This bill permits motorcycles to have a maximum of 4 auxiliary driving lamps mounted to the front of the motorcycle. This bill also adds a representative of the New Hampshire Motorcyclists' Rights Organization to the traffic safety commission.

Summary of Testimony Presented:

# **Representative Sherman Packard, Rockingham 5**

- Rep. Packard said, this bill is a combination of two bills from last year.
  - Part one adds a representative from the motorcycle community onto the traffic safety commission.
  - Part two was requested by motorcycle franchise dealers. Motorcycles can have up to three auxiliary lights. The problem is a lot of motorcycles have main a headlight and two fog lights. On motorcycles with crash bars, owners like to add an extra two lights on the crash bars. Right now, owners can only add one light.

# Representative Timothy Horrigan, Strafford 6

• Rep. Horrigan said he does not ride a motorcycle, but he enjoys seeing motorcycles at bike week.

- Rep. Horrigan clarified he is testifying in opposition to this bill even though he voted for this bill in the House.
- Rep. Horrigan said he wants motorcycle helmets to be required and that the relative organization in this bill, the NH Motorcyclists' Rights Organization (NHMRO), opposes helmets.
- Rep. Horrigan said, remove the NHMRO from this bill and replace the member with another motorcyclist from the public.

# Dan Bennett, NH Auto Dealers Association (NHADA)

- Mr. Bennet testified in support in of this bill.
- Mr. Bennett said, the two issues in this bill are important.
- Mr. Bennett said, motorcycle lamping is done in pairs and motorcycles with better lighting are more easily seen by other drivers on the road. This addresses a two-fold visibility issue.
- Mr. Bennett said, the department of safety, the traffic safety commission, and NHMRO worked with the NH Auto Dealer Association on the language in this bill.
- Mr. Bennet said he disagrees with Rep. Horrigan about the commission. They are data driven, look at roadway safety and have productive discussions with varied interest groups.
- Mr. Bennett said, both bills passed last year.
- Mr. Bennett referred the committee members to pictures of lighting on motorcycles in his written testimony.
- Sen. Sherman asked, does this bill only impact the front of motorcycle? Would this restrict any lamps on the back? Would there be a need to change that as well?
  - Mr. Bennett said, this bill only affects the forward-facing lights. The only restrictions for the back bike are that flashing or blinking lights are not allowed on the back.
- Sen. Sherman asked, are there no additional issues on the rear of the motorcycles that the industry would like addressed on this bill?
  - Mr. Bennett said, we heard of none and know of none.
- Sen. Birdsell, why do we limit the number of lights on a motorcycle anyway?
  - Mr. Bennett said, there is a concept of excessive lamping where it could be blinding or distracting. On an annual inspection they do a headlight aim to check if lights are aiming too high or are too bright. We have to have some restrictions and controls.

# Traci Beaurivage, NH Motorcycle Rights Organization (NHRMO)

- Ms. Beaurivage said, we are not an organization that runs around saying we don't want to wear helmets. I think that perception of us started in the 1960s when talks about not wearing helmets started.
- Ms. Beaurivage said, we got the office of highway safety involved, the rider's safety program, AAA, iHeartMedia, and the liquor commission. We now have a ride smart

program statewide. We have statewide PSAs coming out. We are promoting riding safely. We believe in rider's choice, but we are always talking about doing the right things for the community.

- Ms. Beaurivage said, I respectfully request that you allow us to be on this commission and I support the auxiliary lamping as well.
- Sen. Watters said, I appreciate what you say, and I want you to know that the attitudes expressed earlier are not shared by the Senate Transportation Committee.
- Sen. Birdsell said, I second that.



We feel that NHMRO would be a great asset to the Traffic Safety Commission and ask that you support HB 461.


