#### **ANALYSIS**

This bill allows for the dissolution of a village district by a simple majority vote at an annual district meeting.

#### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

In the Year of Our Lord Two Thousand Twenty Two

AN ACT

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relative to the dissolution of a village district.

Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

1 Village Districts; Dissolution; majority Vote. Amend RSA 52:21 to read as follows:

52:21 Dissolution. Any village district and any district now in existence having the rights and powers of a village district, may, at an annual meeting, by a [2/3] simple majority vote of its legal voters, terminate its existence and dispose of its corporate property. Upon the dissolution of any such district, the property, real and personal, which is contained within the former boundaries of the dissolved district shall continue to be subject to taxation and betterment assessments for the purpose of paying any unpaid bonds, notes, bills or other obligations incurred while the district was in existence, in the same manner as if the said district had not been dissolved. The selectmen of the town or towns in which the district was situated shall assess the taxes and betterment assessments in the same manner as if the district had not been dissolved and shall have the duty, authority, and power to pay such bonds, notes, bills or other obligations after the moneys received from such taxes and assessments. Provided, however, that in no case shall the total of any such taxes or assessment exceed the balance necessary to pay said bonds, notes, bills or other obligations after the net income derived from the property disposed of has been applied for the payment of the same.

2 Effective Date. This act shall take effect 60 days after its passage.

Summary of testimony presented in support:

#### Representative Jonathan Smith

- The purpose is to change the legal requirement to dissolve a village district from a 2/3rds majority of legal voters to a simple majority.
- The simple majority standard is what is used to create the village district and it should be no harder to dissolve than it is to create.
- This change is about fairness to the voter.
- The standard of voting is like every election in the state.
- He has questions in committee that compared this bill to a bond which had a 2/3rds majority requirement but it was lowered to a 3/5th majority in 2020.
- This comparison is false as bonding consists of one action, the 3/5th vote.
- Creating and dissolving a village district requires two actions.
- The simple majority vote to create it and the 2/3rd majority vote to dissolve.
- He believes that it is an injustice to the voters who were unaware that it would be harder to dissolve the district than it was to create.
- It should be the same simple majority standard to create and to dissolve.
- There is a misconception that the municipality will absorb the cost of the dissolved district.
- RSA 52:21 states "the selectmen of the town or towns in which the district was situated shall
  assess the taxes and betterment assessments in the same manner as if the district had not been
  dissolved."
- Senator Gray asked isn't it common practice to have the vote to dissolve something at a higher bar than to establish it.
  - o Rep. Smith replied not that he is aware of in the municipal world
- Senator Gray commented that he is not just speaking of the municipal world. In the legislature
  rules are adopted and then require a super majority to set them aside. He added that having
  just a simple majority could make standards go back and forth and asked if that was good.

o Rep. Smith answered that in the House it would be a 2/3<sup>rd</sup> majority at a later date but if you are immediately looking to overturn a motion it would be a simple majority. In this case that is not a fair comparison because you do not have the option of doing it now or later. There are many forms of village districts and it is the choice of the people if they want to have them or not. This is putting the power in the hands of the voters.

# Testimony

### HB1081

Thank you, Mr. Chairman and Senators,

HB1081 really is a simple bill. The purpose is to change the legal requirement to dissolve a village district from a 2/3<sup>rd</sup> majority of `legal voters to a simple majority of legal voters. The simple majority standard is what is used to create the village district. A village district should be no harder to dissolve than it was to create. This change is about fairness for the voter. I have had concerns from people asking if this bill allows nonresidents to vote. The answer is no. The standard of voting is like every election in the state. You must be a legally registered voter and only those present and voting are counted. That was a court case, Sugar Hill Association V' Lisbon 1962. During testimony I had questions comparing this bill to a bond which had a 2/3<sup>rd</sup> majority requirement but was lowered to a 3/5 majority requirement in 2020 by the state legislature. This comparison is false. Bonding consists of one action, the 3/5<sup>th</sup> vote. Creating and dissolving a village district requires two actions. The simple majority vote to create the district and the 2/3<sup>rd</sup> majority vote to dissolve. I ask you this; (How many voters were unaware that it would be harder to dissolve the district than it was to create? Finally, the House minority blurb indicated that the municipality would absorb the cost of the dissolved district which is not correct. RSA 52:21 states "The selectmen of the town or towns in which the district was situated shall assess the taxes and betterment assessments in the same manner as if the district had not been dissolved." To close, this bill is about transparency and fairness for the voter and I respectfully ask for your support. Same standard to
