I am writing to show my support for HB 205-FN relative to incarceration under a suspended sentence.

I believe incarcerated persons should be allowed to bring a petition to suspend their sentence 18 months prior to 2/3 of their minimum sentence. Currently, many incarcerated persons are not released after bringing their petition and approved because they have not completed the required program(s). If a person is allowed to bring a petition 18 months prior to 2/3 of their minimum sentence, they can be placed in the required program(s) in time for the approved release.

I also believe citizens of NH should not be paying for those individuals whose petition has been granted but are retained to complete required program(s). NH citizens are paying for an individual's incarceration for an additional 30 days to possibly over 12 months beyond the approved release date because the individual has not completed a required program that could be completed if they were allowed to bring their petitioner 18 months prior to their 2/3.

Dear Committee Members,

I write as a director at ReVision Energy, New Hampshire's largest clean energy company and an employee-owned B Corporation. We feel it is our responsibility as corporate citizens to support legislation that would make our criminal justice system more fair, especially to members of minority groups who have historically experienced far higher rates of incarceration for the same offenses which are often nonviolent and related to addiction. As a business seeking to employ more people in the trades, we also believe it is the state's best interest to support the rehabilitation of incarcerated people in any way possible so they can reenter society as productive, hard-working taxpaying citizens.

HB 205 would not change when someone could leave prison but simply allow them to apply for a suspended sentence a little earlier, thereby giving them more time to prepare for re-entry if their suspended sentence is granted. Such preparation is critical to successful re-entry, with people who are incarcerated needing to find housing, find a job, work to renew their driver's license and other necessary steps. This bill will help them re-enter successfully.

HB 598 would enable people to apply for parole after serving 50% of their minimum sentence. It doesn't mean they would be automatically granted parole or released from prison any sooner (parole boards would still consider each case individually) but it incentivizes rehabilitation and gives incarcerated people an earlier to make their case to the parole board. Once a person has been rehabilitated, it is actually counterproductive to keep them in prison longer. NH has one of the most extreme versions of "truth in sentencing" in the country. Even in the 1980s when other states adopted this type of policy like NH, they only required that people serve 70 or 80% of their minimum while NH has always required 100%; many states have reduced that number since. We believe NH's current policy is extreme, counterproductive, and expensive.

ANALYSIS

This bill amends the amount of time that must be served by a person incarcerated under a suspended sentence before petitioning for the suspension of the remainder of the sentence.

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

AN ACT relative to incarceration under a suspended sentence.

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Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

- 1 Incarceration Under a Suspended Sentence. Amend RSA 651:20, I(a) to read as follows:
- (a) Any person sentenced to state prison for a minimum term of 6 years or more shall not bring a petition to suspend sentence until such person [has served at least 4 years or 2/3 of his minimum sentence, whichever is greater,] is within 18 months of serving 2/3 of the minimum sentence, and not more frequently than every 3 years thereafter. Any person sentenced to state prison for a minimum term of less than 6 years shall not bring a petition to suspend sentence until such person has served at least 2/3 of the minimum sentence, or the petition has been authorized by the sentencing court. For the purposes of this subparagraph:
- 2 Effective Date. This act shall take effect 60 days after its passage.

METHODOLOGY:

This bill reduces the amount of time that must be served by a person incarcerated under a suspended sentence before the person may petition for suspension of the remainder of their sentence. The Department of Corrections indicates it cannot predict when current or future residents will petition the court to suspend their sentence or the outcome of such petitions. The Department expects the fiscal impact would be either no change or a decrease in expenditures.

The Judicial Branch indicates there may be an influx of petitions to suspend sentences from those newly eligible. It is not possible to estimate how many petitions there may be, but the Branch assumes any increase in workload would likely be absorbed by the Branch within existing resources.

It is assumed the fiscal impact of this bill will not occur until FY 2022.
