Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

- 1 Committee Established. There is established a committee to study the New Hampshire law relative to soil conditioners.
  - 2 Membership and Compensation.
    - I. The members of the committee shall be as follows:
  - (a) Three members of the house of representatives, appointed by the speaker of the house of representatives.
    - (b) One member of the senate, appointed by the president of the senate.
  - II. Members of the committee shall receive mileage at the legislative rate when attending to the duties of the committee.
    - 3 Duties. The committee shall review RSA 431 and assess the following:
    - I. Are statutes consistent with current agricultural practices?
    - II. Are all terms appropriately defined, including the term "soil conditioner"?
- III. Are all fees directed to appropriate, specific purposes supporting agriculture?
  - 4 Chairperson; Quorum. The members of the study committee shall elect a chairperson from among the members. The first meeting of the committee shall be called by the first-named house member. The first meeting of the committee shall be held within 90 days of the effective date of this section. Three members of the committee shall constitute a quorum.
  - 5 Report. The committee shall report its findings and any recommendations for proposed legislation to the speaker of the house of representatives, the president of the senate, the house clerk, the senate clerk, the governor, and the state library on or before November 1, 2022.
- 21 6 Effective Date. This act shall take effect upon its passage.

has had only minor revisions in the last two decades. One of our roles as legislators is to make sure that our state's laws are appropriate to current agricultural practices, scientific knowledge, and broad legal context at both the state and federal level.

In reading through this chapter, I am concerned about several issues.

First, the term in the chapter title, "soil conditioners," is not defined.

Furthermore, the definitions do not take into account requirements of the National Organic Program even though state law requires compliance for anyone selling products labeled as organic.

There may be other deviations from federal fertilizer regulations or definitions that I was unable to investigate.

The definitions concerning compost and what exactly counts as fertilizer are unclear. Under some definitions, it seems that compost would be considered fertilizer, and under others it would not.

The newly added definition related to plant biostimulants is somewhat unclear, and it is even less clear how it fits into the regulatory framework of this chapter.

Fertilizers and soil conditioners clearly impact soil properties, and the scientific understanding of soils has grown substantially since this chapter last had a significant revision. We need to hear from soil experts on whether there are elements that need to be revised.

The registration fees collected under this chapter are sent to the general fund as unrestricted income. Penalties also go to the general fund. There is no indiction of how the work of analyzing fertilizer samples, verifying and approving labels, and taking enforcement action gets paid for. While I think sending penalties to the general fund make sense to avoid the appearance of the department profiting
