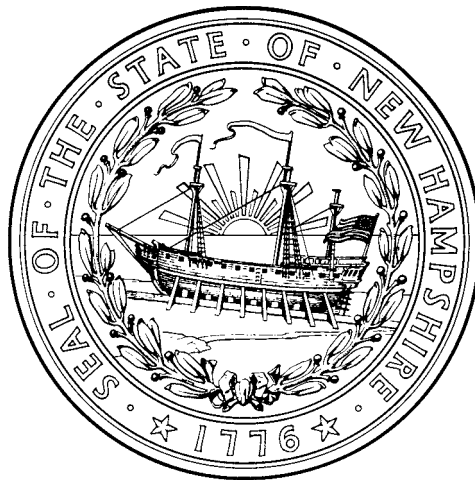

SENATOR STILES: Well, I'm very happy that we're able to recognize Desi today. Desi came to the United States when he was 9.5 years old from Cuba. He served in the U.S. Military during the Vietnam conflict, and is currently the owner of 401 Tavern in Hampton. And the 401 Tavern is like everybody knows your name, and there's an event going on there every day, and it's due to Desi, his wife, and his partner that make this happen because he is so committed to the community, and respects everyone in the community and does everything he can. A few years ago he was recognized by the Chamber as the Citizen of the Year for the work that he does for the community. And if it's a child that needs something, if it's a family that needs something, if it's our police he's always there; always giving, giving, giving. TRANSPORTATION
