Amendment to HB 1235-FN

Amend the bill by replacing all after the enacting clause with the following:

- 1 Crime Victims Assistance; Claimant Eligibility. Amend RSA 21-M:8-h, V to read as follows:
- V. The claimant may be reimbursed for reasonable out-of-pocket expenses, medical expenses, funeral expenses, counseling expenses, rehabilitative expenses, expenses associated with the victim's participation in post-conviction proceedings and victim-offender dialogue programs or other restorative justice programs, and lost wages directly resulting from the crime. Claimants eligible under subparagraph I(a)(4) may be reimbursed for the costs of removing the tattoo with an identifying mark. No reimbursement shall be paid unless the claimant has incurred reimbursable expenses of at least \$100. There shall be a [\$40,000] \$50,000 maximum recovery per claimant per incident. If expenses paid through the victims' assistance program fund are later covered by insurance settlements, civil suit settlements, or restitution, or through any other source, the claimant shall reimburse the fund for the amount of expenses recovered.
 - 2 FRM Victims' Contribution Recovery Fund; Appropriation Amended. Amend 2021, 91:85 to read as follows:
 - 91:85 Appropriation; FRM Victims' Contribution Recovery Fund. For the purpose of awarding recovery assistance to victims of the FRM fraud, there is hereby appropriated the sum of \$5,000,000 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2022, and the sum of \$5,000,000 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2023, to the FRM victims' contribution recovery fund established in RSA 359-P:2. Any unused funds remaining on July 1, 2024 shall be credited to the victims' assistance fund established in RSA 21-M:8-h. The governor is authorized to draw a warrant for said sums out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated.
- 3 FRM Victims' Contribution Recovery Fund; Repeal Date Extended. Amend 2016, 293:7, I to read as follows:
 - I. Sections 4 through 6 of this act shall take effect July 1, [2023] 2024.
- 4 Effective Date. This act shall take effect 60 days after its passage.

Rep. Meuse

Introduced the bill that increases the maximum recover amount from \$40,000 to \$50,000 and extends the period. It also reduces the payments to the FRM victims and deals with money left in the FRM fund after 2024

Q: Alexander Why increase by \$10,000?

Ans: I don't know about the specific amount, but we've had several reviews of the maximum amount and we've looked at who can qualify for it. Part of the intent is to ensure money is available to crime victims.

Q DiLorenzo: Why is FRM recovery included?

Ans: I'm not really sure.

Q I am concerned the FRM money comes out of the state budget, and I don't think that is appropriate.

Q Horrigan: Does that cap apply to the FRM victims?

Ans: That is my understanding, and it also limits claims to 50 cents on the dollar to prevent people subject to very large losses from draining the fund.

Q Chase: How do non-FRM claimants get money?

Ans: I'm not quite sure. I believe it is administered by the Attorney General's office.

Rep Walz:

The need to raise the threshold from 40 to 50 thousand is just because the price of everything goes up and 50 thousand isn't a huge amount by any means, The tie to the FRM situation is to treat The FRM victims the same as other crime victims. That is why he directs whatever is left in the FRM fund to go into this fund.

Q Sylvia: Relative to the FRM case, what charges/convictions were there?

Ans: people were charged and are still in prison over it. There are both criminal and civil issues and the civil issues are my primary concern.

Q Gordon: Rep Meuse says the \$50,000 cap would apply to the FRM victims and the remainder would be transferred to the victims' fund?

Ans: My intent is for victims to receive more money.

Colleagues:

I do not know if it came out in the hearing, but I wanted to make a couple of points with you. If 1235 passes, it disrupts a couple of ongoing settlements. Finance has had a couple of hearings on the settlements by the AG with the sexual abuses at the Sunu nu Center. The AG has set 100 million dollars in a fund for settlements. There are 435 cases filed so far, and the AG is looking at histories from other states to try to guess what the size of settlements will be. This bill interferes with that process. Additionally, we put ten million dollars in the budget for settlement of the FRM Case. This is a case that has been ongoing for ten years. Hundreds of millions were lost by investors relying on the AG and the Banking Commissioner for accurate information about the FRM. State employees lied and covered up the charges against FRM, which should have shut it down. The amounts of the settlements will depend on the individual investors loss, and will like be about 10%. This 1235 will also interfere with current legislation by attempts to set one limit. A sponsor of the bill has spent ten years trying to defeat any awards to FRM victims.

Please for these reasons make HB 1235 Inexpedient to Legislate.

ANALYSIS

This bill increases the maximum recovery per claimant under the victims' assistance fund and establishes a maximum recovery amount for victims under the FRM victims contribution recovery fund. The bill also extends the repeal date of the FRM victims contribution recovery fund.

- I. Except as otherwise provided in this chapter, a claimant shall be eligible for recovery assistance at the rate of 50 cents on each dollar lost by the claimant under this chapter, with a maximum recovery amount equal to the maximum recovery permitted under RSA 21-M:8-h, if the claimant:

- V. Recovery assistance shall be limited to 50 cents on each dollar lost on the amount of the claimant's original investment, with a maximum recovery amount equal to the maximum recovery permitted under RSA 21-M:8-h.

METHODOLOGY:

This bill increases the maximum recovery per claimant under the victims' assistance fund and establishes a maximum recovery amount for victims under the FRM victims contribution recovery fund. The bill also extends the repeal date of the FRM victims contribution recovery fund.

The Department of Justice indicates this bill would raise the cap for victim assistance claims by \$10,000, from \$40,000 to \$50,000. The bill adds language to limit the maximum award permitted from the FRM victims' contribution recovery fund established by RSA 359-P:2 to equal the maximum recovery amount allowed pursuant to RSA 21-M:8-h and it transfers any balance remaining in the FRM fund to the victim assistance fund as of July 1, 2024. The Department states the number of claims received through FRM and/or the Victim Assistance cannot be determined in advance. Therefore, both revenue and expenditure fiscal impact is indeterminable.
