Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

- 1 Limited Access Highways; Placement of Motorist Service Signs. Amend RSA 230:49, I to read as follows:
- I. The location of essential motorist services, including food, fuel, lodging, camping, and attractions, on connecting service roads within 3 miles of the intersection with the limited access highway, within 5 miles for a campground, within 20 miles for an attraction, or within one mile of the intersection in urban compact areas, may be indicated to users of the limited access facility by appropriate signs, the specifications of which shall be determined by the commissioner of transportation. The distance specified shall be measured by computing the travel length from the terminal of an exit ramp to the nearest point along the public highway where the nearest existing driveway entrance to the service is reached. Additional motorist service signs may be placed in advance of intersections on limited access highways [from the Massachusetts border to Concord and additional attraction signs may be placed north of Concord on I 93 and I 89].
 - 2 Effective Date. This act shall take effect 60 days after its passage.

Summary of Testimony Presented:

Senator Watters, District 4

- Senator Watters introduced the bill.
- Senator Watters said this bill extends placements.

Bill Lambert, NHDOT

- Mr. Lambert testified in support of the bill.
- Mr. Lambert referred members to his written testimony on background of the logo program.
- Mr. Lambert said, NH adopted sign logos in 1995. The four categories of logos at the time
 were gas, food, lodging, and camping. NH originally adopted this signage just for ramps;
 the cost of a sign on a ramp vs. the cost of a sign on a mainline was a significant
 consideration. Signs with the attractions category were later introduced in 2013.

- Mr. Lambert said, the NHDOT does not have the resources for the mainline signs. A
 private company does these signs.
- Mr. Lambert said, concerns have come up about having these blue signs in more rural parts of the state, so the bill was originally passed for only the areas south of Concord. However, this excludes towns such as Plymouth, Tilton, Woodstock which are places with a lot of services that would be interested in having these signs.
- Senator Sherman asked, is this limited to federal highways?
 - o Mr. Lambert said, this is limited access to state highways. This would expand to 89 and 93.
- Senator Sherman asked, so it is already on 101 because it is south of Concord. Is this going to allow a significant increase in signage? Or just make it clearer?
 - o Mr. Lambert said, there can be no more than 4 signs for each interchange exit. The number of signs is regulated. The program was originally initiated in the 1970s-1980s for gas services. I do not see us having a lot of full interchanges. Maybe the exit in Tilton would gain a few.

Henry Veilleux, NH Lodging & Restaurant Association

- Mr. Veilleux testified in support of the bill and he said the NH Lodging & Restaurant Association supports this bill.
- Mr. Veilleux said he worked with Bill Lambert on the original bill.
- Mr. Veilleux said, right now you can see logos coming down the divided highway south of Concord. It is helpful to see specific restaurants, for example Common Man on the signs. As of now, on signs north of Concord, there is just generic symbol for restaurants, such as a fork and spoon; you cannot see the restaurant name logos on the signs.

Dear Sen, Birdsell:

I would like to submit the following testimony regarding the subject bill on behalf of the Department of Transportation. The Department of Transportation administers several highway signing programs for specific traffic generators through the Bureau of Traffic, Outdoor Advertising Control Section. As you sponsored the most recent changes to this subject statute, much of this information will be repetitive for you, but may be of interest to new members of the committee.

Background

- Motorist Specific Service Signs (Logo signs) were introduced by FHWA with the 1988 MUTCD for Gas,
 Food, Lodging, and Camping Gas was the driving force as many drivers had brand specific credit cards at that time.
 - o Administrative Rules were adopted in New Hampshire circa 1995 the original administrative rules were developed by a task force that included elected officials of the General Court and the Department of Transportation. Concerns raised regarding the adoption of these signs included the proliferation of signing along some of our scenic highways and the cost of the signing to the locally owned "mom and pop" establishments.
 - Over the years, 46 states have adopted the logo program; New Hampshire is the only state to limit logos to ramps only, though at this time that restriction is only for highways "north of Concord" Cost to locally owned businesses was a consideration As was "proliferation of signs" Several previous attempts to extend program to mainline failed.
- As many as 37 states outsource the logo program, several generate revenue for the agency. The New
 Hampshire DOT is currently limited to fees "sufficient to ensure that the motorist service sign program is
 self-supporting".
- SB 519 Relative to Highway Signs (2016) This bill added mainline Motorist Service signs for gas, food, lodging, and camping from the MA state line to Concord on limited access highways.

- Sponsored by Sen. Birdsell Co-sponsored by Sen. Carson, Sen. Stiles, Rep. Baldasaro, and Rep. Potucek Screened by House Transportation Signed into law May 19, 2016 Effective date May 19, 2016.
- Passage of SB 519 provided for the addition of an undetermined number of mainline signs, each costing in excess of \$20,000. As the Department of Transportation did not have the resources to meet this demand, we issued a Request for Information (RFI), followed by a Request for Proposals (RFP) in order to solicit interest in a contract service to administer this program. Presumably, a contract administrator would be able to monetize the cost of the sign installation based on projected revenue. In addition, entities with experience in this area would be more capable of estimating the market and therefore determine a reasonable cost of participation accordingly. As a result of this process, the Department of Transportation entered into a contract with NH Logos, LLC, a subsidiary of Interstate Logos, LLC, effective April 1, 2019. NH Logos submitted the only proposal in response to the RFP. NH Logos has installed several new signs over the past several months and will continue to add more signs as part of their statewide business plan.

House Bill 305 proposes to extend the limit of mainline signing for the categories of gas, food, lodging, and camping to all limited access highways, effectively eliminating the current prohibition of such signing "north of Concord". Implementation of the bill would expand the number of mainline signs that could be installed along divided highways "north of Concord". As with SB 519, the Department of Transportation would not have the resources to install these signs and would need to amend the existing contract with NH Logos to include the additional highway interchanges.

I would note that the term "limited access highways" would seem to include those two-lane, limited access (and grade separated) highways, such as US 3/NH 11, Belmont to Gilford (Laconia Bypass), NH 16 north of Rochester (extension of the Spaulding Turnpike), and US 202/NH 9, Hopkinton to Hillsboro. These highways are not included in the Department of Transportation's current administrative rules. The Department of Transportation would like to clarify if it is the intent to extend Motorist Specific Service Signing to those highways. Our recommendation would be to limit the Motorist Specific Service Signing to "multi-lane" limited access highways to be consistent with current practice.

I thank the committee for the opportunity to submit this testimony with respect to HB 305 and would be happy to answer any questions.

Dear Members of the Senate Transportation Committee:

I apologize for not attending the hearing for HB 305 on March 16: I was testifying at a House Finance hearing instead. Even with modern technology, I have not yet figured out how to be in two places at one time.

HB 305 deals with those large blue signs which appear shortly before limited access highway exits which say things like "ATTRACTIONS — EXIT 32." The signs belong to the state, and the operators of attractions and motor services pay yearly fees to have their businesses advertised on the signs. Until a few years ago, the DOT operated the roadside signage program in-house. Those fees are currently paid to a private company which administers the program pursuant to a contract which expires in a few years. Both motorists and businesses find these signs very beneficial, and the program easily pays for itself.

Right now, under existing law, there are restrictions on how many signs can be erected "north of Concord on I-89 or I-93" as opposed to "from the Massachusetts border to Concord." South of Concord, the DOT can put up as many additional motorist services and attractions signs as they please if there is a demand for more signs. North of Concord, additional "Attractions" signs can be erected if needed, but only one set of "Motorist Services" signs is allowed, even if there is demand for more signs.

If this bill is passed there will be one set of regulations for these signs statewide, which is simpler and also makes the roadside signage program more profitable for everyone involved.
