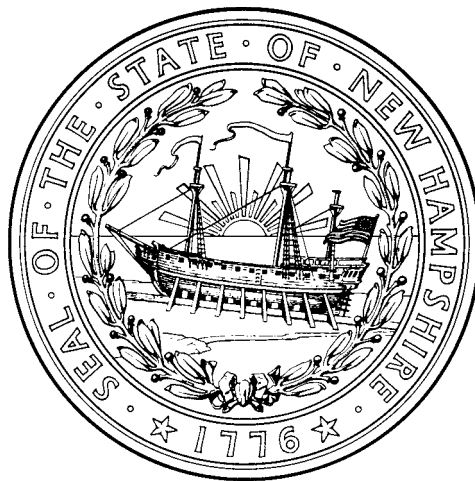

The Senate reconvened at 10:00 a.m., a quorum being present.

Reverend Kate Atkinson, chaplain to the Senate, offered the following meditative thoughts and prayer:

There were, oh, I don't know how many, but many, many others from the greater Concord area, and we were all were incarcerated for an hour or two. Needless to say, we're not really crooks and we were not really in jail. We were actually at the CC Tomatoes restaurant, and we were involved in a fundraiser for MDA, Muscular Dystrophy Association, in which we encouraged our sponsors to "raise bail" to get us out. And Rabbi Robin and I, and all of the other convicts, were perfectly happy to wear striped shirts and plastic handcuffs, and generally to look silly because it was for a good cause.

Now, fun and humor have become very acceptable elements in what might otherwise be very serious matters. In this particular case, it's essential that we work hard to find a cure for muscle disease, and to support the people who suffer from it. But that doesn't mean we can't have fun along the way. In fact, I believe that the more fun we have, the more effective we're going to be; the more effective our efforts become. And I believe that wherever serious work is being done, that laughter and lightheartedness are essential. They're certainly a part of our regular worship services and our ministry meetings at St. Paul's, and I hope that that's true of you as well. I think that you are dealing with some of the darkest, the saddest, the hardest, the most painful aspects of life in our society, and I pray that you will be able to find both healing and cheer in the gift of laughter.

Let us pray.

God of joy, we give you thanks for humor and fun; for the ways they enrich and transform our lives. Help us to loosen our hold on the concerns that weigh us down, and to allow your gift of laughter to infuse the work that we do together.
Amen.

INTRODUCTION OF GUESTS

Senator Larsen introduced Cameron J. Thompson, from Saint John's Regional School, serving as Senate Page for the day.

Senator Prescott introduced Alex Peacock, a homeschooler from Chester, serving as Senate Page for the day.

Sen. Soucy introduced fifth graders from Henry Wilson School of Manchester, visiting in the balcony today.

Sen. Lasky introduced Mount Pleasant Elementary School of Nashua, visiting in the balcony today.

Sen. D'Allesandro introduced Resident Agent In Charge (RAIC) Holly Fraumeni and Special Agent Matthew O'Neill, from the Manchester Resident Office.

Mister President, we have the honor, today, of having not only the Secret Service Agent in Charge of the State of New Hampshire, but we have Matthew O'Neill, Special Agent, who is the Secret Service Agent of the Year. So, Holly, if you could come up. And Holly, if you could give a quick iteration as to what this Secret Service Agent did for the people of the United States of America.

Special Agent Matthew O'Neill first identified website portals that sold approximately 30 million U.S. citizens personal identifying information and other vital information for account access to its customer base of cyber criminals. After conducting over a dozen federal search warrants, numerous undercover purchases of, what we call PII, personal identifying information, and examining nearly 40,000 emails, SA O'Neill identified a Vietnamese national Hieu Minh Ngo as the individual responsible for the aforementioned websites, as well as his ultimate source of the data, Experian. Ngo was considered the largest unauthorized seller of PII in the world, and was federally indicted on 15 counts. SA O'Neill commenced another successful international undercover lure operation, and Ngo was subsequently arrested in Guam by Manchester agents in 2013. Since then, in just 2013, SA O'Neill has been able to indict, lure, and arrest over 10 other resellers/end users to New Hampshire, and provide indictments to two other districts. There have been about 6 more of these arrests, so far, in 2014. Additionally in 2013, SA O'Neill's defendants from the Subway hacking case pled and were sentenced. The "mastermind" received a 15-year sentence, which is the second longest amount of time ever provided in a hacking case. In yet another unrelated Subway case, SA O'Neill investigated and prosecuted in US District Court two individuals responsible for selling "infected" point of sale terminals to Subway franchises in order to gain back door access of payment cards for unauthorized purposes. SA O'Neill is also responsible for the development of an insurance fraud case that the US Attorney's Office considers to be the largest case ever prosecuted in the district. Thus far, three defendants have pled guilty. Losses are estimated to exceed 400 million dollars. Above and beyond all his investigative initiatives, SA O'Neill organized a golf tournament and raised over \$135,500 for a local cancer charity last year. You can also see I am a very proud boss.

Thank you, thank you, Holly. And Agent O'Neill, on behalf of the New Hampshire State Senate, a resolution:

Be it known that the New Hampshire State Senate extends its congratulations to Matt O'Neill in recognition of being named the United State Secret Service Agent of the Year, and be it further known, the New Hampshire State Senate extends its best wishes for continued success. Offered by Senator D'Allesandro from District 20.

And I might say, we all think about the federal authorities and what they do for us, and Agent O'Neill and the office in Manchester has done remarkable work, not only for this state, but for the country, and we should truly recognize the quality of the work and the quality of the service of these individuals. Thankfully, they're here to protect us. They do that in an outstanding fashion.

And I thank Mister President, thank you for allowing them to come today. And I appreciate the Senate's warm recognition of this group of people. Thank you.

SENATOR D'ALLESANDRO: Thank you, Mister President. Personal privilege. I failed to recognize the annotations in our rules, so I just offer that, and I'd like to speak. Thank you, Mister President.

Mister President, at the end of this session and at the end of the month of June, one of the members of the Fourth Estate will be retiring. Now the Fourth Estate is an integral part of the political process. Without the Fourth Estate, the message is not conveyed properly. It's not conveyed, I think, in a wonderful manner with great deal of credibility. So, what are the members of the Fourth Estate: a writer of excellence, a person who presents the narrative clearly and succinctly, and a person whose journalistic qualities have been recognized throughout this state. Norma Love is leaving us. And she's leaving us all with a little bit of "Love", and I think that's important.

I've known Norma for a number of years. I've been on the plus side of some of her articulations. I've been on the negative side of other articulations. But I must say this, as a journalist she reported it as she saw it, she had a tremendous amount of credibility with all who read her articles, and I think the state was the beneficiary of Norma's presence here for a great period of time.

It's with great sadness that you see people leave. People that you've developed a relationship with and a fondness for. I think in both cases that's been my situation with Norma Love. I wish her nothing but the best as she moved forward. She's been a credit to the Fourth Estate. That's, I think, the highest honor, Norma, that we can give you. We respect your journalistic integrity. We respect the way that you present a story, whether we're on the plus side or on the minus side. It's always been fair. It's been articulated well. And, as I say, it's with sadness that I see you go, and it's with sadness that I think that my colleagues see you go. We wish you nothing but the best in the future, and we thank you for every contribution you've given to journalistic quality. Thank you.

(The Chair recognized Sen. Woodburn.)

SENATOR WOODBURN: Thank you, Mister President. This last week New Hampshire and the North country lost someone known to many of you, a former doorkeeper of this body, a former Coos County Sheriff, Emile Martineau. He died on Friday May 16th after a brief illness and a long life. He was 96 years old. He was raised and educated in Berlin, and married the former Pauline Audet, and together they raised a family of four.

The Sheriff became a United States Marine, and served during World War II in the South Pacific. After the war he returned to Berlin where he owned and operated People's Restaurant. His outgoing personality, generous pours at the bar, and his home cooked soups and stews made this venture a success. In the 1950's he worked for Top Furniture where he sold many people their first TV set and washing machines.

In 1962 he was persuaded to run for Coos County Sheriff and he won that election, and the next 10, and served as Sheriff for 20 years from 1962 until his retirement in 1982. He has been fondly remembered in that position by law enforcement personnel, by the public at large, and even by prisoners he transported from the court to the jail and to the prison.

Following his retirement, Emile continued his public service, and he was appointed Doorkeeper of the New Hampshire Senate in 1985, and he served in that position until 1999. He is still remembered fondly by co-workers for his sense of fun as well as faithful service.

Emile was a charter member of the Athletic Booster Club, which supported the Berlin Maroons local hockey team, and was an avid fan. He was also a member of the Eagles Club, the American Legion, VFW, and Retired Law Enforcement Association.

In retirement he remained very active chopping and splitting wood the old fashion way, mowing extensive lawns, and being a helping hand in nearby farms.

Mister President, I would offer condolences to his family, his cherished long-time sweet heart, Esther McDonough of Newport, and his sisters and other family members.

Also, Mister President, I would like to note the death of a former mayor of the city of Berlin, Sylvio Croteau, who was mayor of Berlin from 1968 to 1974, and was instrumental in the creation of the Jericho Lake Park as well as our Industrial Park.

And finally, Mister President, many of you know how many towns, how much square miles I have in my district, and how much of the state it is, but I have 42 schools in my district, as well, and last year I embarked on visiting every one of those and I finished this past week. And it was a reminder of the importance of teachers in the lives of our students and our young people.

And I think of this massive education system, nothing is more important than the relationship between a student and the teacher. And I just want to highlight a few retiring, long, long term educators from District 1: Keith Parent, Gorham Principal; Kathy Tremer from the Groveton School; Claire Senecal from the Groveton School; Jeanne Ward from the Monroe Consolidated School; Pam Hennessey from Littleton High School; Jim Ross from the Lakeway School; Rose Poekert from the Lancaster School; and Joanne Murphy from the Berlin School.
