Dear Honorable Members of the House Education Committee:

I heartily support this bill and hope you will vote "OTP." This bill is needed to clarify the responsibilities of school boards, and will be of great benefit to school board members themselves, as well as the public.

I have served on the Timberlane Regional School Budget Committee as well as serving on the Timberlane School Board and SAU 55 board. Though I am testifying as a member of the public, I am also a founding member and President of the School District Governance Association of NH, a five year old organization dedicated to teaching school district elected officials about their role and responsibilities. In my experience, school board members often have little awareness of their responsibilities under RSAs and even less knowledge of Education Administrative Rule requirements. (I didn't even know about Admin. Rules until years into my elected service.)

This bill also makes the division of responsibility between school board functions and SAU responsibilities very clear, which is also badly needed. Right now we have many school boards who don't know their mandated duties, and expect and are happy for their SAU administration to do the work for them. This upside down situation is so extreme in some districts that school board members who try to wrest their authority back from SAU administrators find themselves vilified and targeted for harsh treatment.



New Hampshire dad arrested at school board meeting after complaining about assigned book's racy content



An angry New Hampshire dad ended up in cuffs at a school board meeting Monday after he spoke out against a racy book his freshman daughter was assigned to read in English class.

William Baer fumed at Gilford High School officials for not notifying him that his 14-year-old daughter's honors English class was assigned Jodi Picoult's "Nineteen Minutes," <u>local WMUR-TV reported.</u>

The book, which has been on the curriculum since 2007, features an explicit passage depicting two teens having sex.

In past years, parents received warning about the book's adult content.



But this year, no notice was given, Baer said.




Baer was given two minutes to speak at the meeting. After his time was up, he piped up from his seat and got into a heated exchange with a female school official. (WMUR)

"I've never read anything like this," Baer told the station. "It's like the transcript for a triple-X-rated movie."

The book's plot revolves around a school shooting, and school officials have said it deals with important themes such as bullying and adolescent sex.

The passage, on page 313, depicts a boy having forceful sex with his girlfriend and includes the sentence, "She could eel his erection, hot against her stomach."

Baer said he became aware of the scene only after a friend found it.

Baer said he emailed the school's principal to ask for a meeting, but the principal wasn't available, the Daily Sun reported.

He confronted school officials about the passage during a comment period at Monday's board meeting.

According to a video of the meeting published on YouTube, the school officials cut off Baer after his allotted two minutes to speak were over.

The book, which is about a school shooting, has been on the school's curriculum since 2007.

He later piped up as another man addressed the issue.

After a heated back-and-forth with a female official, Baer was approached by a cop and told to leave.

He refused, saying, "I guess you're going to have to arrest me."

He was cuffed and charged with disorderly conduct.

"Someone else was given the floor and was speaking. He interrupted them and continued after being asked to stop.

"He was then asked to leave and refused to leave unless he was arrested, so he was arrested."

The station said Baer believed his First Amendment rights were violated and plans to protest his bust.

He faces a fine of up to \$1,200.

Describing the meeting, Baer said, "It was basically you make a statement, you say what you want, and you sit down and shut up. That's not how you interact with adults."


"It was extremely frustrating that I couldn't make any points with anybody," he told the station.

New charge for maskless woman arrested at Timberlane school meeting

The meeting was planned to be held in person at the district's Performing Arts Center, but board Chairwoman Kimberly Farah quickly shut it down before it began and required that it be held remotely.

"I didn't want to jeopardize the health of the staff and the students," Farah said as several Plaistow police officers and state police troopers swarmed inside and outside the auditorium.

The abrupt end to the 7 p.m. in-person meeting happened shortly after Atkinson resident Jackie Wydola watched as police arrested her mother, Kate Bossi, when they entered the building without masks as required by school policy.

"You are violating my rights right now. You are remiss," Bossi told Sgt. Alec Porter as she was being arrested.



"Come on Sgt. Porter, you know this is wrong what they're doing to our kids," one man shouted during the arrest.

"Are you seriously doing this you guys. This is law enforcement. You're not enforcing laws, you're enforcing policy. That doesn't matter," Wydola told officers.

Wydola said that before the arrest her mother "didn't really have any interaction with the officer. She just walked into the building, and when they realized that she had come into the auditorium they followed her in here."

She said her mother was the first unmasked person to walk into the building.

Porter declined to comment on the reason for the arrest at the scene but Wydola, who identified Bossi, said she was told that her mother was arrested for disorderly conduct.

Bonnie Bowley of Danville, who also showed up at the meeting without a mask with her children, said her family has a "medical exemption."

She said Bossi is the Sunday school teacher for her children, who were crying after watching the arrest.

"We have every right to be here. I get it's scary, but that should not dictate our right to be here," she said, adding that she wouldn't have brought her children if she thought they would "face that kind of aggression."

"I came here pretty calm and now I'm trying to calm down," she said.

Farah's decision to hold the meeting remotely angered several of those who came to speak on the mask issue.

When asked if she felt threatened after the in-person meeting ended, Farah responded, "No, I was in the Army. I do not. I'm quite confident in the fact that I've got backups here."

Farah also serves on the Danville Board of Selectmen and was one of three selectmen who walked out of Monday's board meeting because a maskless crowd showed up and violated a board policy requiring masks in town buildings.

Some of the residents who wore masks also expressed frustration with the unmasked, saying they had ruined the meeting for others in attendance.

School board member Shawn O'Neil, who is also chairman of the Danville Board of Selectmen and had refused to wear a mask at Monday's selectmen's meeting, had planned to propose that the school board drop its policy requiring masks in school.

"Kids are going to be going to the prom in two days. It would be nice to have them be able to enjoy it without a mask. You know? They all got screwed last year," he said. When the meeting later resumed remotely, O'Neil did make a motion to end the school mask mandate, but it failed because it didn't get a second.

Interim Plaistow Police Chief Jason Mazza couldn't be reached for comment on Friday.

Claremont School Board votes to end use of 'Fishtank' reading series in schools

CLAREMONT — The Claremont School Board terminated the district's new elementary school reading program with reportedly no advanced warning, saying they were misled about the program's intended use.

On Wednesday the Claremont School Board, by a 5-1 vote, directed Claremont schools to discontinue use of the Fishtank Learning reading series, stating concerns about the curriculum's resource links to seemingly one-sided and politicized views pertaining to social justice topics.

The Fishtank Learning reading program offers a wide range of reading series for young readers, many in the science and social studies content areas. The social studies themes range from Ancient Egypt and the seven continents to "Stories of Immigration" and "Movements for Equality."

At a meeting on July 21, board members conveyed concerns about the use of Fishtank's series as a social studies curriculum.

While acknowledging the books were engaging, well made, and focused on people of historically underrepresented backgrounds, board members noted that certain important historical biographical subjects — such as Thomas Edison, Benjamin Franklin, Abraham Lincoln, and Colin Powell — were omitted. Some board members also worried about the "intensity" of some of the subjects, which include stories of immigrant children and historical periods of social injustice.

The board withdrew their concerns after learning from district <u>Curriculum</u> <u>Coordinator Brynn Kane</u> that the Fishtank readers were used in the district's language arts curriculum and were separate from social studies.

On Wednesday, however, the school board revealed new information. A document drafted by Kane on Sept. 1, outlining elementary level curriculum expectations for the 2021-2022 school year, directs the use of Fishtank units and topics for developing lessons and activities in social studies and science.

"We were told, in quotes, that this was not the curriculum for elementary science and social studies education," said board member Stephen Horsky. "Not once, but twice this board was lied to."

"I hope it's an error, but it doesn't appear to be one," said board member Michael Petrin. "This is unacceptable as far as what we were told it was going to be."

<u>Claremont does not currently have formal curriculums for elementary social</u> <u>studies or science. Elementary teachers have a degree of flexibility and discretion in developing lessons in these contents.</u>

Kane's document informs teachers not to solely use Fishtank materials though it seems to emphasize Fishtank topics as a primary guide.

Vice-Chair Heather Whitney, who made the motion to cease Fishtank, said her concerns rose from researching Fishtank's online resources and professional development tools designed to assist teachers to implement the curriculum. The resources included learning standards around social justice topics that Whitney said she found to be politically driven and inappropriate for elementary-aged children.

One resource even provided tips for how teachers can "camouflage" the curricular units to avoid concerns from administrators.

"It is a political activist curriculum," Whitney said.

In a phone interview with the Eagle Times, school board Chair Frank Sprague said his main concern was not the curriculum itself, which he still entrusts the teachers to figure out how to incorporate, but the "lack of honesty" when coordinators introduced the program to the board, which Sprague believes resulted from either "incompetence or arrogance."

"That made it hard for me to defend the curriculum [last night]," Sprague said.

Unlike the July 21 meeting, there were no educators or principals present at Wednesday's meeting. As a result, the board voted without learning how abruptly changing the reading program would impact teachers.

Superintendent Michael Tempesta told the Eagle Times that the board's motion caught him by surprise, otherwise he would likely have recommended that Kane or other educators attend. While "Curriculum Update" was on the agenda, the supervisory administration had prepared a presentation detailing the district's broader plan to update the curriculum, which is a multi-phased process. Tempesta said he did not expect the conversation to become the board's desire to implement an immediate program change.

The Fishtank Learning reading program originated last year as a pilot at Maple Avenue Elementary. Teachers Cassandra Lockwood and Joan Fontaine, who piloted the program in their second grade classrooms, touted the program's success saying that the students were excited to learn new topics, were engaged and motivated to read and write about the topics.

The educators chose Fishtank for its highly-regarded knowledge-based content, Lockwood said. Having a broad base of knowledge and experience is critical to advancing one's learning, as students rely upon their background knowledge to draw connections to new content.

Lockwood and Fontaine said that Fishtank raised no concerns from students or parents last year.

The complaint about Fishtank reportedly originated from two teachers who voiced their concerns to the school board.

Tempesta agreed that the process in introducing curriculum, including its vetting, needs to be addressed, though the successes witnessed with students at Maple Avenue should also remain at the forefront of curriculum conversations.

Parent, Family, Community Involvement in Education

Parents, families, educators and communities—there's no better partnership to assure that all students pre-K- to high school—have the support and resources they need to succeed in school and in life.

t takes a village to raise a child is a popular proverb
with a clear message: the whole community has an
essential role to play in the growth and development
of its young people. In addition
to the vital role that parents and
family members play in a child's
education, the broader community too has a responsibility to

assure high-quality education for all students.

In the past, parent involvement was characterized by volunteers, mostly mothers, assisting in the classroom, chaperoning students, and fundraising. Today, the old model has been replaced with a much more inclusive approach: school-family-community partnerships now include mothers and fathers, stepparents, grandparents, foster parents, other relatives and caregivers, business leaders and community groups—all participating in goal-oriented activities, at all grade levels, linked to student achievement and school success.

The research is clear, consistent, and convincing

Parent, family, and community involvement in education correlates with higher academic performance and school improvement. When schools, parents, families, and communities work together to support learning, students tend to earn higher grades, attend school more regularly, stay in school longer, and enroll in higher level programs. Researchers cite parent-familycommunity involvement as a key to addressing the school dropout crisis1 and note that strong school-family-community partnerships foster higher educational aspirations and more motivated students.2 The evidence holds true for students at both the elementary and secondary level, regardless of the parent's education, family income, or background—and the research shows parent involvement affects minority students' academic achievement across all races.3

Supporting teaching and learning requires addressing students' social service needs, as well as their academic ones, and this broad-based support is essential to closing achievement gaps. The positive impact of connecting community resources with student needs is well documented. In fact, community support of the educational process is considered one of the characteristics common to high-performing schools.

How do parents, families, and communities get involved?

Parent, family, and community involvement means different things to different people. A research-based framework, developed by Joyce Epstein of Johns Hopkins University, describes six types of involvement—parenting, communicating, volunteering, learning at home, decision making, and collaborating with the community—that offer a broad range of school, family, and community activities that can engage all parties and help meet student needs. Successful school-parent-community partnerships are not stand-alone projects or add-on programs but are well integrated with the school's overall mission and goals. Research and field-work show that parent-school-partnerships improve schools, strengthen families, build community support, and increase student achievement and success.

States press for more partnerships

Data compiled in 20057 show that 17 states have directed all districts or schools to implement parental involvement policies. Seven states—Alaska, California, Indiana, Minnesota, Nevada, South Carolina, and Texas—have obligated schools or districts to develop policies linking parent-community partnerships to school improvement plans, and in Delaware, schools applying for school improvement grants must include parental involvement strategies in grant applications. In addition, many states promote parental involvement in early literacy, school safety, and dropout prevention

programs, as well as in initiatives addressing the needs of at-risk youth and English Language Learners. Some state policies echo the provisions of Section 1118 of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) that direct schools and districts receiving Title I funds to use a portion of those funds to involve parents, educators, and the community in the shared responsibility of improving their students' academic achievement.

Although the research unequivocally affirms the positive and long-lasting effects of parent, family, and community involvement on student learning, this data is often overlooked in local, state, and national discussions about raising student achievement and closing achievement gaps. Education reform efforts that focus solely on classrooms and schools are leaving out critical factors essential for long-term success. What happens before and after school can be as important as what happens during the school day. Even the most promising reforms can be "reversed by family, negated by neighborhoods, and might well be subverted or minimized by what happens to children outside of school."8 While education is clearly an asset to the individual, it also benefits families and serves the common good. Education is a core value of our democratic society, and it is in everyone's self-interest to insure that all children receive a quality education. Our democracy, as well as our economy, depends on an educated citizenry and skilled workforce.

Too many policymakers, community leaders, and even parents still view schools and student learning as the sole responsibility of educators. While educators take their professional responsibilities seriously, they also recognize that they cannot do it alone. They need and depend on the support from parents and community members.

One dynamic too often observed is that parent involvement in education tends to decline as their children go up in grade, with a dramatic drop once students reach middle school. In fact, the lack of parental involvement is viewed by teachers, administrators, the public, and even parents of school-age children, as the single biggest problem facing our nation's schools. 10

To promote student growth and school success at every grade and age, well thought out parent-community-school partnerships, linked to school improvement goals, are needed in every community.

Epstein's Framework on Involvement

- Parenting. Assist families with parenting skills, family support, understanding child and adolescent development, and setting home conditions to support learning at each age and grade level. Assist schools in understanding families' backgrounds, cultures, and goals for children.
- Communicating. Communicate with families about school programs and student progress. Create two-way communication channels between school and home that are effective and reliable.
- Volunteering. Improve recruitment and training to involve families as volunteers and as audiences at the school or in other locations. Enable educators to work with volunteers who support students and the school. Provide meaningful work and flexible scheduling.
- Learning at Home. Involve families with their children in academic learning at home, including homework, goal setting, and other curriculum-related activities.
- Decision Making. Include families as participants in school decisions, governance, and advocacy activities through school councils or improvement teams, committees, and other organizations.
- Collaborating with the Community. Coordinate resources and services for families, students, and the school with community groups, including businesses, agencies, cultural and civic organizations, and colleges or universities.

What hinders involvement?

Parents see lots of roadblocks to getting involved in their child's education.¹¹ Some point to their own demanding schedules and say they don't have extra time to volunteer or even attend school activities, much less get involved in bigger ways. Others reveal how uncomfortable they feel when trying to communicate with school officials, whether that's due to language or cultural differences or their own past experiences with school. Some say they lack the know-how and resources to help their child, or they express frustration with school bureaucracies or policies they find impossible to understand or change.

Some parents complain that they rarely hear from the school unless there is a problem with their child's behavior or performance. Others say the information provided by the school is not comprehensible either because of educational jargon or because the parent or family member does not read or understand English.

Some families criticize school personnel for not understanding the plight of single parents, grandparents, foster parents, or other caregivers. Others say they lack transportation to attend school events or have no child care for younger siblings. While some schools have made great strides in engaging parents and others in the educational process, there is still much more that can be done.

How can we engage more stakeholders?

Here are some specific ways that schools can engage more parents, families, and communities in education:

- Survey educators and families to determine needs, interests, and ideas about partnering.
- Develop and pass family-friendly policies and laws [i.e., leaves of absence for parents/caregivers to participate in school or education-related activities; flexible scheduling to encourage participation by diverse families].
- Provide professional development on family and community engagement for school faculties.
- Offer training for parents and community stakeholders on effective communications and partnering skills.
- Provide better information on school and school district policies and procedures.
- Ensure timely access to information, using effective communications tools that address various family structures and are translated into languages that parents/families understand.
- Hire and train school-community liaisons who know the communities' history, language, and cultural background to contact parents and coordinate activities.
- Collaborate with higher education institutions to infuse parent, family, and community involvement in education into teacher and administrator preparation programs.
- Develop an outreach strategy to inform families, businesses, and the community about school and family involvement opportunities, policies, and programs.
- Regularly evaluate the effectiveness of family involvement programs and activities.

There are a number of parent-family-community-school partnerships that have documented their results:

The National Network of Partnership Schools (NNPS) recognizes schools, districts, states, and organizations that demonstrate excellence and continual progress in

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developing and sustaining comprehensive, goal-oriented programs of school, family, and community partnerships. Some 600 NNPS Partnership Award winners have been recognized since 1998 for programs and practices that improve family and community involvement resulting in increased student achievement and other indicators of success in school.¹²

The Parent-Teacher Home Visit Project is a partnership between the Sacramento City Teachers Association, a faith-based community organizing group, and the school district. Since 1998, teams of educators and parents have visited students and their families at home, built trusting relationships, and shared instructional tools. Evaluations of the project report increased parental involvement, improved parent/teacher relationships, and improved academic achievement.¹³

The **Chicago Parent Centers** model has been cited as evidence that parent participation has a major impact on children's academic success and social development, and that it is a sure strategy for reducing the dropout rate. Each year that parents took part in the program increased the chances—by 16 percent—that their child would complete high school. For students whose parents were involved for the whole six years of the project, more than 80 percent graduated from high school, compared with 38 percent of students whose parents did not participate.¹⁴

Since 1987, more than 375,000 immigrant parents in California have increased their knowledge and skills to support their children's academic achievement and enrollment in higher education by participating in the Parent Institute for Quality Education (PIQE) program. Since then, PIQE programs have expanded to other cities in Arizona, Texas, and Minnesota. A recent study documented that children of Hispanic parents who completed the San Diego PIQE program achieved a 93 percent high school graduation rate and 79.2 percent student enrollment in college or university.¹⁵

Call to Action

NEA believes that significantly more emphasis must be placed on the important roles that parents, families, and communities can and must play in raising student performance and closing achievement gaps. The Association has long advocated policies to assist and encourage parents, families, and communities to become actively engaged in their public schools and become an integral part of school improvement efforts.

While some states and school districts have enacted laws and policies to encourage parent-community-school partnerships, more enforcement is needed. At the same time, promising, locally developed practices should be rewarded, sustained, and expanded.







Subject: HB1137, an act relative to the duty of school boards to provide education

Dear Honorable Members of the House Education Committee,

I am representing the School District Governance Association of New Hampshire (SDGA) in support of HB1137. I have served as the Chairman of the Kensington School Board, where I consistently put much effort into ensuring that the Board performed its educational duties. This effort included refuting misinformation purporting that it is not appropriate for a School Board to set educational goals for its School District. Of course, the truth is that it is the affirmative duty of a School Board to set educational goals for its District, and to follow up on them, as set forth in administrative rule Ed 303.01(g), which states that each School Board shall:

In consultation with the superintendent and in accordance with statutes and rules of the state board of education, [1] determine the educational goals of the district, [2] develop long-range plans and [3] identify measurable and attainable short-term objectives. The school board shall [4] require the implementation of educational programs designed to reflect the goals and objectives and, further, the school board shall [5] review such programs and [6] make public the results of such investigation; (numbers added)

The SDGA studied the performance of these six Ed 303.01(g) educational duties by three New Hampshire School Boards over several school years. The School Boards were: Exeter Region Cooperative, Laconia, and Timberlane. The school years were 2018-2019 to the present. The SDGA wrote to each School Board informing it of the study and inviting the Board's input. None was received. In parallel, each of the three Superintendents received a right-to-know request for government records documenting the performance of the six specific educational duties. The Superintendents of Exeter and Laconia replied point-by-point and supplied specific responsive records. The Timberlane Superintendent referred the requester to an online corpus of records. The SDGA reported its study results to the respective School Boards to give them an opportunity to respond. No response was received.

SDGA's Findings Relevant to HB1137

Based on the government records SDGA was able to obtain and identify, we derived findings that are relevant to HB1137. These are:

- 1. None of the examined School Boards fully performed its educational duties required by rule Ed 303.01(g).
- 2. In general, the School Boards determined educational goals, developed long-range plans, and identified short-term objectives, though there were some lapses in these. However, in no case was the SDGA able to identify records showing that an examined School Board had performed its duties to require the implementation of educational programs designed to reflect the District's goals and objectives; to review such programs; or, to make public the results of such investigation.
- 3. In some cases, the School Administrative Unit performed some of the duties of the District School Board.

SDGA Supports HB1137

The SDGA supports HB1137 because it would improve the performance of School Boards' educational duties in the following ways.

- 1. HB1137 would make the educational duties of School Boards more specific, and thereby make these duties more clear to all, and therefore more likely to be performed.
- 2. The enumeration of School Board educational duties in HB1137 would shift the oversight of education away from the unelected administrations and toward the elected School Boards where it belongs.
- 3. HB1137's promotion of parental engagement and school transparency, as well as the requirement of annual parental surveys, would make the educational work of School Boards more responsive to families and the public.

SDGA's Assessments of Performance of Educational Duties

The following tables list SDGA's findings from the government records obtained by right-to-know request. The green "Board" entries indicate that the school board performed its duty, at least minimally. The yellow "Admin" entries indicate that the district school board did not perform this duty, instead the administration performed it. The red "Not Done" entries indicate that no records were found for the performance of these duties. For example, the Exeter Superintendent responded that "No records exist" for the performance of duties marked "Not Done". The "TBD" entries reflect that the 2021-2022 school year is not yet behind us. The Timberlane entries marked "?" indicate the SDGA did not make a determination, due to less cooperation than was received from the other Superintendents.

ANALYSIS

This bill states the duties and responsibilities of elected school boards and allows school boards to contract with any private school approved by the school board as a school tuition program.

Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

- School Boards; Duty to Provide Education. Amend RSA 189:1-a to read as follows:
 Duty to Provide Education.
 - I. It shall be the duty of the school board to provide, at district expense, elementary and secondary education to all pupils who reside in the district until such time as the pupil has acquired a high school diploma or has reached age 21, whichever occurs first; provided, that the board may exclude specific pupils for gross misconduct or for neglect or refusal to conform to the reasonable rules of the school, and further provided that this section shall not apply to pupils who have been exempted from school attendance in accordance with RSA 193:5.
 - II. Elected school boards shall be responsible for approving and overseeing the structure, content, accountability, advocacy, and delivery of instruction in each school operated and governed in its district. To support flexibility in implementing diverse educational approaches, school boards shall establish, in each school operated and governed in its district, instructional policies that establish instructional goals based upon available information about the knowledge and skills pupils will need in the future. To accomplish these ends, the school board shall be responsible for:
 - (a) The curricula, online instructional programs and applications, and courses taught.
 - (b) Textbook approvals.
 - (c) Adoption of any educational standards that meet or exceed state minimum standards following a public hearing.
 - (d) Evidence-based and measurable methods for assessing student performance in grade spans 3-5 and 6-8 in school years in which a statewide assessment is not given to meet the requirements of RSA 193-C.
 - III. Elected school boards shall:
 - (a) Develop, implement, and assess district policies which shall be voted on by the board in public session.
 - (b) Conduct all meetings of the board and board-established committees in public pursuant to RSA 91-A, the right-to-know law.
 - (c) Conform to standards of ethical behavior.
 - (d) Approve the proposed district annual budget.

A school board may consider any resources it deems reasonable and appropriate, including any resources that may be provided by the state department of education. In this paragraph, "teacher" shall have the same meaning as in RSA 189:14-a, V.

[IV.] VI. Pursuant to RSA 193:3, VI, a school board may execute a contract with any [approved nonsectarian] private school approved by the school board as a school tuition program as defined in RSA 193:3, VII to provide for the education of a child who resides in the school district, and may raise and appropriate money for the purposes of the contract, if the school district does not have a public school at the pupil's grade level and the school board decides it is in the best interest of the pupil.

2 Effective Date. This act shall take effect 30 days after its passage.
