Building on the complementary missions of Granite State College and UNH-Manchester, this bill combines institutional strengths to establish a single, merged college located in the Manchester-Concord corridor. The merged entity will retain the name Granite State College (GSC) and will comprise a new college within UNH. The new GSC will continue to serve its existing student body comprised of both traditional and non-traditional undergraduates and graduate students while applying increased focus on the growing opportunity to provide affordable programs of all types to adult and working professional students. Leadership of the combined entities will be consolidated under the President of UNH. The previous president of GSC is now Chancellor of the Community College System of New Hampshire. Testimony of Catherine Provencher, Chief Administrative Officer, USNH Mike Decelle, Dean, UNH Manchester and Granite State College

Thank you for the opportunity to speak with you today about the future of the University System.

As members of this committee are aware, the University System has been diligently working to address the many headwinds facing higher education in the Northeast to continue meeting our mission of providing access to affordable, high-quality public higher education for the citizens of New Hampshire. We believe HB 1218 is an important piece of that work and want to share our thanks to Representative Ladd, the members of the Public Higher Education Study Committee and other sponsors of the legislation for their help in developing this careful change to our governing statute.

Currently, Granite State College, a component of the University System, and UNH Manchester, a college of UNH, successfully pursue very similar missions focused largely on professional studies and non-traditional students. Because of these similarities, however, the colleges often compete for students while duplicating resources on instruction, administration, and facilities. Most simply this legislation will allow us to address this duplication through the establishment of a single college of professional studies that we believe will better serve our students while reducing costs across the university system.

We want to emphasize three important points:

1) We intended to preserve the name as well as the important identity of Granite State College. As such, enrollment to GSC will remain open access and tuition rates will remain lower than the other programs in the system. We recognize the importance of these principles to our students and partners, including the Community College System and the business community.

- 2) While this bill most directly impacts GSC and UNH, the combined technological infrastructure of these two institutions will be a tremendous asset to Keene State College and Plymouth State University, creating an IT framework that will allow all our campuses to bring their programs online more effectively and broaden our reach.
- 3) We do not anticipate any forced layoffs as a part of this merger.

This proposal was developed by a cross-section of the USNH community, including most notably Granite State College's former president and the current leadership team, GSC alumni trustees and a student trustee, as well as the presidents and leadership teams of UNH, Plymouth State University and Keene State College, and ultimately supported by a unanimous vote of the USNH Board of Trustees. Further, as mentioned earlier, the bill has been recommended and cosponsored by all the members of the joint Public Higher Education Study Committee following a series of meetings last fall.

HB 1218 will allow the university system to better serve our students, and in turn the state, by providing affordable, accessible, aligned, and integrated higher education to any student seeking a degree or credential. It is an important step in a necessary evolution of the university system that we are confident will aid us in strengthening our institutions and preserving their benefits for future generations.

8 State College and University System; Public Higher Education Study Committee. Amend RSA 187-A:28-a to read as follows:

187-A:28-a Public Higher Education Study Committee. Educational opportunity in New Hampshire must involve all the components of education. The general court acknowledges that education does not start or end at any particular point. There is hereby established a permanent public higher education study committee for the state of New Hampshire. The study committee shall be composed of 8 members and shall examine the goals, purposes, organization, and financing of public higher education in New Hampshire, and shall evaluate and make recommendations on the university of New Hampshire, Plymouth state university, Keene state college, [the Granite state eollege,] and the community college system of New Hampshire.

- 187-A:28-a Public Higher Education Study Committee. Educational opportunity in New Hampshire must involve all the components of education. The general court acknowledges that education does not start or end at any particular point. There is hereby established a permanent public higher education study committee for the state of New Hampshire. The study committee shall be composed of 8 members and shall examine the goals, purposes, organization, and financing of public higher education in New Hampshire, and shall evaluate and make recommendations on the university of New Hampshire, Plymouth state university, Keene state college, [the Granite state college,] and the community college system of New Hampshire.
 - 9 Motor Vehicles; Multi-use Decal Plates. Amend RSA 261-B:9, XII to read as follows:

METHODOLOGY:

This bill establishes Granite State College (GSC) as a division within the University of New Hampshire (UNH) and would amend other relevant statutes to reflect attendant administrative and governance changes. The repeal of RSA 187-A:11, II-a, specifically, which establishes GSC as "a body corporate and politic," would be effective July 1, 2023, with the remainder of the act effective upon passage. The fiscal impact on University System of New Hampshire (System) operations is indeterminable as a number of workstreams are being addressed concurrently (e.g., online delivery, accreditation, facilities, programming, etc.). The System states increases to its operating expense to migrate and align GSC and UNH systems are expected in the short term, and savings and added revenue are expected in the long term with the consolidation of duplicative resources and programs and growth in online offerings once fully integrated. Some level of "full integration" is expected by FY 2024, when GSC will no longer offer degrees on its own.
