STATEMENT OF INTENT

This bill, with the amendment that totally replaces the original language, revises the Joint Legislative Committee on Administrative Rules to be 15 members, rather than 10, and divides them into three groups which each review a third of the rules. This has three significant advantages. First, the division structure means that the workload of each member is only 1/3 of that current, which will help with recruitment and retention. Members will be able to read more of the rules and study them more thoroughly. Second, increasing the size of the committee means that more members of the House will be aware of the rule-making process, and the scope and authority of rules. The committee hopes this will lead to more careful delegation of rulemaking authority and better understanding of rules. Finally, having more members from different backgrounds will enable the committee to understand the rules better, since they will have a broader understanding of the affected areas and more familiarity with the statutes involved. The staff performs yeoman's work in analyzing the compliance with legislative intent, but in some cases the intent is not obvious to them. In others, there are differences of opinion on what a statute implies, or conflicts between various statutes, and having the legislative members familiar with the context will be invaluable. I don't believe this will apply very often, but when it does, it will be important.

STATEMENT OF INTENT

In this non-germane amendment to SB 358, the Executive Departments and Administration (ED&A) majority proposes a radical reworking of the administrative rules statute, which the committee minority cannot accept. We reject this undertaking for numerous reasons, both procedural and substantive, but most especially because the underlying principle of the joint legislative committee on administrative rules (JLCAR) is to act as a ministerial gatekeeper over such rules, based on their appropriateness to correctly implement the statutes enacted by the legislature, neither exceeding legislative authority, nor violating legislative intent. However, the express purpose of the majority amendment is to expand the JLCAR, creating three divisions so as to have greater policy expertise. which specifically contradicts and violates the non-policy function for which it was created. The policy decision has already been rendered by the enactment of the statute(s); it is now the executive branch's constitutional function to implement and carry out these laws. The JLCAR's sole responsibility and function is to ensure that there is no executive overreach or violation embedded in the administrative rules. It is not a policy committee to rehash the statutes. In addition, it is clear to the committee minority that the vetting process of this restructuring has been woefully inadequate, lacking analysis and clear understanding of the ramifications of the proposal as to staffing, committee membership, and general workability, to name but a few of the most egregious defects and deficiencies. Expert testimony challenging the fundamental premise of this restructuring and the purported need for it was ignored.

Amendment to SB 358

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3 AN ACT relative to the joint legislative committee on administrative rules.

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Amend the bill by replacing all after the enacting clause with the following:

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- 7 1 Administrative Procedure Act; Definitions; Committee. Amend RSA 541-A:1, III to read as 8 follows:
- 9 III. "Committee" means the joint legislative committee on administrative rules, as well as 10 the divisions of said committee, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise.
 - III-a. "Entire committee" shall mean the entirety of the appointed regular members of the joint legislative committee on administrative rules.
 - 2 Administrative Procedure Act; Joint Legislative Committee on Administrative Rules. Amend RSA 541-A:2, I and II to read as follows:
 - I. There is hereby created a joint legislative committee to be known as the joint legislative committee on administrative rules. The committee shall be composed of [10] 15 members of the general court and [10] 15 alternates to be appointed for 2-year terms ending on the first Wednesday in December of even-numbered years as follows: [5] 9 members of the house of representatives, appointed by the speaker of the house in consultation with the minority leader, not more than [3] 5 of whom shall be from the same party; [5] 6 members of the senate, appointed by the senate president in consultation with the minority leader, not more than [3] 4 of whom shall be from the same party; [5] 9 alternate members of the house of representatives appointed by the speaker of the house in consultation with the minority leader, not more than [3] 5 of whom shall be from the same party; and [5] 6 alternate members of the senate, appointed by the senate president in consultation with the minority leader, not more than [3] 4 of whom shall be from the same party. If a member of the committee is unable, for any reason, to attend a meeting or a portion of a meeting of the committee, the chair shall designate an alternate member to serve regardless of the number of other senators or representatives who attend the meeting. The committee shall elect a chair and a vicechair from among its members, provided that the chair shall rotate biennially between the house and senate members.
 - II. The joint legislative committee on administrative rules shall be divided into 3 divisions, each consisting of 2 senators and 3 members of the house, with an equal number

 of alternates. A quorum of a division shall be 3 members. Each division shall meet separately to conduct its business, and have the authority of the full committee, except that a joint resolution resulting from a final objection shall be approved by the entire committee. Each division shall meet at least once each month and more often as necessary for the prompt discharge of its duties. The director of legislative services shall provide services to the committee. The joint legislative committee on administrative rules shall adopt rules to govern its operation and organization. [A quorum of the committee shall consist of 6 members.] Members of the committee shall be entitled to legislative mileage as provided to members for attendance at sessions of the general court.

- 3 Administrative Procedures Act; Review by the Joint Legislative Committee on Administrative Rules; Entire Committee for Final Objection Required. Amend RSA 541-A:13, VII to read as follows:
- VII.(a) The provisions of this paragraph may be used by the *entire* committee as an alternative to or in addition to the final objection procedure employed by the committee in paragraph V.
- (b) If an agency responds to a preliminary or revised objection but the basis for objection has not been removed or the response creates a new basis for objection, the *entire* committee may, within 50 days from the date on which the objection response was due and by majority vote of the entire committee, recommend legislative action through sponsorship of a joint resolution to implement its recommendation. Such vote shall prevent the rule from being adopted and filed by the agency for the period of time specified in subparagraph VII(c).
- (c) If the *entire* committee votes to sponsor a joint resolution pursuant to subparagraph VII(b), the joint resolution shall be introduced in the house of representatives or senate within 20 business days of such vote when the general court is in session and 20 business days of the start of the following legislative session if such vote occurs when the general court is not in session. If a joint resolution is not introduced within this time frame, the agency may adopt the rule. If a joint resolution is introduced within this time frame, the agency shall be prevented from adopting and filing such rule until final legislative action is taken on the resolution or the passage of 90 consecutive calendar days during which the general court shall have been in session, whichever occurs first. The 90 calendar day period shall commence on the date such joint resolution has been introduced. If the session of the general court adjourns prior to the sixtieth calendar day after such joint resolution has been introduced, then the agency shall be prevented from adopting and filing such rule until 90 calendar days, beginning with the next session of the general court, have passed.
- (d) The provisions of this paragraph shall apply to only the specific portion of the agency's rule identified in the joint resolution. The provisions of this paragraph shall not prevent an agency from adopting and filing the remainder of the rules in the final proposal under RSA 541-A while the *entire* committee pursues legislative action under this paragraph, nor shall it prevent the committee from also voting to enter a final objection pursuant to paragraph V.

1	(e) Nothing in this section shall prevent the general court from introducing legislation
2	which addresses any matter included in a joint resolution introduced under the provisions of this
3	section.
4	(f) Notwithstanding any house or senate rules to the contrary, a joint resolution which
5	the entire committee votes to sponsor under subparagraph VII(b) may be introduced at any time
6	during the legislative session. It shall be subject to the same rules as any other bill introduced at
7	the beginning of the legislative session.
8	4 Effective Date. This act shall take effect 60 days after its passage.

This bill increases the number of members and alternate members on the joint legislative committee on administrative rules, as well as establishes three equal divisions within the committee and specify that a final objection shall only be entered into by the entirety of the regular members on the committee.

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

In the Year of Our Lord Two Thousand Twenty Two

AN ACT

establishing October 2022 as eczema awareness month.

Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

- 1 Eczema Awareness Month. The governor shall proclaim October 2022 to be eczema awareness 2 month in order to raise awareness of the disease, the burden it places on patients and caregivers, 3 and the need for care and treatment that is reflective of the multi-dimensional nature of the disease. 4 The governor shall urge the citizens of the state to observe the month with appropriate activities and 5 events.
- 6 2 Effective Date. This act shall take effect 60 days after its passage.
