Testimony. HB1521

Sponsor: Representative Linda Tanner, Sullivan District 9 representing the towns of Plainfield, Cornish, Grantham, Croydon, Newport, Springfield, Sunapee, and Unity

I am presently serving my 4th term on the House Education Committee. In the first 3 of those 4 terms I was provided a paper bound book with selected statutes, statutory notes and annotations related to education. As indicated by the publisher, this book included the full Text of Title XV, "education" and incorporated new legislation and amendments as enacted by the General Court in the last regular session. It also included a table containing the sections affected by the new legislation. The annotations close with the opinions, articles and notes of the Attorney General, the NH Bar Journal and the American Law Reports. In addition, the book had a comprehensive cross reference, table of contents, and extensive index. It was a wealth of knowledge!

My educational background and career has been in Education, not law. I was honored and excited to be chosen to serve on House Education. I feel my experience and knowledge of education is an important resource for this committee work. While teaching I often questioned and sometimes objected to the regulations and rules handed down from the State. As a Representative I am now aware of how those rules and regulations are formulated and enacted with more understanding but not without the frustration because of a the lack of connection between what is happening in our schools and what we legislate. Having information is essential to our job from listening to the people who are providing the services and education to having an understanding of the current laws and how they are applied.

As a lawmaker on the Education Committee, I was and still am intimidated by the complexity of language, structure, and procedures of working in the world of laws, education statutes, and Administrative Rules. I appreciate the tutorials from the Department of Education on certain topics like funding but being able to have the annotated law book gave me the opportunity to look through the many education statutes, gain insight to the changes in those laws, and see some of the court opinions. For example, I might look at the whole chapter on Charter Schools and see references to other statutes in other sections. I could see opinions, amendments and how particular laws had changed and when. There are court opinions sited that gave context to the law. The current website just doesn't give me that information or ability to look at parts of the educations laws both as a general overview or a specific section. As someone unfamiliar with the practice of law, I found this book invaluable. I still use the last edition I have from 2018-2019.

As a Representatives, you all know that we have no office, no specific library for our work, and, because of sheer numbers, limited access to research assistance. In order to do our work well, to fully

understand the large body of regulations for Education, and make informed decisions, we must have access to information. We, as legislators, need information based, not just on what we hear from a lobbyist, or receive from a local or national organization, or from people who have a self interest in maintaining or changing a certain statute, but on the law as written. We need information we can gather, explore, examine, and analyze that is at hand, complete, and in a format we can access readily or spend time exploring. That is why I have asked in this bill that what was once a standard practice and courtesy, to provide NH Education Laws Annotated paper bound book to the lawmakers on the House Education Committee (20) and the Senate Education Committee (5) now become a requirement for the Department of Education.
