchise Coalition which was the group that organized the grassroots effort to pass the 26<sup>th</sup> amendment. Note: There are only two amendments to the US Constitution that have come from the grassroots – the 19<sup>th</sup> Amendment (women's right to vote) and the 26<sup>th</sup> Amendment (18 year old vote). All other amendments have been created out of Congress. In just four months, the 26<sup>th</sup> Amendment was ratified by the required number of states. This was the fastest ratification of any amendment to the Constitution.

On May 13, 1971 New Hampshire became the 28th state to ratify the 26 amendment.
