ANALYSIS

This bill requires an independent audit and needs assessment regarding COVID-19 preparedness at long term care facilities, nursing homes, and the New Hampshire veterans' home. The bill also makes an appropriation to the department of health and human services for the purpose of hiring a qualified independent auditor.

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

In the Year of Our Lord Two Thousand Twenty Two

AN ACT

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requiring an independent audit and needs assessment regarding COVID-19 preparedness at long term care facilities, nursing homes, and the New Hampshire veterans' home, and making an appropriation therefor.

Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

- 1 Short Title. This act shall be known as the Protect New Hampshire Veterans and Seniors Act of 2022.
 - 2 New Subdivision; COVID-19 Nursing Home and Long-Term Care. Amend RSA 151-E by inserting after section 21 the following new subdivision:

COVID-19 Nursing Home and Long-Term Care

- 6 151-E:22 Independent COVID-19 Nursing Home and Long-Term Care Audit, Needs 7 Assessment, and Recommendations. The commissioner of the department of health and human 8 services shall issue a request for proposals for a qualified grantee, with the approval of governor and 9 council, to undertake an independent audit of the COVID-19 situation in long-term care and nursing 10 homes in New Hampshire and provide a needs assessment to provide recommendations for further COVID-19 related funding, safety and public health upgrades, standards and rules for nursing 11 12 homes, nursing facilities, residential care facilities, long-term care facilities, and the New 13 Hampshire veterans' home, and to provide a preparedness plan for COVID-19 at such facilities, to be submitted to the governor, the chairpersons of the house and senate finance committees, the 14 chairperson of the senate health and human services committee, and the chairperson of the house 15 16 health, human services and elderly affairs committee, no later than October 1, 2022. Neither the governor, the governor's office, nor the commissioner shall direct this independent audit and needs 17 18 assessment, but each shall respond to any requests for information from the grantee. The grantee 19 shall include in the final report all such requests for information. The grantee shall also include in 20 the final report a separate audit and needs assessment specifically for the New Hampshire veterans' 21 home.
 - 3 Appropriation. The sum of \$250,000, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, is hereby appropriated to the commissioner of the department of health and human services from federal COVID relief funds for the purpose of hiring the qualified grantee under RSA 151-E:22. If such federal funds are unavailable, the governor shall draw a warrant for said sum out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated.
 - 4 Effective Date. This act shall take effect upon its passage.

METHODOLOGY:

This bill requires the Department of Health and Human Services to issue a request for proposals (RFP) for an independent audit of the COVID-19 situation in long-term care and nursing homes in New Hampshire. The RFP will also include a needs assessment and COVID-19 preparedness plan relating to safety, public health upgrades, standards and rules for nursing homes, nursing facilities, residential care facilities, long-term care facilities, and the New Hampshire Veterans' Home. The recommendations will be submitted to the Governor and specified legislative committees no later than October 1, 2022. The bill appropriates \$250,000 for the FY22/23 biennium to the Department from federal COVID-19 relief funds for the purpose of hiring a qualified grantee. If such funds are not available, state general funds shall be used for this purpose.

Summary of testimony presented in support:

Senator Cindy Rosenwald

Senate District 13

- Senator Rosenwald said that SB 413-FN-A is the Protect Our Veterans and Seniors Act.
 She said that SB 413-FN-A will appropriate a small sum of federal funds for an independent review of the impact of COVID-19 on long-term care facilities and the Veterans Home, to make recommendations for how to improve the process, protocols, standards, and rules in place to protect the safety and wellbeing of elders and veterans.
- Senator Rosenwald said that in a normal year, 10% of Veterans Home die from an infectious disease, such as influenza or diarrhea, but, once the COVID-19 pandemic hit the Veterans Home, 20% of residents died in two months.
- Senator Rosenwald said that, despite the availability of vaccines and personal
 protective equipment (PPE), there are still outbreaks of COVID-19 at long-term care
 facilities. She said that many facilities are not accepting new admissions despite the
 state allocating \$45,000 per bed.
- Senator Rosenwald said that there are people who are ready to be discharged from
 hospitals beds who cannot be discharged because there is not a facility bed available for
 them, which has a compound effect.
- Senator Rosenwald said that in March of 2021, the Department of Health and Human Services conducted an onsite assessment of the Veterans Home. She said that it was a limited assessment which considered the availability of PPE, hand hygiene, surface cleaning, and testing and screening protocols. She said that it did not evaluate the impacts of isolation on residents and only looked at the Veterans Home and not the broader-scope industry.
- Senator Rosenwald said that there will be more outbreaks of COVID-19, which are currently preventing the health care system from functioning properly.
- Senator Rosenwald said that the Senate appropriated \$3 million to fix the road in Tilton that leads to the Veterans Home. She said that the Senate should spend less than 10% of that sum to safeguard the lives of the veterans who live at the end of that road, as well as the additional 3,000 Granite Staters who reside in long-term care facilities.

Summary of testimony presented in opposition:

Kevin Grady

State Veterans Advisory Committee (SVAC)

- Mr. Grady said that, despite the bipartisan nature and noble purpose of SB 413-FN-A, SVAC opposes the bill.
- Mr. Grady said that SVAC does not feel that the methodology or resources involved in SB 413-FN-A would produce new information in a timely manner.

- Mr. Grady said that there have been many phases to the COVID-19 pandemic –
 including the early lockdown, medium reopening, Fall 2020 surge, vaccines, larger
 reopening, Delta, and Omicron and the situation has rapidly evolved with each phase.
 He said that there is a need for long-term care facilities and the Veterans Home to
 evolve in real-time.
- Mr. Grady said that the likely timeline for the report being released was the summer of 2023. He said that the situation could change a lot in that time.
- Mr. Grady said that the Granite State Health Care Coalition produced a 200-page report with best practices and procedures.
- Mr. Grady said that the vendor chosen to implement SB 413-FN-A would likely be the same vendor that DHHS used in their assessment in 2021. He said that the response needs to be as nimble as possible. He said that the 18-month timeline likely involved would not meet the need.
- Mr. Grady said that the average age of a resident at the Veterans Home is 83.5 years
 old. He said COVID-19 hits older adults especially hard. He said that there were not as
 many tools against COVID-19 when the outbreak hit the Veterans Home.
- Mr. Grady said that between January 1 and December 31, 2021 not a single resident of the Veterans Home tested positive for, or died from, COVID-19. He said that that is a safety record that the Veterans Home is proud of.
- Mr. Grady said that SVAC does not think that SB 413-FN-A will produce timely, substantive changes.
- Senator Sherman asked if Mr. Grady had discussed his concerns with Senator Rosenwald.
 - o Mr. Grady said that he had not. He said that it is difficult for SVAC to see the language of a bill, have a meeting, and then catch up with a sponsor. He said that his preference is for sponsors to go to SVAC before they file legislation. He said that of the 18 bills SVAC is tracking, SVAC opposes 5 of them. Mr. Grady said that he hates opposing legislation.
- Senator Sherman asked Mr. Grady to talk with Senator Rosenwald.
 - o Mr. Grady said that he would. He said that there is a SVAC meeting soon and he would like the opportunity to speak with the SVAC members.

RE: AARP New Hampshire Testimony in Support of SB 413

Dear Chairman Bradley and Committee Members:

Thank you for your support on the issues most important to residents 50+ in the Granite State. AARP NH urges favorable passage of Senate Bill No. 413 requiring an independent audit and needs assessment regarding COVID-19 preparedness at long term care facilities, nursing homes, and the New Hampshire Veterans' home be completed by October 2022. The bill also makes an appropriation to the department of health and human services to hire a qualified independent auditor.

AARP NH also recommends SB413 be amended to focus more broadly on pandemic <u>preparedness</u>, using lessons learned from COVID-19 to help with future outbreaks or pandemics, both including COVID-19, but also unforeseen events. The preparedness plan should focus on best-practices in infection prevention and control coupled with general emergency preparedness strategies.

As we have sadly seen across the Granite State, a number of conditions at nursing homes and other long-term care facilities can exacerbate the spread of disease including:

- frequent physical contact between residents and staff, understaff
- employees who work in multiple facilities, increasing chances for exposure
- residents sharing rooms
- transfers of residents from hospitals and other settings
- shortages of personal protective equipment (PPE) such as masks, gowns and gloves
- lagging COVID-19 vaccination rates

These factors make nursing homes potential breeding grounds for viral and bacterial diseases, especially given chronic problems with infection control that predate the pandemic. A May 2020 report from the U.S. Government Accountability Office found that 4 in 5 nursing homes surveyed between 2013 and 2017 were cited for deficiencies in infection prevention and control, leading the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) to announce tougher rules for infection-control inspections and enforcement.

As vaccinations have increased throughout 2021, restrictions have loosened, particularly those regarding visitation. But COVID-19 and other pandemics are still a threat to nursing home residents and staff, particularly given the recent rise of the <u>delta variant</u>. <u>Hundreds of residents continue to die from the virus each month</u>, so some infection control practices still remain.

AARP and many others in the long-term care community are now also working toward <u>major</u> <u>long-term care industry reforms</u> to ensure another crisis like COVID-19 is avoided. For the safety of Granite Staters and their families, we urge these important amendments to SB413, and the passage of legislation requiring independent audit and needs assessment regarding pandemic preparedness at long term care facilities, nursing homes, and the New Hampshire Veterans' home be completed by October 2022.
