#### **ANALYSIS**

This bill requires that a voter includes a photocopy of his or her valid New Hampshire driver's license, nondriver's picture identification card, or other identification with the application for an absentee ballot and inside the outer envelope when returning an absentee ballot.

Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

1 Absentee Voting; Application; Procedure by Applicant. Amend RSA 657:6 to read as follows:

657:6 Procedure by Applicant. An application form for an absentee ballot shall be mailed or delivered to any person who applies therefor to the secretary of state or to any town or city clerk. It

shall be filled out by the applicant and sent to the clerk of the town or city in which he or she desires to vote. Alternatively, a person may apply for an official absentee ballot by sending to said clerk a

written statement containing the information required by RSA 657:4, I or by the federal official post

card form. The applicant shall include a photocopy of a valid form of identification that

meets the requirements of RSA 659:13, II with his or her application. Failure to enclose a

photocopy of valid identification shall render the absentee ballot void.

2 Procedure for Absentee Voting; Procedure by Voter. Amend the introductory paragraph of RSA 657:17, I to read as follows:

I. After marking the ballot, the voter or the person assisting a blind voter or voter with a disability who is unable to mark his or her ballot shall enclose and seal the same in an inner envelope. The voter shall execute the affidavit on the envelope. A person assisting a blind voter or voter with a disability who needs assistance executing the affidavit shall sign a statement on the affidavit envelope acknowledging the assistance. The voter or the person assisting the blind voter or voter with a disability who needs assistance shall enclose and seal the inner envelope with the affidavit in an outer envelope, along with a photocopy of a valid form of identification that meets the requirements of RSA 659:13, II. The voter or the person assisting a blind voter or voter with a disability shall then endorse on the outer envelope the voter's name, address, and voting place. Failure to enclose a photocopy of valid identification shall render the ballot void. The absentee ballot shall be delivered to the city or town clerk from whom it was received in one of the following ways:

Summary of testimony presented in support:

#### Senator Bob Giuda

- This Bill seeks to improve the security of elections and the verification of those who are casting ballots.
- Currently, there is not a process in statute that municipalities can use to verify that an absentee ballot has been submitted by a legitimate NH voter.
- This legislation will require that any means that is used to verify the identity of a voter at the polling place, be photo copied and submitted with the absentee ballot for verification.
- Senator Perkins Kwoka asked if he had considered the burden on the elderly voters to have to get a copy of their license if they do not have a copier at home.
  - o Senator Giuda replied that there is plenty of time allowed, once this is put in statute, to be able to get a copy before the next election. Persons that vote absentee, that are disabled in some way, usually have assistance so he does not think it is an additional burden. The confidence in the election process that this will bring to voters is worth it.
- Senator Donna Soucy commented that the effective date would impact municipal elections in the fall and asked if that was his intent.

 Senator Giuda replied that it was not, and he would be happy to change the effective date.

#### Senator Bob Giuda - 2nd testimony in response

- He has heard some excellent suggestions and critiques of the bill.
- He agrees that voters that are mailed a ballot, not to their registered address, should have to provide an ID.
- The intent of the bill is for those who are able to get a copy of their identification so that the election officials can verify the absentee voter.
- He does not believe that it is too onerous for those who know months in advance to get a copy of their ID.
- He would be happy to make amendments going forward.

#### Summary of testimony presented in opposition:

#### Representative Timothy Horrigan

- This creates an additional burden on the voters especially elderly, disabled, and poor voters.
- Not everybody has a photo copier available.
- It will be hard to put an additional piece of paper in the envelope with the absentee ballot.
- It also infringes on people's privacy having multiple election officials with access to a copy of the voters ID.
- Some people may not have an ID if their license expired or they do not drive any longer.

#### Ken Barnes

- Voting is the most fundamental right and sacred duty that we have as Americans.
- He is 72 and has voted in almost every election since coming of age.
- SB 54 will impede his right to vote due to medical conditions he has.
- He needs to vote by absentee ballot and would be prohibited from doing so if he cannot get a copy of his ID.
- Some people can use the copier at their place of employment, but he is retired and cannot
- This bill would disenfranchise a large number of Seniors just like me.
- If someone is elderly and cannot leave the house it does not matter how much time they
  have before the election to comply.

#### Michael Skibbie - Policy Director, Disability Rights Center of NH

- They have concerns about the impact this bill will have on people with disabilities.
- Voters who may have paraplegia or vision impairments that make it impossible to work with paper on their own.
- He thinks it is helpful to compare the experience of voting for people with or without disabilities if this bill passes.
- Consider that a person with disabilities does not drive and therefore does not have an ID or the voter had identification but has lost it. Neither of these voters would be able to vote under this bill.

- On the other hand, a person without disabilities that does not have a copier or scanner or has lost his ID, has multiple ways that they can remedy this problem and cast their vote
- One of these voters has the option to vote without identification and the other does not.
- Absentee voting by people with disabilities has a fraud problem in NH.
- Treating these two voters differently is a disability related discrimination, which the legislature should not approve.
- It may be prohibited by the Americans with Disabilities Act and the Rehabilitation Act.
- A lawsuit was filed last summer by the National Federation for the Blind, due to the fact that it is impossible for them to vote with an absentee ballot under the current NH procedures.
- There have been some changes to procedure made by the state following the filing of the lawsuit, which they appreciate.
- The case is still pending with the trial expected within a number of months.
- One of the issues is the ability to return a ballot electronically so that they do not need
  the assistance of someone, therefore violating your privacy as a voter.
- If this bill passes, it will not be possible for them to return their ballot electronically and will make the system less accessible.
- Given the current inability of people with disabilities to vote in the states current system, it makes no sense to add procedures which will make it more inaccessible.
- A voter that has to vote with assistance is not voting on the same terms as someone who can vote in private.

#### Janice Kelble

- For the last few years before he died, she was the caretaker for her husband who had Parkinson's Disease.
- Most people do not have copiers in their homes and in some towns it is hard to find a
  public copier.
- It is very tough for someone who cannot drive to have to depend on someone to get a copy of your identification.
- It is not true that everyone with disabilities has assistance.
- Her husband was frustrated when he could not go to the polls.
- Putting more blocks in the way of voting would create more unnecessary frustration, and hardship.
- This burden will take away the voice of some of the most vulnerable citizens in NH.
- There are options now for people without an ID to vote at the polls and to deny that for the most vulnerable voting absentee is not right.

#### Daniel Healey - Town Clerk, Derry

- This would disenfranchise the elderly residents that cannot get to a copier.
- Many residents of the nursing homes do not have an ID and those that do cannot easily get a copy of it.
- They had many calls from residents in assisted living facilities and nursing homes on how to vote absentee. If there is an additional step to the process it will hinder many of them from voting.
- If this is put into law, there needs to be a procedure of what to do with the copy of the ID after the ballot is verified.

• A suggestion from Tina Guilford was, that if someone is requesting an absentee ballot and they are not getting it mailed to their registered address, that is when you should ask for an ID.

#### Tina Guilford - Moderator, Derry

- They had 6500 absentee voters in November and a huge number of those were mailed.
- If they are mailing it to a different address than what is on the checklist, in that case, she understands asking for an ID.
- All the voters that came in person to vote absentee, wanted to show their ID and that is a good idea.
- It would be suppressing the vote, to require those that cannot come in, to provide a copy of their ID.
- This will confuse absentee voters even more, and the returned ballots will not be correct.

#### Dear Senators,

I submit this statement on behalf of the American Civil Liberties Union of New Hampshire (ACLU)—a non-partisan, non-profit organization working to protect civil liberties throughout New Hampshire for over fifty years. I signed in against SB54 and appreciate the opportunity to share this explanation.

The ACLU-NH strongly opposes SB54, which would require voters to submit hard copies of their photo-ID in order to request an absentee ballot. The reality, particularly during a pandemic when fewer people are going to an office, is most people do not have ready access to a photocopier. To comply with this bill, most voters would have to search out a business with photocopier services. This burden is disproportionately felt by people with disabilities. The ACLU-NH agrees with the Disability Rights Center that this bill risks violating the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) and could subject the state to expensive litigation. Rather than send the state to court, the ACLU-NH urges this Committee to vote *inexpedient to legislate* on SB54.

This bill's effort to change our voting laws sends the message that there is something wrong with our elections. This runs directly contrary to the assessment of our Governor and Secretary of State, both of whom have celebrated how well NH's elections were run last year. Governor Sununu, during his inaugural speech, said, "New Hampshire's elections went off exactly as we needed them to. With integrity and accountability." This assessment undermines any alleged need for this legislation.

The ACLU-NH respectfully urges the members of the Senate Election Law and Municipal Affairs Committee to vote *inexpedient to legislate* on SB54.

Please forward my opposition to SB54 and these comments.

It appears that SB54 is asking each voter to produce a copy of a valid form of identification for BOTH the absentee ballot application and with the returned absentee ballot.

The committee should look at how these requirements make it more difficult for a voter who wishes to exercise their right to vote absentee than a voter who wishes to vote "in-person." Voters wishing to vote absentee have additional burdens and may be denied their right to vote.

From SOS website; "To register, you will need to provide proof of your identity, age, citizenship, and domicile. Proof can be either by documents or if you do not have documents with you, by affidavit. Documents may be presented in paper or electronic form."

When a voter registers to vote they have already proven their identification. And by law if they are unable to produce proof of the identity, they can attest to and sign an affidavit. These voters will be denied their right to vote absentee.

The Committee should take into account that if a voter exercises their right to vote "in-person" they can vote without proof of identification. There is a procedure and that person will need to either be identified by the town clerk, the moderator or one of the supervisors of the checklist. If the person is so identified, they may proceed to vote. If the person is not identified and does not want to or can not produce a valid proof of identification, then the law calls for certain procedures to be followed. Under existing law you have a right to vote without proof of identification.

It also appears that SB54 includes those requesting an absentee application through the federal official post card form. The FPCA is a federal form and the state has no jurisdiction to alter or change the requirements to vote. "This form is for absent Uniformed Service members, their families, and citizens residing outside the United States. It is used to register to vote, request an absentee ballot, and update your contact information."

Again this law would place additional burdens on voters who choose to vote absentee which creates inequility.
