AN ACT                   relative to the New Hampshire weatherization program.

*Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:*

1           1 Purpose. The New Hampshire legislature believes all who act in accordance with the laws,  
2 rules, and regulations should be treated with the same respect and receive the same benefits they  
3 bestow upon the citizens in New Hampshire. The New Hampshire legislature further believes the  
4 shortage of housing will continue to hamper the growth of New Hampshire and its citizens ability to  
5 become financially self-sufficient. It is imperative that all housing meant for human habitation  
6 should be treated equally to meet government's intent to assist in creating energy efficiency in  
7 people's daily lives while also reducing the factors contributing to global warming. Therefore the  
8 legislature has determined it is in the best interest of all inhabitants of the state of New Hampshire  
9 to, in relation to the New Hampshire weatherization assistance program, remove the contractor pre-  
10 qualifications and call for the specific weatherization of re-purposed buildings such as mill buildings.

17 assistance program shall remove the pre-qualification requirements for contractors and shall hereby  
18 accept any and all contractors doing business in any field necessary to perform the work required to  
19 meet the strict standards of workmanship for any and all trades or disciplines used to assist in  
20 completion or to complete the work the weatherization assistance program commissions or provides  
21 funding in any amount. Contractors shall have the licenses necessary to comply with New  
22 Hampshire state licensing requirements, be a business registered with the New Hampshire  
23 secretary of state and in good standing, have and maintain a valid New Hampshire workers  
24 compensation insurance in accordance with New Hampshire state law, and maintain liability  
25 insurance with a company licensed to do business in New Hampshire in an amount sufficient and  
26 necessary to cover any liability for the work both during and after completion.

27           12-P:17 Weatherization of Re-Purposed Buildings. The New Hampshire weatherization  
28 program shall include weatherization and energy efficiency measures required for restoration and  
29 re-purposing of mill buildings, commercial buildings, residential multifamily and single family,  
30 treating each as equals so long as the purpose is to create energy efficient housing for New  
31 Hampshire inhabitants and complies with all other necessary requirements. When the intent of

**METHODOLOGY:**

This bill reduces the contractor pre-qualifications for contracts pertaining to the New Hampshire weatherization assistance program and calls for the weatherization of re-purposed buildings such as mill buildings.

The Department of Energy indicates there are two possible meanings of “prequalification” as it relates to the New Hampshire Weatherization Assistance Program, both of which have cost implications.

- Prequalification relates to required “fair and open” competition in the Uniform Guidance 2 CFR 200.319. A contractor can be “prequalified” by responding to a request for qualifications from the Community Action Program (CAP). Their qualifications are evaluated and if they meet the requirements, the contractor is placed on a “prequalified” list of contractors. This process allows for federally required fair and open competition and eliminates the need to go out with an RFP for each contractor, saving time. Eliminating pre-qualification requirements would require each CAP to issue an RFP or go through another allowable procurement process for every weatherization service. This would increase administrative costs for the CAPs and reduce the amount of funding available for weatherization projects.
- If “pre-qualification” is referring to the certifications weatherization contractors must have to work within the Weatherization Program, those requirements come directly from the U.S. Department of Energy, contained in the *WPN 15-4: Quality Work Plan Requirement Update*. This requirement is still in effect and if the bill becomes law, it is

likely that the next Work Plan submitted to the US DOE would not be approved since it would be out of compliance and the State would not be awarded federal funding.

The Department indicates noncompliance with federal regulations in the middle of a program year would result in "questioned costs" which the State would either have to pay back to the federal government from general funds or receive reductions in future federal funds. The program receives federal funds of approximately \$1.9 million each year and an additional \$18.5 million in one time money from the federal infrastructure bill. Noncompliance with the U.S. Department of Energy regulations would result in federal funds not being awarded to the State.

- Senator Avard clarified that there is an amendment for the bill, and it will be introduced at a later date.
- SB 269-FN reduces the contractor pre-qualifications for contracts pertaining to the NH weatherization assistance program and calls for the weatherization of re-purposed buildings such as mill buildings.

- Senator Perkins Kwoka asked Senator Avard to clarify which pre-qualifications for contractors the bill intends to address. Senator Avard deferred the question to other speakers.
- Senator Giuda asked if this bill is a state mandate citing line 27 of page 1 of the bill. Senator Avard clarified that it is a mandate.
- Senator Watters asked if the intent of the bill is meant to be directed at low-income housing or could this lead to the state paying for the weatherization of large multi-million-dollar projects. Senator Avard clarified that the amendment should clarify that question.

#### Robert Clegg, Legislative Solutions

- Mr. Clegg clarified that the bill was written for the wrong section of the existing statute. He stated that they are meeting with the DOE, Eversource, and other actors. Mr. Clegg asked for time to meet with these actors so they may fix issues with the bill.
- Senator Giuda clarified that he is concerned that the bill is creating a state mandate. Mr. Clegg clarified that the bill is aimed to help low-income individuals. He does not believe the bill is mandating anything. The bill is saying they want to make the programs available and ensure they run efficiently. Senator Giuda is still concerned that the bill is a state mandate, however Mr. Clegg clarified that the amendment to the bill will clear up any confusion.

#### Donna Gamache, Eversource

- Eversource is willing to work with the stakeholders on the bill.
- Eversource's main concern is that the language of the bill conflicts with HB 549.
- Eversource and the other stakeholders will meet and discuss their concerns and return to the committee.

#### Josh Elliot, Department of Energy

- Mr. Elliot clarified that the DOE had met with Mr. Clegg and the other stakeholders and discovered that the intention of the bill was not to change the low-income weatherization program. The money for the program comes from the federal government and is disbursed through county CAP's.
- In statute, the weatherization program refers to the Federal Weatherization Program.
- The amendment for the bill will change the current fiscal note because it will not be impacting the program.

- Senators Gray and Avard clarified that there will be another public hearing on SB 269-FN.

Senator Avard, Senate District 12

- Senator Avard reintroduced SB 269. The bill was recessed in a previous public hearing.



- Senator Avard introduced an amendment to the bill that acts as a replace all and establishes a commission to study energy saving weatherization programs.

#### Robert Clegg

- While the original bill needed to be amended because it was directed at the wrong section of statute, this ended up working out because it got all the stakeholders to work together. After meeting with Eversource, the DOE, and other stakeholders, they decided that creating a commission to address this issue was appropriate. We want the commission to be diverse and we want it to be able to continue even if some members are facing election issues.
- The purpose of the bill is to see how we can best afford to continue the state weatherization program. The cost of energy has gone up significantly. In some cases, a barrel of oil can cost 100 dollars. Every building or home that is not weatherized is costing more money. We need to continue helping people while conserving the products that we have by weatherization.
- Oil and propane do not contribute at all to the weatherization fund and yet they are a big user of the funding. Natural gas has a fee, but everyone needs to participate.
- Senator Watters asked a question regarding line 19. It says weatherization of buildings heated by delivered fuel such as oil, propane, kerosene, and wood, but it does not include electricity. Mr. Clegg agreed that electricity needs to be included. They also agreed that natural gas should be included as well.
- Senator Avard asked if it would be a problem changing the number of Senators on the commission from 2 to 1. Mr. Clegg had no issue with the change.

#### Matt Mayberry, NH Homebuilders

- The NH Homebuilders support the bill and the amendment.
- They want to expand how we help our Granite State Neighbors, especially those who are low-income. This bill allows us to do so.

#### Karen Soucy, CAP

- Mrs. Soucy spoke in place of Henry Veilleux. They asked that the Consumer Community Action Programs be included in the bill.

#### Josh Elliot, DOE

- Mr. Elliot clarified that the bills fiscal note no longer applies because it is a study commission.

- Adding the community action programs to the bill is a good idea given that they are subgrantees for all the federal weatherization funding that goes to the state.
- Senator Watters asked who should make the appointment of the community action program official. Mr. Elliot noted that each CAP has their own weatherization official. They agreed that appointing the Governor would be best.
