

Summary of testimony presented:

Representative Glenn Cordelli - Carroll, District 4

- Representative Cordelli introduced HB 1125.
- This bill is a reflection of reality.
- NHDOE truly goes to NHDOS first, this legislation reflects that.
- This bill also seeks to ensure that NHDOE will have access to these plans. Online option is also included.
- The Director of Homeland Security did have additional thoughts on language. He believes Senator Prentiss is coordinating with them on this.
- Senator Prentiss noted that she has been working with the Director Jennifer Harper of Homeland Security on language for this bill. Representative

Cordelli said he has shared such language with DOE as well.

Representative Rick Ladd - Grafton, District 4

- Supports this bill.
- If you don't have your report in to DOS within two consecutive years, DOE should be notified.
- There are a huge number of school districts that are non-compliant. Close to 80% have not complied their reports.
- When we withheld grants, within two weeks, we got all missing reports in as they were chasing \$30 million dollars.
- There should be communication with DOE when folks are not in compliance.

Amy Clark – Administrator, School Safety and Facility Management, NH Department of Education

- Made herself available for questions.
- This bill removes DOE from the notification which helps the department as there is a lot of duplicative work currently being done. There is already a portal that information is uploaded to.
- Much better for schools to coordinate with Homeland Security.
- There is sensitive information that does need responsible disposal through shredding.
- She would ask that any additional amendments keep the direct communication from schools to Homeland Security.
- Senator Kahn asked Ms. Clark if school districts should not qualify for state capital improvements without having a current safety plan on file. He wonders if we don't have a security mechanism or a pool of dollars, what are some incentives we could include in the language to add layers of security for submission.
 - Ms. Clark said 100% of schools have submitted plans at one point in time. She is not sure if there is a big need to add additional incentives.
- Senator Kahn asked Ms. Clark about technological infrastructure and if we have given thought to that form of a security response plan.
 - Ms. Clark said Homeland Security may better address that question related to cybersecurity.

Jennifer Harper – Director, NH Homeland Security and Emergency Management

- They support the bill now, however, they did not support it in its original form.
- They made changes to ensure that this was in compliance with emergency management standards.
- There were certain disasters that were not outlined previously.
- Schools near the Seabrook Nuclear Powerplant were also asked to include a disaster plan which is unique to that area of the state.
- The department requested a date change from September to October for their office.
- They noticed a trend that not necessarily every school submitted their plans by September 1st but as the school year gets going. An October 15th date change allows for all interested parties to be included in the plan.
- Homeland Security works well with DOE and Ms. Clark's team.
- This responsibility falls under DOE, not Homeland Security. However, they are happy to work as a team to promote safety.
