#### HB 1165 - AS INTRODUCED

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#### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

In the Year of Our Lord Two Thousand Twenty Two

AN ACT repealing the Granite State paid family leave plan.

Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

1 Insurance; Allocation of State Premium Tax. Amend RSA 400-A:32, III to read as follows:

2 III.(a) Except as provided in [subparagraphs] subparagraph (b) [and (c)], the taxes 3 imposed in paragraphs I and II of this section shall be promptly forwarded by the commissioner to 4 the state treasurer for deposit to the general fund.

(b) Taxes imposed attributable to premiums written for medical and other medical related services for the newly eligible Medicaid population as provided for under RSA 126-AA shall be deposited into the New Hampshire granite advantage health care trust fund established in RSA 126-AA:3. The commissioner shall notify the state treasurer of sums for deposit into the New Hampshire granite advantage health care trust fund no later than 30 days after receipt of said taxes.

The moneys in the trust fund may be used for the administration of the New Hampshire granite
advantage health care program, established in RSA 126-AA.

12 [(c) Taxes-imposed on premiums written by duly authorized insurance companies for 13 family and medical leave insurance written in connection with the administration of RSA 21-I:99 14 through RSA 21 I:111 or RSA 282 B shall be deposited into the FMLI premium stabilization trust 15 fund established in RSA-282 B:5. The commissioner shall notify the state treasurer of sums for 16 deposit into the FMLI premium stabilization trust fund no later than 30 days after receipt of said 17 taxes.]

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2 Repeal. The following are repealed:

19 I. RSA 21-I:99-111, relative to the Granite State paid family leave plan.

20 II. RSA 77-E:3-e, relative to the Granite State paid family leave plan tax credit.

21 III. RSA 282-B, relative to purchasing pool for family and medical leave insurance.

IV. RSA 275:37-d, relative to discrimination against employees utilizing certain family and
 medical leave insurance.

V. RSA 6:12, I(b)(374)-(375), relative to the FMLI premium fund and premium stabilization
trust fund.

26 3 Effective Date. This act shall take effect 60 days after its passage.

Who is neutral on the bill: NH Insurance Dept.

#### Summary of testimony presented:

#### **Rep. Andrew Prout**

- This bill would repeal the Granite State family leave plan that was inserted in HB2. The budget process last year included many policy changes, and he disagrees with this policy change.
- The program was sold as a voluntary, private insurance plan but it is 100% taxpayer funded for the 11,000 state employees covered by it.
- Private insurance similar to this offering is already available and costs much more.
- It will create a monopoly for the winner of the state RFP.

- The tax credits available for businesses that opt into this program are only available if they contract through the winner of the state RFP.
- They cannot self-insure or work with another insurance company and still take advantage of that tax credit.
- The House committee heard from the Insurance Commissioner that he thought the market would still be competitive despite this 50% tax credit. Rep. Prout said he did not see how that could be true with that severe a price advantage.
- Rep. Prout believes this program, as written, will end all competition in the short-term disability and family leave marketplace in NH.
- This will also affect county, municipal, and school budgets. An unnegotiated free gift to state
   employees will not go unnoticed by county and local government employees. This program will grow, and local governments will be left holding the bag.
- This program puts all nonprofit organizations at a similar disadvantage. They don't pay business profits tax (BPT) so they cannot make use of the tax credit, yet they will still need to offer the same benefit, unsubsidized, to remain competitive in the labor market.
- We don't need programs like this for employers to offer great benefits to their employees.

# Rep. Len Turcotte

- The Granite State family leave plan came from the Governor in the original HB2. He was involved in getting that removed from HB2. If it hadn't been removed, the Senate would not have received a budget from the House. The plan was added back in to HB2 by the Senate.
- On the last day of the committee of conference negotiations, House leadership determined FMLI was not to be part of HB2 under certain conditions, which were never met. FMLI was put in against House leadership's direction.
- The Chair of House Finance was later removed from the committee and then resigned. That was over having FMLI in HB2.
- This is not a Republican or conservative issue. This is a liberal issue.
- Over the last year there has been no mention of FMLI being included in any public meetings or media. It is not mentioned when discussing other accomplishments from last year because it's not a Republican issue.
- This bill came out of the House committee 11-10. On the House floor, it passed 172-164. Almost everyone voting to keep it was a Democrat and almost everyone voting to repeal it was a Republican.
- During the committee of conference, their caucus vote 11-1 against including FMLI in HB2.
- 11,000 state employees will receive this benefit on the backs of taxpayers.
- We passed this bill without knowing the cost. We know the cost of an average state employee. The bill allows 6 weeks at 60%. We don't know how many people will use it. This will cost tens of millions of dollars. He questioned who will cover the lost time and if it would mean more employees or overtime.
- The bill talks about purpose and policy. It is a cut and paste from a failed attempt from a few years ago to have a dual program with Vermont.
- He said it is nonsense that this would attract workers to NH. The states that have FMLI are the most heavily taxed and have the most net negative migration.
- Individuals are not going to flock to NH for paid FMLI.
- At the House hearing, the Insurance Commissioner said businesses were excited about this program, but he couldn't name them or say how many.

- He asked the commissioner what the revenue loss would be from the 50% tax credit given to potential employers and he did not know.
- FMLI is going to be so expensive it will never work but if we're going to have it in our state, we should let the private insurers compete and let the free market do this.
- He read an email from a former Insurance Department employee that said carriers are already developing this type of coverage and want the ability to offer it for employees to purchase, whether or not NH has a paid FMLI program.
- This is not needed, and private businesses will not sign on because our state is already short employees. It doesn't make sense to incentivize employees not to work.
- This will become a taxpayer funded social benefit for public employees.
- Private employers will not be interested in this.
- This is a social entitlement.
- He asked why pursue this type of program when we can't find enough workers.
- This is not an operative program yet and we have the opportunity now to eliminate it.

### **Insurance Commissioner Chris Nicolopoulos and Assistant Commissioner DJ Bettencourt**

- They are excited about this program.
- This is a NH based solution for an FMLI product.
- It is free market driven and underwritten by an insurance company.
- The base of the pool will be the 10,000 state employees.
- The RFP went out a couple of weeks ago. RFPs will be back in around May 9th.
- They are excited about the interest from companies who have been asking about it.
- We have been dealing with this issue for five years.

**Mr. Bettencourt** added that the product mentioned in the email that was read by a previous speaker is a group product with no first-person coverage. The definition of family is narrower, and the benefit design is narrower. It is very different than what we have before us.

Sen. French asked if this is ready to roll out at the beginning of the year.

**Commissioner Nicolopoulos** said the RFP is out. Hopefully they will get multiple bids on May 9<sup>th</sup>. January 1 is the roll out date.

Sen. Gannon asked how the family is narrower and how the payout is tighter.

**Commissioner Nicolopoulos** said the family definition in the FMLI statute is broad in that it goes to grandparents and grandchildren. The part of coverage that is vastly different is the first-person coverage. The group product is not available to individuals that want to opt in. This FMLI plan that was in the budget will allow NH citizens working for an employer not participating in this program to purchase the coverage.

# Catherine Keane – Deputy Commissioner of Administrative Services and Richard Lavers – Deputy Commissioner of Employment Security

- The law that was passed that established the Granite State FMLI program puts the responsibility on the Department of Administrative Services and the Department of Employment Security to implement the program.
- They have been working with a group of people from other state agencies to implement the plan.

- RFPs are out on the street right now to meet their legal responsibilities to go out to bid for a carrier. There was a deadline in the law that they release the RFP by March 31, 2022. They also had to release a marketing and outreach RFP to promote the plan to employers.
- They are working diligently to meet their statutory responsibilities to implement the law and to make the program available for purchase on January 1, 2023.
- A lot of work has been done across various departments in putting out a comprehensive and thoughtful RFP looking to work with an insurance carrier to deliver the product.
- The way that Employment Security comes to this program is they are the state's workforce agency.
- They are trying to get people back to work right now and they see great numbers. NH private sector employment outpaces the region and country.
- NH netted nearly 14,000 individuals in the 12-month period that ended in July 2021.
- Maine was a little higher than NH but the details of who is moving to NH versus other northern New England states is stark.
- 44% of those who moved into the state during that 12-month period were within the ages of 25-34. We need to keep them here. This is another opportunity for employers to voluntarily choose to offer this product for their employees.
- HR professionals that they have talked to are excited about the product.
- This is a difference-maker not only for workforce attraction but also retention.

Sen. French asked how many insurance companies would have the resources to bid this.

**DC** Lavers said he would defer to the insurance commissioner. He thinks 10-12 companies expressed interest when this concept was floated previous to this.

Sen. French asked how many bids they intend to get.

**DC Keane** said they cannot predict that, but they try to make the bid as attractive as possible **Sen. French** asked if they had just one bid if they would put it to rebid.

DC Keane said likely not. They would probably move forward with contracting.

Sen. Gannon asked what this is going to cost. He said he represents a lot of middle- and lowincome individuals who expect him to be responsible with every dollar spent.

**DC Keane** said they don't know right now. That's why they are out to bid. When they get the bids in, they will understand what the cost is for state employees. If an employer opts in or should the employer choose not to opt in and the individual accesses the individual coverage available, this plan helps people with low income if they have an unforeseen illness of their own or in their family. It's a way to protect their wages so they don't lose weeks or months of income.

Sen. Gannon said this is paid for by the taxpayers who won't get the benefit.

**DC Keane** said if it's a public employee, then yes, the state will pay; if it's a private employer, they pay for it.

**DC** Lavers added that this is a fully administered and fully insured product.

Sen. Cavanaugh stated that employers are saying they need employees, and he thinks it is great to offer another benefit to try to attract people. He asked where NH stands with young people moving in compared to other states

**DC Lavers** said NH had 44% of those 14,000 being in the 25-34 age range. VT and ME were an older demographic. We have seen a lot of people fleeing density as a result of the pandemic. NH has been the beneficiary of that and it's a younger group. The rest of New England did not have gains like the three northern states did.

**Sen. Gannon** said we've passed a bill for 11,000 people not knowing what the cost is. **DC Lavers** said the beauty of competitive process is that it is competitive. That influences how someone bids a product. This is a fully insured and administered product by the carrier.

### **Rep. Jess Edwards**

- He was a member of Finance and served on the committee of conference.
- He signed in opposition to this bill.
- He heard how important this was to the Governor.
- In an effort to get the House version of the budget passed, this became part of the law.
- He didn't like the process that was used.
- Had a bill been introduced and worked through the committee then the legislature could have evaluated the wisdom of the bill.
- It lacks organic support because it was an 11<sup>th</sup> hour addition.
- We are less than a year away from having to submit our next budget and whether we can get one passed depends on the credibility of the people in the room.
- He is obligated to defend what they did in HB2.
- He can't support this bill, but he would be ambivalent if the Senate supported it.
