14 II. Any person claiming to be aggrieved by a violation of this section, including the attorney  
15 general, may initiate a civil action against a school, school district, school board, or other public  
16 education agency in superior court for injunctive and other legal or equitable relief. Any person  
17 aggrieved by an act prohibited by this section may also pursue all of the remedies available under  
18 RSA 491, RSA 275-E, or any other applicable common law or statutory cause of action.

19 III. Violation of this section by an educator shall be considered a violation of the educator  
20 code of conduct that justifies disciplinary sanction by the state board of education. For the purposes  
21 of this section, "educator" means a professional employee of any school whose position requires  
22 certification by the state board pursuant to RSA 189:39.

**Summary of testimony presented in support:**

**Representative Ken Weyler**

**Rockingham County District 13**

- Representative Weyler said that forcing children to wear masks interferes with their learning and breathing.
- Rep. Weyler said that school-age children have the lowest rate of serious Covid-19 infection and data shows little difference between those masked and unmasked.
- Rep. Weyler deferred further comments to others.

## **Representative Melissa Blasek**

### **Hillsborough County District 21**

- Representative Blasek said that HB 1131 is still necessary and relevant despite the Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) updating their mask guidance and the Governor lifting the statewide mask mandate.
- Rep. Blasek said that several school districts are still requiring masks for children. She said that others have been discussing requiring masks each year during cold and flu season.
- Rep. Blasek said that Governor Sununu has referenced “the old normal” and said that HB 1131 is the path to that old normal.

## **Representative Dawn Johnson**

### **Belknap County District 3**

- Representative Johnson said that, as a member of the Laconia School Board, she has had to fight to get masks off of children.
- Rep. Johnson said that her daughter has had strep throat and other illnesses due to her mask wearing.
- Rep. Johnson said that there are schools that need HB 1131.

## **Kelley Potenza**

### **Rochester**

- Ms. Potenza said that she had a petition from 5,311 people demanding a ban on masking children in schools from RebuildNH.
- Ms. Potenza said that if a lie is repeated enough people will believe it.
- Ms. Potenza read a quote from Joseph Goebbels, the Minister of Propaganda in the Nazi Regime, relating to lying.
- Ms. Potenza said that comments from the public regarding masks have fallen on deaf ears as their rights have been infringed. She said that she was done and tired.
- Ms. Potenza said that decisions regarding masking are not up to elected officials and should be up to parental choice. She urged the Committee to vote on HB 1311 quickly.

## **Stephen Petty**

- Mr. Petty referenced his written testimony.
- Mr. Petty said that he is an industrial hygienist.
- Mr. Petty said that doctors talk about Covid-19 and masking but it is not truly within their wheelhouse. He said that doctors talk about disease but industrial hygienists talk about exposure and personal protective equipment (PPE).
- Mr. Petty said that there would be an expected drop in the number of Covid-19 cases in New Hampshire over time as masking increased but there was not.



- Mr. Petty referenced a study from Denmark where there was no difference in outcome between groups that wore masks and those that did not.
- Mr. Petty said that data and studies from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) were flawed.
- Mr. Petty said that ventilation, control, and destruction are the only ways to combat an illness. He said that source control is bogus.
- Mr. Petty said that droplets fall to the ground within minutes but aerosols can take upwards of 50 days to fall.
- Mr. Petty said that the Covid-19 virus is 500x smaller than visible dust. He said that if a hair can slip through a mask, a virus particle can as well.
- Mr. Petty said that the basis of dilute, filter, and destroy has been around within the industrial hygienist industry since 1950.
- Mr. Petty said that a mask that seals properly is a respirator.
- Mr. Petty said that there should be a 90% risk reduction for something to be considered a good solution.
- Mr. Petty said that an asbestos fiber is 50x larger than a Covid-19 virus. He said that no one would ever recommend wearing a N95 mask to work on asbestos.
- Mr. Petty said that Scott Gottlieb, former Food and Drug Administration Administrator, admitted masks do not work on CBS News' *Face the Nation*. He said that the CDC has also admitted masks are not effective.
- Mr. Petty said that he wrote a letter to Dr. Anthony Fauci, Director of the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases, the CDC, and the White House along with other industrial hygienists questioning how the science on masks could change so dramatically over a short period of time.
- Mr. Petty said that a N95 cannot be distributed without ensuring there is a proper fit test, medical clearance to wear it, and training on wearing it.
- Mr. Petty said that masks do not fit within the hierarchy of controls and are below that standard.
- Mr. Petty said that damage is being done to children, include a 12% to 15% loss in reading and math, which he said is worse for minorities. He also said that children born during the Covid-19 pandemic have a 23% reduction in early-life learning.
- Mr. Petty said that the CDC moved the goalposts on the criteria for assessing early-life learning, rather than admitting that children were being harmed.
- Mr. Petty said that the national department of education in the United Kingdom noted that 94% of teaches indicated that face coverings made communication more difficult.
- Mr. Petty cited a study that found 27 adverse effects of masking, with five specific to children.
- Mr. Petty said that masks have never been, are not, and can never be a solution.
- Senator Avarad asked if Mr. Petty's information was on Google and if he had spoken to WMUR, Fox News, or the media, as his information seemed to be new to the public discussion.
  - Mr. Petty said that his information was not new. He said that he had given six national podcast interviews that can be found online, as well as several podcasts he has done from a home studio he built. He said those can be found online. Mr. Petty said that more material has been coming out with time but the underlying principals have been known since 1950.

- Senator Bradley said that Mr. Petty had given compelling testimony. He asked Mr. Petty to share his credentials and resume with the Committee.
  - Mr. Petty said that he would.

## **Julie Smith**

### **Nashua**

- Ms. Smith said that masks are not in the wheelhouse of the medical field.
- Ms. Smith said that public schools with mask mandates are tax-payer funded child abuse.
- Ms. Smith said that she is aware of a private school that refused to commit to a firm and unwavering mask policy before tuition payments were due and said that parents want the terms of the contract spelled out before signing.
- Ms. Smith said that HB 1131 will prevent parental rights from being trampled on by people in office or positions of influence.

## **Allison Dyer**

### **Nashua**

- Ms. Dyer said that the first call of duty of parents is to protect children.
- Ms. Dyer said that kids who want to wear a mask can but it is abusive to force masks on children. She said that it is a failed public health policy.
- Ms. Dyer said that there is a false choice presented between public health and individual choice. She said that people have a right to be left alone.
- Ms. Dyer said that mask wearing by healthy people does not help.
- Ms. Dyer said that people should follow the ancestral wisdom to stay home if sick, rest, hydrate, and live a healthy lifestyle.

## **Maureen Hardy**

### **Londonderry**

- Ms. Hardy said that she has worked in clinical microbiology for many years.
- Ms. Hardy said that a risk-benefit analysis must be conducted when considering a mitigation strategy for a disease. She said that she does not support the use of masks for Covid-19, especially for children, as they do not prevent the transmission of viruses.
- Ms. Hardy said that masks are not benign and there are potential long-term problems. She said that those problems include mouth breathing, facial deformities, speech-learning and learning deficiencies, and holistic processing.
- Ms. Hardy said that masks trap large particles on the face, mask, throat, and lungs.
- Ms. Hardy said that people should be exposed to the natural environment to keep their immune systems strong.
- Ms. Hardy urged the Committee to not ever mandate a bad policy again.
- Ms. Hardy said that another virus wouldn't be mitigated by masks.
- Senator Avard asked what the larger pathogens are.

- Ms. Hardy said that they included mold, parasites, and bacteria.

## **Nicole Sousa**

### **Amherst**

- Ms. Sousa said that there have been no randomized control tests on masks and children. She said that there should need to be proof that they are effective, rather than parents having to prove that there is harm.
- Ms. Sousa said that masks in schools are an experiment on children without parental consent. She said that it is rare in other countries to mask children under six, or children under twelve, and some nations never masked at all.
- Ms. Sousa said that children are at the least risk from Covid-19.
- Ms. Sousa said that after a school district lifted their mask requirement, children said things like “I can hear my teacher”, “it is easier to hear my friends”, and “my friend is so pretty”. She said that two days after a mask requirement was lifted, her six-year-old made their first friend. She said that children cried with joy.
- Ms. Sousa said that, for people who are hard of hearing or deaf, the world is completely mute with masks. She said that children with severe social and emotional deficiencies who have worn masks have had their problems exacerbated.
- Ms. Sousa said that the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (ADA) does not represent children seeking relief from mask mandates and no one listens to the concerns of parents.
- Ms. Sousa encouraged the Committee to follow Europe’s lead and stop experimenting on children without parental consent.

## **Terese Grinnell**

### **Loudon**

- Ms. Grinnell said that she has two sons with development disabilities. She said that one son would chew on his mask and the teacher could not facilitate removing and replacing his mask when it became wet.
- Ms. Grinnell said that she pulled her son from public school because she could not find a provider to give him an exemption, as they told her they would be threatened, Ms. Grinnell said that the ADA would not support her son.
- Ms. Grinnell urged the Committee to let parents parent.
- Ms. Grinnell said that the masks available for purchase at the dollar store that parents put in backpacks are filthy.
- Ms. Grinnell said that she has seen pictures of nurses and teachers at off-school social events not wearing masks but they then force the students to wear masks at school.
- Ms. Grinnell said that masks are political.
- Ms. Grinnell said medical interventions should be left to medical directors, rather than school boards. She said that if there was a child with special needs then the community will rally to protect that child.

### **Walter Kirsch**

- Mr. Kirsch said that masks are a detriment, rather than a benefit.
- Mr. Kirsch said that masks are politically motivated and are a game of the political left and political right.
- Mr. Kirsch urged the Committee to pass HB 1131, end mask mandates, and end all mandates.

### **Dorcas Kirsch**

- Ms. Kirsch said that oxygen is essential to living and restricting oxygen is foolish.
- Ms. Kirsch said that she reads the Bible and the Book of Deuteronomy talks about  blessings and curses from God. She said that she believes a madness is going on in the world today.
- Ms. Kirsch read several Bible verses: Psalm 118, Genesis 2:17, Job 27:3, and 2 Corinthians 3:17.
- Ms. Kirsch said that everyone is going to die and it feels like some people are trying to pretend that that is not going to happen.
- Ms. Kirsch said that God has given people immune systems, as well as logic.

### **Rachel Goldsmith**

#### **Manchester, Moms4Liberty**

- Ms. Goldsmith said that people would not expect teachers to remind children to take their vitamins or psychiatric medicine and cannot be expected to enforce virus prevention. She said that teachers should focus on teaching reading, writing, and arithmetic.
- Ms. Goldsmith said that test scores are declining and teachers are not able to focus on teaching to the task, as there are too many other things to think about.
- Ms. Goldsmith said that children with an individualized education program (IEP) are not being supported by teachers because they are too busy following school board mandates.
- Ms. Goldsmith said that school boards are not doctors.
- Ms. Goldsmith urged the Committee to allow families to choose what their medical needs are.

### **Gina Neily**

#### **Epsom**

- Ms. Neily said that she has been a school bus driver for 10 years. She said that she runs a high school route that brings students from Deerfield to Concord. She said that students were required to wear masks on the bus as well as on the school campus.
- Ms. Neily said that children have a 99% survival rate from Covid-19.
- Ms. Neily said that there were days in June of 2021 when school was released early because it was too warm. She said that she brought a thermometer on the bus to see

how hot it was and it was 104 degrees. She said that she could not enforce the mask rules on the bus. She said that she brought popsicles instead, as it was commonsense.

- Ms. Neily said that she also drives an elementary school route and she used to have to correct children for raising their voices and getting out of their seats. She said that since masks have been introduced her bus has been completely silent. She said that this breaks her heart.
- Ms. Neily said that it is a parent's choice to mask their child.

## **Joanna Brown**

### **Manchester**

- Ms. Brown said that masks do not work but do cause harm.
- Ms. Brown said that masks cause anxiety for teenagers, not only those on an IEP.
- Ms. Brown said that there has been fearmongering by teachers, including one who told a student that he was going to kill his elderly mother because he wasn't wearing his mask correctly.
- Ms. Brown said that there has been an increase in aggression amongst students in Manchester. She said that two years of fear and anxiety have caused long-term damage.

## **John Chamberlain**

### **Newington**

- Mr. Chamberlain said that masks do not work and are politically motivated.
- Mr. Chamberlain said that there was a study that reviewed hundreds of academic journals and did not find evidence to support a protective effect for PPE in reducing influenza transmission.
- Mr. Chamberlain said that masks harm the emotional development of children, as they limit the ability of a child to infer emotions and facial features. He said that this is particularly pronounced in children between the ages of three and five.

## **Christine Vigneault**

### **Concord**

- Ms. Vigneault said that she took both of her kids out of school after she heard of forced masking. She said that a majority of people understand that masks in uncontrolled public settings do nothing and cause harm.
- Ms. Vigneault said that children are terrorized and petrified due to mandates.
- Ms. Vigneault said that Dr. Fauci and the Occupational Safety and Health Administration knew masks were a farce from the beginning, based on decades of data. She said that people tried to speak out but were censored and threatened.
- Ms. Vigneault said that masks make transmission worse due to cross-contamination.
- Ms. Vigneault said that her husband is a physical therapist and wears a N95 mask all day. She said that of his 70 patients, 50 were positive for Covid-19 despite being

vaccinated and constantly masked. She said that her husband comes home from work with headaches and fatigue, and the long-term effects are worse.

- Ms. Vigneault said that people have been put in a trance due to the news coverage of Covid-19. She said that news anchors and pundits are funded by pharmaceutical companies.
- Ms. Vigneault said that children cannot stand up for themselves and are susceptible to peer pressure. She said that children are being conditioned.
- Ms. Vigneault said that masks are a gag, a dirty rag, and a bad security blanket.

### **Russan Chester**

- Ms. Chester said that she has worked in child abuse and neglect and adult abuse and neglect. She said that she worked in those fields during the HIV-AIDS epidemic of the 1970s and 1980s. She said that she refused to wear masks and PPE during the HIV-AIDS epidemic and went into people's homes, as being masked is not human.
- Ms. Chester said that taking peoples' faces away is a crime against humanity.
- Ms. Chester said that it is a travesty that masks take away the ability for a child to be comforted by a face.
- Ms. Chester said that she knows a school bus driver who is concerned about children getting off the bus and being picked up by masked strangers.
- Ms. Chester said that she established an anonymous phone number that people can call to give their position on bills. She said that within ten days of establishing the number she received 183 calls from school employees who support HB 1131 but are afraid to speak out due to school boards and unions.

### **Nicole Nordlund**

- Ms. Nordlund said that HB 1131 should be passed as written with no changes.
- Ms. Nordlund said that she was moved to tears by the House Education Committee hearing on HB 1131, held during a blizzard, because of the stories about anxiety and mental health crises.
- Ms. Nordlund said that her husband is a teacher who comes home with a hopeless look because children will be behind forever.

### **Victoria Gulla**

#### **Spofford**

- Ms. Gulla said that her child with Tourette's is denied education because they could not wear a mask and is now being homeschooled.
- Ms. Gulla said that she wore a mask in the early stages of the Covid-19 pandemic and has had trouble swallowing, suffering from bacterial infections.
- Ms. Gulla said that masks lead to mouth breathing, which has harms.
- Ms. Gulla said that she is a researcher and has focused her work on totalitarian regimes in Asia, as well as working in constituent services for former Massachusetts Governor Bill Weld.

- Ms. Gulla discussed how nasal turbinates help to filter particles from the air and how Vitamin D helps create nitric oxide.
- Ms. Gulla said that mouth breathing is related to masks trapping too much CO2.
- Ms. Gulla said that masks impede the body's fight or flight instincts.
- Ms. Gulla said that SAU 29 has had meetings about violence in the high school and the fact that children are not used to working with others due to separation caused by the Covid-19 pandemic.
- Ms. Gulla said that 26% of children at a high school in Keene have been written up for disciplinary issues.
- Ms. Gulla discussed experiments done on rats in cages, using electric shocks, and how those experiments increase violence and aggression. She compared school children to those rats.

### **Tricia and Reed Lambert**

#### **Hopkinton**

- Ms. Lambert said that she has two children, both of whom attended public schools until September of 2021. She said that her son Reed has a reading disability and IEP, as well as migraines, meaning he could not wear a mask.
- Ms. Lambert said that the American Rescue Plan Act (ARP) forced schools to require masks. She said that Reed's elementary school teacher explained how important looking at the face and lips is to helping Reed read.
- Ms. Lambert said that Reed, her daughter, and herself walked into their school in September to deliver a "do not consent" notice to the school and they were rejected every day for 18 days. She said that her children were given in-school suspension but were told that they could return to class if they wore a mask.
- Ms. Lambert said that she believes the Nuremberg Code bans the use of "do this or else" policies.
- Reed said that they went into school every day to give a "do not consent" notice and a teacher named Mr. Kelly signed it, meaning that Mr. Kelly is liable. He said that a mask mandate was not enforced until three or four days after they first tried to give the "do not consent" notice. He said that the assistant principal was also involved.

### **David Koch**

#### **Hancock**

- Mr. Koch said that he and his wife were concerned about masking policies so they spoke to their superintendent and the school board, who deferred to the CDC and DHHS. He said that he was concerned that the authorities were not following the science.
- Mr. Koch said that the authorities have failed badly. He said that they are essentially saying to follow the authorities and not the science.
- Mr. Koch said that he has lost trust.

## **Shauna and Colin Healy**

### **South Hampton**

- Ms. Healy said that the Covid-19 pandemic has been the greatest psychological operation of all time, which has been evil for children.
- Ms. Healy said that people have ignored, and are ignoring, the science.
- Ms. Healy said that the CDC and the National Institutes of Health have destroyed the careers of people who tried to speak out.
- Ms. Healy said that people are trying to keep the charade of masking alive.
- Ms. Healy said that sunshine, a healthy diet, and movement are the most important factors in being healthy.
- Colin said that masking does not seem to be about safety when children at one school in one town have to wear masks but students at another school in another town do not. He said that people would wear masks on their own if they wanted to if they believed that they worked.

## **Lisa Dean**

### **Stratham**

- Ms. Dean said that there are several “elephants in the room”, including that some children have been masked at school for the entire year and some have been mask optional.
- Ms. Dean said that schools within the same town, city, or county have had different mask policies.
- Ms. Dean said that masking decisions are decisions about medical devices made by unqualified officials.
- Ms. Dean said that there was 100% support from the public at the House Education Committee hearing on HB 1131.
- Ms. Dean encouraged the Committee to let kids live, and breath, free.

## **Gary York, MD**

### **Hopkinton**

- Dr. York asked what the risks and benefits were of masks. He asked what was gained by masking children in schools when they had no risk of getting Covid-19 from their school. He said that the risk is taking away a child’s ability to acquire natural, robust immunity.
- Dr. York said that children being together provides an opportunity for them to acquire natural, robust immunity from mild cases, such as the Omicron variant.



### **Emily Phillips**

- Ms. Phillips said that, as a school board member, school boards do not want the responsibility to make masking decisions and have asked the state to pass a law making the decision.
- Ms. Phillips said that her school district never went remote but did have a mask policy for two years.
- Ms. Phillips said that her school district made an accommodation to allow children who could not wear a mask to wear a face shield instead but this led to an increase in bullying, as some children were excluded from working with certain peers because they said they did not want to work with someone who did not wear a mask.
- Ms. Phillips said that masks make otherwise invisible disabilities visible.

### **Camilla Franson**

- Ms. Franson said that she is a concerned citizen, a parent, and a chiropractic doctor.
- Ms. Franson said that she was delighted to see HB 1131 pass the House but was concerned about the 157 Representatives who voted against the bill. She said that they had voted against children.
- Ms. Franson said that Senators took their positions for the sake of improving the state and looking out for citizens; she said she did not see how someone could not vote for HB 1131.
- Ms. Franson said that she has not personally experienced a school with a mask mandate.
- Ms. Franson urged the Committee, as someone born in Sweden, to look at Sweden's experience with Covid-19. She said that Sweden remained open during the Covid-19 pandemic and did not have any lockdowns or mandates. She said that Sweden has not seen the level of depression or anxiety problems that are being seen in the United States.
- Ms. Franson encouraged the Committee to empower parents.

### **Patrice Myers**

#### **Concord**

- Ms. Myers said that America operates under a constitution which clearly delineates the inherent rights of an individual. She said that one of those rights is to breath fresh air and another is to not be mandated to wear or do things.
- Ms. Myers said that, as elected officials, the Committee took an oath to support the Constitution.
- Ms. Myers said that schools are no exempt from operating under the Constitution.

## **Former Representative JR Hoell**

### **ReopenNH**

- Mr. Hoell said that the people who support HB 1131 are citizens and people who oppose it are lobbyists.
- Mr. Hoell discussed the problems with masking, including lipreading and oxygen deprivation.
- Mr. Hoell said that masks are a medical device that are neither used nor installed appropriately.
- Mr. Hoell said that the importance of Vitamin D has never been discussed by the state.
- Mr. Hoell said that citizens would like to see themselves represented in votes, not just lobbyists.

### **Summary of testimony presented in opposition:**

#### **Representative Jerry Knirk**

##### **Carroll County District 3**

- Representative Knirk said that HB 1131 went to the House Education Committee instead of the House Health, Human Services, and Elderly Affairs Committee.
- Rep. Knirk said that there are negative public health consequences to passing HB 1131.
- Rep. Knirk said that he is currently comfortable with children not wearing masks in schools today but he was not comfortable with that a year ago.
- Rep. Knirk said that his prior position on masks in schools was not a blanket “yes” or “no” but was based on a flexibility determined by the conditions of the moment.
- Rep. Knirk said that the issue of masks in schools has become politicized. He said that it is wrong to blame masking for drops in educational outcomes given that there are other variables involved.
- Rep. Knirk said that the claim that masks are dangerous is contradictory to the respiratory process.
- Rep. Knirk said that, as a surgeon, he would wear masks all day while in surgery.
- Rep. Knirk said that it is better to not require masks if they are not need but that they could be needed at times.
- Rep. Knirk said that a social contract requires giving up some amount of personal liberty to ensure the protection of others. He read Part I, Article 3 of the New Hampshire Constitution: “When men enter into a state of society, they surrender up some of their natural rights to that society, in order to ensure the protection of others...”
- Rep. Knirk said that masks are part of a layered mitigation strategy.
- Rep. Knirk said that people do not have the liberty to drive after drinking excessive amounts of alcohol.
- Rep. Knirk said that a blanket prohibition on masks is bad, as it ties the hands of experts and local school boards.

## **Carla Smith**

### **New Hampshire Nurses Association (NHNA)**

- Ms. Smith said that local control helps to protect health and safety. She said that if HB 1131 passed, local authorities would not be able to reliably know that they were doing everything they could to protect people from exposure.
- Ms. Smith said that NHNA opposes HB 1131.
- Ms. Smith said that the private college she teaches at has a positivity rate of 0.7%.

## **Karen Rosenberg**

### **Disability Rights Center (DRC)**

- Ms. Rosenberg said that DRC opposes HB 1131. She said that DRC is concerned about children with complex medical needs who are particularly vulnerable to viruses or other infections.
- Ms. Rosenberg said that children with disabilities have a right to equal access to education, including requiring that people around them be masked or distanced.
- Ms. Rosenberg said that a blanket policy, even if a medical professional determines there is a need, is a disservice to children with disabilities.
- Ms. Rosenberg said that putting a teacher's license at risk if they were to accommodate a disability is unfortunate.

## **Debrah Howes**

### **AFT-NH**

- Ms. Howes said that AFT-NH opposes HB 1131.
- Ms. Howes said that schools should be able to react locally.
- Ms. Howes said that it is a ridiculous idea to penalize teachers for enforcing a policy made by a school board.

## **Brian Hawkins**

### **NEA-NH**

- Mr. Hawkins said that when students first returned to school, universal masking was supported by the CDC, DHHS, and Governor Sununu. He said that all praised schools for their low transmission rates.
- Mr. Hawkins said that including a violation of the code of conduct in HB 1131 was a cavalier addition to the bill, as the code of conduct was not established for that purpose.
- Mr. Hawkins said that enforcing a policy adopted by the school board should not threaten a teacher's license.

## **Frank Knaack**

### **ACLU-NH**

- Mr. Knaack said that medical associations recommend masking when the risk is high. He said that blanket prohibitions conflict with recommendations from those associations.
- Mr. Knaack said that HB 1131 would ban reasonable accommodations for children with underlying disabilities who cannot be excluded, forcing them to choose between their health and their education.
- Mr. Knaack said that multiple federal courts, including the 8<sup>th</sup> Circuit, the Western District of Virginia, and South Carolina, have recognized that blanket bans violate the ADA.

## **Nancy Brenna**

- Ms. Brenna said that she recently had a procedure done at Concord Hospital and everyone wore masks within the building; no one complained, no one protested, no one refused to wear a mask. She said that the only time she'd seen someone at a medical facility refuse to wear a mask was someone who had testified who took a picture without a mask on social media to show they had flaunted the rules.
- Ms. Brenna said that, at Concord Hospital, no one was gasping for air or collapsing due to oxygen deprivation.
- Ms. Brenna asked if the doctors and nurses who wear masks all day are conspiring to strip people of their freedoms or if they know something about medicine and the spread of diseases.
- Ms. Brenna said that to lift requirements where transmission is low is reasonable but a blanket ban on masks in schools seems foolish and short sighted.
- Ms. Brenna said that, other than a tiny subset of children, children are not harmed by wearing a mask.
- Ms. Brenna said that there are adults and children who legitimately cannot wear a mask, which is why HB 1131 is a bad idea. She said that a blanket ban would make it impossible to protect those who cannot protect themselves.

## **Louise Spencer**

### **Kent Street Coalition**

- Ms. Spencer said that it is not just lobbyists who oppose HB 1131.
- Ms. Spencer said that the members of the grassroots Kent Street Coalition opposed HB 1131.
- Ms. Spencer said that, often, lobbyists speak for a portion of the public.

# Testimony

HB 1131

Testimony by Rep. Ken Weyler

March 30, 2022

1. Forcing our students to wear face masks interferes with their learning and breathing.
2. This age group has the lowest experience with serious COVID infections, and data show little difference between groups forced to wear masks and those not wearing them.
3. This appears to be another area where school officials are attempting to take away the authority that should be naturally allowed to the parents.
4. Some time has passed since mask mandates were common, and this has allowed comparisons which showed the lack of effectiveness in mask wearing for students.
5. I would like to yield the rest of my time to Steven Petty, who has a body of research enforcing the subject of this bill, to forbid a school board or school official from mandating students to wear masks.

HB 1131

I come before you to neither advocate for the use or non-use of face masks, but rather to speak against the negative impact that HB 1131 has on the public health. At this point I am perfectly comfortable with kids not wearing a mask in school. But that was not where I stood a year ago. It is not because I am confused but because responses to public health must depend on the current situation. The re-opening plan passed by the Conway school board in Fall 2021 was well-designed as the question of mask wearing, including when and to what extent, was flexible and based upon current conditions at any given time.

The use of a face mask to prevent the transmission of a respiratory disease is a well accepted public health measure which has unfortunately become politicized. The best data we have supports the use of masks when necessary to prevent the transmission of respiratory diseases. We saw a great deal of misinformation about mask wearing over the past two years. Some have blamed the well-known educational losses in the past couple years on the wearing of masks. But this fails to take into account many other variables such as loss of instructional time due to schools being closed or children being quarantined, lack of access for virtual learning, difficulties at home due to lack of supervision and other events over the past two years. The claims of masks being dangerous due to carbon dioxide retention or lack of oxygen are contradictory to known respiratory physiology and clear evidence, not to mention commonsense and experience. As a surgeon I wore a mask all day long with no ill effect. It is clearly better not to require masks if they are not needed, but there may be times when they are needed as in what we just went through with COVID.

This bill is presented as supporting individual choice about wearing masks. But when people come together in society, there is a social contract to respect the liberty of others as well. Part 1, Article 3 of the New Hampshire state constitution says "When men [sic] enter into a state of society, they surrender up some of their natural rights to that society, in order to ensure the protection of others". For example, to protect others you do not have the liberty to drive after consuming alcohol excessively.

HB 1131 prohibits a school mandate of wearing a mask to control any respiratory illness, now and in the future. This blanket prohibition is wrong.

It is bad policy to place a prohibition of a potentially needed public health intervention into statute as it ties the hands of our public health experts and school boards who need the flexibility to be able to respond in real-time to communicable diseases. We do not know what may come at us in the future. HB 1131 prohibits mask wearing no matter what disease we are facing and no matter how bad the disease is or what is recommended by public health experts. Statutes take time to change and responses to public health need to be nimble and not restricted by statute. Please vote ITL on HB 1131.



Honored Senators, I have attached the following evidence re HB 1131:

**1. Public health officials have had no consistent or coherent scientific position regarding masks.**

Evidence: On March 8, 2020, Anthony Fauci spoke to 60 Minutes, telling the interviewer that at that time people should not wear masks because they were less effective than believed and that could lead people to touch their faces, thus having the "unintended" consequence of increasing the infection rate. (SEE ATTACHED TRANSCRIPT). Later Fauci changed his position. This inconsistency is true of many other politically involved health officials and others.

**2. Objective scientific research has concluded that masks don't work.** Although there are certainly politically motivated statistical "studies" alleging that masks have a beneficial effect, most objective studies have consistently concluded that MASKS DON'T WORK. Attached is a full scientific review published in Emerging Infectious Diseases, an authoritative journal, in May of 2020 comprehensively reviewing the evidence. (SEE XIAO 2020) This paper concluded the following:

*"In this review, we did not find evidence to support a protective effect of personal protective measures or environmental measures in reducing influenza trans-mission."*

**3. Entire countries have had Masks-Don't-Work policies.** Some countries, such as the Netherlands, recommended against wearing masks citing scientific studies and giving reasons such as Fauci originally gave (face touching causing higher infection rate). See attached transcript of Reuters article dated July 2020). It was not until December of 2020 that the Netherlands, under intense political pressure from the United States and other countries, relented and changed their policy.

**4. Masks harm emotional development in children.** Multiple studies have shown that masks are harmful to young children because they retard emotional and development by preventing them from seeing people's faces and receive emotional feedback via facial expressions. SEE ATTACHED STUDY GORI ET AL. The attached study concluded:

*"...a mask obstructing a face limits the ability of people of all ages to infer emotions expressed by facial features, but the difficulties associated with the mask's use are significantly pronounced in children aged between 3 and 5 years old."*

**5. Schools in New Hampshire have employed mask mandates chaotically and with no consistent policy.** In New Hampshire different schools have adopted different policies regarding masks and behaved completely politically with no consistent scientific method or approach. School officials with no medical qualifications whatsoever have been making essentially random political decisions concerning forcing students to wear masks and when and where to wear them. See attached news article from the NH bulletin.

## **Oppose HB 1131– Protect New Hampshire Students**

HB 1131 would prohibit school boards and accredited nonpublic schools from adopting, enforcing, or implementing a policy that requires students or members of the public to wear a facial covering.

**Major medical associations recommend universal indoor masking in K-12 schools under certain conditions.** At a minimum, the CDC,<sup>i</sup> the American Academy of Pediatrics,<sup>ii</sup> and the American Medical Association<sup>iii</sup> recommend universal indoor masking in K-12 schools when community level risk is considered “high.” While the CDC’s universal masking guidance is limited to communities with high COVID-19 levels, both the American Academy of Pediatrics and the AMA recommendations note that certain segments of the population remain vulnerable to COVID-19 infection regardless of the community risk level, including immunocompromised children, children with special health care needs who may be vaccinated but still are at higher risk for severe disease, and children who lack immunity.<sup>iv</sup> The consensus is clear – blanket prohibitions on mask mandates conflict with these guidelines.

**COVID remains a threat in New Hampshire schools.** Over 3,000 COVID-19 cases have been reported in New Hampshire’s K-12 schools, including 266 between March 19 - 25, 2022.<sup>v</sup> New Hampshire lawmakers should be focused on protecting children from COVID, not increasing their risk.

**COVID poses extreme risks to students with disabilities.** Children with disabilities, including a range of underlying medical conditions, are at increased risk of contracting and becoming severely ill from COVID when compared with other children. As the CDC noted, “[c]urrent evidence suggests that children with medical complexity, with genetic, neurologic, or metabolic conditions, or with congenital heart disease can be at increased risk for severe illness from COVID-19. Similar to adults, children with obesity, diabetes, asthma or chronic lung disease, sickle cell disease, or immunosuppression can also be at increased risk for severe illness from COVID-19.”<sup>vi</sup> In addition, people with intellectual disability are also at increased risk of contracting and dying from COVID. According to a study in the *New England Journal of Medicine*, using a data set of “64,858,460 patients across 547 health care organizations reveals that having an intellectual disability was the strongest independent risk factor for presenting with a Covid-19 diagnosis and the strongest independent risk factor other than age for Covid-19 mortality.”<sup>vii</sup> Universal masking is a tool to mitigate the risk to these students.

**Denying children with disabilities a safe learning environment violates federal law.** Under the Americans with Disabilities Act<sup>viii</sup> and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act,<sup>ix</sup> public schools cannot exclude students with disabilities, deny them equal access to their education, or segregate them unnecessarily, and they are obligated to provide reasonable modifications to policies, practices, and procedures in order to give students with disabilities an equal opportunity to benefit from their public education. Prohibiting schools from taking reasonable steps to protect the health of their students forces parents to make an impossible choice: their child’s education or their child’s health. This is a disability rights issue and schools who have children with these conditions have legal obligations under federal disability rights laws.

**Multiple Federal Courts have ruled that federal law requires schools to impose universal masking rules where necessary to ensure students with disabilities have access to public school education.** In Virginia, Judge Norman K. Moon of the U.S. District Court of the Western District of Virginia granted a preliminary injunction in a challenge to two Virginia laws that strip from school districts the ability to provide accommodations for students with disabilities by banning schools from using community masking as a COVID-19 prevention strategy.<sup>x</sup> The 8<sup>th</sup> Circuit Court of Appeals found in a case challenging a state mask prohibition on disability rights grounds that “Plaintiffs’ injuries are the foreseeable result of

Defendants' threatened enforcement of Section 280.31: the schools and school districts have gone without mask mandates because of the law and the threat of enforcement, and Plaintiffs have been forced to choose between their children's lives and the quality of their education."<sup>xi</sup> This decision followed a similar decision from the U.S. District Court for the District of South Carolina, which found that "[y]ears ago, ramps were added to schools to accommodate those with mobility-related disabilities so they could access a free public education. Today, a mask mandate works as a sort of ramp to allow children with disabilities access to their schools. Thus, the same legal authority requiring schools to have ramps requires that school districts have the option to compel people to wear masks at school."<sup>xii</sup> Legislators should avoid the mistakes and costly litigation (at taxpayers' expense) in other states and oppose this dangerous and unlawful legislation.

### **Oppose HB 1131 – No Parent should be forced to choose between their child's health and education.**

**Testimony of AFT-NH on HB1131**

To NH Senate Health and Human Services Committee

Dear Chairman Bradley and Members of the Committee,

My name is Debrah Howes. I am the president of the American Federation of Teachers-NH. AFT-NH represents 3,500 teachers, paraeducators and school support staff, public service employees and higher education staff across New Hampshire.

I write to you in opposition to HB1131 – relative to facial covering policies in schools. We are all overjoyed that COVID case transmission numbers have come down significantly and we are now, many of us, going without masks. Believe me, many of my members are enjoying being able to see whole faces at school, including lots of smiles. No one is eager to ever see a return to everyone wearing masks, but we also know that masks were an effective tool when case numbers were extremely high as part of the layered mitigation strategy that kept the spread of virus in check in our schools and allowed schools to remain open. We cannot predict what future variants this virus may develop, nor can we predict what other airborne viruses may occur in the future. It would be shortsighted to remove an effective tool from the toolbox of local school boards, who are the ones who make these policies.

We urge you to find this bill Inexpedient to Legislate to keep decision making on mask policies in the hands of those who know local conditions the best, local, elected school boards. They are best positioned to respond to a localized spike in contagious, airborne illness, and can act to add layers of mitigation as recommended in guidelines from reputable public health officials like the CDC or NH Department of Public Health Services. Local school boards also can act quickly to try to prevent severe shortages of healthy staff to keep schools open. They can also remove layers of mitigation when case rates fall locally. A one size fits all edict legislated from Concord goes against common sense and our NH tradition of local control. "Union of Professionals"

There is another piece of this bill that is particularly troublesome. This bill would punish educators who enforce a local mask policy with discipline under the Educator Code of Conduct, which could mean a loss of their teaching license. Teachers and school staff have to uphold the policies passed by their local school boards. To refuse to do so is insubordination and grounds to be fired. If you pass this law as it is written, you are now saying that you will punish educators if they **DO** enforce a locally passed policy. Teachers should not be put in the middle between their employer's policy and this law! I am urging you not to put teachers and school staff in this impossible situation.

Dear Chairperson Bradley and Members of the Senate Health and Human Services Committee;

I am providing this written testimony today on behalf of the NH Nurses Association in opposition to HB 1131 relative to facial covering in schools.

Historically, local schools have had the right to control policies for their employees and students to protect the health and safety of those same individuals and all who utilize their services. As the number of coronavirus cases continue to dip, current guidelines by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, intended to help communities assess their need for restrictions to reduce the transmission of the coronavirus, suggest that 90 percent of Americans can now stop wearing masks. Scientists acknowledge that the wide availability of vaccines and other mitigation strategies such as masks puts the nation in a better place than when the pandemic began; however, there is still concern that new variants will continue to spike surges. The World Health Organization this week reported that the number of new coronavirus cases increased two weeks in a row globally, likely because COVID-19 prevention measures have been halted in numerous countries and because BA.2 spreads more easily.

In a March 10, 2022 press release from the National Institutes of Health (<https://www.nih.gov/news-events/news-releases/mandatory-masking-schools-reduced-covid-19-cases-during-delta-surge>) it was reported that during the delta surge there were 72% fewer cases of in school transmission in schools that had mask mandates when compared to those schools that had optional or partial mask policies.

If all school boards were prevented from establishing reliable, science-based mitigations policies, employees and students would not be able to reliably know that they will be protected from exposure. School boards should not be prohibited from requiring masks in times when they are necessary to ensure the health and safety of those they serve. Restricting evidence-based strategies significantly inhibit those boards' ability to maintain a safe school community, while putting vulnerable and immune compromised students at risk.

The New Hampshire Nurses Association urges you to oppose HB 1131 and continue to give local control to school boards including the right to establish requirements for their own students and employees to protect the health and safety of those same individuals and all who utilize their facilities.

## Mandatory masking in schools reduced COVID-19 cases during Delta surge

*NIH-funded study compared more than 1.1 million students across nine states.*

### What

Schools with mandatory masking during the Delta surge had approximately 72% fewer cases of in-school transmission of SARS-CoV-2 when compared to schools with optional or partial masking policies, according to a study funded by the National Institutes of Health. The study included more than 1.1 million students and over 157,000 staff attending in-person school across nine states: North Carolina, Wisconsin, Missouri, California, Washington, Georgia, Tennessee, Kansas and Texas. The study is supported by NIH's Rapid Acceleration of Diagnostics – Underserved Populations (RADx-UP) program and the *Eunice Kennedy Shriver* National Institute of Child Health and Human Development (NICHD). It appears in *Pediatrics*.

The authors pointed out that their study was conducted when Delta was the dominant variant, and that their study did not obtain data on school masking in preventing the spread of the Omicron variant. However, they added that masking remains a critical preventive measure in times with high community infection rates with more transmissible variants, such as Omicron.

The U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recently updated its guidelines for masking and other preventive measures, taking into account community levels of COVID-19. The CDC recommends indoor masking in areas with high community levels of COVID-19. CDC's COVID-19 Community levels recommendations align precautions for educational settings with those for other community settings.

In the current study, most COVID-19 cases among students and staff were acquired from the community and approximately 10% of cases were acquired within school. The researchers found that for every 100 community-acquired cases, school districts with mandatory masking had approximately 7.3 cases of in-school infections, while optionally masked districts had 26.4 cases of in-school infections. In other words, school districts with optional masking had approximately 3.6 times the rate of in-school COVID-19 cases when compared to schools with mandatory masking. These data also show that mandatory masking was associated with a 72% reduction of in-school COVID-19 cases, compared to districts with optional masking.

The study included 61 school districts (kindergarten through grade 12) that provided data from July 26, 2021, through Dec. 13, 2021, a period encompassing the Delta surge and preceding the Omicron surge. In total, there were 40,601 primary infections acquired in the community (36,032 among students, 4,569 among staff) and 3,085 secondary infections acquired in school (2,844 among students, 241 among staff). Of these school districts, six districts (10%) had optional masking policies; nine had partial masking, i.e., policies that changed during the study or only applied to certain grade levels (15%); and the remaining 46 districts (75%) required masking for the entirety of the study.

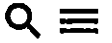

## Abstract

Many countries introduced the requirement to wear masks in public spaces for containing SARS-CoV-2 making it commonplace in 2020. Up until now, there has been no comprehensive investigation as to the adverse health effects masks can cause. The aim was to find, test, evaluate and compile scientifically proven related side effects of wearing masks. For a quantitative evaluation, 44 mostly experimental studies were referenced, and for a substantive evaluation, 65 publications were found. The literature revealed relevant adverse effects of masks in numerous disciplines. In this paper, we refer to the psychological and physical deterioration as well as multiple symptoms described because of their consistent, recurrent and uniform presentation from different disciplines as a Mask-Induced Exhaustion Syndrome (MIES). We objectified evaluation evidenced changes in respiratory physiology of mask wearers with significant correlation of O<sub>2</sub> drop and fatigue ( $p < 0.05$ ), a clustered co-occurrence of respiratory impairment and O<sub>2</sub> drop (67%), N95 mask and CO<sub>2</sub> rise (82%), N95 mask and O<sub>2</sub> drop (72%), N95 mask and headache (60%), respiratory impairment and temperature rise (88%), but also temperature rise and moisture (100%) under the masks. Extended mask-wearing by the general population could lead to relevant effects and consequences in many medical fields.

 The possible side effects and dangers of masks described in this paper are based on studies of different types of masks. These include the professional masks of the surgical mask type and N95/KN95 (FFP2 equivalent) that are commonly used in everyday life, but also the community fabric masks that were initially used. In the case of N95, the N stands for National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health of the United States (NIOSH), and 95 indicates the 95 per cent filtering capacity for fine particles up to at least 0.3  $\mu\text{m}$  [82].

A major risk of mask use in the general public is the creation of a false sense of security with regard to protection against viral infections, especially in the sense of a falsely assumed strong self-protection. Disregarding infection risks may not only neglect aspects of source control, but also result in other disadvantages. Although there are quite a few professional positive accounts of the widespread use of masks in the general populace [111], most of the serious and evident scientific reports conclude that the general obligation to wear masks conveys a false sense of security [4,5]. However, this leads to a neglect of those measures that, according to the WHO, have a higher level of effectiveness than mask-wearing: social distancing and hand hygiene [2,112]. Researchers were able to provide statistically significant evidence of a false sense of security and more risky behavior when wearing masks in an experimental setting [112].

Decision makers in many countries informed their citizens early on in the pandemic in March 2020 that people without symptoms should not use a medical mask, as this created a false sense of security [113]. The recommendation was ultimately changed in many countries. At least Germany pointed out that wearers of certain types of masks such as the common fabric masks (community masks) cannot rely on them to protect them or others from transmission of SARS-CoV-2 [114].

However, scientists not only complain about the lack of evidence for fabric masks in the scope of a pandemic [16,110], but also about the high permeability of fabric masks with particles and the potential risk of infection they pose [108,109]. Ordinary fabric masks with a 97% penetration for particle dimensions of  $\geq 0.3 \mu\text{m}$  are in stark contrast to medical-type surgical masks with a 44% penetration. In contrast, the N95 mask has a penetration rate of less than 0.01% for particles  $\geq 0.3 \mu\text{m}$  in the laboratory experiment [108,115].

For the clinical setting in hospitals and outpatient clinics, the WHO guidelines recommend only surgical masks for influenza viruses for the entire patient treatment except for the strongly aerosol-generating measures, for which finer filtering masks of the type N95 are suggested. However, the WHO's endorsement of specific mask types is not entirely evidence-based due to the lack of high-quality studies in the health sector [108,109,116,117].

Chairman Bradley and Honorable members of the Senate Health and Humans Services Committee,

My name is Megan Tuttle, President of NEA-NH, and I have the honor of representing more than 17,000 educators across our state who have gone to extraordinary lengths over the last 2 years to meet the countless challenges this pandemic has presented them so they can deliver the best education possible to the people who matter most to them, our students.

When many of our New Hampshire public schools transitioned back to in-person learning in the fall of 2020, the CDC and New Hampshire Public Health Department recommended mask wearing as a central tool to mitigate the spread of COVID-19 in our schools so that we could return to the place that educators and students wanted to be most, back in our classrooms. As has been discussed numerous times in this committee, by the Commissioner and by the State Board, in-person learning is the most effective setting for learning for the vast majority of our students and masking policies helped to ensure this could happen with less risk of spread and disruption for students, parents and educators. Governor Sununu and State Epidemiologist Dr. Ben Chan have on several occasions during their COVID-19 press conferences over the past 2 years noted that the spread of COVID in our schools was relatively low and we believe that is in part due to mask policies adopted by school districts.

We are opposed to HB 1131 because this would indefinitely prohibit the use of a masking policy even if recommended by our state public health agencies again should a new variant from COVID arise next fall like it did with Omicron or some other highly infections airborne pathogen. Why would we tie our own hands at keeping students, staff and our communities safe by enacting a blanket prohibition on the use of masks? None of us want to return to a remote instruction setting again, and if a masking policy is recommended by our public health officials to ensure we can stay in the classroom, we should do it. We should not be hamstrung by a piece of legislation that arrives at a conclusion, irrespective of science and facts.

We are also opposed to this bill because of the addition of the legal liabilities it places on schools and school staff, in particular, III of the HB 1131 states that a “Violation of this section by an

educator shall be considered a violation of the educator code of conduct that justifies disciplinary sanction by the state board of education.” The cavalier addition of this provision to a bill banning masks is insulting to educators and disregards the point of the educator code of conduct which was to establish a set of rules and standards around professional conduct. Under Ed 501.02 (t), Professional Conduct means “a set of established professional norms and behaviors” having to do with conducting oneself as a certified New Hampshire educator. Mask requirements, as have been implemented in our schools to keep students safe and reduce community transmission of COVID-19, have been at the recommendation of public health officials and adopted as policies by our local school boards. Making it a violation of the code for an educator to help ensure students are following a school district policy is the exact opposite of what that code was intended to do. Therefore, regardless of your position on the first part of the bill, bringing the threat of civil liability or code of conduct violation is in our opinion, nonsensical and far too extreme.

In summary, we feel HB 1131 ties the hands of public health and school leaders toward keeping our students safe and in the classroom, is too unyielding in its proposed punishments, and therefore we respectfully ask that you find HB 1131 Inexpedient-to-Legislate.

**Testimony for HB 1131**  
**Relative to facial covering policies for schools**  
**Senate Health and Human Services Committee**  
**March 30, 2022**

Dear Chairman Bradley and Members of the Committee:

The Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Public Health Services (DPHS) is providing the following information to the Senate Health and Human Services Committee in consideration of HB1131, *relative to facial coverings for school*.

Multiple studies have shown that face masks are effective at preventing the spread of COVID-19 and other respiratory diseases, especially when combined with other prevention strategies (see Howard et al. PNAS. 2021; CDC Science Brief; Andrejko et al. MMWR. Feb 2022). The American Academy of Pediatrics also supports the use of well-fitted masks in schools in addition to other mitigation strategies such as routine testing and vaccine.

However, recognizing that many people find the universal use of face masks not acceptable, the New Hampshire Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Public Health Services (DPHS) has based recommendations for face mask use on the level of COVID-19 risk – **when risk in our communities is high, we have recommended everyone wear face masks in indoor public locations, and as risk decreases we have recommended that face masks be worn only if a person wants increased protection for themselves or their family.** As the Omicron surge declined, population immunity and vaccine availability increased, and as effective therapeutics have been increasingly available, DPHS now recommends that people wear face masks based on self-assessment of risk and personal choice. **As a result, K-12 schools are no longer requiring face masks for their staff and students.**

Face masks have been an important bridging/transitional measure to allow schools and business to resume operations in the midst of a pandemic. Face masks have given our educational community increased confidence to return to full in-person learning when physical distancing was not possible, and masks have protected schools and classrooms from spreading COVID-19 which would result in staff and students missing educational days, and parents missing work. Over this last school year, unlike many other states where schools have had to go back to remote learning or where whole classrooms have been on quarantine, New Hampshire has had almost no schools or classrooms that have been required to take these more severe actions.

Like vaccine and routine testing, face masks were an important tool to help prevent respiratory disease outbreaks while keeping our children in school and maintaining our education workforce. School districts and parents appreciated this multi-pronged approach to support student learning and mitigating the risks of disease. As risks change, approaches need to be flexible. School staff, teachers and administrators should be supported as they continue to navigate in person learning.

Thank you for the opportunity to provide this information. The Department strives to provide public health protection while appropriately balancing individual choice.

Gainesville, FL (June 16, 2021) – A group of parents in Gainesville, FL, concerned about potential harms from masks, submitted six face masks to a lab for analysis. The resulting report found that five masks were contaminated with bacteria, parasites, and fungi, including three with dangerous pathogenic and pneumonia-causing bacteria. No viruses were detected on the masks, although the test is capable of detecting viruses.

The analysis detected the following 11 alarmingly dangerous pathogens on the masks:

- *Streptococcus pneumoniae* (pneumonia)
- *Mycobacterium tuberculosis* (tuberculosis)
- *Neisseria meningitidis* (meningitis, sepsis)
- *Acanthamoeba polyphaga* (keratitis and granulomatous amebic encephalitis)
- *Acinetobacter baumannii* (pneumonia, blood stream infections, meningitis, UTIs— resistant to antibiotics)
- *Escherichia coli* (food poisoning)
- *Borrelia burgdorferi* (causes Lyme disease)
- *Corynebacterium diphtheriae* (diphtheria)
- *Legionella pneumophila* (Legionnaires' disease)
- *Staphylococcus pyogenes* serotype M3 (severe infections—high morbidity rates)
- *Staphylococcus aureus* (meningitis, sepsis)

Half of the masks were contaminated with one or more strains of pneumonia-causing bacteria. One-third were contaminated with one or more strains of meningitis-causing bacteria. One-third were contaminated with dangerous, antibiotic-resistant bacterial pathogens. In addition, less dangerous pathogens were identified, including pathogens that can cause fever, ulcers, acne, yeast infections, strep throat, periodontal disease, Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever, and more.

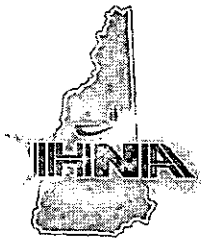


The face masks studied were new or freshly-laundered before wearing and had been worn for 5 to 8 hours, most during in-person schooling by children aged 6 through 11. One was worn by an adult. A t-shirt worn by one of the children at school and unworn masks were tested as controls. No pathogens were found on the controls. Proteins found on the t-shirt, for example, are not pathogenic to humans and are commonly found in hair, skin, and soil.

A parent who participated in the study, Ms. Amanda Donoho, commented that this small sample points to a need for more research: "We need to know what we are putting on the faces of our children each day. Masks provide a warm, moist environment for bacteria to grow."

These local parents contracted with the lab because they were concerned about the potential of contaminants on masks that their children were forced to wear all day at school, taking them on and off, setting them on various surfaces, wearing them in the bathroom, etc. This prompted them to send the masks to the University of Florida's Mass Spectrometry Research and Education Center for analysis.

Dear Chairperson Bradley and Members of the Senate Health and Human Services Committee;

I am providing this written testimony today on behalf of the NH Nurses Association in opposition to HB 1131 relative to facial covering in schools.

Historically, local schools have had the right to control policies for their employees and students to protect the health and safety of those same individuals and all who utilize their services. As the number of coronavirus cases continue to dip, current guidelines by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, intended to help communities assess their need for restrictions to reduce the transmission of the coronavirus, suggest that 90 percent of Americans can now stop wearing masks. Scientists acknowledge that the wide availability of vaccines and other mitigation strategies such as masks puts the nation in a better place than when the pandemic began, however, there is still concern that new variants will continue to spike surges. The World Health Organization this week reported that the number of new coronavirus cases increased two weeks in a row globally, likely because COVID-19 prevention measures have been halted in numerous countries and because BA.2 spreads more easily.

In a March 10, 2022 press release from the National Institutes of Health (<https://www.nih.gov/news-events/news-releases/mandatory-masking-schools-reduced-covid-19-cases-during-delta-surge>) it was reported that during the delta surge there were 72% fewer cases of in school transmission in schools that had mask mandates when compared to those schools that had optional or partial mask policies.

If all school boards were prevented from establishing reliable, science-based mitigations policies, employees and students would not be able to reliably know that they will be protected from exposure. School boards should not be prohibited from requiring masks in times when they are necessary to ensure the health and safety of those they serve. Restricting evidence-based strategies significantly inhibit those boards' ability to maintain a safe school community, while putting vulnerable and immune compromised students at risk.

The New Hampshire Nurses Association urges you to oppose HB 1131 and continue to give local control to school boards including the right to establish requirements for their own students and employees to protect the health and safety of those same individuals and all who utilize their facilities.

- During the pandemic there has been a constant refrain to “follow the science,” which I agree with. The problem is that school districts have been following our health authorities, who are not following the science. Decades of the best scientific evidence - meta-analyses of randomized controlled trials have shown unequivocally that **face masks do not reduce viral transmission**.
- The randomized controlled trials were done on influenza like viruses and it was found that the **viral particles are too small and go right through masks**. The SARS COV2 virus is even smaller in size than the influenza virus, therefore the data can apply to SARS COV2.
- Anthony Fauci, Director of the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases, originally stated that masks were not effective against SARS COV2, which is in line with the decades of research. He later changed his position, based on a new meta-analysis of a handful of studies. I have looked at those studies, none of which were Randomized Controlled Trials. They were retrospective observational studies, which are the weakest form of scientific evidence, because they are correlational.



- One has to ask why Anthony Fauci shifted his position on mask wearing based on such weak scientific data over against the decades of Randomized Controlled Trials.
- Not only are masks ineffective against the transmission of Covid19, but they can increase the risk of developing a respiratory illness by causing arterial oxygen deprivation (also known as hypoxia), which reduces innate immunity.
- Wearing a mask for even just a minute or two raises carbon dioxide levels to over 10,000 parts per million. OSHA's recommendation is a maximum of 5,000 parts per million of carbon dioxide over an 8 hour work day. Our children are wearing masks in school for 6-7 hours a day!
- Masks can increase infection risk is by becoming a breeding ground for bacteria, viruses and fungi that are already in the body and exhaled via the breath and get caught in the mask. Masks worn for extended periods of time become warm and moist which is the perfect breeding ground for these microorganisms.
- There are also many negative physiological and psychological impacts from wearing face masks. Reduced oxygen can lead to headaches, fatigue, anxiety and a decline in cognitive functioning (focus, memory). Face masks can significantly impair communication, social connectedness, and students' psychological well-being. When the brain is not getting enough oxygen, its functioning is affected altogether, including the areas of the brain that regulate mood. There has been an increase in psychological issues and even suicides in children and teens during the pandemic. CDC data showed a 24 percent increase in emergency room mental health visits for children ages 5 to 11, compared to 2019. Among adolescents ages 12 to 17, that increase is 31 percent. Last summer, the CDC reported that one in four young adults had contemplated suicide in the previous month.
- Finally, I would like to emphasize that our children are not at great risk from COVID-19. Based on CDC data, the risk of children between the ages of zero and 19 years of age dying from CoVID-19 is an incredibly low risk of 0.003%.
- Competitive athletes and students in Physical Education classes have been required to wear masks during physical fitness activities, while they are breathing hard with an elevated heart rate. This is especially dangerous and is absolutely unacceptable.

- School teachers and staff are also not at great risk from COVID-19. The risk of adults under the age of 49 dying from Covid is .02% and the risk of adults under the age of 69 dying from Covid is .5%. This would include most or all of the staff in New Hampshire school systems.
- With such a low risk from COVID, how is taking all of these risks associated with having our children wear masks justifiable?

Dear Chairman Bradley and Members of the Committee,

My name is Debrah Howes. I am the president of the American Federation of Teachers-NH. AFT-NH represents 3,500 teachers, paraeducators and school support staff, public service employees and higher education staff across New Hampshire.

I write to you in opposition to HB1131 – relative to facial covering policies in schools. We are all overjoyed that COVID case transmission numbers have come down significantly and we are now, many of us, going without masks. Believe me, many of my members are enjoying being able to see whole faces at school, including lots of smiles. No one is eager to ever see a return to everyone wearing masks, but we also know that masks were an effective tool when case numbers were extremely high as part of the layered mitigation strategy that kept the spread of virus in check in our schools and allowed schools to remain open. We cannot predict what future variants this virus may develop, nor can we predict what other airborne viruses may occur in the future. It would be shortsighted to remove an effective tool from the toolbox of local school boards, who are the ones who make these policies.

We urge you to find this bill Inexpedient to Legislate to keep decision making on mask policies in the hands of those who know local conditions the best, local, elected school boards. They are best positioned to respond to a localized spike in contagious, airborne illness, and can act to add layers of mitigation as recommended in guidelines from reputable public health officials like the CDC or NH Department of Public Health Services. Local school boards also can act quickly to try to prevent severe shortages of healthy staff to keep schools open. They can also remove layers of mitigation when case rates fall locally. A one size fits all edict legislated from Concord goes against common sense and our NH tradition of local control.

There is another piece of this bill that is particularly troublesome. This bill would punish educators who enforce a local mask policy with discipline under the Educator Code of Conduct, which could mean a loss of their teaching license. Teachers and school staff have to uphold the policies passed by their local school boards. To refuse to do so is insubordination and grounds to be fired. If you pass this law as it is written, you are now saying that you will punish educators if they **DO** enforce a locally passed policy. Teachers should not be put in the middle between their employer's policy and this law! I am urging you not to put teachers and school staff in this impossible situation.

On behalf of my members, I am urging that the committee find this bill Inexpedient to Legislate.

Honored Senators, I have attached the following evidence re HB 1131.

**1. Public health officials have had no consistent or coherent scientific position regarding masks.** Evidence: On March 8, 2020, Anthony Fauci spoke to 60 Minutes, telling the interviewer that at that time people should not wear masks because they were less effective than believed and that could lead people to touch their faces, thus having the "unintended" consequence of increasing the infection rate. (SEE ATTACHED TRANSCRIPT). Later Fauci changed his position. This inconsistency is true of many other politically involved health officials and others.

**2. Objective scientific research has concluded that masks don't work.** Although there are certainly politically motivated statistical "studies" alleging that masks have a beneficial effect, most objective studies have consistently concluded that MASKS DON'T WORK. Attached is a full scientific review published in Emerging Infectious Diseases, an authoritative journal, in May of 2020 comprehensively reviewing the evidence. (SEE XIAO 2020) This paper concluded the following:

*"In this review, we did not find evidence to support a protective effect of personal protective measures or environmental measures in reducing influenza transmission."*

**3. Entire countries have had Masks-Don't-Work policies.** Some countries, such as the Netherlands, recommended against wearing masks citing scientific studies and giving reasons such as Fauci originally gave (face touching causing higher infection rate). See attached transcript of Reuters article dated July 2020). It was not until December of 2020 that the Netherlands, under intense political pressure from the United States and other countries, relented and changed their policy.

**4. Masks harm emotional development in children.** Multiple studies have shown that masks are harmful to young children because they retard emotional and development by preventing them from seeing people's faces and receive emotional feedback via facial expressions. SEE ATTACHED STUDY GORI ET AL. The attached study concluded:

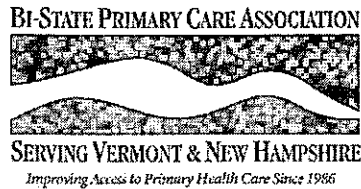

**5. Dear Chairman Bradley and Members of the Health and Human Services Committee:

Bi-State Primary Care Association and our members respectfully request HB 1131, relative to facial covering policies for schools, be recommended inexpedient to legislate. Bi-State is unable to attend the public hearing in person, and we thank you for the opportunity to submit written testimony to your committee electronically.

Bi-State and our members write to you in strong opposition of HB 1131 because it will result in limiting educational institutions' ability to mitigate the spread of deadly disease. We believe that it also prohibits school officials from considering requests by individuals with disabilities for reasonable accommodations pursuant to federal law.

Bi-State Primary Care Association (Bi-State) is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization, formed by two health and social service leaders in 1986 to advance access to comprehensive primary care and preventive services for all, with special emphasis on those most in need in New Hampshire and Vermont. Today, Bi-State represents 28 member organizations across both states that provide comprehensive primary care services to over 300,000 patients at 146 locations. Our members include community health centers (CHCs), federally qualified health centers (FQHCs), rural health clinics (RHCs), area health education center programs, and Planned Parenthood of Northern New England. New Hampshire's 13 health centers serve approximately 112,000 patients at locations across the state, including in those districts represented by the members of this esteemed committee.

**Bi-State and our members oppose HB 1131 because it will prohibit New Hampshire's schools from enacting public health measures designed to minimize the spread of infectious diseases.**

HB 1131 prohibits school boards of school districts, chief executive officers of chartered public schools or public academies from “adopting, enforcing, or implementing a policy that requires students or members of the public” from wearing a facial covering unless it is for a “specific extracurricular or instructional purpose.” Public health measures, such as masks, are designed to and can protect members of our communities, including those who cannot wear masks, from deadly disease. In a recent study included in the CDC’s Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Report (MMWR), scientists found that “consistent use of a face mask or respirator in indoor public settings was associated with lower odds of positive SARS-CoV-2 test result.”<sup>1</sup> Today, New Hampshire school districts can require masks in classrooms where there are clusters of COVID-19 cases to prevent the further spread of disease. If HB 1131 were to become law, our school districts would be prohibited from requiring classrooms mask despite knowing there was a communicable disease spreading in that group of students and staff.

The bill does not seem to take into consideration the needs and rights of children and staff with disabilities; and prohibits school districts (and school boards) from considering requests for reasonable accommodations pursuant to federal law.<sup>2</sup> However, the bill explicitly allows public school boards, “governing person or a body of a school” to require facial coverings in certain circumstances: facial coverings for sports, handling chemicals, fire, or “other hazardous elements from scientific or similar educational purposes.”

HB 1131 puts school districts at odds with federal law by eliminating the districts’ ability to consider requests for reasonable accommodations from children with individualized education programs and Section 504 plans. Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 ensures children with disabilities have equal opportunities to access their schools, school programs, and school activities. The Individuals with Disabilities Education Act of 1975 requires schools to provide a free public education to students with disabilities that is tailored to the needs of the student. This means that students can request an “accommodation” that would allow the student to continue to access public education, including masks being worn by the child, and the children and school staff in near vicinity to the child.

There are people of all ages who are more likely than others to become severely ill or die from COVID-19, including people with cancer, cystic fibrosis, type 1 and type 2 diabetes, Down syndrome, cerebral palsy, pregnancy, and people with intellectual and developmental disabilities. Children with underlying health conditions attend our public schools, and they deserve and are lawfully entitled to an education that does not jeopardize their safety.

In February 2022, the state of Virginia passed S 739, which is similar to HB 1131 in that parents choose whether their children wear a mask, regardless of the needs of the children with disabilities or chronic conditions in the classroom. The parents of twelve public school children who have disabilities and diagnoses that put them at “severe health risk if they should contract COVID-19” filed suit against the Commonwealth of Virginia.<sup>3</sup> March 23, 2022, the US District Court Western District of Virginia As the United States District Court Waster District of Virginia confirmed in a recent injunction, individuals with compromised immune systems and/or

disabilities are at “heighted risk of severe illness or death, and that transmission of COVID-19 in their communities and schools specifically presents an acute, ongoing risk...”<sup>4</sup>

Further, New Hampshire voters elect their school districts’ school boards, and HB 1131 ties the hands of elected officials by prohibiting those elected officials from considering policies that impact the health, welfare, and education of their constituents. HB 1131 also creates a cause of action against school officials even though those very same school officials had no ability to consider requests for or against facial coverings.

HB 1131 will harm children and school staff with complex medical needs. It will also place additional burdens on our educational system to find in-home educational opportunities if these children were unable to attend school due to a lack of accommodations. We know that employing mitigation measures such as masks in schools prevents the spread of disease. Eliminating the ability of the local authorities to require masks to prevent disease spread will undoubtedly increase the number of COVID-19 cases and burden our health care system even more than it is today. COVID-19 will continue to overwhelm our health care system if we unilaterally prohibit mitigation measures.

For these reasons and more, Bi-State Primary Care Association and our members respectfully request the Committee recommend HB 1131 be inexpedient to legislate.

**Summary of testimony presented in support:**

**Representative Peter Torosian**

**Rockingham County District 14**

- Representative Torosian said that HB 1099 was originally more narrowly defined to restrict the Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) from requiring passports for services.
- Rep. Torosian said that, as amended, HB 1099 also includes other political subdivisions such as counties, cities, towns, and school districts.
- Rep. Torosian said that HB 1099 was brought forward because in 2021 DHHS scheduled, and attempted to have a public hearing on, the idea of requiring vaccine

passports. He said that the hearing had so many people attend that there wasn't enough room in the meeting space so it got cancelled. He said that the people were overwhelmingly against the move to change and require a mandate.

- Rep. Torosian said that HB 1099 codifies in law that every person has a natural, inherent right to bodily integrity, free from any threat of compulsion by the government.
- Senator Sherman said that DHHS oversees the state Medicaid program, as well as several different entities that receive Medicaid dollars, such as nursing homes and physician practices. He asked if HB 1099 would prohibit a private entity, such as a private practice pediatrician, from not accepting non-vaccinated patients?
  - Rep. Torosian stated that it is his understanding that it would not but he is not an expert in that area. He said that the governmental entities that he mentioned previously would be who the bill is targeting.
- Senator Sherman said that there is a process for determining what vaccines are required for school age children. He asked, since that process is within DHHS and since school districts are mentioned in HB 1099, if DHHS would no longer will have that ability.
  - Rep. Torosian replied that HB 1099 specifically refers to the Covid-19 vaccine and does not apply to other vaccines.
- Senator Sherman said that there are multiple Covid-19 variants and asked, if another one comes along that is as deadly as the Delta variant was and as contagious as the avian flu, and the only way to protect people would be to require vaccines, if HB 1099 would take the ability to respond appropriately away.
  - Rep. Torosian said that HB 1099 is specifically for Covid-19.
- Senator Sherman stated that he is referring to a variant of Covid-19 and asked if HB 1099 is taking away the ability of DHHS to react to a new variant, as yet to arrive, where the only response is a vaccine.
  - Senator Gray said that that question is too much conjecture for Rep. Torosian to be able to answer.
  - Senator Sherman said that he would wait to ask DHHS.
- Rep. Torosian stated that HB 1099 does not take away the ability for people to become immunized if they choose, but it does prevent people from being forced to be vaccinated by the government. He said that it would not interfere with the private sector.

## **Representative Betty Gay**

### **Rockingham County District 8**

- Representative Gay said that HB 1099 is specifically aimed at Covid-19.
- Rep. Gay said that there are multiple ways to protect other people if you are sick and carrying the disease. She questioned if immunization is the only way to protect other people. She said that immunizations for Covid-19 only last for a few months.

- Rep. Gay said that other countries that do a better job than the United States, like Israel, have a lot of data on immunizations.

**Russan Chester**

**Bedford**

- Ms. Chester said that she believes it needs to be on the record in the state of New Hampshire that people can choose to not be vaccinated for Covid-19.
- Ms. Chester said that there have been many adverse effects to the Covid-19 vaccines.
- Ms. Chester said that she has worked with people with disabilities and elderly people for many years and in many situations there are a lot of reasons why someone should not get vaccinated.
- Ms. Chester said that it has become an issue of discrimination where people are refused services because they choose not to be vaccinated.
- Ms. Chester said that she is a vaccine injured individual but not from the Covid-19 vaccine. She said that she chose to get the vaccine and that it how it should be.

Good morning,

Please support HB 1131 to prohibit mask mandates.

Mask mandates are not effective, have never been recommended as part of standard pandemic response protocol, and cause real social and physical harm to children. Masks do not reduce the transmission of respiratory viruses and no real-world studies or data from recent mandates demonstrated any significant reduction in Covid transmission.

*"The endorsement of masking by medical bodies and public health authorities worldwide, entailed the abandonment of a longstanding view that masks were a useless and even harmful intervention. Over the previous decades, numerous randomized controlled trials had assessed the efficacy of masks in controlling the spread of respiratory viruses like influenza, and pandemic simulations had evaluated their potential.*

*A document published by the World Health Organization in 2019 framed the results of these studies in no uncertain terms: **"there was no evidence that face masks are effective in reducing transmission of laboratory-confirmed influenza"**.*

Additionally, potential harms of masks were never studied and fully quantified, particularly for universal, constant wearing by children. Masks cause skin infections; reduced periodontal health in the form of increased cavities, gum disease, and dry mouth; eye infections and mask-induced dry eyes; and they impede normal breathing and should never be worn while exercising or engaged in play or vigorous activity. Any people, but especially children, who suffer from hearing, speech, or developmental impediments, suffer disproportionately from being masked and having their ability to communicate severely limited.

Not only are masks ineffective at preventing Covid transmission, but Covid is not an emergency for children, or for most of the population for that matter. The risk of severe illness or death in healthy children is almost nil. Johns Hopkins researchers studied 48,000 children and found a mortality rate of zero among children without a serious pre-existing medical condition, such as leukemia. Additionally, children are at very low risk of infecting other children or adults as shown in household studies, and most recently in a study from Iceland.

In summary, you have an illness that poses very little risk to children, who in turn - if they become infected - are at low risk of transmitting it, for a disease that most people have already had, and in the vast majority of people presents no more risk than the seasonal flu. There is no justification for forced masking of children: the situation doesn't warrant it, and studies and mandates have demonstrated no significant evidence to support universal masking. All mask mandates should be removed and never implemented again.

Hello,

This letter is sent with all due respect. I am sure that being a policy maker in these tough times is very challenging. At this stage we have the benefit of much research, scientific study, and analyses to consider when assessing risk vs. benefit. I hope you will kindly consider the following and support HB1131 and keep masks off our children...

**There's an abundance of medical literature indicating masks are ineffective and can be harmful.**  
150 comparative studies and articles compiled by the Brownstone Institute demonstrate that face masks are largely ineffective, have no impact on controlling transmission of the COVID-19 virus and can actually be harmful.

This study from *International Journal of Environmental Research and Public Health* shows prolonged mask use is correlated with significant drops in oxygen, increases in carbon dioxide levels, fatigue, headaches, moisture build-up, temperature rise of the skin and air under the mask, and respiratory impairment.

**Masks cause physical and developmental harm.**

This research report from *Frontiers in Psychology* explains that faces hidden by masks make it difficult for other people to decipher facial expressions. This is more detrimental for toddlers, who rely on facial cues to develop emotional reasoning and social skills.

There is also new evidence in a longitudinal observational study posted on *medRxiv* that suggests significant reductions in cognitive function and performance in children born during the pandemic era.

**Masks are ineffective at stopping or slowing the spread of respiratory viruses.**

In this *Cochrane* review, the authors discuss how surgical masks and N95s may make little to no difference in contracting flu-like or respiratory illnesses.

A study in *The BMJ* also finds that cloth masks have been shown to actually increase risk of infection.

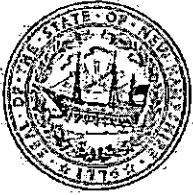

**Governor's Veto Message Regarding House Bill 1131**

By the authority vested in me, pursuant to part II, Article 44 of the New Hampshire Constitution, on May 20, 2022, I have vetoed House Bill 1131, an act relative to facial covering policies for schools.

Just because we may not like a local decision, does not mean we should remove their authority. One of the State's foremost responsibilities is to know the limits of its power.

As Granite Staters, we take pride in local control and our bottom-up approach to education. Similar to our fight to retain states' rights against a bloated and ever-encroaching federal government, we have a responsibility to ensure the State minimizes its infringement on local control. Big government is never the solution, and neither is a one-size-fits-all approach.

The State must remain steadfast in protecting local control as decisions like this are best left to authorities closest to parents and families where they can work with their neighbors to decide what is right for their children.

For the reasons stated above, I have vetoed House Bill 1131.
