STATEMENT OF INTENT

This bill seeks to make explicit the commitment of the Land and Community Heritage Investment Program (LCHIP) to the conservation of farming across New Hampshire by adding the word "agriculture" to the LCHIP statement of purpose, by adding to the LCHIP board a member representing agricultural interests, and by providing additional revenue to LCHIP by transfer of one quarter of a percent of annual proceeds from the real estate transfer tax. Testimony on HB 1450-FN

Honorable Members of the Ways and Means Committee:

At the outset I should say that this bill isn't intended to alter the conservation program of the Land and Community Heritage Program so much as it is intended to formalize agricultural resources as a worthy statewide priority for conservation.

I want to recognize the invaluable work that the Land and Community Heritage Investment Program already does with farm conservation under its natural resource rubric. By formalizing agriculture as a priority area written into law, I don't foresee or intend to rethink the organization's strategizing on the choices that it makes, which are based on well thought out criteria and networking with a large number of stakeholder organizations and citizens across New Hampshire. But what I do want to do is give agriculture organizations, and groups that represent diverse farming interests and local food interests, a seat at the table when prioritizing how best to conserve the state's resources.

In the background to this bill are the demographic challenges facing New Hampshire farms, where nearly one third of farmers are 65 or over and most of these are farming without a younger farmer alongside them ready to take over the operations, or a plan for succession, (American Farmland Trust, 2012). This data suggests that the future of farming in NH may be facing uncertainty that could hurt our state's character and quality of life, and so it is important to take steps to ensure that at the appropriate time there is a way forward, including increased use of agricultural easements, for interested parties to ensure that these properties remain as farms rather than convert to other uses.

Why is it important to conserve farms? I think it goes beyond the scenic value of having farms remain a part of the landscape, although that too is important. I believe it is a strategic goal for the state to retain as much food self-sufficiency as we can for several reasons. We've seen what the Covid pandemic has done to supply chains and distribution of goods across the country. Having our food sourced from local farms means less exposure to the disruptions of supply that may come with future climate change events and God forbid, an even worse pandemic than the one we are currently still in. Also, local food is healthy food, by and large, and one of the hidden costs in our society that again we are seeing play out tragically in the pandemic is our over-reliance on industrially produced, highly processed foods coming from afar, sometimes very far, that are the exact opposite of local food produced on small farms that are answerable to a clientele of friends and neighbors and fellow citizens. The US industrial food system, although producing an abundance of cheap, questionably nutritious food, also leads to

epidemic levels of obesity and chronic disease that makes our country one of the unhealthiest in the world, with a falling life expectancy rate, due in part to our junk food diet. Retaining our farm landscape as a working landscape, supplying products to local as well as export markets, is the first step to ensure that NH citizens can rely on local healthy food options now and in the future. Currently, it is estimated that NH farms could support about 6 percent of the state's population with local food, one of the lowest percentages in New England. It's imperative that we make efforts to increase that level of food security as a safeguard against future lean times, as well as the advantages of local food to greater health.

Local farms retain dollars in local economies that would otherwise flow out of state. Maintaining a base of viable, productive farms will greatly enhance NH in economic terms and in ways that our current economic accounting fails to measure, such as greater health, environmental services such as carbon sequestration, along with already mentioned scenic value. Local agriculture already contributes significantly to New Hampshire's economic output, despite the challenges facing the state's farmers. NH has more than 4,000 farms covering 470,000 acres. The state estimates the agricultural industry supports more than 20,000 jobs with an economic value of some \$850 million. This includes \$479 million in direct sales of agricultural and other horticultural products and services and \$372 million in direct spending by agriculture related tourists, (NH Dept. of Agriculture).

Increasing those numbers relies on many factors, but an essential component will be increasing the ability of young and beginning farmers to access agricultural land, and that will depend on retaining our existing farms as productive parts of the economy as the current generation of farmers looks to pass on their holdings.

Market forces work against farm retention, and we see that becoming especially true given recent hikes in land speculation, and spiking land prices. Agricultural land values are increasing at a 7 percent year to year rate not seen in over a decade, according to the US Dep of Agriculture's 2021 Land Values Summary Report. New Hampshire sits at the high end of variation across the country, given our Northeastern location. All the more reason that there is an additional funding mechanism attached to the bill that would increase the LCHIP's ability to fund a wide array of projects going forward and help meet the state's strategic conservation needs in a fiscally responsible fashion.

And with that I'll conclude my comments and I'm willing to take questions.

Testimony regarding HB 1450 -FN - Including agricultural resources under the Land and Community Heritage Investment Program

Before the House Ways and Means Committee

January 20, 2022

Mr. Chair, Mr. Vice Chair, and Members of the Committee:

On behalf of the Board of Directors of the Land and Community Heritage Investment Program, thank you for this opportunity to speak to HB 1450-FN. LCHIP supports the efforts of Representatives Caplan, Bixby, and Stavis to increase the pace of agricultural land conservation in New Hampshire, and to support the good work that LCHIP has been doing for twenty years. HB 1450-FN as introduced proposes three changes, which I will address in turn: adding the term "agriculture" to various sections of the LCHIP statute; providing additional funding through the Real Property Transfer Tax, and adding a seat to the LCHIP Board of Directors.

Since LCHIP's inception in 2001, the legislature's intent that LCHIP prioritize farmland, as well as wildlife habitat, working forestland, drinking water supply lands, and land for recreation, has been clear. In its first twenty years, LCHIP has supported the permanent conservation of 227 properties across the state. Of those, 93 included farmland conservation. In fact, 41% of all land conservation projects funded by LCHIP have included farmland protection.

While during that same time period LCHIP has, unfortunately, had to turn down more than 250 worthy and eligible land conservation proposals, only 13 farms seeking LCHIP funding have not received LCHIP support. LCHIP's record of agricultural conservation is strong.

Naturally with so many worthy projects not receiving funding, LCHIP welcomes the possibility of increased funding. The new funding mechanism proposed would supplement LCHIP's existing source, and may require we make some minor administrative changes, but there is no doubt that any increase in funding would be welcomed and well-used. For that reason, we leave it to the Legislature to evaluate the source and mechanism proposed.

Finally, HB 1450-FN proposes adding a ninth public member to the LCHIP Board of Directors, to be appointed by the Governor and Council and represent agricultural interests. LCHIP welcomes the expansion of its Board of Directors, which will strengthen representation of agricultural interests.

In closing, I would like to thank the members of the committee for their time and attention to these matters, and for the opportunity to speak to you here today. I am happy to answer any questions you might have.

This bill includes agricultural resources under the land and community heritage investment program and requires an annual transfer from the real estate transfer tax revenue to the land and community heritage investment program trust fund.

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

In the Year of Our Lord Two Thousand Twenty Two

AN ACT including agricultural resources under the land and community heritage investment program.

Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

1 Purpose; Land and Community Heritage Investment Program. Amend RSA 227-M:1 to read 2 as follows:

227-M:1 Purpose. The general court finds that in order to maintain New Hampshire's quality of life and economic vitality for its citizens, growth and development should be balanced with careful protection of the state's most important natural, agricultural, cultural, and historical resources. Permanent protection of these resources, through acquisition of lands, buildings, and other physical assets, or interests in these assets, must be accomplished along with their planned long-term stewardship. The general court further recognizes the importance of public-private partnerships to achieve these ends. To protect and preserve New Hampshire's natural, agricultural, cultural, and historical resources for this and future generations, the general court establishes in this chapter the New Hampshire land and community heritage investment program. The intent of the program is to conserve and preserve this state's most important natural, agricultural, cultural, and historical resources through the acquisition of lands, and cultural and historical resources, or interests therein, of local, regional, and statewide significance, in partnership with the state's municipalities and the private sector, for the primary purposes of protecting and ensuring the perpetual contribution of these resources to the state's economy, environment, and overall quality of life.

- 2 Eligible Resource; Land and Community Heritage Investment Program. Amend RSA 227-M:2, V to read as follows:
- V. "Eligible resource" means a natural, *agricultural*, cultural, or historical resource including archaeological sites; historic buildings and structures which house cultural events and programs; historic properties including buildings and structures; historic and cultural lands and features; ecologically significant lands; existing and potential public water supply lands; farmland; forestland; habitat for rare species or important wildlife; wildlife corridors and habitat strongholds as defined in RSA 207:1; lands for recreation; riverine, lake, estuarine, and ocean shorelands; scenic areas and viewsheds; and wetlands and associated uplands.
- 3 Stewardship; Land and Community Heritage Investment Program. Amend RSA 227-M:2, VIII to read as follows:

METHODOLOGY:

This bill expands the Land and Community Heritage Investment Program (LCHIP) to include agricultural resources. It also requires an annual transfer of 1/4 percent of Real Estate Transfer Tax (RETT) to the LCHIP trust fund on July 1st each year starting July 1, 2022.

The Department of Revenue Administration (DRA)states the fiscal impact is an indeterminable decrease on the General and Educational Trust Funds as they are unable to predict the total revenues from RETT in future years. However, using FY 2021 cash basis RETT revenue data, the DRA can calculate the fiscal impact of the proposed legislation had the legislation been in place in a prior fiscal year. In FY 2021, total cash basis RETT revenue was \$202.7M. One quarter of one percent of total cash basis RETT revenue for FY 2021 is \$506,750. Thus, if the proposed legislation had been in place in a prior fiscal year, General and Education Trust Fund revenue would have been reduced by \$506,750. However, to the extent the LCHIP trust fund revenues are not used they will be lapsed back into the General Fund.

LCHIP states there would be an indeterminable decrease in RETT revenue and an indeterminable increase in the LCHIP Trust Fund. They also state there would be an

indeterminable increase in local revenue as some of the additional LCHIP funds might go to municipalities thus increasing their revenues.

New Hampshire Association of Counties states there would be no fiscal impact on county revenue or expenditures.

AGENCIES CONTACTED:

NH Department of Revenue Administration, New Hampshire Association of Counties and LCHIP
