The Department further notes that there are two public health departments in the state: the Nashua and Manchester health departments.

# Summary of testimony presented in support:

# Senator Rosenwald, Prime Sponsor:

- This bill will help solve a problem recently discovered relative to vaccinations for homebound or otherwise underserved seniors.
- Public health networks that serve a region such as Nashua Public Health Department have learned that they cannot use the federal vaccine fund the state gets to pay for their vaccines if they are vaccinating Medicare enrollees. This is because the program which is known as "317" is for adults without insurance or who are underinsured.
- In the case of Nashua's Public Health Department, they provide a range of vaccinations to approximately 100 older residents each year not only in Nashua, but in surrounding towns. The most common vaccines they've been giving are Tdap and Hepatitis. They also do influenza and any approved vaccines.
- This program is important because it serves a population that does not have ready access to other sites of care. In some cases it is a mobile van, although some individuals do get to the public health center.
- The appropriation is \$20,000 for the two-year biennium.

• Medicare changed some of its rules beginning January 1, 2023. Because of this, Nashua wants to propose a very small amendment to SB 115-FN-A.

<u>Bobbie Bagley, Director, City of Nashua, Division of Public Health and</u> <u>Community Services</u>:

- SB 115-FN-A is very important to reducing barriers to access for adults seeking vaccination at the local health department.
- Nashua Public Health offers vaccinations through their onsite vaccination clinics, during their mobile outreach van, and in the community at various sites when requested. This occurs pretty much all year round. This gives the maximum opportunity to reaching people where they are, allowing for them to make the choices for vaccine coverage to protect themselves and live their healthiest lives.
- Nashua Public Health encountered challenges that are counter-intuitive to their goal of vaccinating as many as want to be vaccinated to prevent illness in the community, when they had to turn away 100 seniors during November and December.
- The passing of the Inflation Reduction Act in January allows for all Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP)-recommended vaccines to be covered with no copay or cost share, which allows for the provision of additional access to many adults. However, Nashua Public Health still faced the challenge of having to turn away those who have Medicare Part B and Part D or the Advantage Plan with prescription coverage if they used 317-funded vaccines.
- The City of Nashua purchases vaccines for Nashua residents, but is also the regional lead for its public health region and often will have residents from surrounding towns attend its vaccination clinics. The requested appropriation will allow Nashua to vaccinate non-Nashua residents who attend the clinics regardless of having Medicare/Medicaid insurances.
- Their ultimate goal is to get vaccines into the arms of those who want to protect their loved ones and themselves.

# <u>Kim Bernard, Chief Public Health Nurse, City of Nashua, Division of Public</u> <u>Health and Community Services</u>:

- As public health professionals, one of their core roles is protecting and promoting the health of their community. A key factor in facilitating this is through prevention. Through increasing vaccination rates, they can assist in preventing severe illness or death from many communicable diseases.
- Their immunization clinics serve the Greater Nashua Region, which includes Nashua and the 12 surrounding towns. In their clinics they are experiencing challenges in providing vaccines to certain populations due to funding guidelines under the 317 vaccination program. Section 317 of the Public Health Service Act authorizes the federal purchase of vaccines to vaccinate children, adolescents and adults. It is directed towards priority populations such as underinsured adults. Depending upon the type of Medicare an individual has, a vaccine may or may not be covered.
- Children who come to the Nashua clinic, regardless of insurance status, are eligible to receive ACIP-recommended vaccines through funding from both the Vaccine for Children (VFC) Program and State of New Hampshire funding. For

adults, there are barriers for several different populations. If an individual has Medicare Part B and Part D or an Advantage Plan (Part C) with prescription for vaccines, they are not eligible to use 317-funded vaccines such a Tdap or Shingles vaccine. Those clients must be referred to a pharmacy or their health care provider.

- Nashua clinics also have limitations with high dose flu vaccine supply when serving those that live outside of Nashua city limits. (High dose is the dose recommended for those 65 and older.) Regardless of insurance, these clients also need to be referred to a pharmacy or their health care provider.
- Older adults are at higher risk for severe illness with many disease processes. They reach out to Nashua Public Health but are faced with barriers, decreasing access to health care. These older adults may not follow through on going to another facility to get their vaccine due to lack of transportation, mobility or accessibility to appointments.
- For high dose vaccine, Nashua has a city-funded flu vaccine supply for city employees and city residents. The state does not carry high dose flu vaccine; it is purchased directly through a pharmaceutical company. They are unable to use this funding stream for residents who live outside of Nashua.
- If Nashua receives the funding SB 115-FN-A provides, the public health department could directly purchase these vaccines and administer at their clinics for those who do not qualify under 317 funds.
- We need to do better to decrease barriers to health care for all people.
- Senator D'Allesandro inquired as to the demographic of Nashua based on age and category. Director Bagley agreed to secure that information for committee members.

# <u>Ryan Tannian, Bureau Chief, Bureau of Infectious Disease Control,</u> <u>Department of Health and Human Services</u>:

- They will work with Senator Rosenwald on a small amendment to the bill. Medicare effective January 1, 2023 expanded access through its Medicare Part D Program. However, there are still gaps that do exist for the above-65 aged population. By removing the specific Medicare language in the bill it would provide more flexibility for public health departments, as well as capture other members of the population where gaps exist that may not be eligible for 317 funding, as well as eliminate the access to care barriers.
  - Senator Bradley inquired about the 153 doses in the fiscal note of the bill. Where did that number come from? Is it enough? Per Mr. Tannian, with 317 funding there is CDC funding which allows them to purchase vaccine at a discounted rate. The 153 rate is an average.

Thank you for having me. My name is Bobbie D Bagley, and I am the Director for the City of Nashua Division of Public Health and Community Services. I am here this afternoon to testify in support of SB 115-FN relative to making an appropriation to the DHHS for the purpose of funding vaccines to be administered at the local health departments. Thank you Senator Rosenwald for introducing and sponsoring this bill and thank you to all of the other sponsors.

This bill is important to reducing barriers to access for adults seeking vaccination at the local health department.

Currently, at the DPHCS we offer vaccinations through our onsite vaccination clinics, during our mobile outreach van, and in the community at various sites when requested, pretty much all year round. This gives the maximum opportunity to reaching people where they are, allowing for them to make the choices for vaccine coverage to protect themselves and live their healthiest lives.

During this past Fall, we encountered challenges that are counter intuitive to our goal of vaccinating as many as want to be vaccinated to prevent illness in the community, when we had to turn seniors away in the months of November and December.


The passing of the Inflation Reduction Act in January allows for all Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) recommended vaccines to be covered with no copay or cost share which allows for the provision of additional access to many adults.

However, we were still met with the challenge of having to turn away those who have Medicare Part B and Part D or the Advantage Plan with prescription coverage at the local health department if we used 317 funded vaccines.

At the City of Nashua we purchase vaccines for Nashua residents, we are however the regional led for our public health region and will have residents from surrounding towns attend our vaccination clinics. This funding will allow for us to vaccinate those adults who attend the clinics that are not Nashua residents and regardless of having Medicare/Medicaid insurances. Our ultimate goal is to get vaccines in the arms of those who want them to protect their loved ones.

As public health professionals, one of our core roles is protecting and promoting the health of our community. A key factor in facilitating this is through prevention. Through increasing vaccination rates, we can assist in preventing severe illness or death from many communicable diseases

Our immunization clinics serve the Greater Nashua Region, which includes Nashua and the 12 surrounding towns. In our clinics, we are experiencing challenges in providing vaccines to certain populations due to funding guidelines under the 317 vaccination program. Section 317 of the Public Health Service Act authorizes the federal purchase of vaccines to vaccinate children, adolescents and adults. It is directed towards priority populations such as underinsured adults. Dependent on the type of Medicare an individual has, a vaccine may or may not be covered.

For instance, children who come to our clinic, regardless of insurance status, are eligible to receive ACIP (Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices) recommended vaccines through funding from both the Vaccine for Children (VFC) program and State of NH funding. We have to refer these clients to a pharmacy or their health care provider.

Our clinics also have limitations with high dose Flu vaccine supply (high dose is the dose recommended for those 65 and older) when serving those that live outside of Nashua city limits. Regardless of insurance, we also have to refer these clients to a pharmacy or their health care provider.

This is an issue because older adults are at higher risk for severe illness with many disease processes. They are reaching out to their public health department and we are putting up barriers; decreasing access to health care when we turn clients away. They may not follow through on going to another facility to get their vaccine due to reasons such as transportation, mobility or accessibility to appointments.

For high dose flu vaccine, we have City funded flu vaccine supply for City employees and City residents. The State does not carry high dose flu so it is purchased directly through a pharmaceutical company. We are unable to use this funding stream for residents who live outside of Nashua.

Recently, we had a couple, in their 90's, that came to our clinic looking for high dose flu shots. Since they lived in a town outside of Nashua, but within our region, we could not use our high dose flu supply. They then asked if they could receive the regular flu vaccine. We had to turn them away, since they were insured. As you can image, we felt terrible turning away this couple as well as other individuals in the same situation.

If we receive the funding that this bill would provide, the public health department could directly purchase these vaccines and administer at our clinics for those who do not qualify under 317 funds. As a local health department, we have the opportunity to bring vaccines into the community to help decrease barriers such as a local senior center, senior activity center and to small, rural towns within our region.

We need to do better to decrease barriers to health care for all people. I urge you to vote in favor of SB15 and Thank you for the opportunity to speak in favor of this bill.
