## STATEMENT OF INTENT

This bill would have established a study committee to study the issue of unmarried cohabitants, and domestic partners. Under existing law in NH, common law marriages are not prohibited. Individual's choosing not to become married is not a conundrum. Currently, NH has mechanisms in the law to protect persons choosing to share a household without choosing to become married, including statutes regarding any children born from the relationship. In the event a couple is uncomfortable with becoming legally married they have the right to keep all of their assets separate. There are not any laws that makes a couple share financial assets, a home, or a car, just to name a few, even if they are legally married. A married couple has the same vulnerabilities to have a bank account liquidated when they share financial accounts. Additionally, there are home ownership options to help secure a person's vested interest in a home investment and everybody has the right to have a last will and testament prepared as well.

#### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

## In the Year of Our Lord Two Thousand Twenty Two

AN ACT

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establishing a committee to study the issue of unmarried cohabitants, domestic partnerships, and common law marriage.

Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

- 1 Committee Established. There is established a committee to study the issue of unmarried 2 cohabitants, domestic partnerships, and common law marriage.
  - 2 Membership and Compensation.
    - I. The members of the committee shall be as follows:
      - (a) One member of the senate, appointed by the president of the senate.
  - (b) Three members of the house of representatives, appointed by the speaker of the house of representatives.
  - II. Members of the committee shall receive mileage at the legislative rate when attending to the duties of the committee.
    - 3 Duties. The committee shall study issues associated with unmarried cohabitants, domestic partnerships, and common law marriage. The study shall include consideration of other states that recognize common law marriage, the fact that New Hampshire does not recognize the validity of common law marriages except to the limited extent provided by RSA 457:39, and whether as a matter of public policy broader recognition of common law marriage is warranted. The committee shall also study issues arising from accumulated assets during the course of a committed relationship as unmarried cohabitants, domestic partners, or through a common law marriage arrangement. The committee may solicit information and testimony from any individual or entity the committee deems relevant to its study.
    - 4 Chairperson; Quorum. The members of the study committee shall elect a chairperson from among the members. The first meeting of the committee shall be called by the first-named senate member. The first meeting of the committee shall be held within 45 days of the effective date of this section. Three members of the committee shall constitute a quorum.
    - 5 Report. The committee shall report its findings and any recommendations for proposed legislation to the president of the senate, the speaker of the house of representatives, the senate clerk, the house clerk, the governor, and the state library on or before November 1, 2022.
      - 6 Effective Date. This act shall take effect upon its passage.
