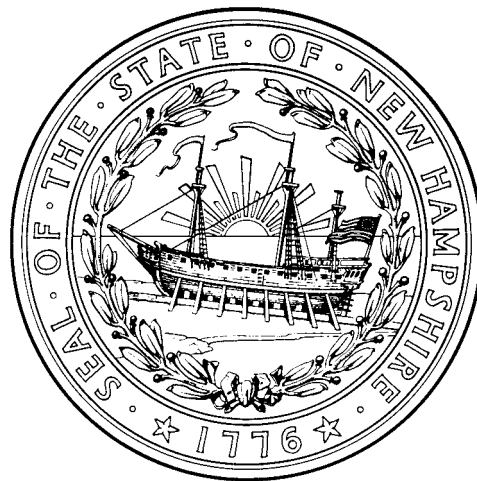

January 8, 2014

The Senate reconvened at 1:00 p.m., a quorum being present.

The Reverend Kate Atkinson, guest chaplain to the Senate, offered the following meditative thoughts and prayer.

Every year around this time I hear comments like, "I am so glad that year is over." Or, "I hope this is a better year than the last one!" We do have this tendency to make sweeping assessments of calendar years. I remember going through a phase of believing that all the bad things in my life happened in the odd-numbered years! Of course that wasn't true - and something else that is certainly not true is that any one year can be classified as either all good or all bad.

As you can imagine, we've had a number of amazing worship services over the Christmas season - but there are two that stick out in my mind as we enter this new year. And the first one was the "Blue Christmas" service at St. Paul's on the 21st of December. And that's a service for people who struggle at Christmastime. They may have lost a loved one during the year, they might be going through illness or some other challenge, and they just struggle with being joyful at Christmas time; that was one of them. And then the other was the weekly service that I stepped in and took for the Chaplain at the State Hospital.

At both of those services, I was struck when people shared their stories, and it became so clear that sorrow and joy are not consecutive; they don't follow on from one another in great long periods in our lives. We could be suffering from the deepest, deepest, darkest grief and suddenly be absolutely delighted by something. We could be dealing with daily burdens of illness, or worry about a loved one, or a job, or any, any of those daily challenges and still experience the deepest joy.

So, as this New Year, as 2014 opens up ahead of us, I'm really encouraging us all to move away from that tendency that better times are ahead of us, and instead to notice all of the times when joy breaks in to our not-so-good days. And while we're at it, I think we could, also, make a real effort and choice to be the light and the joy that breaks into other people's not-so-good days. Let's pray.

Loving God, whose mercies are new each returning day: let the radiance of your Spirit renew our lives, so that, throughout this year, we may be fully aware of your light breaking into the darkness of pain and sorrow, and be blessed with healing, strength, and deepest joy. *Amen.*

(The Chair recognized Sen. Larsen.)

SENATOR LARSEN: I'd like to make a point of personal privilege under 2-17. Thank you, Mister President. I felt with the start of the New Year it's a tradition that we set goals for ourselves and I thought I'd take a moment to reflect on some of the goals that we have thought through and hope that you each would consider in your own minds whether they are goals you would join with us in.

As we begin 2014 and a new legislative session, I'd like to take this moment to focus on the bright possibilities we have in this next year to improve the lives of our fellow citizens.

First and foremost, as we all know, we have in the next months the opportunity to offer health insurance for 46,000 working, uninsured Granite Stator's, at the same time adding \$2.5 billion to the New Hampshire economy, helping to offset and create 700 jobs and saving the state budget \$92 million. How, and even if, we accomplish that goal is still under discussion, but the opportunity lies with us.

We have, this session, the opportunity to re-invigorate the American dream by passing bills that increase the minimum wage, re-enforce pay equity, protect and strengthen retirement savings. Passing these bills, we can reinforce the dream that if you work hard and play by the rules you will be rewarded.

We have the opportunity to spur job growth and economic security with bills that encourage job creation through tax credits for innovative entrepreneurs, extend economic revitalization zones and tax credits for vocational training center donations, creating benefit corporations that encourage more transparent corporate responsibility.

We have the opportunity to improve public safety in our state through investments in our roads and bridges, and bills that further protect against domestic violence and human trafficking. And finally, we have the opportunity to improve lives by making further investments in our fragile mental health system and clarifying marriage equality rights and forms.

This is just a brief listing of the opportunities that lie ahead. And in this year we recognize, in this anniversary of the war on poverty, let us not lose sight of the hard working, law-abiding citizens who count on us to represent them by honoring us with their vote and their trust.

SENATOR D'ALLESANDRO: Thank you, Mister President. Mister President, point of personal privilege. This year we lost a dedicated state representative who had reached her 100th birthday – Natalie Flanagan. Senate President Morse, myself, former Senate President Delahunty, the Secretary of State were with her the day she celebrated her 100th birthday. Natalie Flanagan and I came to this legislature at about the same time – the early 1970's. Some in this room were not born at that time, I'm sure. But I was elected in 1972, came to the legislature in 1973. Nat came in 1974 - there was a special session. Those of you who knew Natalie Flanagan knew that she was a woman of distinction, class personified. Always Natalie dressed, always looked her best, always performed her best here in the House and in the legislature – very gracious woman. Very, very gracious woman – really looked up to her, you know, as really a fashion plate. She came from a political heritage. Her father was mayor of Haverhill, Massachusetts from 1929 to 1932, so she had politics running through her veins. I don't think Nat ever had a bad word to say about anybody; a republican through and through, but just a great, great lady. And certainly a wonderful person to be associated with, a wonderful person to know. And right up until her last days, I'm sure, I mean, when we greeted her – Senator Morse, myself, Senator Delahunty she was very gracious and she was all together. I mean 100 years of age. That's not a bad trip. You know, the first 100 are the toughest, I guess. But she was really, really terrific. But I thought the thing that made Natalie so very, very special was some of the things that she dedicated her life to. And she was asked by a columnist what one thing would you most like to accomplish and her answer was peace. Now there's a lot of foresight in that. What's the one thing in your life that you want: peace.

What should it read on her tombstone? Please cremate me and toss me in the sea. Most people are surprised when they ask her what does she do, and she says I'm a politician. So Natalie Flanagan – just a truly, truly great American, great public servant, served in this legislature for a long time; retired in 2004, served many, many years as a chairman of a committee in the House, but just a really great, great, great lady. We're losing a lot of people, you know, as we move along this path in life, but Natalie was certainly one that gave her fair share, did a great job and will be sorely missed.

PRESIDENT MORSE: I'd like to take a moment of personal privilege to recognize former Representative Natalie Flanagan who passed away this past weekend at the age of 100.

I stopped in to see the Secretary of State on Monday, and he said he was there Saturday and Natalie said to him, "I'm ready to go upstairs."

For over 60 years, Representative Flanagan made Atkinson her home where she was active in her community, her county, and conservative politics.

Despite being born at a time when women were denied the right to vote, Representative Flanagan became a key player in local politics and served 30 years in the New Hampshire House of Representatives - elected repeatedly as one of the top vote getters in Atkinson.

During her time in the legislature, Representative Flanagan was a force on the House election Law Committee where she fought to keep elections fair and open, to ensure our state's military service members had equal access to the ballot, and to improve efficiency through innovations like electronic balloting. For her work improving election law, Representative Flanagan was honored by the National Association of Secretaries of States with their Meritorious Service Award.

When she retired from the House in 2004 Representative Flanagan did so as the longest serving member of the New Hampshire Legislature, and as the oldest serving female legislator in the nation.

For her lifetime of service Representative Flanagan was named the 2004 Citizen of the Year by the Atkinson Lions Club and not once, but twice, "Natalie Flanagan Day" was proclaimed in her honor by Governor Benson.

Representative Flanagan left a lasting mark on the General Court and our state. As a dedicated public servant, as a friend to many of us, she will be sorely missed.
