  - (1) The research-based educational program the public school would implement.
  - (2) The length of school day and school year at the public school.
- (3) The student promotion and graduation policies to be implemented at the public school.
  - (4) The public school's assessment plan.
  - (5) The proposed budget for the public school.
  - (6) The proposed staffing plan for the public school.
- (e) An identification of the improvements in academic performance that the public school expects to achieve by implementing the innovations.
- (f) An estimate of the cost savings or increased efficiencies, or both, if any, the public school expects to achieve by implementing its identified innovations.
- (g) A statement of the level of support for designation as an innovation school or school zone demonstrated by students and parents of students enrolled in the public school, and the community surrounding the public school.
- (h) A description of any provision of the collective bargaining agreement in effect for the personnel at the public school that would need to be waived or modified for the public school to implement its identified innovations.
- (i) Any additional information required by the local school board of the school district in which the innovation plan would be implemented.

- IV. Each plan for creating an innovation school zone submitted by a local school board through collaboration with a group of public schools, may include the information specified in paragraph III for each public school that would be included in the innovation school zone. A plan for creating an innovation school zone may also include the following additional information:
- (a) A description of how innovations in the public schools in the school innovation zone would be integrated to achieve results that would be less likely to be accomplished by each public school working alone.
- (b) An estimate of any economies of scale that would be achieved by innovations implemented jointly by the public schools within the innovation school zone.
- (c) A statement of the level of support for designation as an innovation school demonstrated by students and parents of students enrolled in the public school, and the community surrounding the public school based upon the public hearing.
- V. In considering or creating an innovation plan or a plan for creating an innovation school zone, each local school board may consider innovations in the following areas:
  - (a) Curriculum and academic standards and assessments.
- (b) Accountability measures, including but not limited to expanding the use of a variety of accountability measures to more accurately present a complete measure of student learning and accomplishment.
- (c) Provision of services, including but not limited to special education services, services for gifted and talented students, services for students for whom English is not the dominant language, educational services for students at risk of academic failure, expulsion, or dropping out, and support services provided by the department of health and human services or county social services agencies.
  - (d) Teacher recruitment, training, preparation, and professional development.
  - (e) Teacher employment.
  - (f) Performance expectations and evaluation procedures for teachers and principals.
- (g) School governance and the roles, responsibilities, and expectations of principals in innovation schools or schools within an innovation school zone.
- (h) Preparation and counseling of students for transition to higher education or the work force.
- VI. Each public school and each local school board may seek and accept public and private gifts, grants, and donations to offset the costs of developing and implementing innovation plans and plans for creating innovation school zones.

Summary of testimony presented:

#### Senator Ruth Ward - Senate District 8

 Senator Ward introduced HB 609-FN in absence of the prime sponsor, Representative Cordelli.

#### Megan Tuttle - President, NEA-NH

- Opposed to this bill.
- They have serious concerns.
- This bill subverts the spirit of the Every Student Succeeds Act, also known as ESSA, which indicates that stakeholders should be consulted and have meaningful involvement in improvement plans of public schools and districts.
- In this bill, meaningful involvement seems to be bypassed entirely.

- Lacks provisions to ensure public comment, review and participation in the development of innovation schools, especially since educators are not listed as a primary stakeholder.
- After bypassing valuable education participation, the bill invites the waiving of rules directly impacting educators.
- On page three of the bill, the description of what elements can be waived is both extraordinarily broad and includes specific aspects of employment and working conditions that are often covered at the bargaining table.
- On page two of the bill, it takes one step further by asking about collective bargaining agreement specifics for waiving purposes and is starkly similar to a legislative model previously drafted by ALEC.
- NHDOE lacks this authority to waive collective bargaining agreements.
- Additional concerns include but are not limited to overly broad language, which leads to
  questions about the waiving of special education, English as a second language, dropout
  prevention services, graduation policies, etc.
- On page four, there are concerns about the waiving of compliance regulations.
- Innovation can and does already happen in NH public schools.

#### Representative Glenn Cordelli - Carrol, District 4

- Supports this bill as the prime sponsor.
- He has heard previously that this is model legislation from ALEC. It is not true. He drafted this bill by looking at Colorado legislation.
- Charter schools are laboratories of innovation as they have an advantage by not having to follow administrative rules that traditional public schools do.
- The table of contents for administrative rules is 23 pages long.
- This bill is the ultimate in local control.
- Local school and districts coming up with ideas for innovation by going before the local school board with public input.
- From the local passage, it then goes to NHDOE where they can suggest changes. When
  ready, the local school board would submit to the state board of education where they
  would pass or reject plan.
- There is follow-up and monitoring of the plan. The state board is responsible for their review every two years. NHDOE also crafts a report that's submitted to the Governor and the legislature.
- Senator Prentiss asked Representative Cordelli why there is no fiscal note.
  - o Rep. Cordelli said he is not aware of anything related to a fiscal note.
- Senator Prentiss asked Representative Cordelli about local school funds being utilized to fund this initiative.
  - o Representative Cordelli said it depends on what the plan is. For instance, if it is a simple rule change, may not require any funding at all.
- Senator Prentiss asked Representative Cordelli what his experience with innovation schools in Colorado were.

- Representative Cordelli said he attended an education conference and talked with folks about their innovation project work. He'd be happy to send one of their annual reports.
- Senator Kahn asked Representative Cordelli about President Tuttle's testimony regarding page two of the bill and matters typically covered in collective bargaining agreements.
  - o Rep. Cordelli said he would expect that any plan created locally would need to be renegotiated with that bargaining unit.
  - o The lawyer from NHDOE would not have any authority to make unilateral changes that would impact a collective bargaining agreement.
  - o Reports from Colorado indicated that one plan put in place resulted in negotiations that led to an increase in salary for teachers.
- Senator Kahn asked Representative Cordelli about the fiscal note and if there is a waiving procedure in the House.
  - o Representative Cordelli does not recall if there was a fiscal note attached. It would be an indeterminable cost, therefore, not sent to Finance by leadership.
- Sen. Hennessey noted that NHDOE may be able to answer Senator Kahn's question about the fiscal note.
- Senator Kahn asked Representative Cordelli about this bill being the ultimate in local control. He asked if there are parallels that he might find in other statutes.
  - o Rep. Cordelli said nothing comes to mind off the top of his head, however, local initiative to brainstorm and advance it through local school boards.

# Attorney Diana Fenton - Chief of the Office of Governance, NH Department of Education

- Senator Kahn asked Ms. Fenton about the status of the fiscal note from NHDOE.
  - o Ms. Fenton said she recalls a fiscal note being prepared by the department. It was very difficult to anticipate the fiscal impact of this bill as they are unsure where changes and costs will be.
  - o If these innovative schools were to pass, similar to the charter school bill, the department would anticipate a need for a staff person to oversee it.
- Senator Kahn reiterated that he would understand how the Senate would treat a fiscal note if there ends up being one.

#### Barrett Christina - Executive Director, NH School Boards Association

- Opposed to this bill.
- They would certainly entertain a study committee.
- There are about 12-14 states currently practicing similar state law. We should look at how other states are treating innovation schools.
- Their opposition isn't so much in concept, but it is too broad and vague.
- On page one, there need to be clarity on what is defined as s a public school.
- On page one, collaboration by public schools is already permitted.

- On page two, the language covering the submission of plan(s) to the department of what
  rules they are seeking to waive is too broad and should be narrowed down to certain
  rules that may be waivable. For instance, health and safety regulations should not be
  waivable.
- They share concerns regarding collective bargaining agreements and NHDOE not having authority to waive agreements.
- They appreciate the idea of looking at innovative ways to provide education in NH.
- This bill seems to be creating another program where we already have a charter school program that meets these needs.
- RSA 194:B already allows for local creation of charter schools. Charter schools were introduced to relax some of the regulatory requirements.
- Rather than replicate charter schools, we should look at what regulations might be impeding school districts. The legislature can control that.
- If there are rules by NHDOE in place that are impeding school districts, we should look at that as well.

#### Michael O'Brien - Government Affairs Advisor, Preti Strategies

- Opposed to this bill.
- Representing their client, American Federation of Teachers-NH.
- Agreed with President Tuttle's testimony, especially around the collective bargaining piece.
- A simple Google search of ALEC and innovation schools' results in this bill's language listed line for line on their website. It is possible that Colorado pulled from ALEC for their state law.
- A recent Denver Post article noted that test scores in innovation schools are static as compared to those of normal public schools. There has not been an increase in outcomes.
- As a husband to a school teacher, she innovated every level of her classroom over the last year due to the COVID-19 pandemic.
- In the last seven years, his wife has taken advantage of a program three times, through her collective bargaining agreement, to create a new class that is not available currently.
- Just this year, his wife and another teacher are putting together a plan to present to school administration, school board, etc. to offer another unique class.
- We see innovation in schools already. This bill is offensive to teachers who spend their time making this innovation happen locally.

Dear Chairwoman Ward and Members of Senate Education,

I am writing on behalf of the members of the New Hampshire School Administrators Association to **oppose HB609** as it is currently written.

While NHSAA certainly applauds the effort to allow public schools more flexibility in their attempts to meet the needs of all students, this bill as written as several serious flaws, including:

- the lack of a definition of "innovation";
- 2) the lack of metrics to adequately assess whether the schools or zones are actually improving student outcomes;
- 3) the potential fiscal impact on the state, local school districts, and local taxpayers; and
- 4) the open-ended waivers the bill would afford.
- 1) The first section of proposed RSA194-E:1 includes definitions. While there are several vague definitions in this section, the term "innovation" is never defined. Perhaps innovation is to be defined locally, but that is never clearly stated. Having worked in education for 30 years, I have seen many "innovations" during that time period. What one district might consider an innovation may simply be best practice in another, and that practice was developed within existing statutes and regulations. Innovation is often in the eye of the beholder.

Without a clear definition and explanation of what constitutes innovation, we are concerned that it will be defined as, "I will know it when I see it". That makes determining goals and metrics for assessment problematic at best, impossible at worst.

2) There is a clear lack of accountability in this proposed legislation. Throughout the wording of RSA194-E, proposals *may* submit a plan for assessment. There is no clear explanation or definition of what metrics

would be used to assess the effectiveness of the plan or, more importantly, student outcomes.

The sponsor indicated that this bill is founded on Colorado's Innovation School Act of 2008. There has been significant concern from residents and parents of Colorado regarding the effectiveness of these innovation schools and whether they truly succeed over "traditional" public schools (*Denver Post, Nov. 24, 2019 -* attached). Part of the concern is that, once students were evaluated based on statewide assessment measures, they are not achieving at the rates or the consistency of their peers.

There are clear recommendations in place, but no concrete way in which to apply the brakes if issues such as this arise. In addition, as we have seen with failing charter schools, parents and students are reluctant to "give up" what they perceive as successful, regardless of the objective data.

3) As was noted during the hearing, there is no fiscal note attached to this legislation. While there are many questions about the impact on local budgets and taxpayers, one area of concern would be the notion of an "Innovation Zone", which could be created by multiple schools across a region. While there is a certain appeal to combining resources where possible and appropriate, upon which community would the burden of instruction and facility costs lie? Would the local community be responsible for an influx of special needs students (if they were to be included), or would the costs fall upon their sending districts? Would the "Innovation School" district be responsible for transportation, or would that add to the "sending" districts' overall costs?

Another area of concern is the capacity of the Department of Education to review and monitor these programs. The Department currently does not have the manpower or resources to effectively review the existing public schools across the state, not to mention the charter schools and institutes of higher education. Additional bureaucracy would need to be created at the state level to oversee this program.

These are just a few of the many fiscal questions and concerns that this bill raises, with no clear answers.

4) Regarding the waiver provisions outlined in the bill, <u>it is unclear which</u> <u>regulations could be waived and under what circumstances.</u> Would this legislation allow "Innovation Schools" to waive Ed306 – Minimum Standards for School Approval? Or ED317 – Standards for Suspension & Expulsion? Ed500 – Certification of Professional Staff? Or perhaps Ed1200 – Seclusion? The sponsor indicated that regulations based on statute could

not be waived. However, all state regulations are based on statute, so does that mean that there would actually be no waivers granted?

Finally, we are also deeply concerned that this bill is yet another step toward the privatization of public education in New Hampshire.

The bill sponsor indicated that HB609 is not patterned after the American Legislative Exchange Council (ALEC) model policy but rather Colorado's Innovation School model. I would respectfully submit that Colorado's Innovation Schools Act of 2008 is the exact replica of ALEC's model legislation, except that Colorado education terms were inserted (COStatute).

I have attached a side-by-side comparison of the <u>ALEC model policy</u> and HB609. Even though the comparison document is four (4) pages (in table format), there is little of substance that separates the two. Often where there is a separation, HB609 is not always "better" than the model legislation.

ALEC has made it a goal to privatize public education, and this bill would open the door for this type of expansion into New Hampshire. With this bill as currently written, what would prevent a for-profit company contracting with an "Innovation School" to provide education for students? With the appropriate waivers in place, public schools could become corporate extensions.

Given that New Hampshire ranks among the highest states in the country for student achievement, and that we have a robust Public Charter School system to serve as incubators of innovation, I am unsure why we need to have a national agenda thrust upon New Hampshire's public education system. This bill appears to be a solution in search of a problem.

We would respectfully request that, given all the policy and fiscal questions this proposed legislation raises, as well as the unnecessary complexity it creates, that you vote to oppose HB609.

Dear Chairwoman Ward and Honorable members of the Senate Education Committee,

I come before you today to testify in opposition to House Bill 609, relative to innovation schools, and would like to highlight several serious concerns among many, with respect to this piece of legislation.

First, at a minimum HB 609 subverts the spirit of the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) - which holds that stakeholders should be consulted and meaningfully participate in improvement planning and implementation in our public schools and districts. At each stage of the process laid out in this proposal, meaningful involvement seems to be bypassed entirely.

HB 609 lacks adequate provisions to ensure public comment, review, and participation in the development of the innovation school or district plan, especially since educators are not named as a required stakeholder in a single part of this proposed legislation.

Second, after bypassing valuable educator participation in the development and submission of these proposed innovation plans, the bill appears to invite the waiving of rules that directly impact the educators of a particular school district.

Some of the examples of this are referenced in the proposed plan components allowable by the legislation including:

- Page 2, line 8: "A description of the innovations the public school would implement,
  which may include, but not be limited to, innovations in school staffing, curriculum and
  assessment, class scheduling, use of financial and other resources, and faculty
  recruitment, and employment, evaluation, and compensation.
- Page 3, line 24: "(d) Teacher recruitment, training, preparation, and professional development. (e) Teacher employment. (f) Performance expectations and evaluation procedures for teachers and principals

The description of what can be waived here is both extraordinarily broad and includes specific aspects of employment and working conditions that are often subjects covered at the bargaining table.

On page 2, line 33 the legislation goes further by asking for: "(h) A description of any provision of the collective bargaining agreement in effect for the personnel at the public school that would need to be waived or modified for the public school to implement its identified innovations."

This provision should be removed from the bill and is unnecessary and questionable as to why it exists in HB 609 other than the fact that it comes from the model legislation developed by the American Legislative Exchange Council (ALEC). Proponents of HB 609 acknowledged during the House hearing that the NH Department of Education lacks the authority to waive provisions of a collective bargaining agreement, rendering this cookie cutter language from the ALEC bill senseless. If a school district wanted to make a change that required an adaptation in working conditions, there is nothing from stopping them today from seeking a waiver or negotiating a change to a CBA with a school employee bargaining unit.

Additional concerns for NEA-NH include, but are not limited to, the overly broad language which leaves questions around whether this bill allows the waiver of:

- Important special education, English as a Second Language, and dropout prevention services
- Curriculum and academic standards that allow the drawdown of federal funds.
- A school's assessment plan which must meet federal requirements, or the federal government would have grounds to place schools/districts on At Risk status and withhold federal funds.
- Graduation policies which cannot conflict with federal reporting requirements or policies.

When the bill broadly states on page 4, line 20-21 that "upon the designation of an innovation school or school zone, the state board shall waive compliance with <u>anv</u> administrative rules specified in the local district plan," this begs the question as to whether there is any limit as to what rules the board can waive? Can the state board approve the waiver of IDEA compliance? Is this saying the board can waive compliance of Department of Labor rules around building safety or employment? These questions went regrettably unanswered at the hearing in the House.

Innovation can and does happen in New Hampshire public schools when you engage with the stakeholders who are part of public education in our state. The text of this bill is lifted from model legislation from a Washington, DC thinktank, which is why it is unsurprisingly broad, confusing and will create more questions than it does solutions.

I strongly urge this committee to find HB 609 Inexpedient to Legislate.
