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## STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

AN ACT re-establishing the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) Farmers Market Nutrition Program.

Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

New Section; Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for WIC Farmers Market Nutrition
 Program. Amend RSA 132 by inserting after section 12-e the following new section:

3 132:12-f WIC Farmers' Market Nutrition Program. There is established in the department of 4 health and human services the New Hampshire Farmers' Market Nutrition Program for/participants 5 in the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants and Children (WIC). The 6 program shall distribute food instruments to eligible WIC participants to redeem for locally grown 7 fresh fruits, vegetables and herbs at authorized New Hampshire farmers' markets in compliance 8 with 7 C.F.R. 248 that are redeemable only at designated New Hampshire farmers' markets. The 9 commissioner shall adopt rules under RSA 541-A to implement this program.

2 Appropriation; WIC Farmers' Market Nutrition Program. There is hereby appropriated to the department of health and human services the sum of \$300,000 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2023, which shall be nonlapsing, for the purpose of funding the WIC Farmers' Market Nutrition Program in RSA 132:12-f. The governor is authorized to draw a warrant for said sum out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated.

15 3 Effective Date. This act shall take effect July 1, 2022.

# **METHODOLOGY:**

This bill establishes a NH farmer's market program for participants in the women, infants, and children (WIC) nutrition program. The program will supply locally grown fresh produce to WIC participants through the distribution of vouchers redeemable at designated NH farmers' markets. The bill contains a nonlapsing general fund appropriation of \$300,000 for this purpose in FY23. The Department of Health and Human Services states that the program may be eligible for matching funds, but has not identified the percentage match that it expects to receive. With respect to utilization, the Department states the appropriation and possible federal match could be used to provide a \$30 one-time benefit to the estimated 11,977 low-income women and children enrolled in the WIC program.

The Department anticipates needing a 0.25 full-time equivalent (FTE) Program Assistant II position (labor grade 15) in order to administer the new program. The pro-rated cost of this position, including benefits and miscellaneous expenses, is estimated at \$17,000 in FY23, \$17,800 in FY24, and \$18,500 in FY25.

# Summary of testimony presented in support:

# Senator Becky Whitley

# Senate District 15

- Senator Whitley said that the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) provides federal grants to states for supplemental foods, health care referrals, and nutrition education for low-income pregnant, breastfeeding, and non-breastfeeding postpartum women, and to infants and children up to age five who are found to be at nutritional risk.
- Senator Whitley said that SB 403-FN-A will support sourcing fresh produce for WIC recipients and increase the demand for New Hampshire-grown produce at farmers markets.
- Senator Whitley said that Senate District 15 has robust farmers markets in each community and the local farms are part of the fabric of her district, and many others.
- Senator Whitley said that SB 403-FN-A's WIC Farmers Market Nutrition Program builds on work done on the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) in the last legislative session and the last state budget. She said that the WIC Farmers Market Nutrition Program was offered until 2011 or so but it should be brought back.
- Senator Whitley said that the SNAP Farmers Market Nutrition Program operates very similarly to the WIC Farmers Market Nutrition Program and both are matched 100% by the federal government. She said that New Hampshire should draw down the additional federal dollars available in order to broaden access to fresh fruits and vegetables.
- Senator Whitley said that the state match is for the administration of the program.
- Senator Whitley said that the state should support every possible access to fresh fruits and vegetables. She said that there is a disparity in who can access fresh produce.

# Lissa Sirois

# Administrator, Nutrition Services Section, and State WIC Director, Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS)

- Ms. Sirois said that reestablishing the WIC Farmers Market Program will allow DHHS to provide access to low-income children to be able to redeem coupons at farmers markets for fresh, local fruits and vegetables.
- Ms. Sirois said that the WIC Farmers Market Program has not been in operation since 2010 because, at that time, leadership decide to stop the program due to low redemption rates and an increasingly difficult administrative burden. She said that, now, the administrative infrastructure is more robust, there are more farmers markets in more communities, and, based on participation in the SNAP Farmers Market Program, there is more interest in farmers markets.

- Ms. Sirois said that WIC serves 10,000 low-income families, including 9,000 children between the ages of one and four who would benefit.
- Ms. Sirois said that, in order to qualify for the program, a family's income must be at or below 185% of the federal poverty level.
- Ms. Sirois said that DHHS has submitted a plan to the United States Department of Agriculture for approval of the WIC Farmers Market Program but has not received it back yet. She said that the appropriation in SB 403-FN-A would allow \$10 spent to turn into \$30 with the federal match, which would make the program more attractive with the comparative purchasing power.
- Ms. Sirois pointed out the increase in obesity in youths and highlighted the benefits of fresh fruits and vegetables in living healthier lives.
- Ms. Sirois said that SB 403-FN-A would support the agricultural industry in New Hampshire and send money back to New Hampshire farmers.
- Senator Bradley noted that the fiscal note appropriates \$300,000 in the upcoming fiscal year. He said that he assumed the WIC Farmers Market Program would be an ongoing initiative and, further, that the reason there was no appropriation in Fiscal Year 2024 and Fiscal Year 2025 was because the program would be absorbed into the next state budget.
  - Ms. Sirois said that that was correct.

# **Brendan Cornwell**

# NH Nutrition Incentive Network Coordinator, NH Food Bank

- Mr. Cornwell said that since the WIC Farmers Market Program was shut down in 2010, farmers markets have developed with new technologies to make the redemption process easier and more attractive. He said that in 2010, the WIC Farmers Marker Program was the only Farmers Market Program in operation in New Hampshire at the time.
- Mr. Cornwell said that, in 2021, \$670,000 of federal dollars were spent in New Hampshire on New Hampshire-grown produce for the SNAP Farmers Market Program. He said that the WIC Farmers Market Program has similar eligibility requirements.
- Mr. Cornwell said that he would rather give a child a nutritious local apple rather than an old imported apple, local blueberries from local farmers, and he would rather a child refuse to eat local kale than other kale.

# Tiffany Dodier

# **Community Engagement Director, NH Hunger Solutions**

- Ms. Dodier said that SB 403-FN-A is an evidence-based plan to support women, children, and local economies.
- Ms. Dodier said that the COVID-19 pandemic has made hunger needs worse in New Hampshire. She said that because of the ongoing increased connectiveness of New Hampshire food organizations, now is the right time to reestablish the WIC Farmers Market Program. She said that the infrastructure is in place to support the program.
- Ms. Dodier said that the United States Department of Labor said that there has been a 6% increase in food costs over the last 12 months. She said that the WIC Farmers

Market Program will help make healthy foods more available for the most vulnerable people.

- Ms. Dodier said that fresh produce for pregnant women and children is important for their growth and development and leads to better consumption habits as the children age.
- Ms. Dodier said that every dollar spent on food through WIC and SNAP generates \$1.50 in the local economy for farmers to spend on supplies, their own foods, etc.

# Rebecca Woitkowksi

# Kids Count Policy Coordinator, New Futures

• Ms. Woitkowski said that access to food is important to mitigating adverse childhood experiences (ACEs). She said that families that can meet their basic needs – such as food, housing, clothing, etc. – are better protected against ACEs.

Dear Senator Bradley and Members of the Senate Health and Human Services Committee,

My name is Tiffany Dodier and I am the Community Engagement Director speaking on behalf of NH Hunger Solutions, a non-profit that seeks to end hunger in NH. Part of my role is to coordinate the NH Food Access Coalition, a statewide group composed of nonprofits, research institutions, medical organizations, state agencies, and businesses across NH's food system. Since the outset of the pandemic, this group has advocated for policies that improve access to nutritious food for all New Hampshire's people.

Today we submit this testimony on behalf of our partners to state our strong support of Senate Bill 403, re-establishing the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) Farmers Market Nutrition Program. This bill supports an evidence-based strategy to connect more women and young children to fresh, locally grown produce while supporting our farmers and bolstering local economies.

A large part of my day-to-day work includes collaborating with organizations across the state to address hunger in NH. The COVID-19 pandemic has necessitated this work more than ever. It is because of the increased connectedness of NH organizations working to end hunger that we know this is the right time to re-establish the WIC FMNP. We now have the infrastructure in the state to support the administration thanks to programs like Granite State Market Match, which you will hear testimony about today as a viable model for the WIC FMNP. We have a growing list of over 200 partners in all corners of the state where we endeavor to support the development of local food access coalitions. These coalitions make possible widespread campaigns to promote the use of WIC FMNP and education about the importance of eating fresh and eating local to our individual health and the health of our local economy.

This bill is important now because increasing numbers of our neighbors report having trouble securing adequate nutrition, nearly 85,000 NH adults as of January. Relatedly, The U.S. Department of Labor just reported an over 6% rise in food costs in the last 12 months - this calls for measures that keep fresh produce affordable for our most vulnerable people. This bill does that while also helping NH farmers.

As a registered dietitian, I know the importance of fresh produce intake to young children and pregnant women for optimal growth and development. We also know earlier exposure to fresh fruits and vegetables leads to greater consumption as older children, thus contributing to overall health in our children and less strain on our healthcare system. We have the infrastructure to support the administration of a WIC Farmers' Market Nutrition Program and should take advantage of that.

A final point to remember is what is known as the multiplier effect. Every federal dollar spent on food purchases, through WIC or SNAP, for example, has been shown to generate at least \$1.50 in local economic activity. NH residents purchase food from farmers, who use that money to support their business by purchasing supplies from others, and so on.

This bill represents a thoughtful, conservative and innovative investment in the health of our mothers and children, and local farms and farmers, as well. I urge the Committee to recommend SB403 ought to pass.



Dear Senator Bradley and Members of the Senate Health and Human Services Committee:

The Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Public Health Services (DPHS) is in support of Senate Bill 403, re-establishing the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) Farmers Market Nutrition Program. This bill will allow an estimated 9,000 low income children ages 1-4, enrolled in the New Hampshire WIC Nutrition Program to receive a one-time thirty dollar (\$30) benefit for fresh locally grown fruits and vegetables. NH DHHS is eligible for a federal award from the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) and we have submitted to USDA a state plan for approval to implement the WIC Farmers Market Nutrition Program. USDA requires states to contribute a match of up to 30% of the total administrative funds. The federal award alone only provides a one-time benefit of \$10 to each child, whereas Senate Bill 403 will provide up to a \$30 benefit for each child, ages 1-4, thus increasing access to fresh, local produce and further supporting New Hampshire farmers.

The Farmers Market Nutrition Program was established by Congress in 1992 to provide fresh, nutritious, unprepared, locally grown fruits, vegetables and herbs through farmers' markets to WIC participants, and to expand awareness, use of, and sales at farmers' markets. Eligible WIC participants are issued farmers' market nutrition program coupons in addition to their regular WIC healthy food benefits. The coupons are used to buy fresh local produce from NH farmers at Farmer's Markets, which increases our dependence on local produce while supporting NH farmers. The farmers then submit the redeemed FMNP coupons for reimbursement. NH WIC anticipates participation in the Program from 39 farmers markets and more than 100 NH farmers, covering all ten counties.

The WIC Nutrition Program, administered by the NH Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Public Health Services contracts with four local agencies in the community to provide healthy foods, nutrition and health education as well as referrals for healthcare and social services across the state. The WIC Program is a federally funded discretionary program with more than 40 years of success and evidence based health outcomes, yielding healthier infants, school ready children and full term pregnancies. New

Hampshire WIC currently serves almost 10,000 low-income households making up just under 9,000 children ages 1 to 4. The WIC Programs' income guidelines allow a household to be eligible if their income is at or below 185% Federal Poverty Level.

The re-establishment of the WIC Farmers Market Nutrition Program will allow children access to local, fresh produce grown by local NH farmers. Childhood obesity rates among NH children enrolled in WIC are currently second worse in the nation at 17%. Overweight and obese children are likely to stay obese into adulthood and more likely to develop chronic diseases like diabetes and cardiovascular diseases at a young age. To help children and families develop healthy eating habits, it is important to provide plenty of vegetables and fruits<sup>1</sup>. The WIC Program normally offers \$9 a month, per child, for purchasing fruits and vegetables at an authorized retailer and adding this benefit will improve retention and participation in this program and address food insecurity in NH.

The re-establishment of the WIC Farmers Market Nutrition Program will provide fresh, nutritious, unprepared, locally grown fruits, vegetables and herbs through NH farmers' markets to WIC participants, and expand awareness, use of, and sales at NH farmers' markets.
