Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

1 New Paragraph; Access to Governmental Records and Meetings; Meeting Open to the Public; Public Comment. Amend RSA 91-A:2 by inserting after paragraph III the following new paragraph:

IV. All meetings of a school board or school administrative unit board open to the public under this chapter shall include an opportunity for public comment after the meeting has been opened and prior to the board addressing any substantive agenda issues. Individual public comment time may be limited but not to less than 3 minutes per person. The meeting can proceed into substantive issues once all public participants have been given the opportunity to speak, provided however that the total time to hear all members of the public may be limited, but not to less than one hour. The content of the public comment shall not be limited except for purposes of maintaining decorum. Nothing shall prevent a school board or school administrative unit board from having additional public comment at other times during the meeting.

Summary of testimony presented:

### Representative Tom Dolan - Rockingham, District 5

- Representative Dolan introduced HB 1195.
- The original intent of this bill was to improve communication efforts between citizens and local government.
- As this bill went through the process, it became about school boards.
- School board approach is important, but it is too narrow. The original proposal was supposed to cover all municipal meetings, which includes school boards.
- Senator Prentiss noted her experience in local, public bodies where a public comment period was always allotted for. She asked Representative Dolan what the genesis of this bill is as her experience has been different.

- o Representative Dolan said he has spent 21 years as a Londonderry town councilor. He has found out that public comment periods are very inconsistent across the state.
- o There is some mischief in public comment which pushes against the original notion of public comment.
- Some bodies would put public comment at the end of meetings at 11:00
   PM to avoid public comment. These kinds of things put in jeopardy the relationship with local officials and the public.
- o The way the bill was originally written said that the chairmen could limit the time per comment but could not limit the content.
- Senator Ricciardi reiterated Senator Prentiss' statement about not seeing any issues before selectboards/aldermen meetings in SD9 about the lack of public comment periods. The first thing being done in Bedford is public comment with a five-minute time limit. After each item on the agenda is heard, they open it up for comment. She does not want to take away local control at state level.
  - o Representative Dolan agreed that local control is important. He said what she described is not common.
- Senator Kahn asked Representative Dolan if he suggests going back to the original version of this bill.
  - Representative Dolan said the Committee may hear testimony that the legislature should not be getting involved on this local control topic.
  - o If a local town were to entertain a gun ordinance, people would come out of the woodworks to speak. On those occasions, you are going to want to have rules around speaking time to give all an equal opportunity to speak. In this case, school boards have been the main topic. He would suggest pulling back from that and bring the focus back in a more general way.
- Senator Kahn asked about the possibility of this being turned into a study committee or a committee of conference.
  - o Representative Dolan said he could see either way, a committee of conference would allow for both bodies to come together and sort this out.
- Senator Ward noted that she has sat on boards and has never witnessed this problem. Senator Ward asked Representative Dolan if we should specify a certain time around the permission of public comment periods throughout a meeting. She believes the school board issue came up because parents have been having a hard time. In her district, a school board required that folks sign up two weeks in advance.
  - o Representative Dolan said there has been a lot of discussion by the media about CRT, etc. since the filing of this bill. The intent of this legislation was not to get in the middle of that discussion.

- Oppose this bill but supports SB 410 before the House Education Committee today.
- The original bill indeed was about any public body, not just school boards.
- This bill is too broad related to school boards.
- In the bill's language, "prior to addressing substantive issues" is too broad as all agenda items are substantive because they are on the agenda.
- This provision calls for a 1-hour period, SB 410 calls for 30 minutes.
- NHSBA previously provided language on limiting comments on privileged student and personnel privacy matters.
- If we are to have public comments in law, they should be applicable to all public bodies.
- Senator Kahn asked Mr. Christina if he is aware that Representative Dolan's bill, as introduced, had a 15-minute provision.
  - o Mr Christina said he does not recall if they provided a position on the as introduced version. They do object to the version that did come out of the House of which is before this Committee.
- Senator Kahn reiterated that the changes provided by NHSBA to SB 410 were good improvements.

## Testimony

Dear Honorable Senate Education Committee Members:

I am writing to you as a cosponsor of **HB 1195** relative to public comment periods at public meetings. A public comment period at a public meeting is essential as it provides the opportunity for members of the public body to hear directly from the people who they govern and who are also affected by the decisions made by the public body. The opportunity for public input should unquestionably be placed at the beginning of a public meeting. This allows for the public to weigh in on topics on the agenda noticed for the present meeting before these items are discussed by the public body. Importantly, by placing a public input period at the beginning rather than at the end of a meeting, the public body may obtain relevant and important information from the public that serves to inform the public body regarding agenda items for which they may be acting upon, voting, during the course of the meeting. For this reason, waiting until the end of the meeting to allow for public input particularly on agenda items is unsound as well as counterproductive.

Public input placed at the end of a meeting, as some may suggest as preferable, would be most purposeful in allowing the public to comment upon topics not address at the present meeting and subsequently enable the public body to place such topics on a *future* meeting agenda.

Finally, while I understand that a public meeting is a business meeting, a balance must be achieved in order to both ensure and uphold the right of the people being governed to be heard at a public meeting. As a former Budget Committee member and chair, I understand this tradeoff first hand; and that is why our state needs HB 1195. Public input governed by social norms at a public meeting should never be thwarted nor suppressed. The opportunity for public input at a public meeting is essential. In closing, HB 1195 serves to protect the voice of the people at public meetings in New Hampshire.

I urge the committee to vote OTP on HB 1195.
