This bill would repeal the Granite State Paid Family Leave Plan (FMLI) that was included in the omnibus HB 2 this past year (Ch. 91:139, Laws of 2021). That plan has significant deficiencies, many unanswered questions, and is no longer needed. The plan would require taxpayers to pay for FMLI for 11,000 state employees (at a cost yet unknown), at no cost to the employee. The bill would give the potential private employers who sign up a 50% tax break for premiums paid, yet the impact on tax revenues is unknown. The number of private businesses interested in purchasing this insurance is unknown. Over the years, this FMLI will morph into a public sector benefit/entitlement paid for by taxpayers. Finally, insurance carriers have recently filed plans to the Insurance Department to offer this type of insurance in NH, whether the state moves forward with the state's FMLI plan or not. This proves the private market already can and will provide FMLI type insurance through the free market without bureaucracy's involvement. Since the FMLI plan will not be implemented any earlier than the end of 2022, we have the opportunity to remove it from the books before it is forever ensconced into law.

Dear Chairman Infantine and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for considering my testimony. My name is Ronnieann Rakoski and I am the Policy and Planning Director of the New Hampshire Council on Developmental Disabilities (DD Council). I'm providing testimony on behalf of the DD Council membership, which believes this bill has a negative impact on the disability community.

Our Council, by law is comprised of at least 60% people with developmental disabilities and parents or guardians of people with developmental disabilities, most whom are volunteers advocating for disability justice.

The DD Council is a federally funded agency that is dedicated to dignity, full rights of citizenship, cultural diversity, equal opportunities, and full participation for all NH citizens with developmental disabilities. The DD Council carries out its mission through education, advocacy and collaboration on initiatives, that encourage full integration and inclusion of individuals with developmental disabilities as required in the Developmental Disabilities Assistance and Bill of Rights Act (2000). Access to quality services and resources that provide assistance to caregivers of people with disabilities is an important part of our five-year plan.

The DD Council membership believes strongly that repealing the Granite State paid family leave plan will create unnecessary hardships for individuals and families with extenuating health considerations who are eligible for paid leave under this plan. This law allows for individuals to provide and care for their families or loved ones temporarily without fear of losing their entire income. The plan eases the financial burden of being out of work to care for a family member by providing 60% of wages for a period up to six weeks, for covered workers. This is a benefit to individuals and families impacted by disabilities.

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

In the Year of Our Lord Two Thousand Twenty Two

AN ACT

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repealing the Granite State paid family leave plan.

Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

1 Insurance; Allocation of State Premium Tax. Amend RSA 400-A:32, III to read as follows:
2 III.(a) Except as provided in [subparagraphs] subparagraph (b) [and (c)], the taxes
3 imposed in paragraphs I and II of this section shall be promptly forwarded by the commissioner to

4 the state treasurer for deposit to the general fund.

- (b) Taxes imposed attributable to premiums written for medical and other medical related services for the newly eligible Medicaid population as provided for under RSA 126-AA shall be deposited into the New Hampshire granite advantage health care trust fund established in RSA 126-AA:3. The commissioner shall notify the state treasurer of sums for deposit into the New Hampshire granite advantage health care trust fund no later than 30 days after receipt of said taxes. The moneys in the trust fund may be used for the administration of the New Hampshire granite advantage health care program, established in RSA 126-AA.
- [(e) Taxes imposed on premiums written by duly authorized insurance companies for family and medical leave insurance written in connection with the administration of RSA 21 I:99 through RSA 21 I:111 or RSA 282-B shall be deposited into the FMLI premium stabilization trust fund established in RSA 282-B.5. The commissioner shall notify the state treasurer of sums for deposit into the FMLI premium stabilization trust fund no later than 30 days after receipt of said taxes.]
 - 2 Repeal. The following are repealed:
 - I. RSA 21-I:99-111, relative to the Granite State paid family leave plan.
 - II. RSA 77-E:3-e, relative to the Granite State paid family leave plan tax credit.
 - III. RSA 282-B, relative to purchasing pool for family and medical leave insurance.
- IV. RSA 275:37-d, relative to discrimination against employees utilizing certain family and medical leave insurance.
- V. RSA 6:12, I(b)(374)-(375), relative to the FMLI premium fund and premium stabilization trust fund.
 - 3 Effective Date. This act shall take effect 60 days after its passage.
