Dear Members of the Election Law Committee,

As the moderator responsible for one of the largest polling places in the state, I am opposed to CACR19.

Milford's 9,955 registered voters cast their ballots at one polling location. Derry and several other towns have even more voters at one polling place. Nevertheless, according to former Secretary of State Bill Gardner, Milford's size still makes us one of the 25 largest polling places in the country.

We use four AccuVote tabulating machines and are testing an alternative, with the Ballot Law Commission's approval, during the March 2022 local elections.

Our polling place is open from 6:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. The clerk, other election officials and workers, and I arrive at 5:30 a.m. Generally, the results have been counted and checked, and I can announce the results at about 10:00 p.m. The clerk and I accompany the police as they return the tabulators, cast and uncast ballots, and other election material to town hall about 10:30 or 11:00. The clerk and I already work for upwards of 17 hours straight with machine counting.

I am opposed to the proposed constitutional amendment for these reasons:

Present election law stipulates the counting begin immediately after the polls close "and shall not be adjourned nor postponed until it shall have been completed." Imagine asking volunteers to return to the polls at 8:30 p.m., after the polls close, to spend the night counting thousands of ballots with multiple races and warrant articles! And requiring clerks and moderators, who have been at the polls since 5:30 a.m., to manage the overnight hand-counting process.

Milford was one of the first towns to adopt SB2, enabling voters to cast their votes on the town and school district warrants. This year, the town warrant has more than 30 articles - in addition to the races for town officials. The ballot will likely be 4 or 5 double-sided pages. Imagine counting more than 2,000 voters' ballots, each with more than 50 marks for races and questions, by hand, overnight.

Our "first in the nation" Presidential primary would be at risk. Granted, we count one mark on each political party's ballot, but the voter turnout is much higher than at local elections. Candidates expect the results by 10:00 p.m. so they can be on the 11:00 news as the winner and a midnight flight to the following primary state. Hand counting in large communities would jeopardize what the candidates and press expect. We do not want an lowa caucus debacle to happen here. Requiring hand-counting while not adjourning or postponing the polls' closing until it is complete will force communities to split their large polling places into multiple smaller ones. The cost of election official and staff time before, during, and after elections will be significant. Wards will have to be created and voters educated.

Hand counting is not inherently more accurate than a machine count, and indeed, the opposite is likely the case. If not done so already, someone should research recounts held by the towns, wards, and the state to determine how many times a hand-count town found different results when a recount occurred.

The proposed amendment essentially forces machine count communities to hand count the Constitutional question: "The ballot containing the question shall include 2 squares next to the question allowing the voter to vote 'Yes' or 'No.'" AccuVote tabulators scan an oval space to determine how to count the vote.

The proposed amendment disqualifies votes made by filling in the square or using a checkmark, which are common voter marks: "If no cross is made in either of the squares, the ballot shall not be counted on the question." Also, moderators often can discern the voter's intent by stray marks adjacent to the oval or square but that would not be allowed.

Forcing large communities to stop machine counting threatens the integrity of their results. We can ensure the continued integrity of machine counts using techniques such as random audits by the Secretary of State's office.

I ask the Committee not to approve this proposed constitutional amendment,

You have a great many bills to consider. Sadly, the goal of many of these bills is to make voting more difficult and to put New Hampshire's safe and accurate election system at risk. However, the attempt by some lawmakers to outlaw ballot counting machines (See HB 1064, HB 1064 FN, and CACR 19.) is especially egregious given that our November 2020 elections saw a record number of New Hampshire citizens safely and securely cast their ballots.

There is absolutely no need to make dangerous changes to New Hampshire's demonstrably sound and successful voting system. A change to hand counting ballots WOULD BE MORE COSTLY, WOULD REQUIRE MORE MUCH MORE TIME, WOULD BE LESS ACCURATE, and MORE SUSCEPTIBLE TO POLITICAL MANIPULATION.

Please oppose HB 1064, HB 1064 FN, and CACR 19. These bills are unnecessary and pose a serious threat to NH's reliable voting system.

CONCURRENT RESOLUTION PROPOSING CONSITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

PROVIDING THAT: all elections shall be conducted through paper ballots.

Be it Resolved by the House of Representatives, the Senate concurring, that the Constitution of New Hampshire be amended as follows:

1 I. That the first part of the constitution be amended by inserting after article 11 the 2 following new article:

3 [Art.] 11-a. [Paper Ballots Required]. For purposes of facilitating the examination and 4 recounting of votes cast, all elections shall be conducted using paper ballots.

5 II. That the above amendment proposed to the constitution be submitted to the qualified 6 voters of the state at the state general election to be held in November, 2022.

III. That the selectmen of all towns, cities, wards and places in the state are directed to
insert in their warrants for the said 2022 election an article to the following effect: To decide
whether the amendments of the constitution proposed by the 2022 session of the general court shall
be approved.

IV. That the wording of the question put to the qualified voters shall be:

"Are you in favor of amending the first part of the constitution by inserting after article 11 thefollowing new article:

14 [Art.] 11-a [Paper Ballots Required.] For purposes of facilitating the examination and 15 recounting of votes cast, all elections shall be conducted using paper ballots."

V. That the secretary of state shall print the question to be submitted on a separate ballot or on the same ballot with other constitutional questions. The ballot containing the question shall include 2 squares next to the question allowing the voter to vote "Yes" or "No." If no cross is made in either of the squares, the ballot shall not be counted on the question. The outside of the ballot shall be the same as the regular official ballot except that the words "Questions Relating to Constitutional Amendments proposed by the 2022 General Court" shall be printed in bold type at the top of the ballot.

VI. That if the proposed amendment is approved by 2/3 of those voting on the amendment, it
becomes effective when the governor proclaims its adoption.

26 AT THE PRESENT TIME, there is no duty in the New Hampshire constitution to use 27 paper ballots in elections.
