**Summary of testimony presented in support:**

**Representative Michael Yakubovich**

- This bill will give more data points during a recount.
- Whenever there is a recount conducted, this bill is asking that another office be recounted as well.
- When the ballots are pulled out and every ballot is being looked at by both sides more data can be collected by looking at another office that was not part of the original request.
- The bill calls for one of the top ballots offices to be recounted and that office will be picked by the Secretary of State.
- The cost of tallying up another office is marginal and the time spent will also be minimal because the boxes are already opened.
- By looking at another office that is not being questioned it will demonstrate to the people that our elections are solid.
- Senator Ward asked who he sees being a part of a partial recount.
  - Rep. Yakubovich replied they would only look at the ballots that were already retrieved for that candidate. For a state rep it would be a single town.
- Senator Soucy asked what if the recount is being done for a congressional candidate and would a partial recount have to be done for half the state.
  - Rep. Yakubovich replied that all those ballots for the congressional candidate would be retrieved and in the room to recount so another office on that same ballot would also be looked at.
- Senator Soucy commented that she has a concern about the time frame especially with the lateness of New Hampshire's primary and asked if that would place an undue burden on the Secretary of State's office to prepare the ballots.
  - Rep. Yakubovich stated that the Secretary of State will speak to that.
- Senator Gray commented that if this is done and the last recount that was conducted, which would be 7-14 days after the election, causes another recount for a ballot at the top of the ticket, it will push the results out at least another week. He questioned how they could do that.

- Rep. Yakubovich replied that there is two parts to that question. One is do we want to know if there is a problem at the top of the ticket. He believes everyone would say yes. How to deal with the problem is the second part of the question and does it push it out to far which is a valid concern. Regarding the time frame he will defer to the Secretary of State.
- Senator Gray stated that the Senate passed an audit bill that will audit a certain percentage of the ballots from the AccuVote machines and asked if that accomplishes the same thing as this bill and in a timelier manner.
  - Rep. Yakubovich stated he is not familiar with that bill.

#### **Alvin See**

- This bill will not conflict with the Senate Audit bill.
- There may be an overlap if a town that was involved in the audit also had a recount.
- This will give the general public a better idea of the accuracy of the counts.
- It only uses the ballots that were sent into Concord for a recount.
- It does not require additional ballots to be shipped around.
- It does add additional time for counting because you are counting additional names on the ballots but they are the same ballots.
- This method of audit provides for a somewhat random sample of towns or cities.
- You cannot predict which towns will have a recount until after the election occurs, so this process is reasonably random.
- After the 2020 election there were 16 recounts requested that included 55 cities and towns in 7 counties.
- Some cities and towns were involved in more than one recount.
- Senator Gray commented that it might be possible for a state office to delay the General Election but federal law dictates the date for federal elections.
  - Mr. See replied that you can make an exception so that it requires a bigger trigger or having an additional recount

#### **David Scanlan – Secretary of State**

- He recognizes the concerns that the committee has raised and if there was a recount requested of one of the top tier offices, they may want to waive the requirement that another office be counted.
- Section III raises some questions from an administrative perspective.
- If there is a discrepancy greater than 1% the candidate can request a full recount of that race.
- It does not say anything about the process for that, will the candidate pay the fee, etc.
- He believes they need to identify explained discrepancy.
- This bill describes it as an “unexplained discrepancy.”
- Senator Gray questioned that there could be a situation where two people running for the Register of Probate where there are maybe 70 votes could ask for a recount and then they would have to do another recount of one of the higher offices.
  - Secretary Scanlan stated that would be extreme but he sees the point.
- Senator Soucy commented that this says for each official recount so if you have 22 separate requests for recounts it could be only after the last recount is done that another recount would be requested. She asked if he has any concern about the time it will take to get the ballots prepared to comply with UOCAVA and be ready for the General Election.
  - Secretary Scanlan replied yes, if this bill passed, they would have to expedite all of the recounts requested so they could address the time constraints.

#### **Representative Barbara Griffin**

- She thinks the bill needs an amendment because she is not convinced that it amends the proper section of statute to begin with.

- The underlying intent of the bill had great support in the House.
- She would like to see it go forward.
- She wants to have a conversation with the Prime Sponsor and others to see if an amendment might correct the issue.
- To solve the time limit issue, they may think about having it apply to the General Election only.
- Also, maybe they should limit it to official candidates and not write in candidates.
- Senator Gray commented that if they limited to only State Rep races. He would rather see the time and expense go into auditing the AccuVote machines pre-recount than a post recount.
  - Rep. Griffin pointed out that the audit bill is only for this upcoming election. She agrees that there appears to be a duplication of counting. The reality is that we are only one of a handful of states that do not have an audit procedure. That is what the Senate Bill is trying to address. This bill is trying to address the concern that they saw arise this past election in regards to the accuracy of results in races that might not be the focus of a recount. State Rep races are the most recounted races. Those are not the races that people would tamper with.

I am in support of House Bill 1467, a bill to require partial audits of additional offices on ballots involved in recounts.

This bill provides a way to do a partial audit in a relatively inexpensive way by incorporating some additional counts during the regular recount process.

This uses only ballots from towns and cities that had sent ballots to Concord for recounts requested by candidates. While this will make each recount take a little more time to read additional names from each ballot and counting stacks of ballots after examining them, it still provides a useful value for the effort.

The Secretary of State or his designee shall pick one or two additional offices, one of which shall be one of the top-of-ballot offices, to be audited during each recount. Where the chosen office is US Representative or Executive Council, the audit may cover more than one district but still the same office.

This method of audit provides for a somewhat random sample of towns or cities. Due to demographics of the various towns and districts, some districts may be less likely to have a close enough race to warrant a recount. Never-the-less, one cannot necessarily predict where a recount may be called for, so this process is reasonably random.

After the 2020 general election, there were 16 recounts requested that included 55 cities and towns in 7 counties. Some cities and towns were involved in more than one recount where the Executive Council, Senate and Representative districts happen to overlap.

It should also be noted that this audit process will in no way conflict with the audit process using high-speed scanners as provided in SB 366. There may be some overlap with the two methods depending on which districts have a recount requested.

*I urge this Committee to recommend OTP for this bill.*
