STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

In the Year of Our Lord Two Thousand Twenty Two

AN ACT relative to restroom access for persons with certain medical conditions.

Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

1 1 Title. This act shall be known and may be cited as the "Crohn's and Colitis Fairness Act" or
2 the "Restroom Access Act".

3 2 Purpose. The general court hereby finds and declares that:

4 I. Crohn's disease and ulcerative colitis, collectively known as inflammatory bowel disease
5 (IBD), are painful, medically incurable diseases that affect the digestive system resulting in
6 symptoms that include loss of bowel control and require urgent and sudden use of a restroom.

7 II. Denying restroom access to IBD patients can lead to embarrassing, avoidable accidents
8 that can cause extreme emotional distress.

9 III. As IBD affects numerous people in this state, and as increasing numbers of people are
10 being diagnosed with IBD, it is in the public interest to ensure that these patients can access a
11 restroom in an emergency.

12 3 New Subdivision. Amend RSA 155 by inserting after section 80 the following new subdivision:

Restroom Access Act

13
14 155:81 Definitions. In this subdivision:

15 I. "Eligible medical condition" means Crohn's disease, ulcerative colitis, any other
16 inflammatory bowel disease, irritable bowel disease syndrome, or any other medical condition that
17 requires the use of an ostomy device or immediate access to a toilet facility.

18 II. "Retail establishment" means a place of business open to the general public for the sale of
19 goods or services.

20 155:82 Restroom Access. A retail establishment that has a toilet facility for its employees shall
21 allow any individual who is lawfully on the premises of such place of business to use that toilet
22 facility during normal business hours, even if the place of business does not normally make the
23 employee toilet facility available to the public, provided that the following conditions are met:

24 I. The individual requesting the use of the employee toilet facility suffers from an eligible
25 medication condition or utilizes an ostomy device, as evidenced by a signed document from a health
26 care provider, an identification card from a national association, or other reasonable evidence of a
27 qualifying medical condition.

28 II. A public restroom is not immediately accessible to the customer.

29 III. The employee toilet facility is not located in an area where providing access would create
30 a health or safety risk to the customer, and providing access to the toilet facility would not pose a
31 risk to an employee.

METHODOLOGY:

This bill requires retail establishments to allow individuals with eligible medical conditions to use employee toilet facilities under certain circumstances as well as establishing a fine for any retail establishment or an employee of a retail establishment in violation of the statute. There is no method to determine how many violation charges would be brought as a result of the changes contained in this bill to determine the fiscal impact on state General Fund expenditures or revenue.

It is assumed any fiscal impact from this bill will not occur until after FY 2022.

Bill Analysis: This bill requires retail establishments to allow individuals with medical conditions, like Crohn's disease and colitis, to use employee toilet facilities under certain circumstances.

Summary of testimony presented in support:

Representative Jan Schmidt

Hillsborough County District 28

- Representative Jan Schmidt said that HB 1130-FN was a request from a constituent to implement a model of law called Ally's Law.
- Rep. Schmidt said that HB 1130-FN states that all public retail establishments that have a restroom available for employees must make the restroom available to certain members of the public in the case of an emergency.
- Rep. Schmidt said that more than 13 states have Restroom Access Laws on the books. She said that, despite significant concern from business owners in some of those states, there have been no reported incidents of abuse or bad outcomes in any of those states.

- Rep. Schmidt said that she is aware that some businesses do already allow the use of their employee restrooms in the case of an emergency but it is both hard for people suffering from an emergency to ask for access, and potentially explain their compromising situation, and for employees to determine if someone legitimately needs emergency access to a restroom.
- Rep. Schmidt said that HB 1130-FN will require a written document from a medical provider, or an identification card from a national organization, stating the individual's medical need. She said that HB 1130-FN has provisions so that if a store has a valid reason to deny access – such as a shipment recently being delivered and being placed in such a way as to make it dangerous for someone to walk through – a store can deny the request.
- Rep. Schmidt said that the New Hampshire Medical Society supports HB 1130-FN.
- Senator Sherman asked if the House of Representatives was fully in support of HB 1130-FN.
 - Rep. Schmidt said that the House Health, Human Services, and Elderly Affairs Committee (HHSEA) was in full support and voted 21-0 to support the bill.

Matthew Sullivan

Bedford

- Mr. Sullivan said that he is both a business owner and someone who would benefit from HB 1130-FN.
- Mr. Sullivan said that HB 1130-FN spells out the conditions for accessing a restroom: Crohn's disease, ulcerative colitis, inflammatory bowel disease, irritable bowel disease syndrome, or any other medical condition that requires the use of an ostomy device.
- Mr. Sullivan said that symptoms of Crohn's disease can continue to exist even after corrective surgery.
- Mr. Sullivan said that over three million people suffer from incontinence.
- Mr. Sullivan said that the need to use a restroom is not a gentle nudge like it would be for a normal person, but gives only minutes or seconds to find and use a restroom. He said that for an ostomy bag there is only so much output that the bag can hold before it needs to be emptied.
- Mr. Sullivan said that he has worried about being able to find a restroom before.
- Mr. Sullivan said that he has been denied access to a restroom probably less than a dozen times, but more than once is too often.
- Mr. Sullivan said that it is awful and embarrassing to both have to ask for restroom access and to be denied restroom access. He said that the uncertainty can lead to people not wanting to leave their homes.
- Mr. Sullivan said that 13 other states have laws similar to HB 1130-FN, and the first was Illinois in 2005.
- Mr. Sullivan said that RSA 277:10 requires employers to provide a toilet for their employees. He said that it is not hard to expand access for clients or people in need. He also said that it is important to not put people in harm's way, such as walking through an area when heavy machinery is in use or when there is a single employee working who would feel unsafe.

- Mr. Sullivan said that the impact on the state as a whole would be minimal, but the impact on those who suffer from such conditions would be profound.

Randi Mahoney

Nashua

- Ms. Mahoney showed the Committee a kit that she keeps in her car, including plastic bags, a diaper, baby wipes, and a pair of pants. She said that many people who suffer from Crohn's disease maintain such a kit.
- Ms. Mahoney said that in February of 2021 she had her daughter. She said that the birth set off a slew of symptoms which led to her being diagnosed with Crohn's disease. She said that despite repeated attempts she has not been able to find an effective medicine for her.
- Ms. Mahoney said that she needs to use the restroom 19 times per day and five times per night, on average. She said that her urges are sudden and urgent and she can have as little as 90 seconds to find and use a restroom. She said that Crohn's attacks have left her unable to feed her daughter, change a diaper, or run errands.
- Ms. Mahoney said that leaving her house often involves squatting in her car and using her kit, which can lead to charges of indecent exposure.
- Ms. Mahoney said that her request for Rep. Schmidt to file HB 1130-FN came about because she was shopping at a boutique store and had an attack. She said that she found a restroom but it was locked and when she asked an employee for access she was told it was for employees only. She said that she then tried to rush to her car but was unable to reach it in time. She said that this experience led her to learn more about Restroom Access Acts and related doctor's notes.
- Ms. Mahoney said that, in one specific incident, seven different stores in Manchester denied her access to their restrooms.
- Ms. Mahoney said that some people have suggested that it would be a matter of discrimination to deny other people from the restrooms. She said that it is simply a matter of equal access to public places. She said that she has a friend who suffers from seizures and has a service dog named Sky. She said that her friend cannot simply go somewhere else to have a seizure. She said that the potential that her friend might have a seizure in public means she is legally entitled to have Sky with her. Ms. Mahoney said that if her friend is denied access to a store because of Sky, then that facility is legally inaccessible to her. She said that this is the same principle as restroom access in HB 1130-FN.
- Ms. Mahoney said that HB 1130-FN grants legal access to restrooms for a medical need.
- Ms. Mahoney said that the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 requires reasonable accommodations for both employees and customers. She said that HB 1130-FN does not require restrooms to be available to all customers, makes exemptions for health and safety, and requires documentation. She said that not granting restroom access is actually an undue burden on the employees, who are then forced to clean up after accidents.
- Ms. Mahoney said that no one wants to admit that they do not have control of their bowels. She said that people who suffer do not have the time nor the ability to simply "hold it". She said HB 1130-FN is a matter of ethical treatment.

- Ms. Mahoney said that HB 1130-FN requires nothing of business owners.
- Ms. Mahoney said that having to go without access to a restroom is degrading and disgusting.

Dear Chairman Bradley and members of the HHS committee:

The Greater Nashua Chamber of Commerce supports HB 1130 as amended, however we feel the exemptions should be expanded beyond just employees .

On behalf of the almost 400 business members and thousands of the employees that we represent, I write to you with the following suggestion of language to be added to the amendment to HB 1130's exemption in situations were providing restroom facilities (to those with Crohn's etc) would pose a risk to employees.

While the addition of this exemption protects the business employees, what about the risk to other customers in the business as well? I will use an example brought to the Chamber by a business owner who owns a children's clothing store. The layout of his store has the restroom facility located in the same hallway as the store's dressing rooms. The business owner feels in this case that allowing an individual from the public to use the restroom would put the children at risk who are in the dressing rooms trying on clothes.

I think the same example could be applied to women alone in dressing rooms as well.

We respectfully ask that you have some discussion as to who else might be put at risk when you allow use of business restrooms which are not open to the public under ordinary circumstances.

Good afternoon Mr Chairman and Honorable Members of the Health and Human Services Committee

For the record my name is Representative Jan Schmidt of Ward 1 Nashua, and today I bring you a bill requested by a constituent, HB1130, and she asks that NH to pass **Ally's Law**. Once it was filed I began hearing from others who would ask for this to pass - some who are too embarrassed to come forward and some who wrote to me because of someone they love experienced the problem..

An earlier attempt to address this issue, HB 764, was filed in 2007 and I'll include the link here: http://gencourt.state.nh.us/BillHistory/SofS_Archives/2007/house/HB764H.pdf. Clearly the bill had been so open and simple that even I would have found it ITL. It said:

All places of public accommodation and buildings and facilities, as defined by RSA 275-C:10, II, that are equipped with toilet and lavatory facilities shall allow the public to use such facilities in an emergency.

The question was and is, what is an emergency.

So we know that this isn't a brand new idea here in NH, the rest of the country has seen this and has moved forward on this.

The **Restroom Access Act** has been passed in several states: Colorado, Connecticut, Illinois, Kentucky, Maine, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, New York, Ohio, Oregon, Tennessee, Texas, Wisconsin, and Washington.

In some states, this has been opposed by business owners as they were concerned that the Act could be abused, that cleaning the facilities will be a burden to employees, or that there could be issues of liability. These concerns are largely without merit because there have been no issues reported by business owners in any of the states where the **Restroom Access Act** has become law.

Now, it would be nice if a business would allow a customer who is experiencing any bathroom emergency to the use of their employee restroom. I believe that some businesses do this in a pinch already, but I can also see how it might be difficult to ask and worrisome for the business to allow. Our intent on this bill is to recognize a specific illness, for a person under a doctor's care, showing a signed document accompany their request for accommodation.

A little about the person who would be asking for this access...

This emergency isn't that someone forgot to use the toilet before leaving home. Not at all. This is sudden and urgent need. If you haven't experienced such a need in your life, consider yourself lucky. Pregnant women might understand, there are times when you simply cannot move another step without the need to visit a bathroom. and horribly embarrassing if caught while out. Big stores have facilities, the mall does, grocery stores do, restaurants as well - but in NH we shop in local stores, we support NH's small businesses, and here is where good people are asking for your help.

Where you can have been 100% ready to leave the house yet you have a need so urgent that you are willing to ask a stranger for help - this is why we need **Ally's Law in NH**.
