METHODOLOGY:

This bill expands the number of lottery retailers who would be eligible to offer Keno in municipalities which have approved the game (under current law, Keno is limited to retailers that hold a liquor license or similar age restricted environments). The Lottery Commission estimates there would be approximately 700 additional retailers that would offer Keno in the 91 municipalities that have authorized the game. The Lottery Commission has provided the following estimates (based on the stated assumptions):

Summary of testimony presented:

Rep. Lang

- This bill allows for retail operations in jurisdictions that approved Keno to be able to sell Keno.
- Currently only locations with pour liquor licenses can sell Keno.
- The retail locations that are lottery agents are required and obligated to cash out those tickets, so they have to do the work without the benefit of being able to sell the ticket and possibly make revenue on that. This bill seeks to fix that inequity.
- Keno money goes to the education trust fund (ETF) so there will be an incremental increase in revenues for the state to benefit education.

Sen. Rosenwald asked why there was no fiscal note on the bill.

Rep. Lang did not know but suggested perhaps because it is likely indeterminable as it is a moving target. Some towns have Keno on their ballots for this year.

Sen. Giuda asked about the language in the bill that says lottery retailers licensed to sell Keno shall not display Keno on an active screen.

Rep. Lang said that language was added by House Ways and Means. It was not in the original bill. He wishes it were optional. He thinks businesses should have a choice on whether or not they want to display a screen. It was a compromise he accepted.

Sen. Hennessey asked him to explain what that means for those who don't know what a screen at a retailer is.

Rep. Lang said locations selling Keno have a screen showing the games that are going on. It is like any other lottery drawing in that you do not have to watch the drawing. You can buy your ticket and go back a week later and have them scan it to see if you won. Keno has a screen where the balls drop. Currently, the pour locations that operate Keno are required to have screens. He would prefer that it be optional.

Sen. Hennessey asked if it would reduce revenue if they do not have the screens up.

Rep. Lang does not see a reason why that would happen. Some retailers may want to put up a screen with the hopes of keeping people in the store longer and purchasing more items while waiting for their game to finish. Other stores are so packed they may not want a screen. The concerns that were voiced in House Ways and Means was that they didn't want Keno parlors.

Rep. Abrami

- Keno is currently only in restaurants that pour liquor.
- Heard testimony from convenient stores and grocery stores that they were cashing tickets.
- They don't like the esthetics of people standing around in a grocery or convenient store waiting for a number to come up on a screen.
- Keno machines are same as all other devices already in the stores.
- They can have a sign that says they sell Keno.

Charlie McIntyre – Executive Director NH lottery commission

Sen. Rosenwald asked why there was no fiscal note.

Director McIntyre said he was holding a fiscal note and did not know how it did not get to the legislature. Incremental revenue is a difficult proposition. There might be a slight cannibalization of Keno sales from bars and restaurants to stores. The Lottery Commission estimates an increase of \$5.9 million in net revenue to the state. One of the difficulties is that they are not sure how many stores will adopt it. A supermarket is not going to put a screen up, but some convenience stores that serve lunch might. He added that this estimate is a conservative number. They are running ahead of what they initially anticipated for Keno revenue.

Sen. Daniels asked if the bill as amended causes an advantage or disadvantage for one location versus another with regard to the display screen.

Director McIntyre said no. They leave it to retailers in terms of what equipment is brought in. If you have a Keno sale without a screen, it would be indistinguishable from a Powerball ticket. It would be a choice of the business.

Simon Thomson – Sheehan Phinney – New England Convenience Store and Energy Marketers Association

- They represent convenience stores and fuel industry transportation in NH.
- 850 convenience stores across NH.
- They employ 14000 people.
- They supported the bill as introduced.

- They would like to see the bill go back to its original form and allow the option to have a screen in stores. They do not want it mandatory to have screens, but business owners should have that option.
- This industry is evolving from small stores to stores that have a larger footprint.

Sen. Rosenwald asked if his clients are opposed to the bill as amended by the House.

Mr. Thomson said they want the option to sell Keno no matter what, but they would like the option to have screens.

Sen. Daniels asked Director McIntyre to clarify his answer to Sen. Daniels' earlier question.

Director McIntyre said the decision regarding screens was left to the business owner.

Director McIntyre said current law does not require every establishment to have a monitor. Keno can be sold without a monitor. The way this bill is written, the stores would have what is known as blind Keno which is when you buy a ticket and leave.

RE: HB 355 as amended - An Act relative to Keno.

Chair Guida, Vice-Chair D'Allesandro, and Members of the Committee:

The New England Convenience Store & Energy Marketers Association (NECSEMA) represents the convenience store and transportation fuel industries in New Hampshire, and throughout New England. NECSEMA members wholesale and/or retail most of the motor fuels sold in the state. Across New Hampshire, there are over 850 convenience stores (of which 650 sell motor fuels) and employ close to 14,000 people.

NECSEMA appreciates the opportunity to provide comments in support for this measure. As introduced, HB 355 allows duly licensed lottery agents, with municipal concurrence, at their choosing to operate Keno games on premise. As amended by the House the bill currently prohibits game display screens. NECSEMA supports this bill; however, prohibiting screens contradicts the game's design and limits the value the game may bring to retail lottery agents.

NECSEMA believes the amendment restricting screens is unwarranted, given that store owners for whatever reason have the option to not offer Keno games or if they do to determine whether to include screens. NECSEMA supports removing the screen limit currently in HB 355 as amended and allow retailers the opportunity to choose.

Thank you for your thoughtful consideration of our position on this matter.
