Summary of testimony presented:

Representative Plett, Hillsborough-District 6

- HB 1148 is designed to keep municipalities from enacting ordinances to prevent fuel types for power production and conversion. This is a state responsibility solely and we have a Site Evaluation Committee to aide in this decision making.
- Any type of power generation or conversion when proposed and no matter the nature appears to engender a negative response.
- The SEC may reject many proposed future projects, but the projects should not be subject to “death by a thousand cuts” on a municipal level.

- The bill amends RSA 362 by inserting a new section in 362.9 to prohibit government entities subordinate to the state from restricting the types of fuel sources that may be used for energy. It is geared to energy production or conversion.
- Municipalities may still have zoning. However, municipalities may not deliberately throw monkey wrenches by changing the zoning to prohibit a project from going forward. Municipalities may go to the SEC to express their support or opposition to a project.
- Senator Avarad asked if municipalities are targeting projects and then making rules to undermine them. Representative Plett stated that they may, and this bill prohibits it.
- Senator Avarad asked if this undermines local control. Representative Plett stated that there is no local control in New Hampshire. The control that localities have is granted by the legislature.
- Senator Watters asked if lines 5-6 have the effect of restricting or prohibiting. He asked how this can be determined. Representative Plett stated that the bill ensures that municipalities cannot adopt ordinances that ban certain energy types such as wind or nuclear. They cannot impose zoning to kill a project no matter the nature of the project.
- Senator Watters asked how it can be determined that this is happening. Representative Plett stated that this is something that the SEC would have to determine.
- Senator Watters asked if the bill could have an effective date of January 1, 2023, so that municipalities can have a chance to react. Representative Plett stated that the committee may modify the bill as they see fit. The intent is that municipalities should not be doing this.

John Gage

- He is a local energy committee volunteer in Windham, and he opposes the bill. He stated that carbon pricing is being developed by other countries around the world.
- He wants to decarbonize his town and the state.
- Towns should be able to make decisions on how they get their energy generated. The towns should be able to do what their citizens voted to do regarding lowering net emissions.

Natch Greyes, NHMA

- Senator Watters asked if municipalities have the legal right to exclude certain energy sources. Mr. Greyes stated that this is a complicated issue. What we

have seen is community power. They have seen interest in moving towards more renewable sources.

- They have an issue with restricting or prohibiting. This is because it is not clear when a zoning ordinance would spill into having a restricting effect. This would be a case-by-case issue. We have not seen a lot of this currently.

Testimony of Rep. Fred Plett April 25, 2022

HB1148 is designed to keep municipalities from enacting ordinances to prevent fuel types for power production or conversion. Determinations of this type are a state responsibility solely, and we have a Site Evaluation Committee to aid in this decision making.

Any kind of power generation or conversion, when proposed, and no matter the nature, appears to engender a negative response, whether it is simply a “not in my back yard” mentality, or ideology driving an argument against a particular technology.

Antrim Wind, Northern Pass, and Liberty Utilities Granite Bridge (27 miles of new natural gas pipeline to be buried along Route 101 from Stratham to Manchester, along with an Epping LNG storage facility), are recent examples of controversial proposals, all of which except Antrim Wind, failed or were modified to something entirely different. The Site Evaluation Committee may still red-light many proposed future projects, but the projects ought not be subject to death by a thousand cuts at the municipal level.

This bill amends RSA 362 by inserting a new section 362.9 to prohibit government entities subordinate to the state from restricting the types of fuel sources that may be used for energy. As such, it is geared towards energy production or conversion.

It was pointed out to me that SB 86, passed last session and now law, prohibited restrictions on the installation of certain commercially available heating systems and engaging the services of certain energy providers. I see the subject matter as different – one prohibiting restrictions on energy production or conversion, the other prohibiting restrictions on heating systems. Nevertheless, I went back to the Office of Legislative Services if the language of either could be tweaked to cut down on overall verbiage in the statutes. I was told by OLS that SB 86 amends

RSA 155-A:2 and RSA 674:51, both of which are relative to the state building code. The language of the new section inserted by this bill is inserted into RSA 362 because it is a regulation of energy production. I confirmed my belief.
