Dear Health and Human Services Committee,

Today you are hearing SB275 which has some housekeeping changes to the Opioid Abatement trust Fund Statutes.

As you hear this bill I would like you to consider making a few additional changes to the statute.

First and foremost, I would like you to consider eliminating the population penalty levied upon counties with regard to the 23 entities which were original litigants in the opioid lawsuits. 8 of our 10 counties are penalized by eliminating the population of any municipality within the county that were also litigants in the original national opioid lawsuit. As a result, each county receives less money from the settlement distributions if any municipality within it joined in the litigation.

The fact is that the counties and municipalities have vastly different programs which they offer, and which stand to be funded by these distributions going forward. The counties should not be penalized just because a municipality within that county decided to join in the original national lawsuit. For example, Sullivan County would be penalized the population of Claremont, yet Sullivan County still serves the people of Claremont in the county opioid abatement programs that they offer. The population penalty is not fair in this respect and I have attached language that could be attached as an amendment to fix this.

I have provided a spreadsheet which shows what the difference in allocation of distribution of settlement dollars for the McKinsey settlement would have meant to the counties had the population penalty not been in effect. Compare columns H and I to see the difference. For some counties the difference is quite meaningful because the population penalty (column G) is substantial. For instance, Strafford and Hillsborough county suffer a 49% population penalty because of the municipalities in their counties that decided to be part of the original national litigation.

You should also know that the 13 municipalities who were original litigants represent 50% of the opioid problem in our state. They recognized the problem early on, which is why they decided to join in on the national litigation. I must add too that if it weren't for these 23 entities participating in the litigation, New Hampshire would not have received anything from these lawsuits!

Additionally, language with regard to the allocation calculation needs to be spelled out and clarified in the statute.

Finally, RSA126-A:84 IV and VI need to be changed to reflect annual reporting and remove the 2020 year mentioned in current statute.

### Suggested amendment to SB275

- 1. OpioidAbatementTrustFund.RSA126-:83,II is repealed and reenacted to read as follows:
- II. Prior to any deposit in the consumer escrow account or the opioid abatement trust fund, the treasurer shall distribute funds to the counties and political subdivisions that filed lawsuits, on or before September1,2019, against opioid manufacturers, distributors and other persons identified as defendants in the multi-district opioid litigation pending in the federal district court for the northern district of Ohio according to the formula described in this paragraph. The distribution shall occur on an annual basis. The distribution of funds shall be based on the most recent decennial census population of each qualifying county and political subdivision that joined the national litigation prior to September1,2019, according to the following formula: the distribution shall be calculated by multiplying the settlement amount by the population factor and the allocation factor; where the population factor is derived by dividing each qualifying county's and municipality's population by the state's total population, and the allocation factor is set at 15 percent.
- 2. Opioid Abatement Trust Fund; Management and Distribution of Funds. RSA126-A:84,II(a) is repealed and reenacted to read as follows:
- (a) Funds shall be distributed to the counties and subdivisions in accordance with the formula identified in RSA126-A:83,II. This distribution shall occur not later than 90 days after the state receives proceeds from opioid-related settlements or judgments.
- 3 Opioid Abatement Trust Fund; Management and Distribution of Funds. Amend RSA126-A:84,IV to read as follows:
- IV. **Annually**, on or before September 1,[<del>2020,</del>] each county, city, town or program that receives funds under paragraph II shall [<del>annually</del>] provide to the department of health and human services and the opioid abatement advisory commission a detailed account of all monies spent on approved uses, including, but limited to, an analysis and evaluation of the projects and programs it has funded.
- 4. Opioid Abatement Trust Fund; Management and Distribution of Funds. Amend RSA126-A:84, VI to read as follows:
- VI. **Annually**, on or before November 1,[<del>2020,</del>] the commissioner of the department of health and human services shall submit an annual report to the governor and fiscal committee of the general court detailing the activities of the advisory commission, the administration of the opioid abatement trust fund, the amount distributed in the past year, the amount remaining in the trust fund, a summary of how funds were used in the past year, and any recommendations for future legislation.

The projects outlined in the statute outline recovery and treatment efforts but does not include prevention-based programs. SB 275 would fix that.

Fortunately, New Hampshire has a robust infrastructure of community and school-based prevention organizations that work to educate and support individuals and communities to prevent the use and misuse of drugs and the development of substance use disorders. Prevention is a part of the full continuum of care for substance use disorders, along with treatment and recovery, and as such, it should be reflected in the duties of the Opioid Abatement Trust Fund.

### Suggested amendment to SB275

- 1. OpioidAbatementTrustFund.RSA126-:83,II is repealed and reenacted to read as follows:
- II. Prior to any deposit in the consumer escrow account or the opioid abatement trust fund, the treasurer shall distribute funds to the counties and political subdivisions that filed lawsuits, on or before September1,2019, against opioid manufacturers, distributors and other persons identified as defendants in the multi-district opioid litigation pending in the federal district court for the northern district of Ohio according to the formula described in this paragraph. The distribution shall occur on an annual basis. The distribution of funds shall be based on the most recent decennial census population of each qualifying county and political subdivision that joined the national litigation prior to September1,2019, according to the following formula: the distribution shall be calculated by multiplying the settlement amount by the population factor and the allocation factor; where the population factor is derived by dividing each qualifying county's and municipality's population by the state's total population, and the allocation factor is set at 15 percent.
- 2. Opioid Abatement Trust Fund; Management and Distribution of Funds. RSA126-A:84,II(a) is repealed and reenacted to read as follows:
- (a) Funds shall be distributed to the counties and subdivisions in accordance with the formula identified in RSA126-A:83,II. This distribution shall occur not later than 90 days after the state receives proceeds from opioid-related settlements or judgments.
- 3 Opioid Abatement Trust Fund; Management and Distribution of Funds. Amend RSA126-A:84,IV to read as follows:
- IV. *Annually*, on or before September 1,[2020,] each county, city, town or program that receives funds under paragraph II shall [annually] provide to the department of health and human services and the opioid abatement advisory commission a detailed account of all monies spent on approved uses, including, but limited to, an analysis and evaluation of the projects and programs it has funded.
- 4. Opioid Abatement Trust Fund; Management and Distribution of Funds. Amend RSA126-A:84, VI to read as follows:

#### **ANALYSIS**

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Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

- 1 Opioid Abatement Trust Fund. Amend RSA 126-A:83, II to read as follows:
- II. The treasurer shall distribute 15 percent of all funds received prior to any deposit in the consumer escrow account or the opioid abatement trust fund to the counties and the political subdivisions that filed lawsuits, on or before September 1, 2019, against opioid manufacturers, distributors and other persons identified as defendants in the multidistrict opioid litigation pending in the federal district court for the northern district of Ohio. This distribution shall occur on an annual basis. The distribution of funds shall be based on the [2010] **most recent decennial** census population of each qualifying county and political subdivisions. The population of any political subdivision which receives funds under this section shall not be included in the population of the county for determining the distribution to that county.
- 2 New Hampshire Opioid Abatement Advisory Commission; Membership. Amend RSA 126-A:85 (k) to read as follows:
- (k) A county nursing home supervisor, or designee, appointed by the [governor] New Hampshire Association of Counties.
- 3 New Subparagraph; New Hampshire Opioid Abatement Advisory Commission; Duties. Amend 126-A:86, I(b) by inserting after subparagraph (14) the following new subparagraph:
- (15) Support evidence-based prevention programs and services, including efforts to promote healthy, drug-free lifestyles, reduce isolation, build skills and confidence, and facilitate community-based prevention efforts.
  - 4 Effective Date. This act shall take effect 60 days after its passage.
