

Dear Chairwoman McGuire and Committee Members:

I am writing on behalf of the NH Water Works Association (NHWWA) and our 300+ supporters who represent roughly 2,500 regulated public drinking water suppliers serving two-thirds of New Hampshire residents and businesses with safe, reliable, and affordable drinking water. We are testifying in support of SB325 for the following reasons, and hope that you will also support SB325:

• The proposed legislation is necessary. Treating public works personnel as first responders recognizes the foundational services they provide. Without safe and clear roads, fire and rescue personnel cannot respond. Without wastewater treatment, drinking water becomes polluted. Without clean drinking water, manufacturing, firefighting, and our economy and health fail.

With the 2020 COVID outbreak, drinking water and wastewater operators sacrificed their time and comfort, and risked their safety to maintain levels of service, but were not prioritized for vaccination. This created unnecessary and unacceptable risks for all our citizens and visitors.

The proposed legislation should be expanded. Public water supplies for tens of thousands of citizens are provided by private entities contracted with their customers (e.g. Pennichuck Water, Hampton Area Water Co., Aquarion Water). Village Districts and Precincts (which are enabled by the Legislature but often overlooked by State and national policy) also provide clean water to thousands of citizens. All workers that provide critical public services must be considered "first responders" to avoid substantial system failures.

We recommend that SB325 be voted Ought to Pass, and that additional work on this important topic continue with minimal interruption.

SB 325 - AS AMENDED BY THE SENATE

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

In the Year of Our Lord Two Thousand Twenty Two

AN ACT relative to local organization for emergency management and first responders.

Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

Department of Safety; Homeland Security and Emergency Management; First Responders.
 Amend RSA 21-P:35 to read as follows:

3 21-P:35 Definitions. In this subdivision:

I. "Commissioner" means the commissioner of safety.

5 II. [Repealed.]

III. "Council" means the advisory council on emergency preparedness and security.

7 IV. "Director" means the director of the division of homeland security and emergency
8 management.

9 V. "Emergency management" means the preparation for and the carrying out of all emergency functions, including but not limited to emergency response, [and] training functions, or 10 the utilization of first responders, in order to prepare for, prevent, minimize, and repair injury 11 or damage resulting from the occurrence or threat of widespread or severe damage, injury, or loss of 12 life or property resulting from any natural or human cause, including but not limited to fire, flood, 13 14 earthquake, windstorm, wave actions, technological incidents, oil or chemical spill, or water contamination requiring emergency action to avert danger or damage, epidemic, air contamination, 15 16 blight, drought, infestation, explosion, terrorist act, or riot.

VI. "Local organization for emergency management" means an organization created in
accordance with the provisions of this subdivision by state, county, or local authority to perform local
emergency management functions, which may direct the utilization of first responders.

20 VII. "Political subdivision" means counties, cities, towns, and duly established village 21 precincts.

VIII. "State of emergency" means that condition, situation, or set of circumstances deemed to be so extremely hazardous or dangerous to life or property that it is necessary and essential to invoke, require, or utilize extraordinary measures, actions, and procedures to lessen or mitigate possible harm.

IX. "First responders" means state, county, and local governmental and nongovernmental emergency public safety fire, law enforcement, public safety telecommunications or dispatcher, emergency response, emergency medical services providers including hospital emergency facilities, emergency management, public health, clinical care, public works, and other skilled support personnel, such as equipment

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3 2 Effective Date. This act shall take effect 60 days after its passage.
