Summary of testimony presented in support:

Representative Tony Lekas

Hillsborough - District 37

- Representative Lekas introduced HB 456 on behalf of Representative Lynne Ober, who was not present.
- Rep. Lekas said that HB 456 would allow the Secretary of State (SoS) to provide a limited set
 of vital records to the Department of Corrections (DOC) if the DOC needs them in the scope
 of their duties. He said that these vital records would be things like deaths, marriages, and
 divorces
- Rep. Lekas said that House Executive Departments and Administration heard testimony
 that if DOC could not access the vital records from the SoS, they would have to contract with

- an outside group to collect the information.
- Rep. Lekas said that the House amendment made HB 456 more limited in scope and more
 explicit, as well as corrected an errant "date" to "data".

Helen Hanks

Commissioner, DOC

- Commissioner Hanks said that she supports HB 456. She said that the goal is to do a better
 job within DOC by using the limited data set to engage in collecting restitution as ordered by
 the court system.
- Commissioner Hanks said that there are 13,000 people who are in a 'collections only' status. She said that DOC wants to focus on people who owe restitution.

Summary of testimony presented in opposition: None.

Neutral Information Presented:

David Scanlon

Deputy Secretary of State

- Mr. Scanlon said that the vital records division is part of the SoS in New Hampshire but is in health and human services departments in other states. He said that the vital records division collects a lot of information that is private and confidential, including births, deaths, divorces, adoptions, etc. He said the SoS is charged with keeping that information private. He said there is an exception for sharing the information with the Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS), which uses the data to track issues related to medical problems, such as COVID-19 and how it moves through the state.
- Mr. Scanlon said that there also was a request for the SoS to share vital information with the New Hampshire Retirement System (NHRS) for the purpose of tracking who beneficiaries are. He said that the SoS has memorandums of understanding (MOUs) with both DHHS and NHRS with specific minimum data that can be provided. He said that the SoS can work on an MOU with the DOC.
- On a policy issue, Mr. Scanlon said that the SoS has concerns about using the vital records
 data to go after citizens for collections. He said that the SoS has received requests for similar
 information from the Department of Revenue Administration to the SoS corporation division.
- Mr. Scanlon said that the SoS can work with the DOC and craft an MOU that satisfies agency concerns and doesn't steamroll into something larger.
- Senator Carson asked to clarify that Mr. Scanlon was looking for an MOU with the DOC.
 - Mr. Scanlon said that that was correct, and that that was what is written in HB 456.

I am in support of HB 456 as proposed and thank the committee for their consideration in passing the proposed legislation. In my role as Commissioner, I have uncovered our need for clearer data sets in order to invest state resources effectively, specifically, this legislation targets cleaning up our records as it pertains to collection of restitution and other fines associated with NH RSA 504-A:12,VI; NH RSA 504-A:13. We, at this time, have no ability nor legal authority to confirm the death of a person, change in name due to adjustment in marital status or other reportable events for cases we have under a collection only status. This is important information that will serve to assist our agency in meeting our statutory obligations and focus on having current, relevant data and information. If this proposed legislation passed, we would be able to match our existing data in our electronic client record with the information from vital records for only those in our system that we are monitoring for collections allowing us to use staff resources more effectively. Currently, we have 13,014 people we are focused on collections of fines, fees and other court order payments in review of the last 13 months (highlighted below):

CHAPTER 504-A PROBATIONERS AND PAROLEES

Section 504-A:13

504-A:13 Supervision and Service Charges. -

- I. The court shall establish a supervision fee for probationers, and the parole board shall establish a supervision fee for parolees. The fee shall not be less than \$40 a month, unless waived in whole or in part by the court, board or commissioner, and may be any greater amount as established by the court or board. This fee shall be considered a condition of release, and failure to satisfy this obligation shall be grounds for a violation hearing, unless the probationer or parolee has been found to be indigent and, for that reason, unable to pay the fee. Service charges for collection of fines and fees, other than supervision fees, shall be established at 10 percent of the funds collected.
- II. Monthly supervision fees collected under this section shall be deposited as follows:
- (a) \$5 to the state general fund to defray expenses of providing training to employees of the department of corrections.
- (b) The balance to be credited to the general fund.
- III. The court, for probationers, and the parole board, for parolees and those under the jurisdiction of the court, may assess fees for services as provided by the department of corrections, division of field services, not otherwise provided for by this chapter.
- IV. (a) Any person under state probation or parole supervision who requests a transfer of supervision to another state shall submit such request on a form to be developed by the commissioner of the department of corrections along with an application fee not to exceed \$100. The commissioner may waive the fee as deemed appropriate under the circumstances. All fees collected under this subparagraph shall be deposited into the probation and parole receipts fund established in subparagraph (b).
- (b) There is hereby established a probation and parole receipts fund in the department of corrections which shall be administered by the commissioner of the department of corrections. The fund shall be nonlapsing and continually appropriated to the department of corrections to offset the cost of annual dues and any extradition costs incurred by the department pursuant to the interstate compact for adult offender supervision under RSA 651-A:25 through RSA 651-A:38.
