Representative Kat McGhee

Hillsborough - District 27

- Representative McGhee said that she worked with Mrs. Tara Happy from the Hollis Primary School environmental science class to develop HB 318. She said that the students have embarked on a fascinating journey of ecology and elections.
- Rep. McGhee said that HB 318 was unanimously recommended out of House Environment and Agriculture on an 18-0 vote.
- Rep. McGhee said that the daring jumping spider is a common spider but has unique
  qualities. She said that the students researched several spiders, argued their case, and

- voted, saving the General Court from forming a study committee.
- Rep. McGhee said that there are several other state emblems, including the lady bug (State Insect) and the spotted newt (State Amphibian), that are recognized because some cared enough to advocate for them to become a state symbol.

#### Representative Howard Pearl

#### Merrimack - District 26

Representative Pearl said that Mrs. Happy and her students did a great job. He said that he
was skeptical of HB 318 going into the House hearing but that the students' presentation is a
real treat.

#### Tara Happy

#### Environmental Science Teacher, Hollis Primary School

- Mrs. Happy said that students at Hollis Primary School had been learning in-person all year.
- Mrs. Happy said that she worked with the New Hampshire Fish and Game Department on a spider unit and helped students overcome their fears of spiders.
- Mrs. Happy said that there was a school-wide movement to elect a State Spider. She said
  that she worked with Fish and Game as well as a local nature center and the school held
  speeches, debates, and an election.
- Senator Carson commended Mrs. Happy for her work and said she thought it was interesting
  to get children interested in spiders. She said she was ready to learn about the daring
  jumping spider.
- Speaking for a second time, Mrs. Happy said that "Team Spider" were an amazing group of
  children, speaking on behalf of the entire school. She said that the last year has been difficult
  for students as many things have been cancelled. She said that each student has been brave,
  determined, and hasn't given up.
- Senator Carson said that she did some reading on the daring jumping spider. She asked if it
  was more common for the daring jumping spider to have fluorescent green or fluorescent blue
  mouth pieces.
  - o Mrs. Happy said that the colorful nature of the daring jumping spider is normally the males of the species looking for mates. She said that there is a variety, but the bolder mouths win out.
- Senator Carson said that she gardens and will now know what to look for.
  - o Mrs. Happy said that the fluorescent coloring is very real.
- Senator Carson said that she could tell the students put a lot of hard work into their project and she was very pleased to see children learning how government works.

 Ms. Constantian read from her written testimony, highlighting that her class hunted for spiders in the wood and held them on sticks and that children are small, like spiders, but can do big things, like spiders.

#### Eva Constantian

#### Hollis Primary School

 Ms. Constantian read from her written testimony, highlighting that the daring jumping spider was chosen by a vote of the entire Hollis Primary School and the spider protects gardens and farms from bugs and pests.

#### Nora Laine

#### **Hollis Primary School**

- Ms. Laine read from her written testimony, highlighting that only South Carolina has a state spider, and that that effort was led by a 3<sup>rd</sup> grade student, as well as that the daring jumping spider is brave but makes safe choices, like New Hampshire residents.
- Senator Carson asked if Ms. Laine had found a spider with her class.
  - o Ms. Laine said that she had and her friends had held them.

Good afternoon Chairwoman Carlson and members of Senate Executive Departments and Administration. Thank you for having us here today to introduce the Senate to what is refered to as The State Spider bill, HB318

I'm Representative Kat McGhee from Hillsborough 27, Hollis and I am here today to introduce a bill on behalf of my constituents from the Hollis Primary School. Environmental Science teacher, Mrs. Happy first reached out to me in the fall of last year to ask me what it would take to submit a bill for a candidate for State Spider. I will admit, as the Deputy Ranking member on the House Science, Technology & Energy, this bill took me in a new direction.

As we discussed her bill, I came to learn that Mrs Happy had created nothing short of a movement with her 3<sup>rd</sup> graders at the Hollis Primary School. She will explain further what that process was, but suffice it to say that and her students, also known as 'Team Spider', some of whom you will hear from today, had embarked on a fascinating journey of ecological exploration and elections. That journey resulted in the nomination of the Daring Jumping Spider or Bold Jumping Spider (also known as Phidippus Audax) for NH State Spider and a unanimous 18-0 decision from the House Environment and Agricultural Committee that they had made their case.


Although Team Spider's candidate for the honor of State spider is a common spider. His characteristics and unique qualities make him anything but ordinary. These students were given an assignment to research several spiders and then argue and vote for the one they thought deserved to be NH's state spider. When I heard about the work of Team Spider, I could not help but think that they had saved the General Court a subcommittee. Their study and the election grew to encompass the entire elementary school, it became far more than a simple assignment. They began learning how to work for something larger than their own interests, how to advocate and debate, and even how to interact with their state government, during a pandemic, in pursuit of their goal.

The last thing I will say on behalf of the Daring Jumping Spider is that when I researched Title I The State and Its Government, Chapter 3 State Emblems, I learned a few things myself. First, we have a state insect, the ladybug, and 2 state fish, one saltwater, the Striped Bass and one Freshwater, the Brook trout. We even have a state amphibian – the spotted newt. Each of these nominees was a species among many, that someone cared enough about to advocate for its consideration for a state symbol. The Daring Jumping Spider is not less deserving of this distinction.

I will leave it to my constiuents Mrs. Happy, Chloe, Nora, Eva and Geoffrey to make their case before you today to see if you agree that the Daring Jumping Spider deserves to be the State Spider of New Hampshire.

#### Testimony in Support of HB 318- State Spider

My name is Nora Laine. I am 8 years old and in third grade at Hollis Primary School. One of my favorite classes is Environmental Science with Mrs. Happy. We've spent a lot of time this school year learning about spiders, even finding some in our school gardens! My friends got to hold them. Mrs. Happy taught us about how spiders are such an important part of the wildlife in New Hampshire.

New Hampshire, like most other states, lists many insects among their state symbols. These include honeybees, butterflies, dragonflies, and ladybugs. However - South Carolina is the only state to recognize a spider as a state symbol (it's the Carolina wolf spider), in addition to a state insect. Interestingly, this was the result of the efforts of a THIRD GRADER! Now, New Hampshire 3rd graders like me want to continue to build awareness of how valuable spiders are and select one type that is a good fit for our state.

A lot of people I know don't like spiders. Some people think they're scary, ugly, and annoying! This year I learned that spiders are really helpful to our environment. This is because they eat mosquitoes, flies, stink bugs, and other insects we might encounter when we spend time outside. They help keep those populations balanced, which is good for our gardens and the inside of our homes. If we didn't have spiders, it would disrupt the food chain, and the number of household pests could sky-rocket! We wouldn't want that, would we?

If New Hampshire has nine state species, an official beverage (apple cider), a state dog (the chinook), a state insect (the ladybug), and nine state songs, then spiders should not be left out. Even though spiders might be small and look different from other creatures, they are really mighty, and each one has its own special talents and characteristics.

For New Hampshire, a great choice is the Jumping Spider. They are generally friendly, enjoy spending time in the garden, and they have a super power - they can jump 20-50 times their own body size! When they do this, the Daring Jumping Spider always attaches to a web, just in case. The people of New Hampshire are brave, too, but still make safe choices. Dear Cameron Lapine and Members of the Executive Department and Administration Committee,

My name is Tara Happy and I am the Environmental Science teacher at Hollis Primary School. I teach year round outdoor education to Kindergarten through third graders in Hollis, NH. This year has been a bit different of course, but the majority of our students have been in person full time nearly all year long! All of the teachers and young students here have been wearing our masks and carrying on with lots of learning! Today I am with a few of our third grade students to speak to you about the Daring Jumping Spider.

This year, as a result of an online NH Fish & Game workshop I attended, I created a week-long spider unit for third graders. I had found that after I began to learn more about spiders and the amazing things they can do, I was sincerely less afraid of them. Knowing that spiders are a common fear of children, I hoped that with some positive education on the topic I could do the same for my students and eliminate a learned fear that so many of us have. This started as an honest effort to just make children more comfortable with spiders.

What I didn't expect to happen was a school wide movement to elect a NH State Spider! After learning how important spiders are to our world, the students were a little shocked to learn that such an important species wasn't recognized with a state symbol. The kids instantly declared that it wasn't fair and that spiders deserved to be loved.

I was told small and scary things are still special to our world and it was like watching a crowd unravel as they began to cheer on the underdog of a losing football game. I had to admire their determination to help out spiders in general so off we went with the idea. This year so many things these kids love have been cancelled: sports, birthdays, vacations ...and now we have this little spider to rally around.

I tossed my other planned lessons out the door and we began to research spiders, checked with Fish and Game and a local nature center to make sure we had the important species represented, and our election began. Web Spinning Spiders vs' Hunting Spiders. There were spider speeches from our four candidates and some very heated spider debates that took place in our formal forest classroom, but in the end a hunting spider, the Daring Jumping spider won. Some were happy and some were sad, but we all agreed to back up our winning spider candidate.

We felt this spider represented the spirit of New Hampshire:

- Be brave and take jumps, but hey, leave a web as you fly through the air just in case.
- Be tough and survive these long hard winters so you can eventually enjoy the warmer weather.
- Be adventurous. Hunt and explore. Don't just sit in one place and wait for food to come to you ...go get it.

All I know is I started with a class yelling "ewwwww", and by the end of the week I had them lined up in our garden waiting for a turn to hold a little black spider with their bare hands. It's all about how something is presented, and today our students are going to explain how and why they love this little Daring Jumping Spider.

Only one other state, South Carolina, currently has a State Spider, allowing New Hampshire to jump ahead of the pack and adopt a new, unique State symbol with a distinct appearance.
