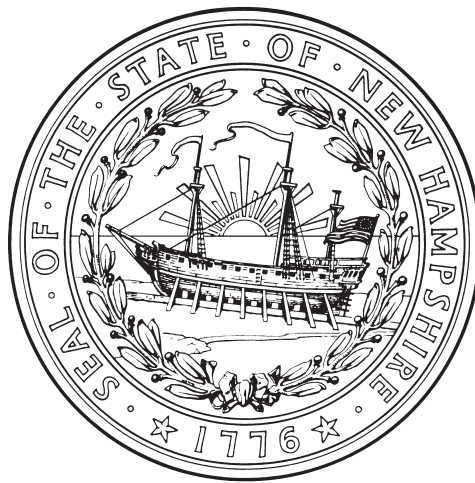

HB 1685-FN, establishing a statutory commission for oversight over occupational regulation—if Inexpedient to Legislate recommendation is overturned.

Without objection, the FN Report is adopted.

ENERGY AND NATURAL RESOURCES

HB 1286, by Senator Feltes

CONSENT CALENDAR

Senator Bradley moved that the Consent Calendar, with the relevant amendments as printed in the day's Calendar be adopted and that all such bills found Ought-to-Pass be ordered to Third Reading.

EDUCATION

HB 1480, relative to the membership of the board of trustees of a chartered public school.

Inexpedient to Legislate, Vote 5-0. Senator Watters for the committee.

This bill would modify the membership requirements of the board of trustees of a public chartered school, changing the ways that parents are represented on the board and making it so that no employee would be a voting member of the board. The committee believes that parent involvement is a vital part of a well-functioning charter school and that having teachers on the board is vital, given their expertise in making decisions that are best for students.

HB 1493, relative to the statewide assessment system of performance in schools.

Ought to Pass, Vote 5-0. Senator Giuda for the committee.

This bill provides that the statewide education improvement and assessment program shall be designed to measure academic achievement and growth. The legislation also specifically enumerates that the assessments address post-secondary readiness and deals with the criteria to be used in the development of the program. This bill is an important step in aligning education statutes with the state's Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) plan.

HB 1494, relative to the definition of academic standards.

Ought to Pass, Vote 5-0. Senator Ward for the committee.

This legislation clarifies the definition of "academic standards" by including what a student should know and be able to do in a course or at each grade level, in order to include students who may be taking courses above their given grade level.

HB 1551, relative to the retention of records of individualized education programs.

Ought to Pass, Vote 5-0. Senator Watters for the committee.

This bill clarifies requirements to retain records on IEPs and streamlines recordkeeping for school districts. This legislation is important in order to deal with a recent change in rules.

ENERGY AND NATURAL RESOURCES

HB 1575, permitting hunting with an air rifle.

Ought to Pass, Vote 5-0. Senator Innis for the committee.

This bill permits the hunting of small game with an air rifle. This bill comes with the support of the New Hampshire Fish & Game Department. The bill has been tailored to prohibit the firing of an air rifle for the purposes of hunting within 300 feet of a permanently occupied dwelling. Air rifles are often chosen for vermin control and general shooting in compact areas.

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENTS AND ADMINISTRATION

HB 1441-FN, establishing the office of the ombudsman in the department of state.

Inexpedient to Legislate, Vote 5-0. Senator Gannon for the committee.

This bill was brought forward to establish an office of ombudsman within the department of state. The ombudsman would investigate criminal complaints from the public and from the New Hampshire General Court, and would also conduct investigations of such complaints. The Committee did not believe there were adequate resources to support this, in addition, there were no specific qualifications for this position. The committee felt there were many unanswered questions.

HB 1823-FN, relative to layered amortization of retirement system liabilities.

Ought to Pass, Vote 5-0. Senator Carson for the committee.

This legislation incorporates recommendations from the Decennial Commission. It will assist in smoothing out the ups and downs of rates. This bill makes sense for our retirement system's future, in stabilizing the system and in having predictability for the New Hampshire Retirement System employees and employers.

JUDICIARY

HB 1425-FN, relative to simple assault.

Inexpedient to Legislate, Vote 5-0. Senator Hennessey for the committee.

This bill would provide that, for the purpose of the simple assault statute, unprivileged physical contact which does not result in harm or injury to another would be charged as a violation and not a misdemeanor. The Committee believes this would be an unnecessary and confusing change to a statute that is working well.

HB 1683-FN, relative to the definition of child abuse.

Ought to Pass, Vote 5-0. Senator French for the committee.

This bill will amend the definition of 'abused child' to include a child who has been subjected to human trafficking. Enacting this legislation will ensure that children who are sex trafficking victims will be able to receive all available services currently offered to abused children.

PUBLIC AND MUNICIPAL AFFAIRS

HB 1446, relative to childhood cancer awareness month.

Ought to Pass, Vote 5-0. Senator Gray for the committee.

This bill designates September as childhood cancer awareness month. Recognizing that there is a cancer cluster in a five town area of the New Hampshire Seacoast, raising awareness is a priority. This legislation will facilitate the steps needed to encourage research, improve screening, and increase understanding of environmental triggers of pediatric cancers.

TRANSPORTATION

HB 1271, changing the name of Industrial Drive at the Hugh Gallen Office Park to Ratification Way.

Ought to Pass, Vote 5-0. Senator Cavanaugh for the committee.

This bill renames a section of Industrial Drive in Concord as Ratification Way. The cost of any signage or other markers will be covered by the appropriation contained in the current capital budget for the archives building project.

HB 1290, relative to vehicle registration for new residents to New Hampshire.

Ought to Pass, Vote 5-0. Senator Gannon for the committee.

This bill was requested by the Department of Safety to allow them to issue registrations and number plates to new residents whose vehicles were registered in another state and whose titles are held by an out-of-state lien holder. Current statute requires the department to issue temporary registrations valid for 60 days; however, 60 days has proven to be an insufficient timeframe for receipt of the title. The registrations will be valid until such time as they are due for renewal.

HB 1331, relative to incidental uses for agricultural plates.

Ought to Pass with Amendment, Vote 5-0. Senator Ward for the committee.

This bill authorizes uses of a vehicle with agricultural plates that are incidental to agricultural uses. Authorized uses include, but are not limited to, stops at a school or place of business during travel. The committee amendment addresses a request of the Commissioner of Agriculture to update RSA 261:84 relative to farm plates so that a driver authorized by the holder may operate the vehicle.

Amendment to HB 1331

Amend the bill by inserting after section 1 the following and renumbering the original section 2 to read as 3:

2 Farm Plates; Use. Amend RSA 261:84, II to read as follows:

II. This section shall be construed as authorizing the holder of farm plates ***or a driver authorized by the holder*** to operate the vehicle while it is empty so long as it is being used generally to accomplish the purposes allowed in this section, and to transport within such vehicle incidental personal property such as food, tools, and clothing.

HB 1363, relative to the waiver of vehicle registration suspension fees.

Ought to Pass, Vote 5-0. Senator Birdsell for the committee.

This bill authorizes waiver of vehicle registration suspension fees in cases where an error resulting in suspension has been made by the Department of Safety, the court, or law enforcement.

HB 1453, relative to the traffic safety commission.

Ought to Pass, Vote 5-0. Senator Birdsell for the committee.

This bill modifies the duties of the traffic safety commission by adding two members from the legislature. Legislative involvement will help to ensure that the legislature knows about the good work that this commission is doing and so that the commission may become better integrated with both the House and the Senate.

HB 1454, eliminating the commission to study recommendations of the National Transportation Safety Board.

Ought to Pass, Vote 5-0. Senator Ward for the committee.

This bill eliminates the commission to study recommendations of the National Transportation Safety Board (NTSB). This commission was formed over 20 years ago and has not held one meeting. Further, studying recommendations of the NTSB is rightfully in the responsibilities of the traffic safety commission.

HB 1517, relative to vehicle inspection failures for rust.

Ought to Pass, Vote 5-0. Senator Ward for the committee.

This bill will amend RSA266 to change rust examination during vehicle inspection and establish a standard for failure from rust that is structural in nature. This change will ensure that vehicles do not fail inspection for rust that is cosmetic only.

HB 1518, repealing the requirement that motor vehicle lighting and safety equipment be approved by the director of the division of motor vehicles.

Ought to Pass, Vote 5-0. Senator Gannon for the committee.

This bill repeals the requirement that motor vehicle lighting and safety equipment be approved by the director of the Division of Motor Vehicles. As part of vehicle inspections conducted every year on vehicles, this is a more proper venue to determine if after-market parts meet the safety criteria. Further, to date, there has not been a request for approval of lighting devices to the director, making current law unnecessary.

HB 1523, relative to heavy duty recovery vehicles.

Ought to Pass, Vote 5-0. Senator Cavanaugh for the committee.

At the request of the Department of Safety, this bill establishes weight limits for heavy duty recovery vehicles, which recover other large vehicles when they go off of the roadway. This bill creates a registration category for these vehicles and allows a permitting process for the weight class.

(f) With the permission of the policy holder, an insurance producer may provide any bank or lending institution with a copy of the certificate of insurance, policy of insurance, or insurance binder relating to the subject property. If the insurance producer provides a copy of the insurance, policy of insurance, or insurance binder, an insurance producer may complete supplemental questionnaires for a bank or lending institution, provided that the insurance producer shall not be required to analyze or warrant any provisions of the insurance policy.

The facility licensee shall, at a minimum, provide and pay for heat, electricity, water, sewer, maintenance, and security surveillance infrastructure for the video lottery location for which the facility licensee shall receive remuneration pursuant to RSA 284-B:15.

284-B:3 Duties of the Gaming Regulatory Oversight Authority. The authority shall:

I. Issue licenses after completion of the investigations set forth in this chapter. All license applications shall be approved or denied no later than 150 days from the date of application. No license issued under the provisions of this chapter shall be assigned, transferred, or sold, without a complete application and the approval of the authority and payment of a \$150,000 application fee. No person or entity may own or have an interest in more than one facility license.

II. Collect all license fees imposed upon any applicant and all fees imposed by this chapter.

III. Certify net machine income by inspecting records, conducting audits, having its agents on site, or by other reasonable means.

IV. Establish a central computer system at a location of its choosing linking all video lottery machines to a central computer to ensure control over the video lottery machines.

V. Enter into lease agreements with up to 3 technology providers to provide video lottery machines to the state. Lease agreements shall provide that the technology provider supply the quantity and quality of video lottery machines determined by the authority in a timely and efficient manner, and shall be paid with a percentage of the net machine income, as provided in RSA 284-B:15. The technology provider shall provide all maintenance and service of its video lottery machines at no additional charge or fee to the state. Each agreement shall also provide that the technology provider shall be required to replace 30 percent of its video lottery machines annually.

VI. Establish technical standards for approval of video lottery machines, including mechanical and electrical reliability and security against tampering, as it may deem necessary to protect the public from fraud or deception and to ensure the integrity of the operation.

VII. Not later than November 1 in each calendar year of this program, provide a report to the legislative fiscal committee regarding the generation of revenue of video lottery machines. Such report shall include any recommendations for legislation and any public concerns.

VIII. Establish a list of approved table games and establish standards and testing processes for electronic table games.

IX. Have the authority to issue subpoenas and compel the attendance of witnesses, to administer oaths, and require testimony of witnesses under oath.

X. Make and keep records of all proceedings of its public meetings. A copy of the transcript shall be made available to any person upon request and payment of the costs of preparing a copy.

XI. Keep and maintain a list of all license applicants and a record of all actions taken with respect to each applicant. A file and record of the actions by the gaming oversight authority shall be open to public.

XII. Maintain such other files and records as it deems necessary. All records maintained by the gaming oversight authority may be maintained in digital format or other technology, provided that such information is capable of being produced in written form.

XIII. Maintain the confidentiality of all information and data obtained by the authority. Such information shall not be revealed in whole or in part except as otherwise provided by law, upon the lawful order of a court of competent jurisdiction, lawfully executed and served grand jury subpoenas, or with the approval of the attorney general, to a duly authorized law enforcement agency.

XIV. Provide notice of the contents of any information or data released, except to a duly authorized law enforcement agency or grand jury subpoena pursuant to paragraph XIII, shall be given to any applicant, registrant, or licensee in a manner prescribed by the rules adopted by the authority.

XV. If necessary, contract for and procure financial, economic, or security consultants and any other technical and professional services as the authority deem necessary.

XVI. Develop and provide an employee training program which shall include, but not be limited to, information on state law, criminal and civil liability, and management practices.

Dwight Seavey Haynes

January 22, 1937 – March 24, 2018

The Reverend Dwight S. Haynes, 81, of Concord, NH passed away on March 24, 2018, surrounded by his family. Born in Haverhill, MA in 1937, as a four year old, he was diagnosed as deaf and dumb. Sent home by the experts in Boston, Dwight was operated on in the family's living room by a doctor who lived next door. His hearing was significantly restored, and speech therapy helped him to speak.

A shy and reserved child, (surprising to those who knew him as an adult!) Dwight set a goal giving himself the satisfaction of achievement and helping others at the same time, a quality he displayed throughout his life. As a second grader in 1944, he collected 2,650 tin cans for the war effort. This won him top honors in his city's "Tin-Toter Campaign." Told by his high school principal that he would never make it to college, Dwight earned a Bachelor's degree in philosophy from Bates College in 1959, and graduated from Boston University School of Theology in 1962 with dual Master's degrees in Divinity and Psychology & Pastoral Counseling. A lifelong champion of civil rights, one of his proudest moments was marching on Montgomery with Martin Luther King, Jr. In fact, he had just given a talk on the subject to middle school students in February of this year. Before retiring in 2002, Dwight served 40+ years as a pastor in the United Methodist Church (UMC). In notes made in his late 70s, he tallied having conducted 276 weddings, 280 baptisms, 414 members received, 590 funeral/memorial services, "and thousands of meetings."

In retirement he served four interim pastorates, preached in 46 churches, including two services at Bow Mills UMC on the Sunday before he died, and continued to participate in many volunteer activities. Whether serving as a mentor for local pastors and candidates for ministry, attending political rallies or social justice events, or writing letters to the editor, Dwight never stopped finding ways to contribute in any way he could. This included serving as a Granite State Ambassador at the kiosk in front of the State house for eight summers, as well as president of the Havenwood Resident Association. An avid bicyclist, Dwight completed 36,000 miles by his 81st birthday. Another goal he set and exceeded was donating 112 pints of blood. Dwight traveled as often as he could starting with a summer in Europe in his 20s, and taking trips to Israel and Egypt, Greece and Turkey, culminating in lifetime tallies of five continents, 29 nations, 44 states, and 17 National Parks. When speaking of his travels, Dwight frequently shared that while "people may look different and talk different, we all have the same hurts and hopes." He also liked to point out that St. Augustine said, "The world is a book. Those who do not travel read only a page."

Dwight leaves his wife of 56 years, Maryellen; his daughters, Linda and Judith; his grandchildren, Jessica and Joshua; and one great-grandchild, Asher.

A celebration of his life will be held at Wesley United Methodist Church, 79 Clinton Street, Concord, NH on April 12 at 2 pm. In lieu of flowers, memorial contributions may be made to the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) or Wanakee Camperships and mailed to Bow United Methodist Church, 505 South Street, Bow, NH 03304. Memorial gifts may also be made directly to the Audubon Society or the ACLU.

(The Chair recognized Senator D'Allesandro.)

SENATOR D'ALLESANDRO: Thank you, Mister President. I, too, rise and ask for personal privilege. As I was entering my house last evening I got a call from George Lamprey, and George mentioned to me that Stewart Lamprey had passed away. Stewart Lamprey was a unique human being. He was Speaker of the House, he was President of this Senate; he became Under Secretary of Commerce during the Nixon Administration, but more importantly Stewart was a great friend and, I thought, a really great American. I first met Stewart in 1968 when Walter Peterson appointed me to the Athletic Commission as a Commissioner. I walked into the office, Ray Burton was standing in one corner, Cynthia Kirby was at the desk, and Stewart was on the inside, he was Chief of Staff; brought me into the office and Governor Peterson, at that time, thought that this Athletic Commission was something more than the boxing and the wrestling and I got approved. From that point on Stewart really became my friend, and in 1982 Stewart ran my campaign for Governor. We lost in a very close race, and it was the primary. Stewart was a real visionary, a real visionary. In 1972 before he left, he produced a document and talked about legislative changes that should be made. Maybe some of you have read that. I know I keep it in my office and look it over every once in a while. But Stewart had a vision of how this should all work, and did a great job of making things happen, making things happen. After he left politics Stewart started a company called New Hampshire Business Sales. And New Hampshire Business Sales was a very successful real estate operation, and he did a great job. And Jeb, you probably remember the work he did in Meredith. That beautiful building he constructed in Meredith. As I said, Stewart was a visionary, but in this business, as I say often, life's all about relationships; I had a relationship with Stewart, and it was a very meaningful one, and go and meet him and we'd talk politics and he ended his life in a nursing home up in Meredith and he passed away there. But, we all need somebody to talk to at sometime in our lives, and

we get, you know, get an answer to some of the questions that we pose, and that person you have to believe in strongly. And I had that relationship with Stewart. He taught me a lot about politics and a lot about how to do things right, and how to correct things that weren't going so well. Stewart had a long and very, very successful life; a long and successful life. And I hope that the mark that he left on this state will continue in this context. Government has a purpose, that purpose is important to the people we serve; and Stewart made that happen as Speaker of the House, and as President of the Senate, and that's a great guide, I think, a great guide for me to look at as we move forward. I'm very proud to have known Stewart; very proud to have said he tutored me in the business of politics, and very proud to say Stewart did good things for New Hampshire. He did good things for this state, and should be remembered for those things. Thank you, Mister President.

(The Chair recognized Senator Fuller Clark.)

SENATOR FULLER CLARK: Thank you very much. I request personal privilege? There're some remarks I'd like to share with the body. Many of us here today were either children or young adults in the 1960s, and we lived through a devastatingly painful and shocking period when many of our most remarkable leaders were struck down by an assassin's bullet: President John F. Kennedy, Medgar Evers, Malcolm X, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., and Senator Robert Kennedy. Today, on the day after the 50th anniversary of the death of Martin Luther King, we are reminded of that painful time in our nation's history, and of the great loss to our country. Here in New Hampshire I'd like to share the fact that on October 26, 1952 a 23 year old divinity student at Boston University delivered a sermon at the historic Pearl Street Church in Portsmouth. Eleven years later, now a Doctor of Divinity, Martin Luther King, Jr. stood before the Lincoln Memorial in our nation's capital to deliver one of the most poignant and powerful speeches in American history. He said he had a dream that one day his children would be judged not by the color of their skin, but by the content of their character, and that one day little black boys and little black girls will be able to join hands with little white boys and little white girls as sisters and brothers. And in that speech he evoked our state, imploring us, quote, "to let freedom ring from the prodigious hilltops of New Hampshire." As you know, fifty years ago yesterday, Dr. King's life was ended by an assassin's bullet. He was a great voice of moral clarity in troubled times; an advocate for peaceful nonviolent protest in a time of violent oppression. His legacy lives on when we, as a country, pause to honor his memory through the celebration of Civil Rights Day. On the 9th, Dr. King's assassination, Senator Robert Kennedy was speaking in Indianapolis. When he received word of this terrible tragedy, Senator Kennedy, who would himself be struck down by an assassin's bullet just two months later, said in honoring Dr. King's memory, quote, "What we need in the United States is not division. What we need in the United States is not hatred. What we need in the United States is not violence and lawlessness. What we need is love, and wisdom, and compassion towards one another, and a feeling of justice towards those who still suffer within our country. Sadly, that message is as relevant today as it was fifty years ago. I hope we can all take it to heart. Thank you, Mister President.

SENATOR DANIELS: Thank you, Mister President. Senate Finance will convene in room 103 at 2:30.

SENATOR WOODBURN: I rise to pay tribute to some North Country legends who we have lost recently. Ronney Allen Lyster died unexpectedly, and he came to the North Country to be a logger, got his chainsaw caught in a tree and walked away and started selling cars and created a very, very successful multi-dealership; and owns and operates one of the most beautiful farmsteads in our region. Ronney was a man with a big heart, contagious and infectious smile, constantly in motion. He gave so much to others—his time, his heart, his energy, and his money. He'll be sorely missed.

We also lost a former colleague in the House, Representative Ralph "Buster" Doolan, Jr., who was living in Candia, now. A graduate of Lancaster Academy; excelled in sports, and was a member of the 1951 Class B State Champions; went to Norwich University, the University of New Hampshire; served in the United States Army. He enjoyed a successful and varied career in many different companies: LM Pike, Timberland Machines, Rotobec; and was a pioneer in some of the timber harvesting tools that have come to be known today. He also, along with his wife Jean, found in 1989, *Sawlog Bulletin Magazine*, an international business journal for the timber harvesters. He was very involved in student's, young people programs to encourage and promote local sports, including the Coos and Upper Grafton Independent Football League. He was involved in the Republican State Committee on the Executive Board, and was elected in 2012 to the New Hampshire House of Representatives. And we will certainly miss Buster. I had a few opportunities to drive to Concord with him, and he was just a great person, cared deeply about people, and we certainly miss him today.

I'd also like to recognize and let you all know that James Hill Fadden, Sr., who came to this body with three generations of Fadden's, a few years back to celebrate our maple sugaring industry, passed. He was born in Lincoln, and was the son of Norm and Marion Fadden. The Fadden family has a deep history; deep connections to the community and to each other. He was a veteran, and also an active member of his community. He also ran, for many years, the Fadden's General Store; and, obviously, the maple sugar operation, which the family is famous for in our parts.

And, finally, just up the road in Lincoln, we lost William Michael Farrand, and he was a truly unique person whose challenges in life started at birth but they never slowed him down of pursuing things that he loved. He was fiercely independent, he loved nature and the outdoors, and his family and friends were all very, very close to him. He found his true calling, Mister President, when he was hired as the Wolfman at Clark's Trading Post; and to be remembered and loved by chasing after children calling him, "Scram you old Goat" made many young people's lives better. And his footprint is sorely missed today by people, and I'm glad to see the accolades across our newspapers when William Farrand passed, and his memory will be certainly be remembered by many, many people to come. Thank you, Mister President.
