Summary of testimony presented:

Senator Kevin Avard

- Senator Avard introduced the SB 259. He explained that the bill is related to HB 315 that was passed in the previous session. HB 315 touched on many

energy related issues however, SB 259 is focused on eligible customers under the expanded net metering provision.

- HB 315 previously raised the net metering cap from 1 to 5 megawatts however, it limited participation exclusively to political subdivisions. Under HB 315, the term political subdivisions is defined as any city, town, county, school district, chartered public school, village district, school administrative unit, or any district or entity created for a special purpose administered or funded by any of the above-named governmental units.
- The purpose of SB 259 is to slightly amend the definition by adding the State of New Hampshire and offering clarity to the eligibility of housing authorities.
- Senator Watters asked Senator Avard to clarify which entities will be covered. Senator Avard responded that there are several other bills being heard regarding entities such as the Pease Development Authority and the university system.

Bart Fromuth

- Mr. Fromuth spoke in support of SB 259 agreeing that it is a bill designed to complement HB 315.
- One potential oversight in HB 315 is that the State of New Hampshire was left out as a political subdivision. Furthermore, entities such as the State House, University of New Hampshire, and Keene State College would be left out because of they are administered and funded by the State.
- The housing authority may prove to be troublesome with regards to eligibility. However, he concurred that SB 259 would solve any issues related to that.

Kelly Buchanan-Provided Written Testimony

- Spoke in favor of the bill. Ms. Buchanan agreed with Mr. Fromuth's testimony. She expressed support for SB 259 on behalf of Clean Energy New Hampshire and explained that the bill would help reflect the true nature of housing authorities and the State of New Hampshire.

Rob Werner

- Expressed support for SB 259. He believes that this bill will prove to be beneficial over time. Mr. Werner also noted that NHTI has expressed its interest in the bill and would help it build larger distributed energy systems. Furthermore, he testified that the bill would help the City of Concord achieve its renewable energy goals.

Josh Elliot

- Mr. Elliot expressed a neutral stance on the bill on behalf of the Department of Energy and his willingness to answer any questions and point out technical issues regarding SB 259. He clarified that the Department of Energy found no technical issues.

- Senator Watters asked Mr. Elliot about the possible size increase in the amount of net metering that might occur by making this definitional change. Mr. Elliot clarified that it would depend on the number of entities that decide to take part in their new eligibility under this bill.
- Senator Watters followed up his question by asking Mr. Elliot if he agrees with a previous sub committees report that net metering and distribution may not result in costs shifting for participants.
- Mr. Elliot clarified that the Department of Energy is currently working with a consultant on figuring out cost shifting due to net metering. Currently, the Department of Energy does not have a definitive answer on this issue however, the study is still underway and should be completed by late spring of 2022.
- Mr. Elliot also clarified that given the small number of entities involved cost shifting may be minimal.

Testimony on SB259: relative to the definition of "municipal host" for purposes of limited electrical energy producers

Dear Chair Avard and members of the Committee,

Clean Energy NH (CENH) is a non-profit member-based organization. We are New Hampshire's leading clean energy advocate that is dedicated to supporting policies and programs that strengthen our state's economy by encouraging a transition to renewable energy and promoting energy efficiency.

CENH strongly supports SB259, which would slightly expand the definition of a political subdivision of state to include the state of New Hampshire and housing authorities, as it relates to RSA 362-A and the landmark legislation that passed last year, on a bipartisan basis, to raise the net metering cap up to 5 MW for local renewable energy projects. The inclusion of the state of New Hampshire and housing authorities as eligible political subdivisions is a pragmatic change to the definition, which more accurately reflects the nature of both the state of New Hampshire and housing authorities. This change will help reduce ambiguity in the definition of a political subdivision, which was dealt with subsequent to the passage of HB315.

While this change more accurately defines a political subdivision of the state, SB259 will also support the responsible expansion of local renewable energy resources, help municipalities meet renewable energy and/or emission reduction goals, and help strengthen local economies with new business opportunities for clean energy. This small change in definition further enables New Hampshire's municipalities to secure the maximum benefits of locally produced power. Small-scale municipal generating assets are an important part of our economy and our energy resiliency. This legislation is an important step forward towards energy independence for the Granite State.

For the reasons described above, CENH asks you to find that SB259 ought to pass.
